High school windows to be remodeled

The Lockney School Board held its regular monthly meeting on November 8. Minutes of the last meeting, payment of current bills, making investments and tax Report #2 were all approved.

The audit report, done by Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert, and Moss of Lubbock, was presented to the board for approval. The report is for the physical year ending August 31, 1983. Becky Lusk, who is with the accounting firm, discussed the report with the board and the board approved the report.

Bids on renovation of the windows in junior high and high school were opened. Six bids for the work to be done were submitted to the board and Wayne Arnold of Plainview Plate Glass was present to discuss his bid with the board. After the board discussed all of the bids, motion was made to accept the bid from Plainview Plate Glass for \$19,884.00. Windows will be covered with brown corrugated panels with a storm window so that the rooms will still have some natural outside light.

During the principals' report, the principals discussed the effects new curriculum changes would make for Lockney. The overall consensus seemed to be that if the new changes are implemented, Lockney would have to have two to three new teachers.

W.H. Hallmark then reported to the board that the state and insurance inspectors have recommended that Lockney replace its #3 boiler. The boiler has some cracks in the cast iron

parts. The board voted for the replacement of the boiler with a newer, more efficient model.

Eddie Teeter then reported on the Appraisal District Audit report.

Supt. Hallmark then brought up the substitute teacher pay. At the present time all substitute teachers are paid \$25 per day and, if they teach for more than 10 consecutive days, the pay goes to \$35 per day. The board voted to change this pay scale for substitute teachers who are certified. Now any certified substitute teacher who teaches for four consecutive weeks or more will receive \$50 per day. This would affect substitutes who take the place of teachers who have lengthy illnesses or those who are out for several weeks for maternity leave. Non-certified substitute teacher pay will remain the same at \$25 for up to 10 consecutive days and \$35 for days after that.

Hallmark also discussed with the board the possibility of purchasing a new bus. It has been two years since the school system bought a new bus and Mr. Hallmark had checked into the current prices for new buses, and after discussion, the board authorized the superintendent to order a new 48 passenger bus. The bus will cost approximately \$18,500 and comes equipped with an automatic transmission and air conditioning.

The board approved participation in the Region 17 Service Center In Service for the 1984-85 school year.

The Floyd County 4-H food show was held Saturday in the Lockney Elementary Cafeterium. There were 33 4-Hers who entered this year's show. A very wide variety of foods was exhibited. The six judges for this year's event included Cindy Ford and Denise McCann, both are homemaking teachers in Lockney.

After the judging was complete, parents and guests were invited to a tasting bee of all of the foods being shown by the students.

Junior and senior winners were picked in each of four categories, breads and cereals, main dishes, snacks and desserts, and fruits and vegetables. First place junior and senior winners will go to district competition in Lubbock on December 10. The second place winners will attend the district show if the first place winners cannot go.

City Council re-enacts bounty on stray dogs

The Lockney City Council met for its regular monthly meeting on November 8 with Mayor Copeland, alderman Kring, Frizzell, Wofford, and Dipprey present. Also present were city attorney Paul Lyle, city secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, and police chief Ken Farrow.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as well as the payment of current bills.

The first order of business was brought before the council by Police Chief Farrow who requested that the council reenact the bounty on loose dogs. Farrow stated that there are an "abundance of dogs running loose in Lockney" and that from this point forward the police department would be strictly enforcing the dog code in Lockney. Council approved enacting the bounty. Complete details on the bounty and on the dog ordinance will follow at the end of this article.

Also on the agenda for the meeting was a complaint from Earl Freeman. Freeman claimed that the city owes him pay from 4 or 5 years ago when he filled in for officer Marion Barton for four days. After discussion, the council decided that since Barton was paid for those days that it was his responsibility to pay Freeman for the days that he worked.

City attorney did not have the papers for the suits to abate nuisances ready and that item will be taken up at the next council meeting.

After discussion of the water department pickup trucks the council passed a motion to get rid of two of the trucks in the poorest condition and replace them with one good pickup. The department will operate out of two trucks.

A request was made by the personnel of the street and alley department for the city to provide them with uniforms. After discussion the council passed a motion to provide the uniforms. These uniforms would be rented from a uniform company and will be cleaned by the company. Each employee will have five uniforms per week at a cost of \$7.50 each for the three employees per week.

Police Chief Farrow reported that October was a quiet month in town. There were three minor traffic accidents, three traffic citations were issued, one citation for a minor in possession of alcohol. One in-town burglary in which a TV set was taken, two sets of Chevrolet hub caps taken was committed. Lockney police assisted the Floydada police in apprehending a car which was carrying a pound of marijuana. Farrow also reported that Halloween night was quiet and there were no problems reported that night. He reported there had been four major burglaries reported outside of town. In these thefts everything from furniture to farm tools have been taken and Farrow urges everyone to lock barns and homes in the country to protect against theft.

The Lockney police department would like everyone to be aware of the dog ordinance stipulations since the department will begin to strictly enforce it.

All animals, dogs and cats, must be vaccinated against rabies, they must have a rabies tag and they must also have a city license issued by the city secretary's office. Fee for the city license is \$2.00 per animal and must be renewed in January of each year.

From this day forward, all pets, dogs and cats, WILL be kept in an enclosed yard of an enclosure which will not allow the animal to run loose in town. Chaining or tying dogs in an unenclosed yard is not acceptable. Animals must be in an enclosed area.

Any animals caught running loose in town will be picked up and taken to the city animal pound located at 617 East 8th Street in Lockney. Animals impounded will be kept for three days and if not claimed they will be destroyed. Owners going to claim animals must show proof of rabies vaccination and must show proof of a city license before they will be released. If the owner cannot show proof of both, they must obtain both before the animal will be released to them.

Any animals out of their enclosures must be on a handheld leash. It is unlawful for animals to run loose within the city limits and owners found violating this may be fined up to \$100.00.

Any enclosure where animals are

kept will be kept clean, sanitary and free of offensive odors. Enclosures must be cleaned and all discharge will be disposed of every 72 hours.

Owners must control animals. Any dogs who create a nuisance by constantly barking will be controlled by the owner or the owner can be fined up to \$100.00.

Any officer attempting to catch a loose dog that feels he may be in personal danger may use his discretion as to what means he uses to control the animals, including destroying the animal if necessary.

The increased number of loose dogs in town was brought before the city council and the council elected to reenact the \$5.00 per head bounty on loose animals. Most of the loose dogs are running in groups, chasing cars and children on bicycles, and because of this the bounty has been brought back. Bounty will be paid only on LIVE dogs turned in. When turned in, a receipt will be given and the money may then be collected at the city office. Anyone found turning in a stolen dog will be prosecuted.

Animals turned in will be kept for three days before they are destroyed. Anyone losing a dog is urged to check with the pound daily. Dogs turned in wearing collars and having tags will be contacted by the vets office, but for those turned in without tags and collars, the owners must claim them within the three day period.

Lunch will consist of turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce, sweet potatoes, green beans, cole slaw, hot rolls and milk.

The annual Community Thanksgiving Service will be held Sunday, November 20, at the First Baptist Church in Lockney. Services will start at 7:00 p.m. and the Rev. Gary Kleypas of Providence will bring the evening message.

Everyone is invited to attend the service. There will be a reception in the Fellowship Hall following the service for all those who wish to stay and visit.



Ash to chair Smokeout

To emphasize another kind of beauty -- the beauty of good health -- the American Cancer Society (ACS) announced that Texas businesswoman Mary Kay Ash of Dallas will serve as honorary chairman of the 1983 Great American Smokeout in Texas.

Known throughout the country for the cosmetics which bear her name, Ms. Ash accepted the position because of the event's positive, good-natured events.

The Smokeout is sponsored by the ACS nationwide to encourage smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day -- November 17 -- if only to prove to themselves they can.

"I can think of few things that would be more beautiful than for a smoker to give up cigarettes...or for a friend to help someone give them up -- whether it's for one day or a lifetime," said Ms. Ash. "Texas has volunteers all over the state promoting this as a day for the smoker and I like that."

A survey conducted by the Gallup organization last year (the Smokeout is now in its seventh year) indicated more than 19 million Americans tried to quit for the day. Almost five million made it the whole day and 2.3 million were still not smoking one to 11 days later.

According to Texas ACS volunteers planning the Smokeout, Ms. Ash's involvement is particularly timely.

"She is certainly one of the best-known, most admired women in this state and frankly, women smokers are a target audience for us," said Penny Reeves of Austin, who is the volunteer spearheading the campaign in Texas.

The ACS predicts that by the end of the decade lung cancer will surpass breast cancer as the number one cancer killer among women. If a woman smokes, her chances of developing lung cancer are five times greater than that of a nonsmoking woman.

"With Mary Kay Ash as our honorary chairman, we hope to draw attention to the unfortunate truth that lung cancer is not just a male disease," said Reeves.

Thanksgiving travelers should take extra caution

Thanksgiving often means traditional family reunions. Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Holiday weekends also often mean

more collisions, injuries and traffic deaths because more people travel, and more traffic means more exposure to accidents."

Last year during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas recorded 40 traffic fatalities. Major Cawthon said, "Some people tend to drink more during the holidays and then attempt to drive. By doing this, they show a low regard for the well being of themselves, their passengers and other motorists." He said, "Drunk driving is one of the most dangerous risk factors facing the motorist."

He added, "Fatal accidents increase during night time hours, and darkness is coming earlier this time of year." He advised motorist to turn on their headlights and not parking lights at the first sign of dusk.

Cawthon concluded, "Heavy traffic calls for more caution and less speed, but those motorist who are extra careful, obey traffic laws and avoid the use of alcohol can have a safe and pleasant Thanksgiving."



Are there compelling arguments in the Bible which should cause us to take a position of abstinence in regard to alcoholic beverages? I think so, but not along traditional lines. Let us look at the arguments.

The most common arguments center around the Biblical statements concerning drunkenness, the statement that our bodies are the temples of the Holy Spirit, and the injunction to be careful not to make our brethren stumble. All of these have loopholes in them for the advocate of moderate drinking. Usually, in the case of the first two, the loophole is considered to be that of moderation itself. Responsible use is not prohibited, they argue, just drunkenness, loss of control, and that is the only thing which would dishonor the Spirit.

As for making my brother stumble, many feel that if they do not push alcohol on others, and refrain from its use in the presence of those who are troubled by it, then the requirement is satisfied. This begins to break down when the question is placed concerning the non-drinkers knowledge of a drinkers habit, even though he does not actually see his friend indulging. This question is usually not satisfactorily answered.

have to do with other arguments. Firstly, the Bible has an overriding concern with the good of the com-

munity, even to the subjugation of an individual's rights and desires. In a society where death related to alcohol abuse exceeds death due to war for a whole century; in a culture where alcohol is one of the most abused substances by youth, as well as adults, it is difficult to condone the use of alcohol at all. Why? Because it says to the community that there is nothing wrong with drinking when in fact there are a host of ills associated with the use of alcohol. (Remember that in the case of Gabe Rivera none of the people who were with him thought he was too drunk to drive. That is exactly the problem with the moderate drinker—he usually does not realize he is too impaired to drive since he has been "being responsible.")

directives to be perfect as our Father in heaven is perfect (that one came from Jesus himself), and to be transformed into the image of Christ. The concept of perfection involves maturity and that rules out the attitude "I can do it if I want to". Being like Christ means that we seek comfort, strength, relaxation, social skills, etc. from the same source he did, God, not a bottle.

It is true that Jesus ate with winebibbers (drunks). No one accused him of the same activity, and he did it in order to redeem them. It is no stretch of the imagination to him say to the newly converted drinker "Go and drink no more".

The Reagan administration insists that their military maneuvers in Central America are planned to help the region defend itself against Cuban and Soviet backed revolutions.

There is even a National Commission on Central America that is headed by Kissinger. He and his 12 members recently returned from a tour of six Central America countries.

A Hispanic member, the mayor of San Antonio, Henry Cisneros, warns that with the military presence the U.S. is "in danger of continuing a history by which we lose the people." When it comes to U.S.—Cuba Relations, there is another side of the coin.

In the late 1890's a U.S. ship - Maine was sunk in Havana Harbor, and the disaster was attributed to a Spanish bomb. After the war, the U.S. withdrew its troops, but there was a 1901 agreement in which Cuba had to meet certain conditions. They were: Cuba could not transfer land to any power other than the U.S., the U.S. won rights to a naval base at Guantanamo Bay.

After Fidel Castro took power in 1959, the U.S. had two military operations against Cuba - the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion and the 1962 air and naval quarantine that forced Russia to remove nuclear missiles.



Shorthorns end season in a loss







Venison Steak
1½-2 pounds of butterfly steaks cut from the loin (½ inch thick)
¼ cup red wine vinegar with garlic
3 Tablespoons Worcestershire
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ teaspoon paprika
1 cup buttermilk
½ cup yellow cornmeal
1 cup flour

Make marinade from vinegar, Worcestershire, and seasonings. Marinate meat 2-3 hours at room temperature or overnight in the refrigerator. Toss occasionally. Heat fat (¼ inch deep in skillet) to medium high heat, or you may deep fry these if desired. Dip steaks in buttermilk and then cornmeal and flour mixed together. Fry until cooked through, turning once. Serves 4-6.

Sweet and Sour Vegetables

Sauce:
6 Tablespoons sugar
2 Tablespoons soy sauce
1 Tablespoon white wine (optional)
3 Tablespoons vinegar
½ cup pineapple juice (drained from slices)
3 Tablespoons catsup
1 Tablespoon salad oil
Combine above ingredients in sauce pan and bring to a boil. Mix ½ cup water and 2 tablespoons cornstarch. Add to boiling ingredients and stir until thickened. Set aside.

Vegetable mixture:
1 scant cup sliced water chestnuts
1 scant cup green pepper cut into 1" diagonal squares
1 cup carrots sliced thin on the diagonal
1 cup pineapple slices cut in sixths
1 cup onion cut in eighths
Stir fry vegetable mixture in 4 tablespoons peanut oil for a few minutes over medium high heat or until vegetables take on a transparent appearance. Add sauce and blend. Heat until bubbly. Serve immediately. Serves 8.
