### COOKER TESTING DATES ANNOUNCED

Food preservation is a war-time contribution that all farm families and many who live in town can make. Adequate conservation assures the family of a year-around balanced diet and relieves trans-portation and labor in handling commercial products and processed foods. Canning is a practical and economical method of preserva-

The pressure cooker is used for canning vegetables and meats because there are certain types of bacteria found in these foods thatt cannot be destroyed unless a high temperature is maintained. The gauges on presure cookers should be tested from year to year. If the temperature inside the cooker is bigher than that shown on the glass jars, or bulging seams when cans are used. In extreme cases the cooker may explode. If the temperature is lower inside the cooker than the gauge registers, there is danger of underprocessing the food, which may cause spoil-

All cookers should have their lids fastened on and the owner's name tagged to it in some way.
