PRIZE JEEP IN BOND SELLING CONTEST HERE

Well, young folks the Jeep has arrived and the Bond Selling Contest is on. The Jeep is well worth the effort of any boy or girl to try and win, and is also an opportunity to carry out their desire to do something for their country in Bond selling.

I would not have uncrated her, but much has already been said about the Jeep and much more will be said about it as the contest advances, it was necessary that someone view it in order to let you know it was a Jeep.

Now since my inspection of it, I feel warranted in telling you it will do as much in serving the winner or owner as lots of cars and trucks I have seen.

The first idea advanced was to make a boy and girl scout contest for this Jeep, which idea was good and some other person suggested we include the 4-H Clubs, which idea was also good as it came nearer covering the county, and we have decided that inasmuch as we had had no bond selling program in the Castro County Schools, due to the fact that schools were nearly ready to close when bond selling started, it would be better and fairer to also let all scholastics for the school year of 1944 and 1945 who wished to enter.

As to the terms or the manner in which we will determine the winner will be as follows. The boy or girl will obtain an instrument of writing from the applicant or purchaser, substance of which instrument will read as below.

The undersigned hereby agrees to purchase 7th War Loan Bonds at the maturity amount of \$..... Dollars, between the starting and ending date of the Jeep Contest and authorize the counting group to give Name credit for selling in the Jeep Contest. Signed..... Bond Purchaser.

The counting group mentioned will be three suitable persons named for this service and you will deliver your signed instruments to them within two full days, or 48 hours from the ending period of the contest.

You will use your own judgment in soliciting, as I do not know how to advise, but when I was a boy your age I can remember an election where a great man ran for office on a sixteen to one platform.

I did not understand much about it then and do not believe many others did either for they are still talking about it yet. But let me tell you one thing I did understand. During World War I, I purchased Liberty and Victory Bonds, (which were War Bonds), and after the Armistice was signed I sold those bonds for 100 cents on the dollar and I also purchased cows at \$80.00 a head and sold them for \$20.00, well I see you guessed it, it is the four to one ratio which I did understand. Quite a lot of land that had been selling for \$30.00 during the war sold for \$15.00.

The model Jeep will be on display in a store window in Dimmitt to pass the inspection of boys and girls who care to enter the contest. Other details pertaining to the contest will be announced from week to week.

VETERAN OF FIVE BATTLES ARRIVED HOME MONDAY

Pvt. Bob Hembree, a veteran of five major European Battles, and with probably more continuous combat hours than any man from this section, arrived home Monday, after an army career that carried him across France and into the heart of Germany. Where he was destined to spend the last month of the war in a German Prison Camp. After participating in the battles of Northern France, Normandy, Rhineland and central Europe, with the 4th Armored Division, referred to as "Patton's Pets" of the third army, Bob was captured by the Germans on March 28, while a detail, 250 Tankmen and Infantrymen, were trying to make their way back to American lines after liberating Americans from the Prison camp at Hammelburg. They were liberated from the Mooseburg Prison Camp on April 29. Pvt. Hembree saw his first combat service at Nancy, France in September 1944, and then until the end of hostilities he was granted only one 8-hour pass.

Bob will remain at home for a 60-day furlough visit, following which he will report to Santa Barbara, California, where he will be stationed at a rest camp temporarily.

1st. BASE AIR DEPOT, WARRINGTON, ENGLAND - V-E day found Cpl. Royal G. Cruse of Dimmitt, Texas, on the job, helping to ready more combat planes and equipment for immediate action wherever they might be needed.

Cpl. Cruse, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. M. Cruse of Friona is a member Command teams who pitched in to break the air assaults that helped knock Germany out of the air.

Cpl. Cruse has been overseas since October, 1943, and joined the army in October 1942. He is a former one of the crack Air Service mer student of Dimmitt High school.

NOTICE

STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF CASTRO :-
The following resolution was duly passed by the Commissioners Court of Castro County, Texas, in regular session:

BE IT REMEMBERED, that the commissioners court of Castro County, Texas met in regular session on the 28 day of May, 1945, with the following members present: Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, T. R. Davis; Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, A. O. Thompson; Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, J. O. Ayers; Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, John Stork; and there came to be considered the matter of various farmers in the county permitting waste water from irrigation to go from their lands in and onto the county roads of Castro County, Texas, sometimes in the bar ditches, and sometimes on the roadway itself.

And Whereas, in some instances, this condition is permitted to continue for months at a time.

And whereas, this prevents in some instances the care of the road by the county commissioner of the precinct so affected. It permits the luxuriant growth and seeding of Johnson grass, which is an undesirable plant and very prone to spread, and the court feels that with a little thought and care, the natural blessing of irrigation water could be better utilized and the supply preserved.

Wherefore, be it resolved that request be published in the "Castro County News", three times, that persons desist from the practice of letting excess irrigation water into the bar ditches or on the roads of Castro County, Texas, and that the public also be hereby informed that anyone who persists in this practice shall be prosecuted in accordance with and under existing penal laws, it being distinctly understood that this notice does not apply to farmers who, at the request of the county or the State of Texas, turn irrigation water to bar ditches for the purposes of irrigating trees. Motion being put, all members voted "aye" in favor of the resolution.

COOKER TESTING DATES ANNOUNCED

Food preservation is a war-time contribution that all farm families and many who live in town can make. Adequate conservation assures the family of a year-around balanced diet and relieves transportation and labor in handling commercial products and processed foods. Canning is a practical and economical method of preservation.

The pressure cooker is used for canning vegetables and meats because there are certain types of bacteria found in these foods that cannot be destroyed unless a high temperature is maintained. The gauges on pressure cookers should be tested from year to year. If the temperature inside the cooker is higher than that shown on the gauge, there is danger of overcooking, losing liquid, breaking glass jars, or bulging seams when cans are used. In extreme cases the cooker may explode. If the temperature is lower inside the cooker than the gauge registers, there is danger of underprocessing the food, which may cause spoilage.

Miss Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent, announces that she will test cookers in the kitchen of the Home Economics Department of the Dimmitt High School on the following mornings, with other mornings devoted to this work, should the times set prove insufficient. All cookers should have their lids fastened on and the owner's name tagged to it in some way. They should not be brought to the building and left unless someone is there to lock them inside the kitchen.

DRILLING OF CITY WATER WELL IN PROGRESS HERE

Work was begun here late Tuesday afternoon on the drilling of a second city water well for Dimmitt by D. L. McDonald, well contractor of Amarillo, after unavoidable delay of original plans under which the well was to be completed June 1. The well had been drilled to a depth of 80 feet by Wednesday afternoon and it is believed that the drilling operation will be completed within eight or ten days.

According to an announcement by city officials the contract provides for the well, 36 inches in diameter, to be drilled to a depth of approximately 380 feet, with a 14 inch casing inside. The total contract price, which includes the drilling and complete equipping of the well, is \$16,669.69. The driller guarantees a well with a minimum production of 400 gallons per minute, with not over one ounce of sand per 100 gallons of water.

The new well is located about 300 feet south of the old well.
