School board hires 2 new teachers

The Lockney ISD school board met Tuesday, June 14, for the regular monthly board meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, payment of current bills were approved, tax report #9 was approved, and the current investments were approved.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark gave his monthly report during which he reported on the building repair work. Paving and resurfacing of the parking lots around both of the school buildings has been completed. Some of the rooms in the Junior High school are being repainted and the wood flooring in the high school gym has been put down though the floor is not finished yet.

Two new teachers were also hired during the meeting. Deborah Woolverton has been hired as the new Junior High science teacher, at the state base salary, plus bonus.

Mickey Crow has been hired as the new boys coach to replace coach Knippa. Mickey comes from Cline Forrest High School in Houston and has nine years experience as a football coach. He and his wife, Mendy have a three year old son, Darrall. Mickey was also hired at the state base salary plus bonus.

The board also rescinded a motion made on May 10, 1983 to accept a bid from Bill Hunter to replace the lighting fixtures in the High School. This was

done because the school is going to buy the fixtures and it will cost less than \$5,000 to do the work, therefore the board does not have to have bids. Mr. Hunter will be doing the installation though.

The board then began its first work session on the 1983-84 school budget.

The meeting adjourned at 1:15 a.m.

Wheat harvest to full swing

The wheat harvest has begun in the Lockney area on what appears to be an excellent crop. Most of the wheat being cut now is dryland wheat.

The first loads were hauled to the elevators on June 13. W.T. Cooper had the first load at the Coop Elevator and Stinson Stringer had the first load at Sandhill. Muncy received its first load from J.C. Anderson on June 14. The first loads at Patterson Grain were cut on the Patterson farms and hauled in on June 15. On the 15th Patterson also received the first customer loads from the Bacaus farms. Sterley's first load was hauled in by Lloyd Widener.

Cutting on the irrigated wheat in the area should begin any time. With all the hot weather we are having it has helped dry the wheat for cutting.

Wheat must test 14.0 or below to be considered dry. A lot of the wheat brought in is running 61 test weight.

Many area farmers do their own harvesting but those who don't have their own equipment hire custom harvesters to cut for them. These custom harvesters travel all around the country cutting grain crops for a living.

To all the farmers we wish good luck and an excellent yield.

Season Football Tickets On Sale

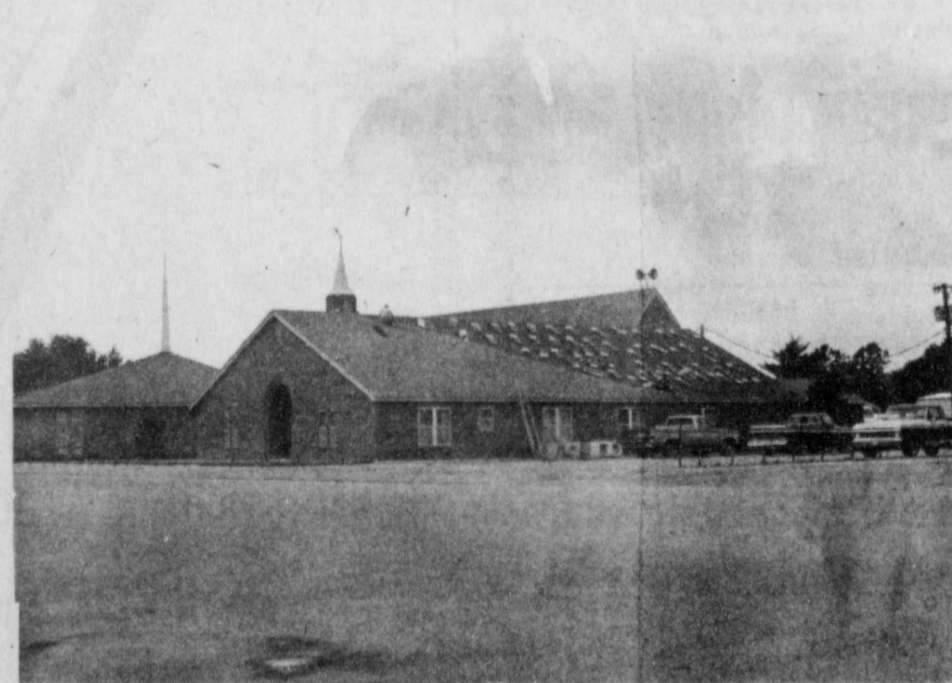

PERSPECTIVES

Sally Ride is making her first trip into space. Ordinarily, such a piece of news would be paid little attention. But since Sally is obviously a female, the very first that our nation has sent into the Great Beyond, lots of attention is being given to the event.

All of this bothers Ms. Ride a bit. If women had been making the kinds of strides they were supposed to have made over the last several years, then this should not be such a big deal. But it is, and even though some think it is about time that a woman made it into space, the fuss over the event indicates that while women may have come a long way, they have a way to go yet.

I have never been what anyone could remotely consider to be an enlightened liberated male. I still make my secretary get me coffee (though I often make the foul stuff myself) and I find myself in a group that has long accepted the ordination of women, and which has a female bishop, but I don't really like the idea of women preachers.

Still, when I watch old movies and TV shows, I am amazed at the stereotyping of women that existed. I recognize that my attitudes have changed toward the

involvement of women in many activities and their ability to perform. I recently listened to the head of a service group speak and was thoroughly amazed at the things he said.

Time and time again, he referred to wives as "girls" and made several statements which indicated that his idea of a wife was that she was something to stand placidly by, supporting whatever he was involved in, and occasionally being allowed to dress up and be shown off in public. A mannequin could do as much.

Suddenly I found myself somewhat on the side of the feminist movement. Oh, I'm still unsure of women ministers, think women should take their husband's name, and hope that my secretary won't someday tell me to get my coffee, but I am convinced about women as though they were objects, or property, to be used as we see fit. Women are people and deserve respect. Whether a woman chooses traditional roles or non-traditional roles, we should respect her choice.

And now, I must get back to my babysitting.

County Agent's Corner

This week's column comes from information gathered by Dale Spurgeon, Extension Agent-Entomology for Crosby and Floyd Counties.

The cold, wet weather, and cold, wet soils were holding back those crops already planted in Crosby and Floyd Counties. Until this past weekend we had not received any good hot weather. COTTON

Many cotton fields, some planted as early as the first of May, have come up to a stand, but the plants are just sitting there. None of the plants observed are beyond the cotyledon stage, and some of those plants emerged nearly three weeks ago!

Cool wet conditions place young cotton plants under a great deal of stress. Furthermore, these conditions make the plants very susceptible to other sources of injury, such as thrips and seedling diseases.

Nearly all cotton plants observed are suffering from seedling diseases. Although this is a bad situation, there is little we can do about it. The best remedy would be warmer weather. As long as soil temperatures remain under 60 to 65°F and soil moisture is high, we will likely have disease problems. The only practice which comes to mind that may have any effect on this situation would be some type of cultivation to

open up the soil. By opening up the soil we could reduce moisture levels near the surface, and possibly speed the warming of the soil.

Thrips could be a problem in some fields at this time. Under good growing conditions, young cotton plants will normally outgrow even heavy thrips infestations. But under cool, wet conditions, when the plants are growing very slowly, thrips can cause further damage and further delays in growth.

Before deciding to treat for thrips, be certain you have both thrips and thrips damage. Thrips are tiny insects (about 1/15 inch or less in length) which are light brown or yellowish in color. If they are present they can usually be found on the undersides of cotyledons or leaves, or hidden in the terminal bud. They are very good at hiding, and a close inspection of plants with a magnifying glass or hand lens is necessary to find all of them.

Thrips damage is characterized as silvery areas with tiny black specks on the undersides of leaves and cotyledons. Damage from wind and sand can easily be mistaken for thrips damage, but wind or sand damage is usually more mild in appearance than silvery, and lacks the black specks.

The recommended treatment level of thrips is 2 to 5 thrips per plant combined with poor growing conditions. You need to determine if most of the thrips are winged adults or wingless nymphs also. If many of them are nymphs, the thrips are obviously reproducing and the problem is probably more serious than if only adults are present.

If you should decide to treat for thrips, use the least expensive method of treatment available to you, such as combining the application with another field operation. In the past, thrips control practices have not consistently resulted in yield increase. GRAIN SORGHUM

Corn leaf aphids have appeared in some sorghum fields. These aphids are not usually considered a problem and seldom does their presence warrant control. Be certain that you do not confuse this bluish-green aphid for the lighter colored greenbug.

Greenbugs have appeared in some fields, but only very small numbers of them. If greenbug colonies are present in seedling sorghum and damage (yellowing of plants) is observed, treatment may be warranted.

Individualized Crop insurance expanded

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has added more crops to a special insurance plan that individualizes crop insurance policies based on farm performance.

Crops added to the plan are flax, dry bean, rye and sunflowers. Crops already included are corn, wheat, cotton, rice, grain sorghum, barley and soybeans.

Called the "individual yield coverage plan," this concept of crop insurance protection allows many farmers with verifiable records of production yields to



Wheat board to hold 6th biennial mail election

The Texas Wheat Producers Board formed in 1971 to support wheat research and market development will hold its sixth biennial mail election between July 1 and July 15, according to W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday, Chairman. The terms of three current board members expiring at that time include: Cagle Kendrick, Stratford; Otis Harman, Tullia; and Dwight Hamilton, Olney.

In 1971 when the Producers Board was formed by Texas producers as self-help program to enhance the value of their crops, 3.5 million acres was planted to wheat that produced 31.4 million bushels valued at \$37.3 million. In 1983, even with 22% of planted acres idled by the PIK program, Texas is expected to produce 141 million bushels valued at over \$600 million. All of the increased production in the ensuing years has been exported through markets newly developed by U.S. producers through their Boards and Commissions self-assessment programs.

Any wheat farmer producing within the 34-county commercial wheat area, is eligible to vote for a board member for that district. Counties included in District II are: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Floyd.

Moore points out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election, at least 30 days (June 15) prior to the election final date (July 15), in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all

eligible voters 15 days prior to the election, Moore said. He also indicates that any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date, may obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices in the 34-county area as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Wheat producers fund TWPB with a 1/2 cent assessment on their deliveries of wheat at commercial handlers. Proceeds from such participation supports programs of foreign and domestic market expansion, food and feed wheat technical service, insect control demonstrations and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producers income. In addition to Moore and the three members with expiring terms, other TWPB members are: Robert Graves, Perryton; Wiley Tabor, Quanah; Leo Witkowski, Hereford; Kenneth Keisling, Dumas; and C.L. Edwards, Panhandle.

Landscape & Gardening

IRRIGATION TIPS

Not that April and May showers were replaced this year by dry winds, it looks like summer's here with its usually hot dry weather; here are some recommendations for watering. The most important consideration is not to water by the clock, but by plant symptoms, and when you do water, water thoroughly. When plants begin to get dry (for instance the lawn) you'll see signs of wilting, slight loss of apparent sheen to the lawn, and at that time you should water until the ground is soaked eight to twelve inches deep. Granted this is not easy to do since our tight clay soils seem to shed more water than they absorb, so it will require some persistence and a lot of moving of sprinklers. If you have a permanent system this will mean fairly constant watering until the soil is soaked to this depth as opposed to frequent sprinkling. To check for depth of water penetration you can use an iron bar that will push easily into damp soil and stop when it has reached the dry layers of soil.

Mulching is of great benefit at this time of the year. Check with local farmers - many of them have spoiled hay laying around that they would be

glad to part with. A layer four to six inches deep around the base of trees, shrubs, etc. will cut down on the amount of water lost to evaporation, keep the soil cooler and generally make your plants do better through the summer.

When do you water? By far the best time to water is in the morning. This allows the plants to dry before the cool temperatures in the evening promote diseases. If you can finish your watering by two o'clock in the afternoon your plants should have time to dry. If watering should be restricted at some time so that you can only water at night the best way to water under these circumstances is with furrow irrigation where you flood the soil between the rows, or with drip irrigation. Drip irrigation is relatively easy to use. A simple plastic tube kit is available at many nursery and garden centers, and you not only conserve moisture but you get the maximum amount of growth in plants given this type of irrigation. I have some order forms for an inexpensive drip irrigation system I would be glad to share with anyone who is interested. Simply allowing the hose to run at a slow trickle around the base of trees will do a similar job of watering.

FARM BUREAU NEWS

The Floyd County Farm Bureau is cooperating in a nationwide effort to preserve the reforms in the Economic Recovery Act of 1981 by opposing the repeal of the indexing provisions of the act, according to Dan Smith of Lockney, president of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

The Floyd County Farm Bureau supports the indexing provisions of the 1981 act scheduled to become effective January 1985.

Indexing would effectively prevent "bracket creep" which automatically increases income taxes during inflationary periods.

The Floyd County Farm Bureau, in keeping with American Farm Bureau Federation policy, also opposes the repeal of the income tax cut scheduled to go into effect July 1, and objects to freezing the estate tax exemption provisions of the 1981 act at its present level of \$275,000.

Indexing puts the federal government's fiscal policy out in the open. It was noted that Paul Roberts, a former assistant treasury secretary, stated that: "Without automatic tax increases the failure to control spending leads to larger budget deficits. The indexing provisions puts pressure...to prevent spending from growing faster than the

economy."

In short, indexing helps to break the tax-and-spend cycle which has adversely affected the American economy.

Under indexing tax brackets would be widened by the percentage by which the Consumer Price Index (CPI) grew in the preceding fiscal year. As an example, the 1984 tax rate on married couples making between \$16,000 and \$20,000 is 18 percent. If the CPI grows 5 percent that fiscal year, then the 18 percent levy would apply in 1985 to all income between \$16,800 and \$21,000. The zero-bracket amount (the income on which no taxes are paid) would grow with inflation, as would the personal exemption.

If indexing is repealed it would hit the lower-income taxpayers the hardest, because the tax brackets are narrower for those with lesser incomes, making it easier to be pushed into a higher bracket.

If indexing is repealed, the Treasury Department reports that taxpayers with incomes of less than \$10,000, as a group, would pay 9.4 percent more taxes, compared with a 2.7 percent increase for those in the \$50,000-\$100,000 range.

That means the lower-income taxpayer-those making \$10,000-have less after-tax income than they did in 1980.

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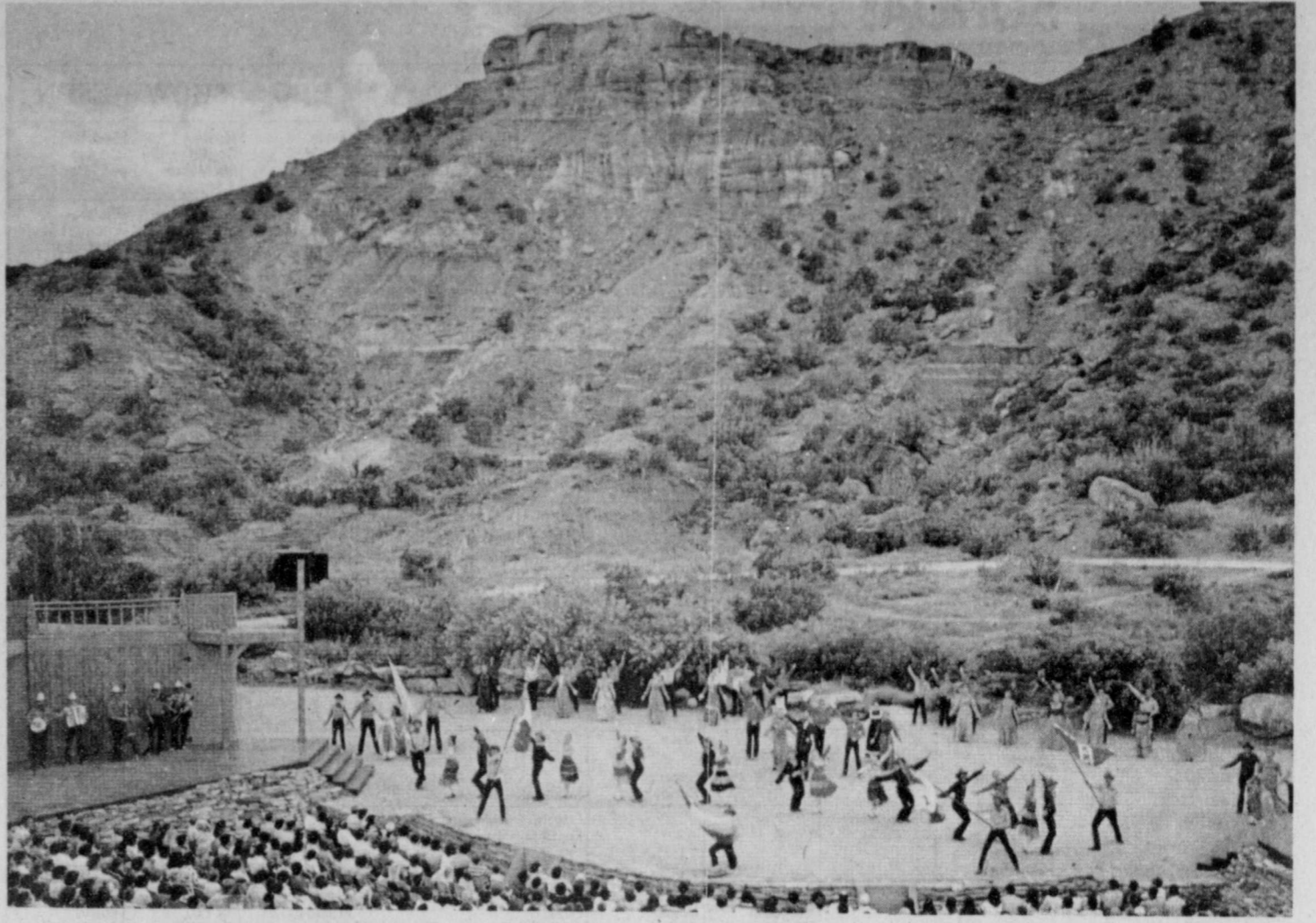
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TEXAS
