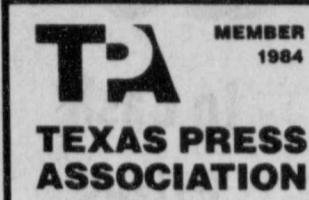

## Horns bring home district 4-2A championship

For the first time in 27 years the Lockney Longhorn varsity football team brought home an outright district championship last Friday night. The Horns had won district in the past but it has been determined by a coin toss.

Of the game Friday night Coach Bob Purser said "It's a big win for us, and we are tickled to death. We are the outright champions and I think we proved without a doubt that we are the best team in the district." He also commented "all the boys played a good game and proved they are champions".

Lockney began its scoring drive for the night on a 3rd and 3 on their own 48 yard line. Brent Hallmark took the quarterback option and ran the ball for a 52 yard touchdown. Tony Banda scored the extra point and Lockney led with 4-0 left in the first quarter. Lockney scored again in the first quarter on a

2nd down and one yard to the goal line play as Hallmark handed off to Dickie Hernandez for the 1 yard scoring run. The extra point attempt failed and Lockney led at the end of the first period of play 13-0.

The second quarter was much like the first as Hallmark again took the option and ran for a 12 yard touchdown. In the extra point attempt Hallmark ran the ball in for the two point conversion.

One of the most intriguing drives of the game was a play that came after a fourth down punt from Ralls. Lockney started with the ball on its own 1 yard line. On a 2nd and 7 play, Hallmark handed off to Banda, who carried the ball out to the Lockney 30. An incomplete pass put Lockney in a 2nd and 10 situation. On the next play, Lockney gained two yards. With a 3rd and 8 situation, a complete pass to Jerry

Mathis put Lockney on the Ralls 3 yard line. Two plays later Mathis took the handoff from Hallmark and threw a pass to Gary Kent in the end zone for another Lockney touchdown. The 13-0 lead was blocked by Lockney 1st in the first half.

In the third quarter Hallmark handed off to Ritchie Thornton for a 27 yard TD run and Banda made the extra point.

Lockney scored two times in the fourth quarter. The first was a 45 yard pass from Hallmark to Kent. A 17 yard interception run by Mathis put the finishing touches on Banda's two extra points after both touchdowns.

The game ended with a score of 48-0 and a Lockney District Championship. Lockney enters bi-district competition this Friday night with an 8-1-1 record, quite different from last year's 2-7-1 record. When asked why he felt the

boys who are basically the same team as last year, but improved so much from last year, Purser said "They have more experience, they are bigger, stronger, and smarter than they were last year. They have been more involved in the weight programs, and they have been training a lot. Mostly though they have matured, both physically and mentally."

Statistics for the year for Lockney include 4531 yards on offense while the defense has just allowed 1170 yards. Some of the individual statistic leaders include Dickie Hernandez who rushed for 1002 yards for the year and has 14 touchdowns to his credit in regular season play.

Gary Kent has 589 yards and 10 TDs to his credit; last but not least Brent Hallmark has passed for 1147 yards and 16 touchdowns for the year. Last week against Lorenzo Hallmark attempted 14

passes and completed nine including six touchdown passes. For his efforts in the Lorenzo game Hallmark is now entered in the Texas high school history having tied the third best record in the state with six touchdown passes in one game.

Friday night Lockney will journey to Plainview's Bulldog Stadium for the bi-district playoff game against Hale Center, a team Lockney defeated on September 28 of this year by a score of 21 to 8. The game will begin at 7:30, and Lockney will be the visitors and will be seated on the east side of the stadium. Gate admission will be \$3.00.

Of this upcoming game Purser said "It's always difficult to play the same team twice in one year, but I don't think we will have any problems getting up to play them." He also commented "We will have to play well and take care of business."

The Horns of the Week for the Ralls game were offensive linemen Jerald Johnson and George Basaldua, and offensive backs Ritchie Thornton, Dickie Hernandez, Brent Hallmark, Jerry Mathis, and Tony Banda. The defensive forcing unit player was Terry Mathis, secondary team's player was Jerry Mathis, and the special team's Player of the Week was Johnny Torrez. This week's big hit went to Terry Mathis and Danny Peralez. The MOE of the week was the WHOLE TEAM.

## Varsity boys cross country team wins 3rd at State meet

Not only was Lockney well represented in the district football contest by varsity and JV but the Cross Country team also represented Lockney well this past weekend.

The boy's cross country team, with members Jesse Castro, Eddie Garza, Daniel Rodriguez, Roy Ochoa, Tony Banda, Michael Villa, and Ricky Hernandez, left Friday morning for Southwestern University at Georgetown for the State Cross Country meet. The boys team qualified for state by placing

second in the regional meet two weeks ago in Lubbock.

At the state meet the boys placed third in the state with a team score of 90 points.

Comments from Coach Patti Purser included, "We were so excited, and it was wonderful. The boys seemed to be a little unsure; we only had two boys, Jessie and Eddie, who were there last year, but they were all excited." She also said "The boys have set first place in state for their goal for next year. Last

year they won sixth and this year third; they plan on being number 1. I think they can win state next year; the entire team will be returning to run, and we have some excellent JV runners."

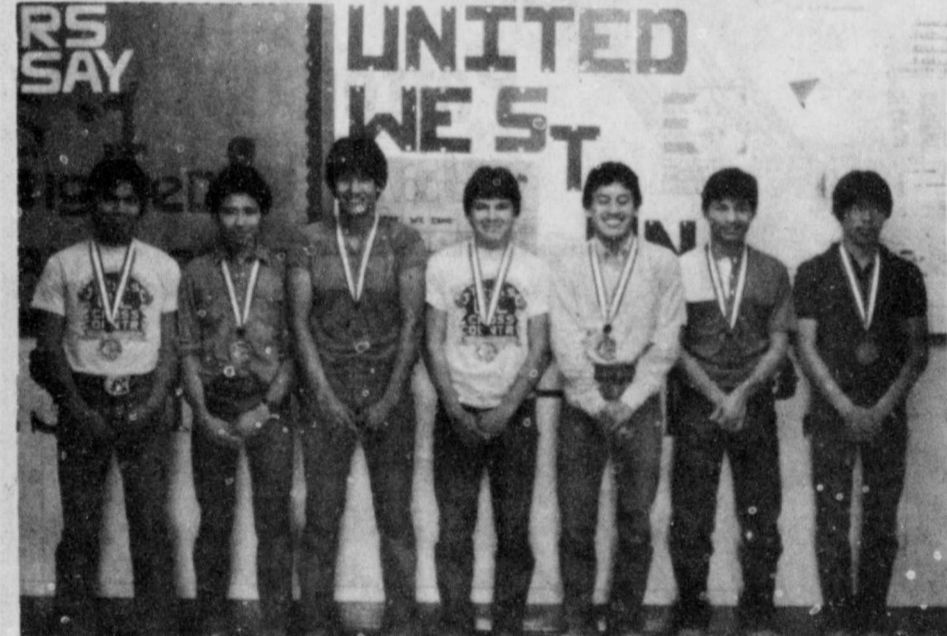
Jessie Castro, Lockney top finisher in the meet came in second in the state with a time of 16:46 which is the same time posted by the first place finisher from Abernathy. "It was a photo finish," said Purser. "Jessie had run with the top contenders throughout the entire race and in the last 800 yards Jessie pulled out in front, but the last 5 yards the Abernathy boy edged up on him. Even though they finished with the same time, the Abernathy boy leaned

out just ahead of Jessie for the number one spot."

Other finishers and their places include 7th place Eddie Garza, 17:17; 28th place Daniel Rodriguez; 35th Roy Ochoa, 49th Tony Banda, 56th Michael Villa, and 73rd Ricky Hernandez.

A few of the comments from the boys included for first timers, "It was a new experience and real exciting for the first time." Part of the course the boys ran took them by Texas Stadium, and they were all impressed with that.

Congratulations to the Cross Country team on representing Lockney so well, and we will look forward to a State win next year.

## JV Horns secure district championship title

With the district championship on the line, the Lockney J.V. proved to be of championship material with a convincing 42-6 win over Ralls, running the Horns district record to 3-0, claiming undisputed possession of the 4-2A title.

Lockney took a 20-0 lead in the first half on two touchdown runs by Javier Bernal, a touchdown pass from Todd Hallmark to Rusty Teeter and a 2 point conversion by Hector Flores. The Horn defense dominated the Ralls offense in the first half, allowing only 2 first downs.

More of the same was in store in the second half as Bernal scored on a 41 yard run, Joe Torrez scored on a 3 yard scamper, and Teeter scored on a 4 yard run from the fullback position. Jimmy Ballejo passed to Albert Martinez and Flores run tallied the second half conversions. Ralls scored in the last minute of the game on a 3 yard run.

In district play the Horns outscored the opposition 96-26. Their final season record stood at 4 wins 2 losses and 3 ties. Congratulations to the J.V. Horns.

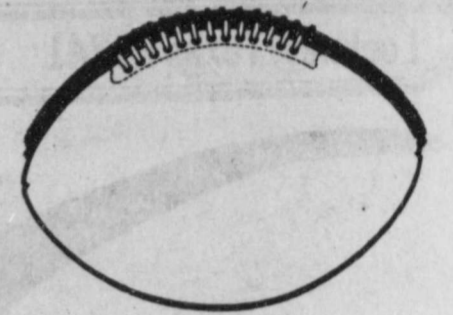

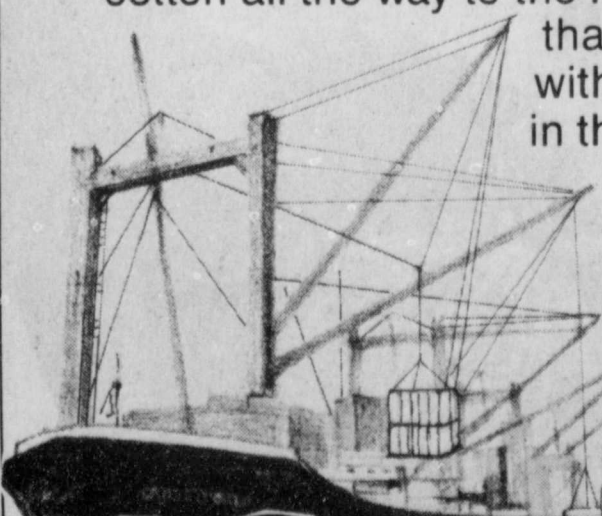

## Lockney City Council meets

The Lockney City Council met last Thursday morning for their regular monthly meeting.

The main issue brought before the council was the opening of the bids on the new fire department building to be erected just south of the city hall.

In all there were ten bids submitted to the council which included Lubbock Development Company in the amount of \$26,389.00; Custom Buildings of Hart for \$28,000.00; Pharr Company of Lubbock for \$29,496.00; Ward's Construction of Lubbock for \$29,804.00; and A and S Steel Buildings of Amarillo for \$30,961.00.

Also submitting bids were Hallmark Buildings of Lubbock for \$35,450.00; Plains Builders of Lubbock for \$31,140.00; Webb Construction of Amarillo for \$32,604.00; Davis Welding of Wellington for \$38,294.00; and Ivorton Buildings of Lubbock for \$35,926.00.

After much discussion and checking the bids it was suggested that engineer A.C. Bowden check with Pharr, Lub-

bock Development Company and Custom Buildings to make sure that they have included the proper insulation in their bids as some of the bidders had bid in error. The council was to meet some time this week to make a final decision on which of the above three bids they would accept.

Also brought before the council was the ordinance to close certain streets and alleys in the Wilson Addition. Attorney Ben Ayres made this recommendation after finding several streets and alleyways marked off on an old map of the city. The streets and alleys at present are in a field and not likely to be used; therefore the ordinance will remove them from city maps.

The council also approved the minutes of the last meeting and paying of the current bills.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Copeland, aldermen Dipprey, Reecer, Wofford, city secretary, Erma Lee Duckworth, and attorney Paul Lyle.

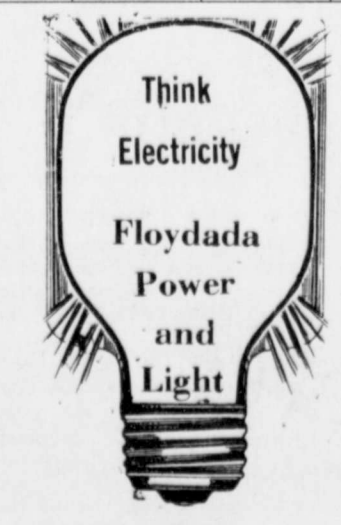

## In times like these...

Although peace talks that opened in La Palma, El Salvador in mid-October may fail to bring an immediate end to the nation's five-year civil war, President Reagan and Salvadoran President Duarte stand to emerge as winners. For President Reagan, the talks can be used to create stability in Central America by combining U.S. military and economic aid, and a tough stance toward Nicaragua, Cuba, and the Soviet Union.

The 5 1/2 hour meeting between Duarte and rebel leaders in a village church in La Palma October 15 has sparked a nationwide mood of optimism. The leftists say that Duarte has recognized their political and military legitimacy for the first time. They have agreed to take part in a joint commission that is to hold more talks this month.

The peace process could yet become derailed, however, by a surge of rebel attacks or by a backlash from right-wing politicians or Army officers who equate peace talks with treason. Just three days before the historic meeting at La Palma, the Secret Anti-Communist Army-a paramilitary group regarded as the most dangerous to tourist organization-accused Duarte of "high treason" and threatened to kill him.

At the same time, leftists prospect of shooting their way into power have steadily dimmed. This has made insurgent leaders more receptive to Duarte's initiative, even though he offered less than the rebels first sought as a precondition for talks.

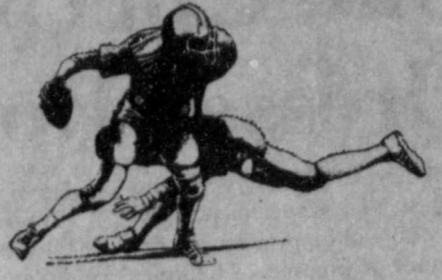

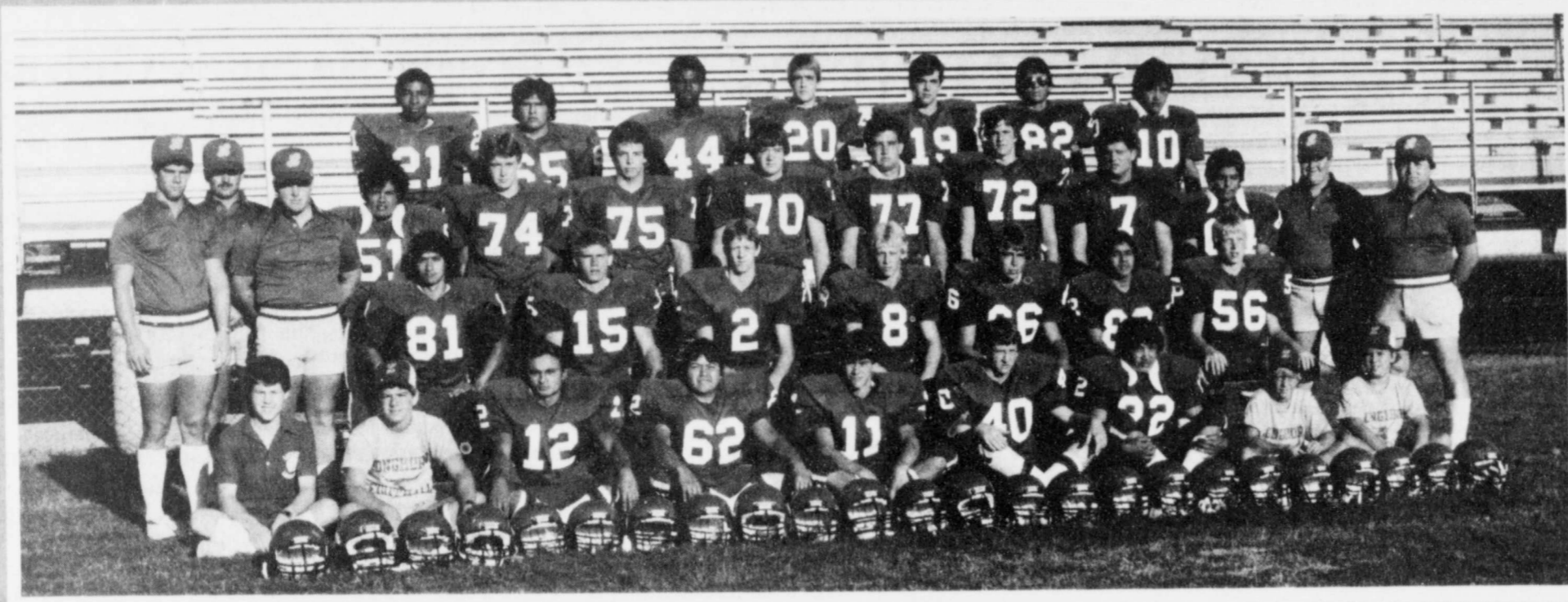
