Playoffs underway

The Swiftettes are classy. The Bobcats are awesome. The Swifts are dangerous. And they're all giving local basketball fans a big case of playoff fever.

Their goals are obvious, but the path to those goals comes one game at a time. For the time is here when a single loss spells the end of the season.

Nazareth's Swiftettes, defending a record of six-straight state championships, pulverized two opponents to capture the bi-district and area titles during the week and advance to the Region I-A Girls' Tournament in Levelland.

Dimmitt's Bobcats, defending state champions and the only undefeated team left in Class AAA, hiked their record to 32-0 during the week and are ready to take on Boys Ranch in the bi-district game Friday night.

Nazareth's Swifts, regional runners-up last year, will begin their playoff quest tonight (Thursday) when they play Silvertown for the bi-district title.

Meanwhile, the county's fourth district championship team this year, the Hart Lady Longhorns, saw their best-ever season come to an end Friday night when they lost their bi-district game to Plains, 44-40.

Swiftettes
The Swiftettes will be gunning for their eighth straight Region I championship Friday when they begin play in the regional tourney at Levelland's Texan Dome. Nazareth meets Hartley, 43-39 overtime winner over Claude, in opening action at 7 p.m. Friday. The winner there would meet either Klondike or Robert Lee in the Semifinals

at 11 a.m. Saturday. The finals will be played at 7 p.m. Saturday.

"Hartley has two really good players," Nazareth Coach Joe Lombard said. "Both are about 5-10 and one plays inside and one outside. They are supposed to be two of the better players in the area."

"It's not going to be easy," Lombard said. "We'll have to play well to win."

"Klondike has three starters who are 6-2, 6-0 and 5-11. They are really big. On the other hand Robert Lee has an all-state post player and I've had some people tell me they will be the best team at regional."

Nazareth will have to handle Hartley, Klondike or Robert Lee to advance to the finals, where they would meet the winner of four "really good" teams vying for finals berth.

Among those are Sudan, Phillips, Forsan and either Whitharral or Midland Greenwood. The winner of that area game was not known at press time Wednesday.

Juveniles charged in burglary

Another highly successful Junior Livestock Show climaxed Saturday with a lively auction sale that saw prices only slightly off from last year.

Buyers paid \$130,802.30 for the 125 barrows, 125 lambs and eight steers that went through the sale ring, then kept their pocketbooks open to donate \$12,284.67 to three worthy causes, giving the sale a grand total of \$143,086.97, according to accountants of Stanley Schaeffer, CPA.

Mike Anthony's Grand Champion steer brought \$2,360 on a bid of \$2 per pound, while Jane Hicks's Reserve Champion got a guaranteed price of \$1,740 on a bid of \$1.50 per pound.

Overall, steers averaged \$1.06½ per pound, 14% below last year's \$1.40 average.

Woody Glass's Grand Champion barrow received a guaranteed bid of \$4 per pound for a \$964 total, and Cara Odom was guaranteed \$728 for her Reserve Champion on a bid of \$3.25 per pound.

The Grand and Reserve Champions and the 14 other breed champions and reserves in the barrow sale averaged \$2.47 per pound in the sale, and barrows overall averaged \$1.877 per pound — virtually the same as last year's \$1.88 average.

Mark Standlee showed the Grand Champion lamb and it was worth \$1,105 to him in the sale, bringing a bid of \$8.50 per pound. Woody Glass's Reserve Champion lamb brought a guarantee of \$516 on a bid of \$4 per pound.

The eight top lambs in the show (Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, breed champions and runners-up) averaged \$4.06 per pound and the other 117 lambs that qualified for the sale brought an average of \$3.46. Overall,

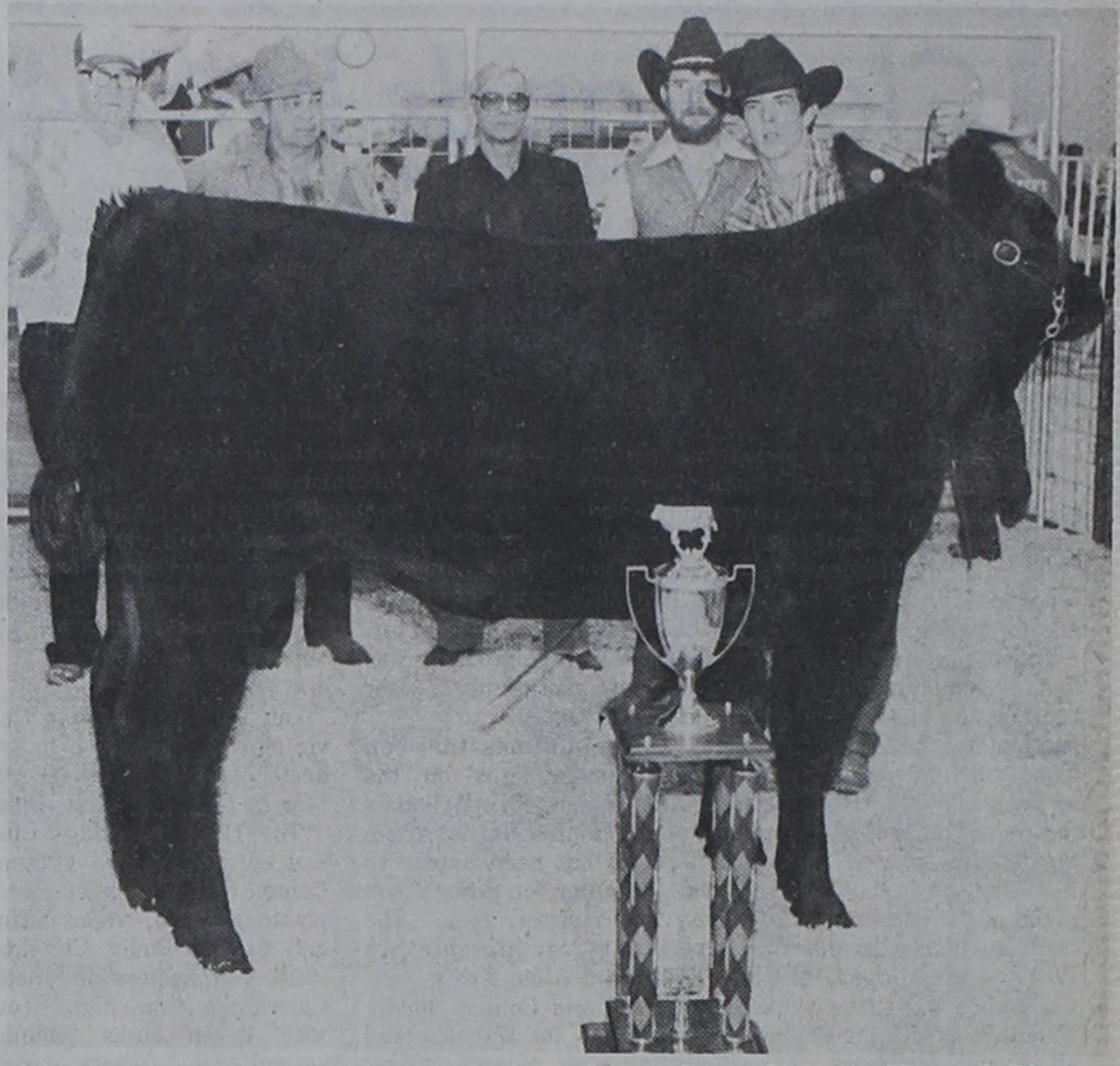

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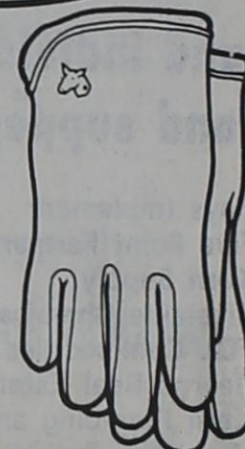
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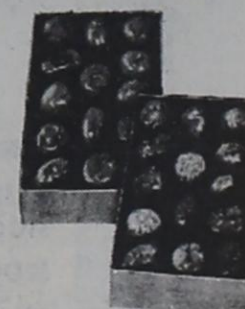
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First Baptist Church sets concert Sunday

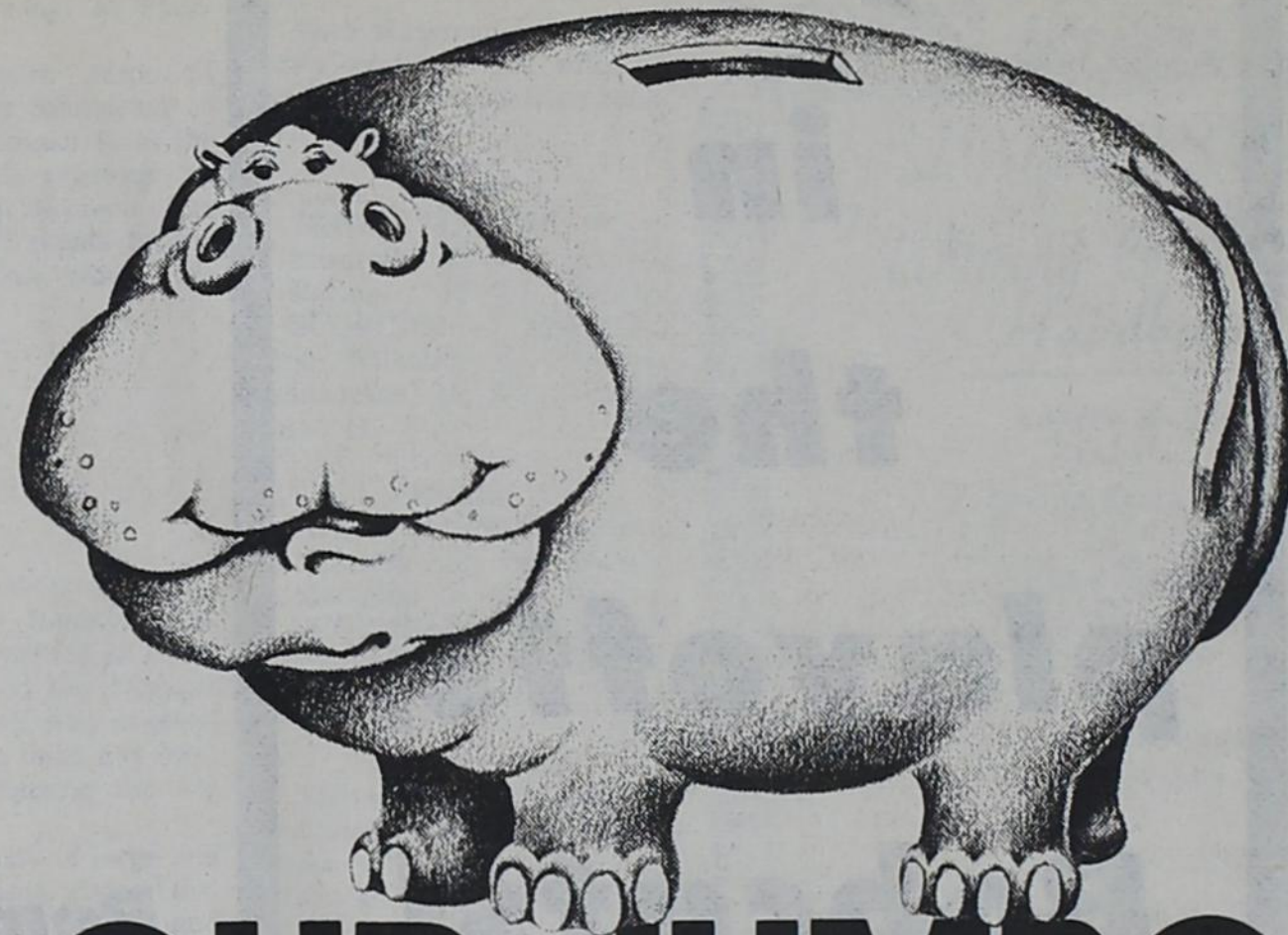

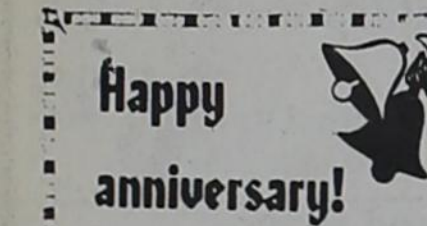

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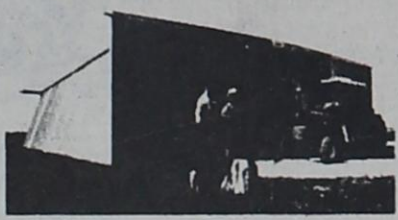
