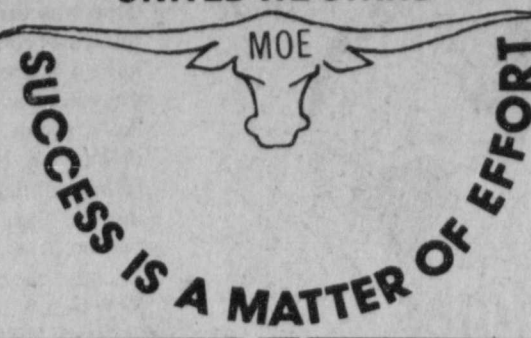

## Cherilen Brewer presents program for Rotarians

Last Friday Cherilen Brewer, representing the Forever Bee Products presented the program at Rotary. The program was centered on bee pollen and propolis as well as the honey. The pollen, the fertilizing dust found in flowers, is gathered and brought to the hive for food by the bees.

Cherilen became involved with the Forever Living Aloe Vera Products about two years ago and last December began working with and selling the Forever Bee Products.

Bee pollen is considered to be nature's most perfect food containing all 22 nutrients required for perfect health, according to Brewer. These include 16 different vitamins, all the minerals, enzymes, fatty acids, carbohydrates, proteins, and amino acids.

Bee propolis is a sticky resin that is secreted by trees, which is collected by bees to metabolize it and then line their hives with it to protect against bacteria.

Brewer said propolis is considered to be nature's most effective antibiotic, and

it helps to stimulate the bodies immunization system. Propolis contains resin, vitamins, amino acids, and minerals.

Included in all of the Forever Bee products is a substance called royal jelly, to be fed to the queen bee. Fed on royal jelly, the queen will live as long as six years while other bees the same age as designated queens will live only 5 to 6 weeks without the jelly. Brewer explained, "the main ingredient in royal jelly is a rich vitamin B which is found in all living tissues."

Brewer discussed honey with the group of Rotarians. "Nutritionalists cite honey with pollen to be the only natural food to include all the necessary substances to sustain life. Honey is also the world's only perfect natural sweetener, and it increases energy and has an indefinite shelf life," she proclaimed.

An interesting program, complete with honey samples, and a video tape of how the Forever Bee Products are produced and prepared for sale completed the program.

## In times like these.....

Costa Rica has become an island of tranquility in an ocean of turmoil due to policies such as abolishing the military and pouring money into education. Despite the country's name, which means "rich coast," there is little natural wealth. Most Spaniards who came here in the early colonial era were small farmers, not the gold-seeking conquistadors who brought a tradition of violence to the rest of Central America.

Despite its present calm, this small nation - about the size of Vermont and New Hampshire together - has been victimized by two of the biggest threats to Central America: communist subver-

sion and soaring debt. In 1946-47, San Jose was the target of an uprising that analysts consider the first Soviet inspired Communist effort to seize power anywhere in the Western Hemisphere. As a result of the revolt, Costa Rica disbanded its Army to prevent any future militarist threat. However, during the past few years Nicaragua has been a constant threat to Costa Rica.

Consequently there have been military ties with the U.S. Costa Rica is getting 9.2 million dollars to buy mortars, machine guns, rifles, and other equipment. Also it moves closer to the U.S. in practical ways.

Panama-based Americans slip in quietly to advise Costa Rica officers. A Coast Guard training mission may be included in the emergency aid package. A proposal to bring in 1,000 or more National Guard members for maneuvers that would involve building roads and improving an airstrip near the Nicaraguan border has been postponed but not abandoned.

"Some resentment is inevitable because the Costa Ricans realize that ultimately both their security and economic future depend on the United States," says a senior diplomat. "But think what a success it would be if Central America was full of Costa Ricans."

# Horns win Homecoming game against Owls

The Lockney Longhorns entered the field Friday night through an alleyway created by ex-football players and supporters, bursting through a large sign held up by exes and full of confidence that paid off as the Horns won the homecoming game against Hale Center by a score of 21 to 8. This brings Lockney's record to three wins and one loss.

Coach Bob Purser said "We created Hale Center's mistakes and capitalized on them." This proved true as Lockney took three Owl fumbles in the first half and turned them into scoring drives.

The first quarter saw Lockney and the Owls evenly matched, but with 16 seconds left in the quarter Lockney scored a safety as Hale Center was preparing to punt from their end zone. A dropped snap gave the Horns time to rush Hale Center and force them out of the end zone for the safety.

In the second quarter Lockney had good field position, but lost the ball on a fumble. Two plays later Hale Center fumbled and gave the Horns good field position on the Owl 37. Just plays later inside the 10 yard line, quarterback Brent Hallmark hit Gary Kent with a six yard pass for Lockney's second score of the game. Danny Peralez made the extra point and with 8:44 left in the half Lockney led 9 to 0.

The kickoff to Hale Center after the touchdown was run back to the Horns 44 yard line. On the first and 10 play, Hale Center again fumbled and the Horns gained possession at their own 43. Hallmark hit Kent again on the next play, this time for a 57 yard completed pass that put six more points on the board for the Longhorns. With 7:59 left in the second quarter, Lockney lead 15 to 0.

With 3:01 left in second quarter Lockney again scored on a one yard run by Buffo Rodriguez. This came about after the Owls received a Lockney punt on the Horns' 10 yard line. A five yard penalty placed them in a first and 15 yard situation before they fumbled again. The Horns went to the dressing rooms at the half with a 21 to 0 lead in the game.

Hale Center's only score of the game came with 1:44 left in the third quarter with a two yard run and a two point conversion.

Of the Longhorns Coach Purser said "We hit good, took advantage of the Owls turnovers, and played a good game. We did make too many mistakes in the last half, but the players came back in the final minutes of the game and played ball."

This week Lockney will take on the Abernathy Antelopes here. The game starts at 8:00 p.m.

Coach Purser said "We can't wait. We will be ready for them. They have some very talented backs, but we can play ball with them."

Other participants were Ricky Hernandez, freshman; Daniel Rodriguez, sophomore; and Michael Villa, junior. There were 95 runners in the boys

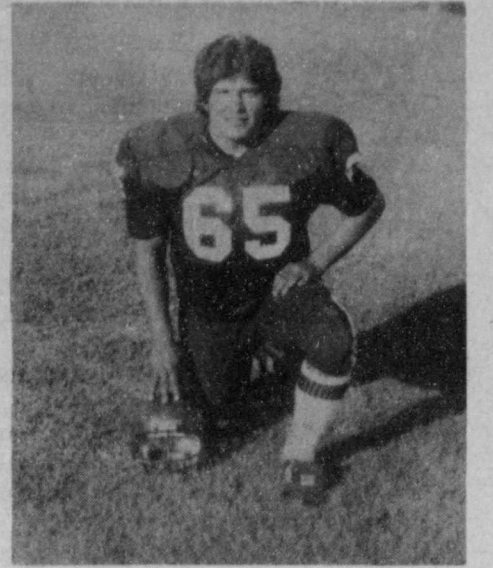

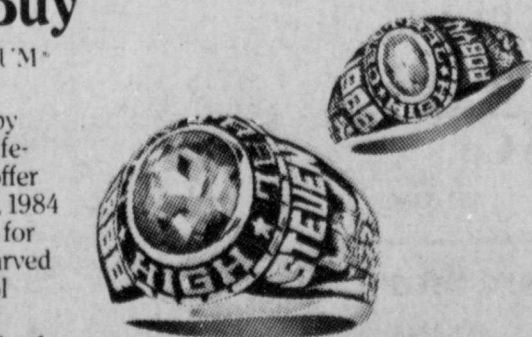

# FARM NEWS

## LANDSCAPE AND GARDENING

by Benny Butler

### GARDEN CHECK LIST

1. Caladiums require plenty of water at this time of year if they are to remain lush and attractive until fall. Fertilize with ammonium sulfate at the rate of 1/2 to 1/2 pound per 100 square feet of bed area and water thoroughly.

2. About eight weeks after gladiolus have finished flowering, they should be mature enough to dig, cure, and store. Destroy any corms that appear to be diseased.

3. Don't allow plants with green fruit or berries to suffer from lack of moisture. Hollies will frequently drop their fruit under drought conditions.

4. Stake mums through growing season when necessary. Do not divide crowded mums until spring.

5. Powdery mildew season is here. Check crapemyrtle, evergreen euonymus and zinnias. Funginex or Benlate will usually give excellent control.

6. Remove weak, unproductive

growth from crapemyrtles and roses to stimulate new growth for fall beauty in South Texas.

7. Prune out dead or diseased wood from trees and shrubs. Hold off on major pruning until mid-winter. Pruning now will only stimulate tender new growth prior to frost.

8. Time to sow seeds of snapdragons, pinks, pansies, and other winter flowers in flats for planting outside during mid to late fall.

9. Collect interesting plant materials for drying and curing to use in winter arrangements.

10. Plan now for major landscape changes you need or want.

11. As you plan your new landscape or as you remove an existing plan remember to consider recommended plant varieties for your area.

12. For gardens in the Panhandle and South Plains areas only, it is time to plant peonies in September and October to give the roots an opportunity to become established before cold weather. Don't move or divide peonies unless there is a good reason to do so as they do not like to be disturbed. If replanting is deemed necessary, place the growth-bud not more than one to two inches below the soil surface.

13. Select and order or purchase spring flowering bulbs as soon as available. This way you get fresh bulbs that haven't dried out in the warm dry store. Plant all but the tulips and hyacinths when the bed is ready. Store the tulips and hyacinths in the vegetable drawer of the refrigerator until December. They should receive at least 60 to 90 days of low (35 or 40°F.) temperature before planting. Beware of close-out sales later in the season as often the bulbs are no bargain at any price.

14. Prepare the beds for spring flowering bulbs as soon as possible. It's important to cultivate the soil and add generous amounts of organic matter to improve the water drainage. Bulbs will rot without proper drainage.

15. Continue to mow lawn regularly. Do not scalp until next spring.

16. Time to divide spring flowering plants such as iris, Shasta daisy, gaillardia, cannas, daylilies, violets, liriopie and ajuga.

17. Good time to watch the ads for needed garden equipment such as mowers, sprinklers, edges, weeders, hoses and the like. Merchandisers want

to make room for Christmas items and often offer good buys at this time.

18. Don't attempt to plant Bermuda grass seed after September 15, as it will seldom develop a root system strong enough to withstand freezing temperatures.

19. Continue the disease spray schedule on roses as blackspot and mildew can be extremely damaging in September and October. Funginex used every 7-14 days will give excellent control.

20. It's time to turn your existing compost pile, and to think about starting a new one for the fall crop of leaves and garden wastes.

21. If treatment for grub worms has not been applied and a definite problem is present, (four grubs in a one square foot soil area four inches deep). Diazinon or Dursban granules can be applied in early September. Water them thoroughly.

22. If you have had a water softener installed, don't be tempted to use the water for container plants. It contains sodium and can be damaging. Draw water from a tap that is not connected to the softener. Or better yet, collect the condensate from a refrigerated air conditioner.

23. For those who have successfully carried over a poinsettia from last Christmas, if you want them to flower in time for the holiday season, you had better give them the short day, long night treatment. You can drape them with a sheet of dark cloth for 14-15 hours each night or place in a room or closet where there is no danger of a light being turned on. Start about October and your plant will flower by Christmas.

24. Christmas Cactus can be made to flower by supplying 12 hours of uninterrupted darkness and cool nights (55°F.) for a month starting in mid-October.

## US trade team visits Japan

**Cotton Looks Up In Japan:** A special U.S. cotton trade team reports that prospects for cotton in Japan look promising.

The trade team, sponsored by Cotton Council International and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, recently concluded three days of meetings with Japanese textile representative and cotton traders.

Members heard that cotton textile products fared well against synthetics during late 1983 and early 1984.

A recent surge in imported cotton fabrics has renewed concern in Japanese textile circles, but the industry intends to remain strong through introduction of more innovative fabric technology over the long term, the team reports.

Despite the negative influence of surging imports and unfavorable yen/dollar exchange rates, imports of U.S. cotton are forecast to reach approximately 1.6 million running bales during 1984-85. As of July 5, 1984, Japan's total commitments for purchases of U.S. cotton during marketing year 1984 were nearly 1.9 million running bales, up 26 percent over the same date last year.

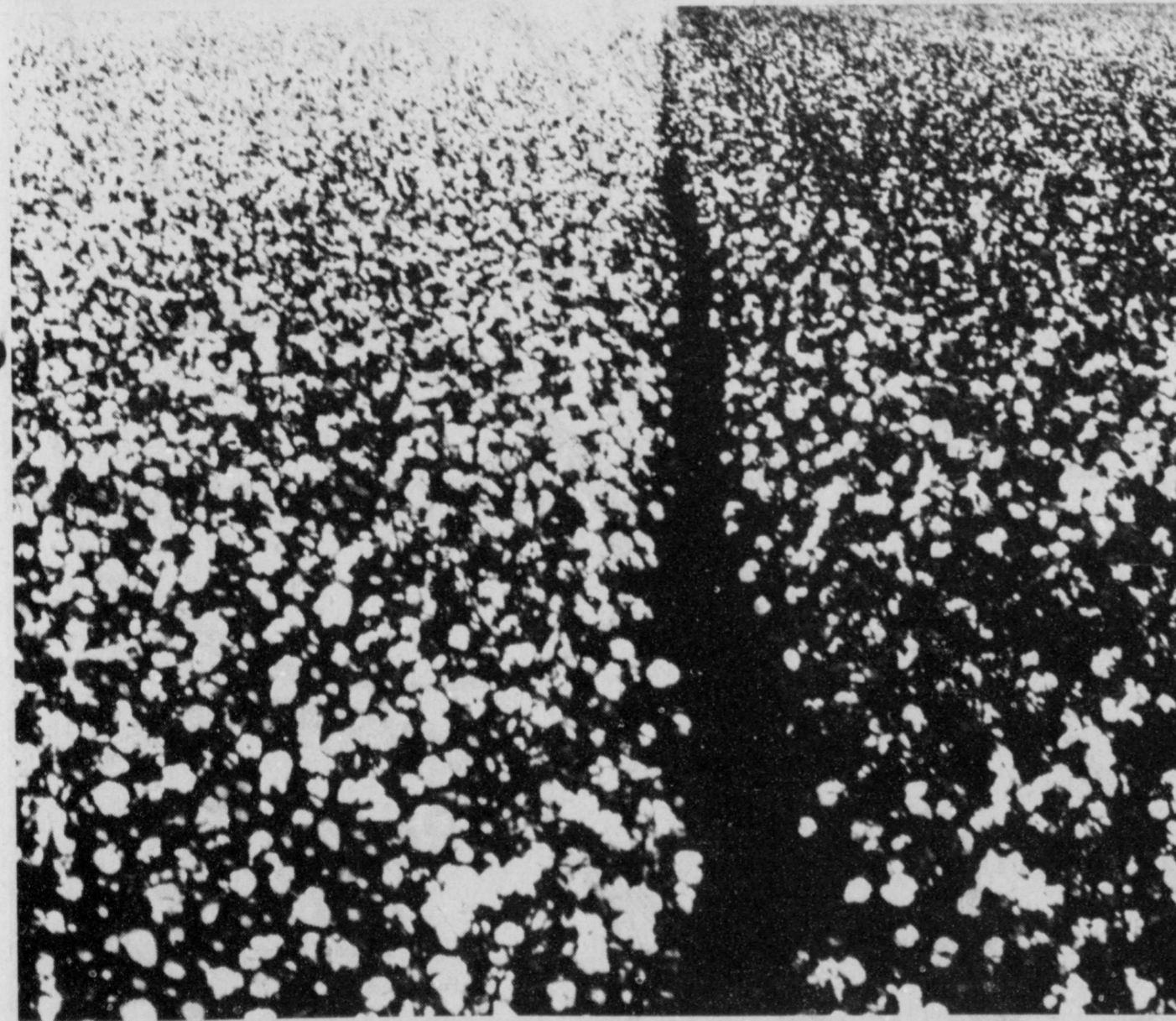

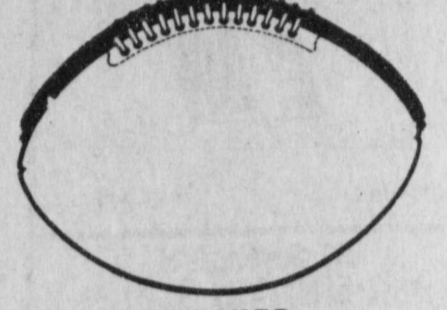
