provided by the school home parents for their signatures. School officials were restricted from reviewing or challenging any of the information.
Adversely, this year parents of child ren applying for the free or reduced meals (breakfasts and lunches) must apply in person at the school for the
application. It should be emphasized that school
officials are eager for all children who truly qualify to receive the free and
reduced meals. However, accurate inreduced meals. However, accurate in-
formation will be necessary in order for the claims to be substantiated.

In fact, several consumer several consumer surveys show that there are really few differences in the way homemakers-employed and at home-handle meal-management. home or not, these employed outside the can help ensure nutritious family meals in the face of today's hurried lifestyle: Before you shop, make a long-range plan for meals. <br> plan for meals. This will mean <br> important factors: Built in nutritional balance. Sticking to a budget <br> with. Thinking about the "where" and when" your family eats various meals

-Thinking about the "where" and
"when" your a family eats various meals
and making allowances for special
diets, such as low low calories ones. Then to make the plan really work-
able, add some time-saving items and steps to your plan, and, finally be sure to think "Plan Ahead". In planning meals and snacks for your
family, you'll want to ensure that meals family. you want to ensure that meals
are balanced--that is, planned accord-
ing to the family members' nutrient needs.
Use the Basic Food Groups in
planning, and include the number of recommend-ed servings for each mem-
br. Stay within your budget. This is
especially important in these inflationmary times.
Consider the foods you have available, such as fresh vegetables from the
garden or those you canned in the spring.
Check newspapers, television Check newspapers, television and
several stores for advertised specials.
Make an inventory of foods on hand Make an inventory of foods on hand
based on your menu. based on your menu.
Plan to shop for a week or two at a time-not every other day. Frequent
trips to the store waste time and cause trips to the store
impulse buying.
Efficient use of Efficient use of time is special to busy
homemakers. Thinking about homemakers. Thinking about the
"where" and the "when". of family mears-ahead of time will make a big
difference in meal effie difference in meal efficiency.
Will all meals be eaten at home or "on the run?" Will you do all the meal planning, or will some members eat
away from home where away from home where you have no
control over their selection for that meal?
If so
sure you plan helps "fill in the nutrition gaps" at the meals they do eat at home.
Also, make sure at-home meals help bring their "calorie count"" bach into the necessary range. Fewer calories at
home will "even up" the score for home will "even up" the score for

## 'The guiding light of the west'

Editors note: The following is an article reprinted from the Feb ruary 1958 issue of Texas Co-op Power magazine. It gives a brief, interesting history of the Floyd County Hesperian. Homer Steen served as editor-publisher of The Hesperian from 1911 to 1962 . He died on December 12, 1971 after 60 years of newspaper work.

Most Newspapers are rather prosaically named somthing like "News" of "Gazette". or "Herald."
But not the Newspaper in Floydada, it is named "The Floyd County Hesperian.

How. did it come by such a name? The founder. Claude V. Hall, had been an only child and, having no playmates, had read much. He had been especially interested in the adventures of Ulysses, who in his wanderings was impressed by the star Hesperus, the evening star in the west.

Actually Hesperus is the planet now known as Venus, which moves in an orbit between that of Mercury and the earth. At its brightest Venus is far more brilliant than any fixed star
The ancients of the time of Ulysses thought of it as two stars-Lucifer, the morning star, and Hesperus, the evening star.

Thus Hesperus, the evening star, was thought of as the beacon of the west, or the guiding light of the west.
And that was the way that Claude Hall thought of his news paper-as the guiding light of the west. So he named it THE FLOYD COUNTY HESPERIAN when he first established it back in 1896.
And a guiding light the newspaper has remained, even though Mr. Hall didn't long remain with paper. He moved on into teaching after taking a master's degree from the University of Texas. His thesis was a history of Floyd County.
Present editor of the Hesperian is Homer Steen, who worked for his father on the paper as a boy.
In 1911 he became manager of the paper. That same year it was burned out by a disastrous fire. After the fire, the business was re-organized as a corporation. Mr. Steen again managed the paper and has gradually acquired more and more of the stock in the corporation until he now owns about 85 per cent of it.
Through all these years Mr. Steen has kept the idea of the "guiding light" definitely in mind. His newspaper takes a strong stand on matters which it feels will help he Floyd County area to grow and improve.

Diversified agriculture in the area gets full reporting and boosting.
Other community events get the same type of support.
The women of Floydada organize study clubs and hold meeting aimed at improving themselves and their community.
The HESPERIAN duly reports these meeting in full, noting where the next meeting will be and that roll call at that next meeting will be answered with "Sugestions on how to improve our town."
Reported, too, are the many events which make up the life of a community-births and deaths, weddings, illnesses, happy times. and sad times.
Chuck Day, proprietor of Chuck's Market, has a relapse of an unknown fever contracted while in service. His return to the veteran's hospital is reported so that all his friends may know. that all his friends may know. And it is also reported that Mrs Day is continuing to run th market while Chuck is away.
It is reported that the Rosson twins will study at Stephens College, that the Band Boosters will kickoff their ticket campaign, that the Floydada Lions Club will sponsor the annual sale of brooms for the Texas Blind Shops
caravan, that farmers will tour new farm projects, that the Whirlwinds will play a football game-and on, and on.
The HESPERIAN also has an editorial page. Many weekly editors have abandon the editorial page, but not the "guiding light of the west."
The HESPERIAN still recog. nizes its obligation to express its leadership and its opinions on the editorial page. It-does exactly that.
The road program in Floyd County appears bogged down. The HESPERIAN points out that two elections have already been held, that the Commissioners Court seems to be favoring still another election.
The editorial page has its lighter side, too. Readers are likely to be advised. "It takes as much energy to wish as it does to plan."

Or they may read a quote from another paper: "Now that they have made cigarettes less irritating, we wish they would get to work on the commercials."

Mr. Steen has three children. two boys and a girl. All of them have worked on the paper at times, but all are away now. His daughter is now a bookkeeper and the two sons are pilots.

THE LATE HOMER STEEN, his son Maurice, and granddaughter Lisa. Steen was the first editor of the Hesperian from 1911-1962. Steen worked on the Hesperian as a boy, 1958
