****** FCIC Seeking Floyd County **Comments**

The Federal Crop Insurance (FCIC) of the Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on a proposed amendment to regulations for insuring soybeans in Floyd County, effective with the 1981 crop year.

The proposed rule would benefit soybean crop insurance policy holders by amending two sections of the Soybean Crop Insurance Policy to prescribe procedures for allowing them to replant acreage to soybeans under certain conditions and to become eligible for a replanting payment under certain conditions.

Down For 1980

The 1980 grain sorghum crop has been reduced as much as one-third by this summer's drought, reported Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Associa-tion. "The crop could be off as much as fifty percent if general rains don't fall in the next two weeks throughout much of the sorghum belt," he said.

Harp reported a telephone survey he conducted during the last week of July. "The crops are now in critical condition even where they had not suffered earlier in the year," he said. "The crops have gone as far as they can go without rain and they will deteriorate rapidly from this point. Even irrigated crops have suffered from the extreme heat."

Harp found that much of the crop is beyond the point of return. Large areas are being baled as hay, chopped as ensilage, or grazed out. These areas include a region west and south of San Antonio, Texas and another strip through North Texas, Oklahoma, Southeastern Kansas and Missouri.

The irrigated crops of the Texas High Plains and Western Kansas are fair, but need supplemental rain and cooler weather. Western Kansas is spotted with much of the crop still in fair condition, provided rains fall very soon. The same is true of Nebraska.

Most of South Texas and South Central Texas sorghum matured before the onset of the heat wave. Harvest there produced fair-to-good yields.

The drought is already affecting market prices. Short crop prospects have strengthened prices to the "call level" for sorghum in the reserve program. On July 25, the last of the reserve sorghum was called. This means that more than 80 million bushels of sorghum will be forced into the market within 90 days following the call.

If the market continues to strengthen, reserve corn will be called. Then, over a billion bushels of reserve corn will be dropped into the market. (USDA is presently considering a plan to raise the call levels.) The "called" grain will tend to hold a ceiling on prices-at least temporarily.

The extent of damage to the corn crop will ultimately determine the price of both corn and sorghum. Some analysts are now predicting the 1980 corn crop to be 6.4 billion bushels or less. If the corn crop drops below this level, all reserve stocks will be absorbed and both corn and sorghum prices will remain strong throughout the coming

COTTON

Cotton bollworm activity remains high in some areas while egg and worm counts have dropped in others. Irrigated cotton in corn producing areas continues to receive the worst bollworm pressure. Areas in which irrigations have been discontinued and cotton has stopped terminal growth have the lowest level of bollworm populations. Open bolls can now be found in some areas. Many fields have a good percentage of mature bolls

Yeary Elected To

Angus Association

Jack Yeary, Floydada, has been elected to membership in the American Angus Association, reports Dr. C.K. Allen, executive vice-president of the national organization with headquarters in St. Joseph, Missouri.

The American Angus Association, with some 38,000 active life and junior members, is the largest beef cattle registry association in the world. Its computerized records include detailed information on nearly 10 million registered Angus.

The Association records ancestral information and keeps records of production on individual animals for its members. These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association. Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raise high quality beef for U.S. consumpthat can be considered safe from bollworm attack.

Reports from pest management program field scouts from last week indicated the following bollworm populations. For Floyd County egg counts of 5 to 87 and worm numbers of 0 to 21 for every 100 plants were recorded. One field was observed with 40 per cent of the plants infested with bollworms. In Crosby County 0 to 13 eggs and 0-12 worms per 100 plants were reported.

A continuous egg-lay in some fields has resulted in a few more small worms each week. We can expect continuing problems until the temperatures drop to a point where egg laying activity ceases and cotton plants terminate growth.

SORGHUM

Headworms (bollworms and fall armyworms) are present in developing sorghum heads. Checks fields in several locations to determine the percent infested heads. In seed production fields numbers approaching one per head will cause economic damage.

The cotton is opening fast this week. If this continues, there should be some defoliation beginning in about two weeks to some fields.

Cotton prices are still going up. Wednesday contracts were at 3400 points over the 1980 loan. The outlook on yields varies greatly throughout the county. The dryland that has not been plowed up will not yield much while some of the irrigated crop should make over a bale per acre. Some estimates are as high as 11/2 bales per acre.

Corn harvest is increasing each day. Some of the fields are still too wet. Most of the corn is running around 25% moisture at this time. Yields are ranging from around 6,000-6,5000 lbs. to over 9,000 lbs.

Puzzling Words Defined

What do oncology, neo-plasm and chemotherapy as cancerous tumor. have in common? They're medical terms commonly used in cancer-treatment and research. Since we often fear things we don't understand. 'strange' words do no-

thing to ease our fears of cancer. On the other understanding these words can help a bit. Here are a few of the most "puzzling" words to most people - and their definitions (although the list is far from complete):

Oncology — the study of cancer which has become a specialty branch of modern medicine.

Cancer — a large group of more than 100 diseases characterized by uncontrolled growth and spread of abnormal cells.

Neoplasm - any new abnormal growth of cells or tissues that may be benign or malignant but is

Benign Tumor - an abnormal swelling or growth that is not a cancer but causes a reaction by its pressure on adjacent

Malignant Tumor — a tumor made up of cancer cells. These tumors continue to grow and invade surround tissues, with the ability to break away and grow elsewhere.

Metastasis nounced mah-TAS-tahsis) the process by which cancer cells break away from their primary point of origin and spread to other parts of the body through the lymph and blood systems and start new cancerous tumors.

Biopsy — the surgical removal of a piece of tissue from a patient for microscope examination to determine whether cancer cells are present.

stance that causes cancer. Chemotherapy - treatment of cancer by administering chemicals and drugs to destroy the can-cerous cells with minimal effects to normal, healthy

Radiotherapy - treat ment of cancer with radiant energy to destroy cancerous cells. Cobalt-60 is a commonly used radioactive element in radiotherapy.

Immunotherapy treatment of cancer by stimulating the body's own immune system against the disease.

Sarcoma - a form of cancer that arises in the connective tissue and muscles, such as bone and cartilage.

Carcinoma - a form of cancer that arises in the tissues that cover or line such organs of the body as skin, intestines, uterus, lung and breast.







WBC Offering New Activity Courses This Fall

A list of 18 activity courses-including nine at night-whose emphasis is on proper physical conditioning, will be offered during the fall semester by the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation at Wayland Restiet College

Wayland Baptist College. The classes, which each offer one hour college credit, range in nature from tumbling and gymnastics to nutrition and figure control and are designed to meet a variety of needs for people in the Plainview area, according to Dr. Sylvia Nadler, head of the department.

"We think we have something this fall for just about everyone, parti-cularly persons who are interested in bettering their physical condition," Dr. Nadler said. "And, many of the classes are in the late afternoon or evening to accomodate working schedules."

For the first time ever, all the P.E. activity courses scheduled by WBC are oper to high school students, although only seniors may enroll in any class for credit. High school freshmen through juniers may audit any class, and youngsters below that age level must be accompanied by a parent enrolled in that same

Nutrition and Figure Control, being taught for the first time ever this fall, is aimed particularly at young and middledaged people who have developed weight problems and are interested in doing something about it, according to Mrs. Tom (Barbara) Almon, who will be instructing the class.

'We're urging men, as in the class because good nutrition is something that affects everyone, says Mrs. Almon, who is administrator for Plainview's Christian Manor.

The class, which meets each Monday night from 7-9 p.m. in Hutcherson Center, will feature guest lectures and discussions with hypoglycemics, diabetics, pharmacists, psy-chologists and nutritionists, among others. "We plan to deal with the fallacies of fad diets, how nutrition affects the aging process, hear from some people who have already lost weight," Mrs. Almon

Another related course - Fitness - will be taught by the new WBC professor Pat Buchanan and will meet at 8 p.m. every Monday, Wednes-day and Friday for one hour. The course will deal with the various aspects of physical education and good physical condition-ing, including the "why" as well as the "how." Among the topics for dis-cussion are how exercise relieves tension and the difference in being "over-weight" and being "fat."

Several other night classes will put physical conditioning to practical use through a variety of activities. Heading the list is Wayland's popular Aerobics class, which was taught during the 1970 80 taught during the 1979-80 academic year to over 1,400 persons in Plainview and the surrounding

The beginning Aerobics class will meet each Monday evening during the semester from 6-8 p.m. in Hutcherson Center, while the intermediate class, reserved for those who have already had the introductory course, will meet during the same time period on Thursday evenings.

Three other classes are scheduled in the late afternoon and should be of parti ar interest to pe-ople with busy schedules at night, according to

Two sections in Weight Training, also to be taught by Buchanan, are being offered, with one meeting from 12:15-1:30 p.m. on

and the other from 5:15 until 6:30 on Monday and Wednesday. schedules will accomodate businessmen who would like to either work out during their lunch hours or before they go home,' Nadler explained.

Also to be offered in the late afternoon is Skating, which meets from 5:15-7:15 p.m. on Thursday, and Self-Defense, scheduled for Tuesdays from 4-6 p.m. at the Ash Elementary School Gym.

"The Skating class is designed especially for adults since we have another class (11 a.m. Monday and Friday) for col-lege-age students," Nad-ler noted, adding that a \$20 facility usage fee will also be charged to students in addition to the regular enrollment fees. Self-Defense, also be-

ing taught by Buchanan, was originally designed for public school teachers but is now open to all interested persons. "We're urging local businesses to allow their female employees to enroll in the course, since it is of special interest to them," said Nadler. Registration for the course will be conducted September 9 at the Ash Gym.

Also on the night schedule is Tumbling and Gymnastics, which meet on Tuesdays from 8-10 a.m. at Hutcherson Gym. Kym Thompson Radke, a former Miss Wayland and a summer graduate of WBC currently employed by the Barnyard Academy, will teach

Introductory and inter-

mediate courses in Karate, to be taught by Buchanan, are also on the evening class list. The two classes will meet con-

currently from 6-8 p.m. each Tuesday night.
Other activity courses

scheduled during regular class hours include Bowling (10:50 a.m. Tuesday and Thursday), Golf and Volleyball (9:25 a.m. Tuesday - Thursday), Swimming I (10:50 a.m. Tuesday-Thursday), Tennis and Badminton (9 a.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday), Racquetball (11 a.m. Monday-Friday and 8 a.m. Tuesday-Thursday), and Swimming II -Life Saving (10:50 a.m. Tuesday-Thursday).

Both sessions of Rac-quetball, which will be taught by Mrs. Jackie (Myrna) Clark, will meet at the YMCA on South Ennis, with each session limited to 12 people. Life Saving which along with Swimming I also meets at the YMCA, will be taught by WBC sophomore Morris Wilcox, a certified Water Safety Instructor.

Registration for daytime courses will be conducted September 2 in Harral Auditorium, while registration for evening classes will be held during the week of September 8-12. Cost per class is \$33.33 for auditing students and \$50 for credit. A \$15 application fee is also charged to credit students enrolling in Wayland for the first time.
