More than 150 4-H members are making final preparations for the South Plains District 4-H Food Show. It will be held Saturday. December 12, at the Texas Tech University Home Economics

Building in Lubbock. Youths from 20 counties will compete in senior and junior divisions. Each division has four food classes: main dish, vegetables, breads and cereals, and nutritious snacks and desserts. Senior division winners in each category will advance to the state 4-H Food Show

next June in College Station. Contestants in the district event are all winners of their county food shows, said Peggy Robertson, chairman of the district event. She is Extension home

economics agent in Dawson County. Judging in the district show begins at 9:30 a.m. in the Tech Home Economics Building. Dr. Catherine Crawford said. She is district director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Four-H is a youth program of the Extension

An ever-increasing number of people and organizations are joining an intensive campaign to prevent the storage of nuclear waste in the Panhandle area. The latest organization to join the battle is 'Serious Texans Against Nuclear Dumping' (STAND), which was organized in Tulia recently.

STAND will offer an informative program on the storage of nuclear waste in the Tulia High School Auditorium.

State Representative Chip Staniswalis will be present as well as aides from the offices of Jack Hightower. Kent Hance. Bill Sarpalius and Reagan Brown. These have been confirmed and we are waiting to hear from our other elected officials.

suitable, they said, are compactness of the core sample, relative dryness and a stable geologic formation.

The reasons this area should be concerned are (1) if the nuclear waste material radiates or leaks into our underground water it will ruin it: (2) the nuclear waste will have to be transported by truck or rail, and there's always a chance for an accident: (3) the proposed site is near Mackenzie Dam and could contaminate that; and (4) it could ruin farmland because nuclear waste can radiate through soil.

Also, the site would require 160 acres, plus a restricted area five miles around, plus prohibition of oil drilling or mining for 12 miles beyond that.

One reason that DOF can go ahead Senators Bentson and Tower have and drill is that Gov. Clements has not opposed it. Nearly all the other governors of affected states have opposed it.

There are three levels of nuclear waste. Low-level is exposed clothing. gloves, and so forth. Medium-level waste is what is used in hospitals for radiation therapy, and other such specific uses. High-level waste is spent fuel from large reactors and by-products of weapon systems.

This site would be for disposal of high-level radio-active materials, and this would be the first such dump.

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Tips for the cotton producer

In the face of a projected recordbreaking cotton harvest, Murray Williams of Altus, Oklahoma, Chairman of the Cotton Board, and W.T. Robertson of Holly Ridge, Mississippi, Chairman of Cotton Incorporated, recently offered their views on how producers can aid their own industry.

Their advice stems from experience. Both cotton producers. Williams, who farms in southwestern Oklahoma, and Robertson, who farms in the Mississippi Delta, are strong supporters of cotton's research and promotion program.

"Considering crop projections, we have to do everything we can to promote demand," said Williams, who will complete his second and last term as Chairman or the Cotton Board on December 31. "At the same time, we

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must continue research to reduce costs and improve efficiency from the farm to the mill so that cotton can regain adequate profitability."

"We all know the tremendous chal-

A concern expressed by Robertson is the research and promotional push behind synthetics. Currently, the synthetic industry's research and promotion budget out-paces cotton's by

almost \$15 to \$1. But, thanks to advances made by cotton's "self-help" program, both

about the industry's future. "When adding up that a 15-year decline in overall market share has been

arrested; that just as new equipment and systems have solved old problems, existing problems can be overcome through continuing support of the program. There is light at the end of the tunnel based upon long term projections for increased demand," stated Wil-

Robertson is quick to add that, on the research side, cotton has made good progress ranging from expanded technical assistance to foreign textile mills to research into hybrid cottons and cottenseed. Programs are continuing to improve efficiency in production and

processing. In addition, emphasis is being given to combat byssinosis which both producers call one of cotton's most serious problems. Toward this end, Cotton Incorporated is currently in an \$8 million accelerated program involving both government and industry.

Robertson also reports that greater emphasis will be given to international markets in 1982. Cotton Incorporated's first European office will open in London next year. And the Cotton Board has recently received approval by the Secretary of Agriculture for Cotton Incorporated to open an office in Osaka, Japan, to serve the growing Far Eastern market. This office is scheduled to open in early 1982.

These new overseas offices will complete Cotton Incorporated's network to more effectively provide worldwide technical assistance to textile mills and to expand U.S. cotton's share of these

"All of us must work together." Williams stressed, "in building the most successful cotton and research promotion program possible. The reason is clear: if cotton is to continue to make strides then greater advances in cotton research and promotion must be

"Some producers feel that the 'other grower' should carry the burden. Obviously, with the challenges we face, we need total producer support. In my opinion, the per bale assessment is a real bargain today, even in this time of inflation. Believe me, the grower gets his money's worth.

Funded and directed by U.S. cotton producers through per bale assessments, the Cotton Board based in Memphis, Tennessee, oversees the cotton research and promotion program and contracts with Cotton Incorporated to carry out actual projects. Cotton Incorporated has marketing offices in New York, research facilities in Raleigh. and additional offices in Dallas and Los

Volunteerism-A key link in extension programs

Without hard-working volunteers, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System, would be much less effective in carrying out its informal educational programs in agriculture, home economics, and community and youth development.

"Each state boasts a Cooperative Extension Service, and it's been said that this organization makes greater use of more volunteers than any other entity existing today," points out Dr. Ken Denmark, an Extension staff development specialist.

"County Extension agents pride themselves in the way they involve volunteers in planning, organizing and implementing local educational activities," says Denmark.

This year alone, some 63,000 Texans have been involved as Extension volunteers. This includes about 18,000 serving on county program building committees, 23,000 in organized homemakers clubs and more than 22,000 in 4-H programs and activities.

For Extension's agricultural programs, farmers and ranchers volunteer their land, labor and equipment to test and demonstrate new ideas for the benefit of their neighbors. They voluntarily provide information about their farming and ranching operations and in many ways contribute their time and talents to the success of Extension programs, notes Denmark.

IT'S A FACT A well trained horse for farm and ranch work is hard to find. So the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has developed a "Ranch Horse School" to help producers learn how to breed and train top quality work horses. This may suggest that even the popular "threewheeler" can't replace the versatile ranch horse. Helping farmers and ranchers to raise and train work horses is another example of "The Extension

The goal: A once-over cotton harvest, with higher quality. A tough act, but a major U.S. agriculture chemical company thinks they have the answer with a new boll opener. The company is careful to describe the product as a boll opener, not a defoliant. According to company scientists, it works best as a preconditioner used before a defoliant is applied. This means more defoliation can be expected. In a summary of test plots, the product showed first pick yields of up to 95 percent, three weeks earlier in the season, as compared to 75 percent from untreated fields. Growers using the product on an experimental basis report up to 25 percent more high-quality cotton from the first pick, according to the company. That should mean higher prices and harming for prices and happier farmers
