Longhorns win Bi-District championship against Hale Center

They said it couldn't be done! Seven Lubbock Avalanche-Journal sportswriters unanimously agreed that Lockney could not defeat the Owls from Hale Center twice in the same season. But the Hustlin' Horns let their character show Friday night in Plainview's Bulldog Stadium as they overcame an Owl lead to deadlock the contest at 6-all and emerge with a bi-district victory on penetrations. The Longhorns posted three penetrations while limiting the Owls to only one. This advances the Red and White to the area plateau of the state playoffs against White Deer. Three times in the final 24 minutes the Hustlin' Horns stood tall with tremendous defensive performances to hold the blue clad enemy at bay and preserve their bi-district championship. They previously had captured the District 4-AA title enroute to an 8-1-1 regular season record.

Early Opportunity
 Lockney, which had scored all its points in the first half during a 21-8 homecoming victory over the Owls on Sept. 28, had two golden opportunities in the early minutes Friday night to again break on top.

After Hale Center had stopped the 'Horns on their initial possession of the skirmish, forced a punt and then ran one play, 185 pound junior runningback Ronald Phillips was jarred free from the ball and Ritchie Thornton claimed the fumble at the Owl 32.

Three plays netted only 3 steps and Adam Rodriguez went into punt formation. Although he was tackled sky of scrimmage on the fake punt, Dame Fortune again smiled on the Longhorns as an Owl defender grabbed Rodriguez' face mask and penalty distance was stepped off to the 13.

With a penetration and a fresh series of downs, Lockney had incomplete passes sandwiched between a 2 yard gainer by Buffo Rodriguez. On fourth-and-8 from the 11, senior signal-caller Brent Hallmark was sacked for a 10 yard setback on a hard rush.

The squads swapped punts, with the Owls gaining possession at their 20 and beginning their most successful march of the contest.

The men in blue ran for four downs on the ground -- two each by Phillips and Michael Peggram -- and an 18 yard aerial from quarterback Andy Garcia to end Ennis Smith as they ground out 79 1/2 yards in 10 snaps to be only six inches shy of the double stripe as quarter number one became history.

Owls Score First
 Garcia kept up the middle on the first snap of the second period to send the Owls in front 6-0.

On the crucial running attempt for two bonus points, Garcia's errant pitch was covered by big 'Horn tackle Randy Race to leave the scoreboard reading 6-0 with only three seconds lapsed from the quarter.

Powerhouse fullback Dickie Hernandez gained 11 and 9 before Lockney ran shy of downs and Rodriguez boomed a 50 yard punt to the enemy 7.

With neither squad able to garner a first down, three more punts followed before the Hustlin' Horns let Mitch McBeth's 23 yard punt roll dead at midfield.

From this point, the white shirts cranked their offensive engines. On third-and-7, Coach Bob Purser reached into his bag of tricks for Hallmark to pitch to Jerry Mathis, who tossed a bomb in the direction of sterling wide receiver Gary Kent. The glue-fingered senior outmaneuvered a defender to grab the pigskin for a 32 yard gain and a first at the HC 15.

Hernandez bulled to near the 5 and Mathis picked up another first at the 4. After carrying for 2, Hernandez plowed over the right side of his line and into the end zone to knot the count at 6-all with 3:06 remaining before the bands performed. Danny Peralez' PAT attempt was blocked.

On this drive, the men in the offensive trenches -- center Scott Poole, guards Paul Moats and Peralez, tackles Jerald Johnson and Race and tight end Monty Teeter -- began to gain the upper hand against the hefty Owl forward wall.

Taking the ensuing kickoff, Hale Center garnered a first on a 15 yard Garcia-to-Phillips screen pass and another on a questionable roughing the punter call. Lockney's lone first half penalty.

With the clock showing 0:25, a any play unfurled as Jerry Mathis intercepted Garcia and raced to the Owl 28 but fumbled and the Owls regained control.

Momentum shifts
 Hale Center had momentum much of the first half until the 'Horns scored, but "ole Mo" fit comfortable in the Hustlin' Horns pocket most of the remainder of the contest.

Picking up a first on a 16 yard Peggram rush, the Owls then were held to a minus 5 yards on 3 attempts and punted to the 'Horn 34.

Facing third-and-7, Hernandez muscled his way for 10 steps, Thornton, injured on the Lockney touchdown, took a well-timed pitch from Hallmark and found daylight around left end for 17

years. Hernandez went for 7 more yards before the fumble Nemesis again struck the Longhorns. The Owls' Scott Snipes covered at the 29.

Following a punt, Hale Center got a wink from Lady Luck as Adam Rodriguez got a hard rush on a punt attempt, could never gain control of the ball and blue shirt James Pardo was the last man off the ball at the LL 24.

Defense Shines
 With the score tied and Lockney owning a 2-1 penetration edge, the Owls were threatening. But the Hustlin' Horns defense -- ends Scott Poole and Monty Teeter and tackles Danny Peralez and David DeLeon in the trenches; superb linebackers Terry Mathis in the middle and Paul Moats and George Basaldua on the outside; corners Johnny Torrez and Gary Kent; and safeties Ritchie Thornton and Adam Rodriguez -- shined as it has on numerous occasions throughout the campaign. It limited Hale Center to only two first downs and 16 net yards in the final 24 minutes.

Garcia was smothered for no gain, Phillips went for 2 and Garcia's fumble was sacked up by Poole 8 yards upfield at the 30. In the final minute of the third stanza, Jerry Mathis made a phenomenal grab of a toss off Hallmark's right arm and three times broke tackles on an apparent 58 yard pass-and-run. Offsetting penalties erased the effort as the 'Horns were charged with illegal motion and Hale Center was assessed 15 yards for a dead ball personal foul. This gave Lockney a first at the Owl 47.

Another Hallmark-to-Mathis aerial clicked for 4 as quarter number three became history.

Hernandez gained 8 and a first and Hallmark, the Longhorns' brilliant field general, kept for 5 and another new series at the 21. Hernandez stepped off 4 more to the 17 and the third Lockney penetration.

The complexion changed rapidly as Mathis lost 12 and Rodriguez' punt was blocked for a 37 yard loss all the way back to the 'Horn 34. Ennis Smith's decision to pounce on the ball rather than attempt to advance the live ball (with no white shirts within 20 yards) was a lifesaver for the 'Horns.

Kent got it right back on the next snap as he swiped a Garcia pass at the 10.

Four downs later, the white shirts punted to their 48 and Hale Center again owned good field position. Peggram went for 15 before the Owls were bogged down by the LL defensive unit. On fourth-and-1, Peggram fumbled and the steady Poole again recovered his second at the 31.

Tony Banda picked up a first before Rodriguez punted to the HC 19. Ernest Smith lost 8 on the return.

A holding infraction put the Owls in a real hole at their 6.

'Horns Sense Victory
 Sensing victory, the 'Horns defense put hard rushes on Garcia, causing three consecutive incomplete passes.

McBeth's punt rolled 68 yards with the wind to the LL 26. With time now their ally, Lockney's effort to pick up a first were futile and they punted to the Owl 41.

A Garcia aerial fell awry and the HC quarterback lost 4 before Thornton (who earlier had a fumble recovery) capped another strong performance by intercepting at the 'Horn 26.

Hallmark fell on the ball as the final seconds expired.

Hernandez again eclipsed the century plateau with 121 yards rushing on 30 attempts. Thornton gained 19 on 3 carries. Banda had 7 steps on 3 tries. Buffo Rodriguez made 2 on his lone carry. Hallmark was -2 on 10 keeps (dot yardage due to sacks on passing attempts). Mathis was -11 on 5 carries and Adam Rodriguez had a minus 15 on the fumbled punt, due to the rush.

Hustlin' Horns Roll Along

While nurturing the sweet victory -- the one some sportswriters said wouldn't happen -- longtime Lockney fans remembered that 27 years ago in the same Bulldog Stadium the Longhorns edged past Dimmitt on first downs (following an early season trouncing of the Bobcats) to become bi-district champions. More than one of these 1957 'Horns now has a son on the field wearing the Red and White, including Ritchie Thornton and Randy Race, sons of Ronnie Thornton and Bill Race.

But this night belonged to the brilliant '84 squad as the Hustlin' Horns continues to roll along. Their enthusiasm while accepting the bi-district trophy following the hard-knocking contest was indication enough that the 'Horns are not nearly ready to put away the footballs.

The players of the week for the Hale Center game were Scott Poole and Dickie Hernandez as the offensive

lineman and the offensive back, respectively. The forcing unit player was Terry Mathis, the secondary players of the week were Ritchie Thornton and Gary Kent. Big Hit this week went to Danny Peralez and the MOE was Jerry Mathis. Last week we reported that Johnny Torrez was the special teams player when in fact it was Trent Gant.

Of the performance in Plainview last Friday night, coach Bob Purser said that "they (Hale Center) were as tough as we thought they would be. They were alot more physical than when we played them earlier. It took the first half of the game for us to settle down but we did come back in the second half and played very good defense."

Of the upcoming game against White Deer Purser said "they are real big and they ran a different kind of offense that will take all the time we have this week to get ready for."

Purser also said "we are so excited about still playing football. It's great!"

Lockney school board accepts bid on tractor

The Lockney Independent School District Board of Directors accepted the bid from James Brothers Implement of Plainview for \$6670.00 for a new lawn tractor. This was one of six bids submitted to the board.

In other action the board approved the purchase of a new copy machine. The purchase will be made after several machines are used and the different features are studied. The teachers and principals will ascertain which of the machines will best serve their needs.

The board approved the 1983-84 audit report. They also approved the teacher exchange program brought before the board last month by D'Lyn Morgan. The program would provide teachers from the United States to exchange with teachers from foreign countries for a one year period. Morgan has submitted an application for acceptance into the program and has requested that she be given a position in England. If accepted, she would teach there next year and Lockney would have a teacher from England teaching here during that time.

James Whitis, band teacher, discussed the prospect of purchasing new band uniforms. He said the present uniforms

are "10 years old and are in need of being replaced."

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark also discussed the attendance with the board. During the month of October, the average daily attendance (ADA), the basis for State money Lockney will receive, was up. It was increased by 28 over last year at the same time. Due to the increase, which is expected to remain much the same for next year, according to Hallmark, and with regard to regulations in House Bill 72, Hallmark told board members that Lockney will probably have to add a minimum of three new teachers for grades K-2 next year. The school "will possibly have to add more classroom space somewhere at the elementary school" because no one teacher is allowed to have more than 22 children under instruction. "The House Bill has created not only more work for teachers, but also may create a space problem," Hallmark concluded.

There were no bids received on the old school buses; therefore no action was taken.

Social Security News

Recently people in this area have been learning about hospice and of the plans to introduce such a program in the Plainview community. It may be of interest that Medicare has covered hospice care since November, 1983.

Medicare's definition of hospice, although technical, is consistent with the "shelter for the traveler" concept of hospice; a place of comfort for the individual confronted with a terminal illness. It defines hospice as a home care program to provide medical and support services to manage a terminal illness, including pain control.

Covered services include those of a physician, nursing care, medical appliances and supplies (including outpatient drugs for symptom management and pain relief), home health aide and homemaker services, therapies, medical social service, and counseling. Additionally, a broad range of outpatient services and short term inpatient care is also covered.

Several requirements must be met to become eligible for hospice care. First, one must be eligible for Medicare (Part A) hospital insurance. Both the doctor and hospice medical director must certify that the patient's illness is terminal. The patient must choose hospice instead of standard Medicare benefits. Finally, the care must be received from a Medicare certified hospice program.

Hospice benefits are provided for two periods of 90 days each and one 30 day period. A patient can choose to cancel the hospice coverage and resume

regular Medicare at any time. When hospice care is cancelled, coverage for the remainder of the period is forfeited. If a patient continues to need services after the 120 days of coverage are exhausted the hospice is still obligated to continue providing the care.

Medicare pays the hospice directly and the patient can be charged for only two items. The hospice can charge a maximum of \$5.00 for each pain relief or symptom management prescription. Also, a patient may need a short term inpatient stay in this situation, a charge can be made for the lesser of 5% of the inpatient stay or \$356.00 (for 1984), or \$400.00 (for 1985). Medicare continues to cover conditions other than the terminal condition under its standard benefits. All other services must be provided by the hospice.

Cheesy Omelette Makes Easy Dinner

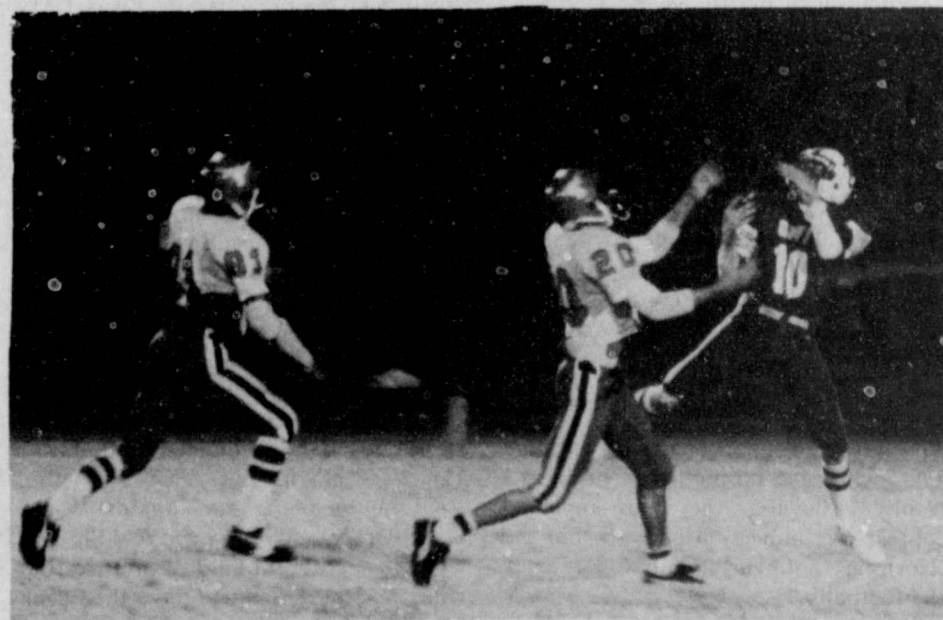
When everyone — including the cook — arrives home just in time for dinner, that's the time to serve a Golden Fluffy Omelette. Puffy with stiffly beaten egg whites, the baked omelette is filled with smooth and easy melting Velveeta pasteurized process cheese spread and crumbled bacon. Golden Fluffy Omelette

- 6 eggs, separated
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup green onion slices
- 2 tablespoons Parkay margarine

- 1/4 lb. Velveeta pasteurized process cheese spread, sliced
- 3 crisply cooked bacon slices, crumbled

Combine egg yolks, milk and salt; beat until thick and lemon colored. Stir in onion. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Melt margarine in 10-inch oven proof skillet over low heat. Add egg mixture. Cook over low heat 10 to 12 minutes or until underside is golden brown. Bake at 325° 10 to 15 minutes or until top is firm. Place half of process cheese spread on half of omelette. Top with bacon; continue baking until process cheese spread begins to melt. Remove from oven; make deep crease across center. Slip turner underneath; tip skillet to loosen and gently fold in half. Slide onto serving plate and top with remaining process cheese spread. 4 servings

With it's problems heightening day by day, Britain is fighting a battle every bit as critical to its future as any this proud nation has waged since the end of World War II. At the root of Britain difficulties is a divisive strike by coal miners, now in the 34th week, that has cast a mood of apprehension over the country.

To Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, the strike is a "Marxist challenge to the roads of democracy that must be resisted. The opposition Labor Party sees itself protecting the working class from abuses of a "police state."

Making the fight more critical for Britain's 50 million people are worsening economic prospectus, a growing political chasm between left and right, and rising social tensions.

Labor Party has swung to the left. It has already vowed, if it comes to power, to end nuclear cooperation with the United States, expel American cruise missiles from Britain and dismantle the British deterrent force.

Mary was employed by the school for several years. Another club member, Kathryn Cooper was the first dietician the school hired when it opened in 1969.

Mary said there were 531 children at the homes. There are 19 dorms and five children to each bedroom. A child had to be 6 years of age to be admitted. At present they employ 850 persons. When children are able, they are put in shelter homes. Different club, family members, and individuals can help with these children, especially at Christmas time.

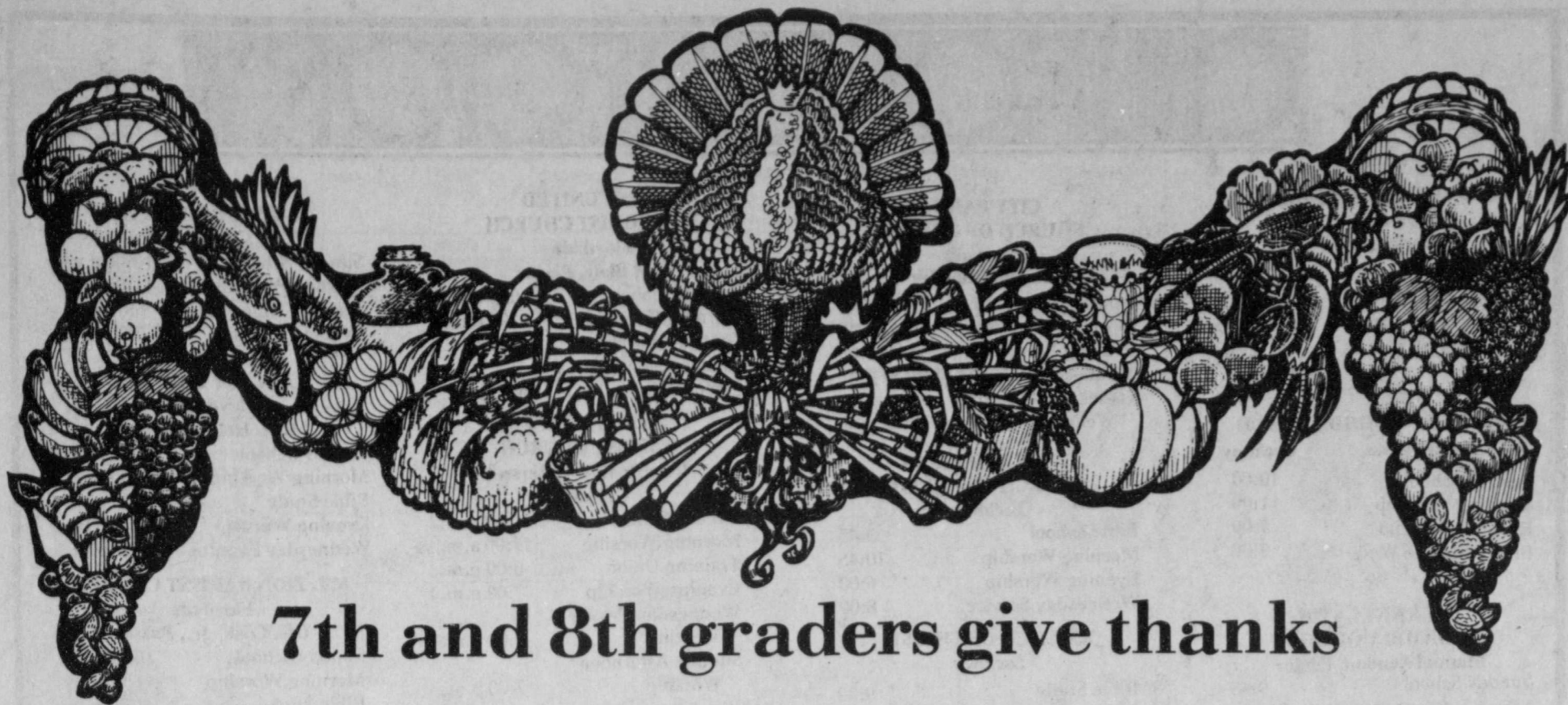

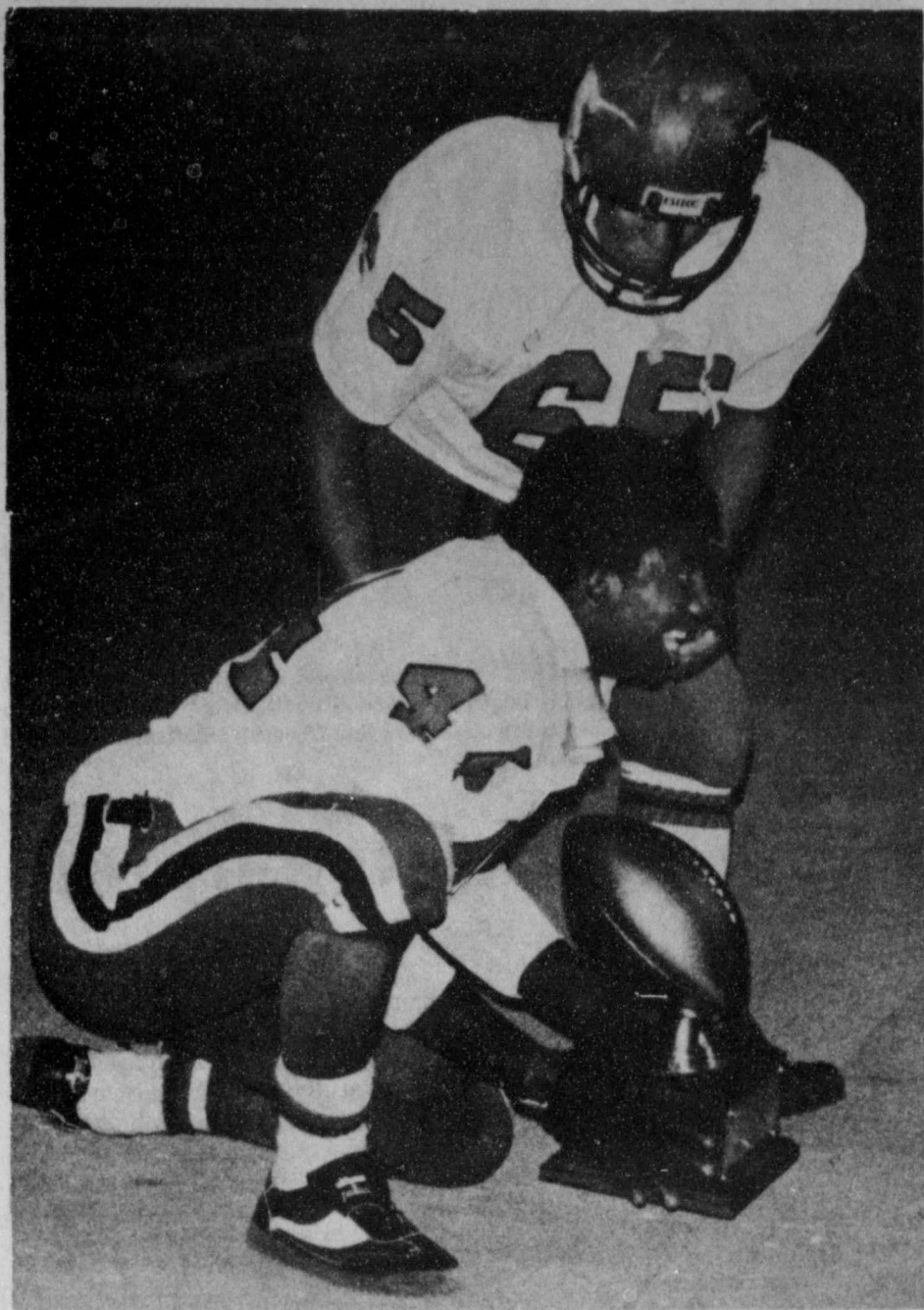

Help Your Heart



Check your blood pressure

High blood pressure can cause stroke, heart attack, kidney damage and more. It can shorten your life. But high blood pressure can be treated and controlled with your help.

Everyone has blood pressure. Without it, the blood couldn't circulate in our bodies. Blood pressure in your arteries changes from day to day, even from moment to moment. It goes up when you get excited, and down when you rest or sleep. These changes in pressure are perfectly normal.

What is high blood pressure? In some people, certain arteries may clamp down. This makes it harder for blood to pass through, and pressure builds up as a result. If it goes too high and stays that way, it is called high blood pressure.

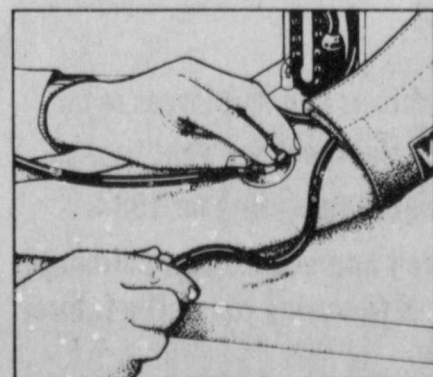
We still don't know what causes most high blood pressure, but research scientists are working hard on the problem. While they don't have the final answer, yet, they do have some important leads.

If your parents have had high blood pressure, there is a good chance you have it or will develop it. And if you have it, your children may develop it. Children should have regular blood pressure checkups just like adults.

Help your heart! Have your blood pressure checked at least once a year. It's the only way to find out if you have high blood pressure. There usually are no early signs to warn you. That's why high blood pressure is called the silent killer.

Call your doctor, clinic or nearest health center to make an appointment to have your blood pressure checked. A rubber cuff, something like a

bandage, is wrapped around your upper arm. The cuff is filled with air until it squeezes the artery in your arm. Then the air is slowly let out of the cuff. At the same time, a doctor listens with a stethoscope as the blood rushes through your artery. He also watches a measuring gauge which tells him your blood pressure.



If you have high blood pressure, it can be treated and controlled. But it takes two to do it: you and your doctor. By cooperating with your doctor you can live a long and normal life.

Your doctor may prescribe pills. Keep taking your medicine as long as he says you should. Your doctor may also put you on a low-fat, low-salt diet. If you are overweight, it's important to lose the extra pounds and keep them off. The extra weight puts a strain on your heart. Smoking cigarettes does too, so don't smoke. Your local chapter of the American Heart Association has information on how to stop smoking and on high blood pressure.

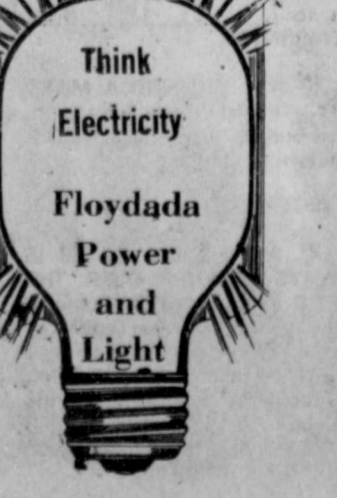

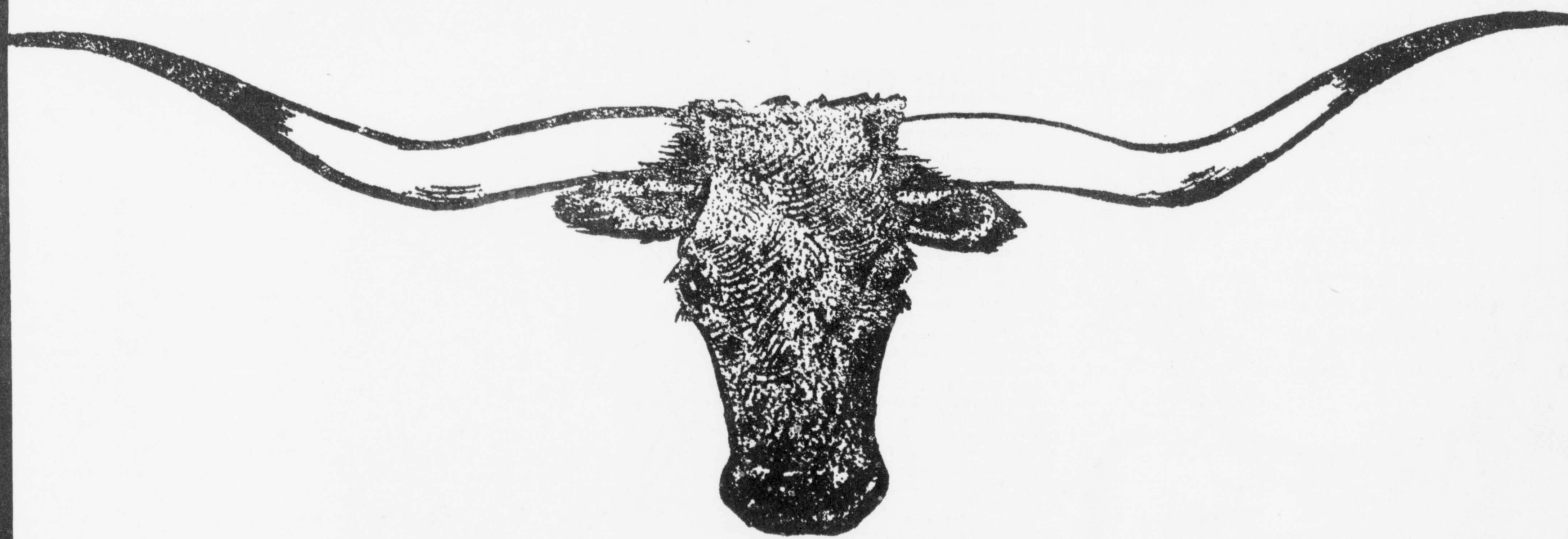
