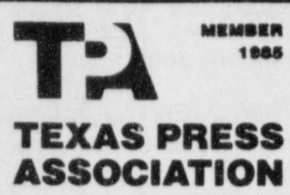
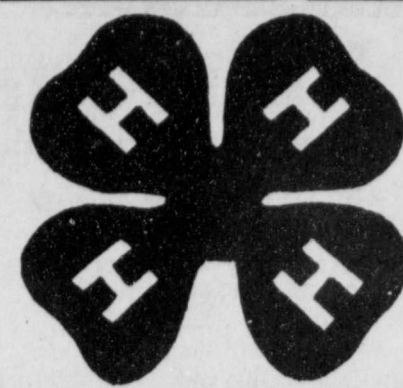

50 students exhibit animals in local show and prepare for county show

Approximately 50 Lockney area 4-H and FFA members braved the cold weather on Saturday, February 8 to show the animals they have spent the past several months raising and caring for.

Students braved, what felt like sub zero temperatures inside the Lockney show barn to exhibit lambs, pigs, and steers in the show. A total of 110 animals were shown by these Lockney youngsters, in preparation for the Floyd County show which will be held this weekend in Floydada.

Kicking off the show at about 10:00 a.m. last Saturday morning was the pig show. Taking the top honors in the pig division was Michelle Delgado who walked away with both the grand and reserve grand champion belt buckles. Showmanship winner in this division was Robert Wofford.

Belt buckles for the pig show were donated by Warren Mitchell for the grand champion buckle; Lockney Coop the reserve grand champion; and H and W Swine donated the showmanship buckle.

Breed and reserve breed champions in the respective classes of the pig show include Clay Adrian and Ramon Cortez

in the Duroc breed, Robert Delgado and Michelle Delgado in the Hampshire class, Julio Cortez and Wymon Rexrode in the Spots and Berkshires, Wymon Rexrode and Rusty Carthel in the Yorkshires, and Robert Delgado and Anthony Emert in the cross class.

Gwen Lane took top honors in the lamb show with the grand champion lamb, while Matt Mitchell showed the reserve grand champion, Tony Saucedo was awarded the showmanship buckle in the lamb show.

Belt buckles for the lamb show were donated by Buster Terrell and Eddie Teeter for the grand champion, reserve grand champion by Kenneth Holt and Warren Mitchell, and the showmanship buckle by John Quebe and Clar Schacht.

Other top winners in the lamb show included Matt Mitchell and Lori Smith the breed and reserve breed champion Finewools, Matt Mitchell and Gwen Lane in the Finewool cross class, Lane and David Turner in the Hamp class, Tony Saucedo and Jennifer Fortenberry in the Suffolk class, and Gwen Lane and Gracie Saucedo in the Southdown class.

There were only ten steers exhibited in the Lockney show this year and top honors went to Matt Williams with the

grand champion and Chad Golden with the reserve grand champion. The showmanship winner was Scott Howard.

Buckles in the steer show were donated by Jerry Williams, Lockney Coop, and Larry Golden for the grand, reserve grand champion, and showmanship buckles respectively.

During the show space heaters were put on each end of the spectator stands. Consumers Fuel Association of Lockney donated 30 gallons of diesel and 10 gallons of kerosene to fuel the heaters.

The Lockney Chamber of Commerce donated prize money for the exhibitors in the show with the top five winners in each class in each division of the show receiving \$5, 5, 3, 2, and \$1 respectively.

Also Kelton Shaw and Warren Mathis donated money and each exhibitor received a \$2 bill from these two men.

Weighing-in for barrows and lambs will begin the annual Floyd County Junior Livestock Show on Friday,

February 14. Weighing and classification of steers and heifers will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, February 15. All entries need to be submitted to the county agent's office or the high school ag teachers before Monday, February 10.

Lamb judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, February 15. Barrow judging will follow at 2:00 p.m. in the afternoon. Heifers and steers will be judged on Sunday afternoon beginning at 2:00 p.m. Steers will be judged immediately following at 3:00 p.m.

Monday, February 17 will see an activity filled day for the annual show. The livestock judging contest is slated to begin at 7:45 a.m. All individuals are invited to participate. The contest will be handled this year by the Clarendon Junior College Livestock Judging Team.

The annual Buyers Luncheon will begin at 11:30 a.m. on Monday. The premium sale will follow at 1:00 p.m. A banquet for the exhibitors and their parents will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the Lockney Elementary School cafeteria on Tuesday, February 18. This awards function is being sponsored by Floyd County Farm Bureau.

Social Security News

Persons dealing with the Social Security Administration do not have to be represented by an attorney or anyone else; however, some people may feel more comfortable if they are represented.

The representative may be an attorney or any other qualified person and may be entitled to a fee even if the claim is denied; however, any fee charged must be approved by SSA. Even a contract between the claimant and his or her representative for payment of a specified fee is not binding.

Any fee due the representative is usually paid from money due the claimant when a claim is approved. If this amount is insufficient to cover the fee, the claimant is responsible for paying the balance.

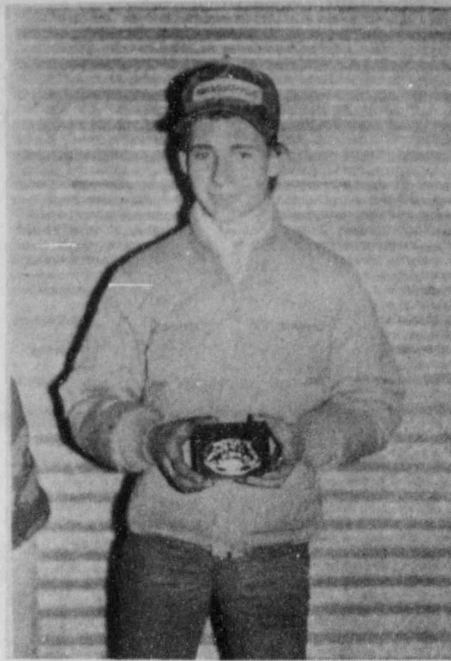

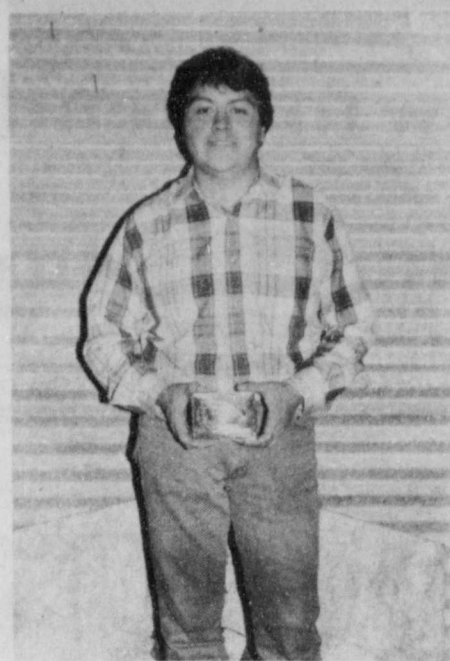

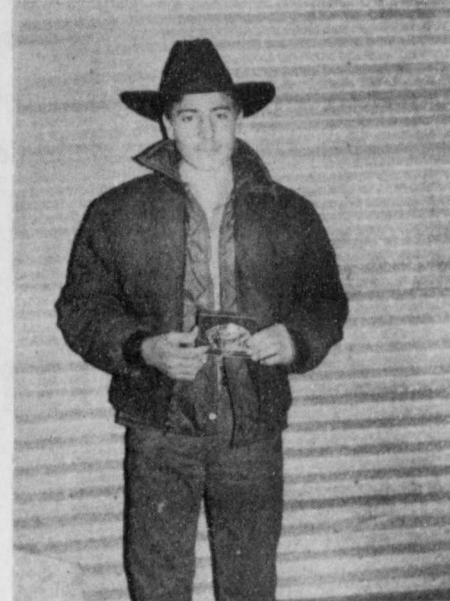

Our students have had five lessons and are progressing very nicely. Remember to "Load the Boat."



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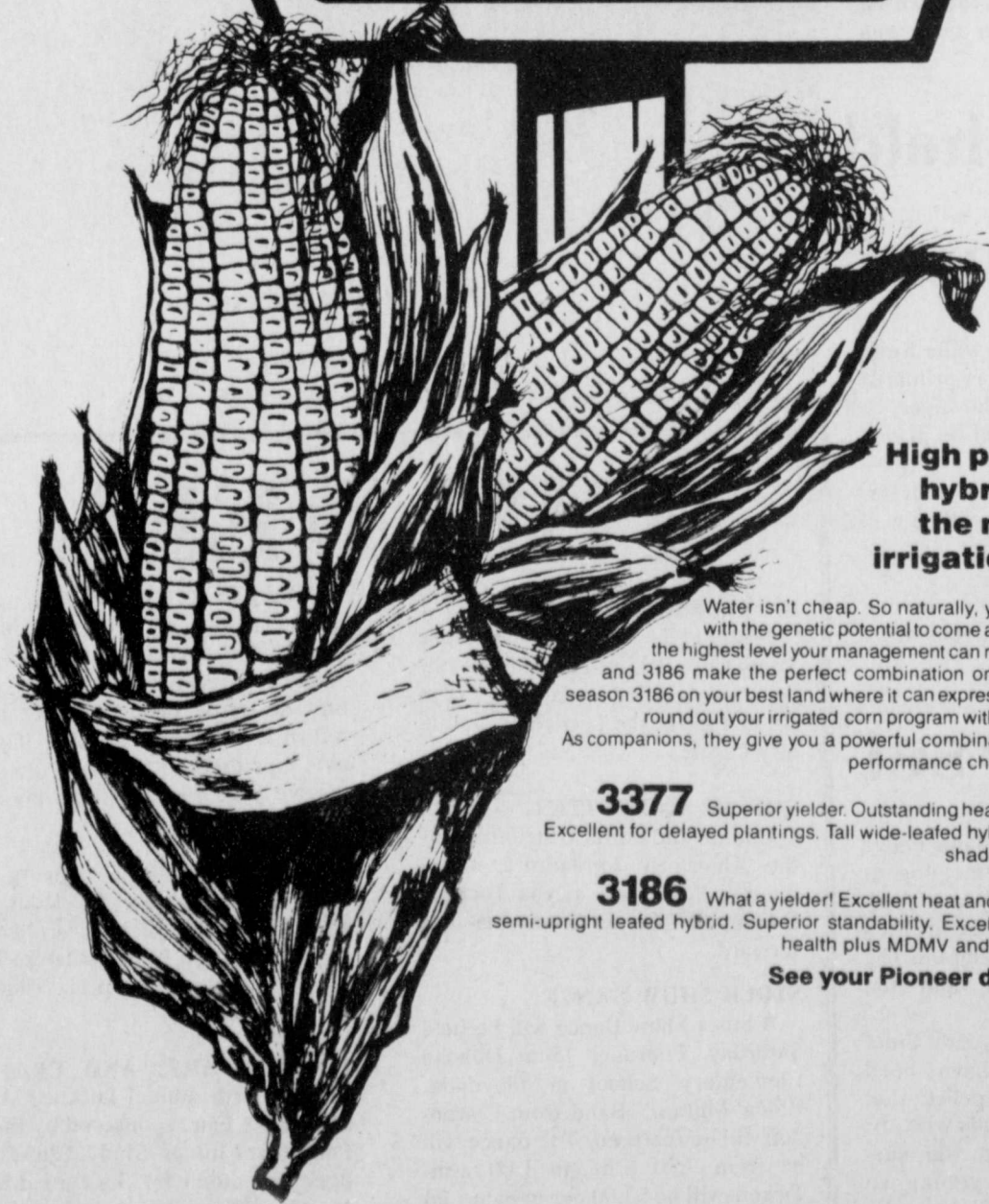
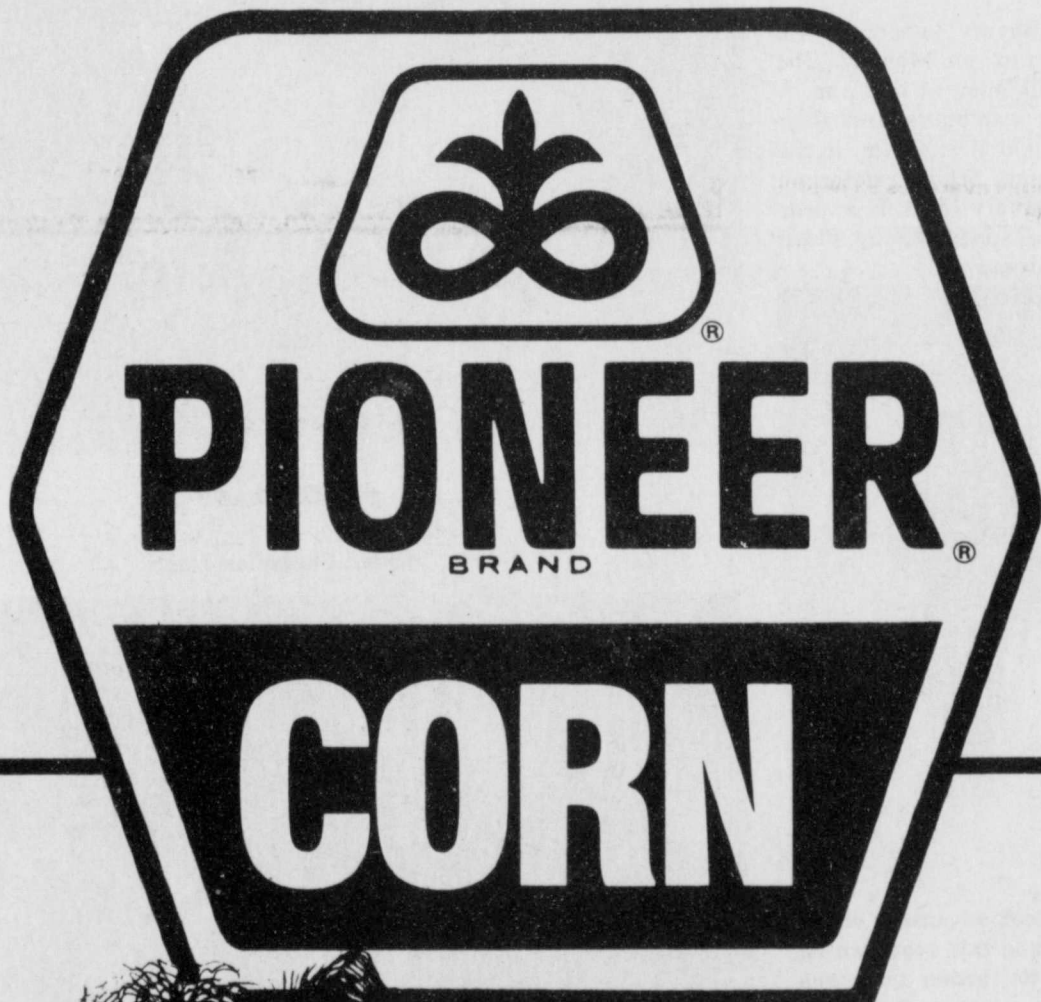

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TEC conducts investigation

The Texas Employment Commission announced its plans to conduct state-wide fraud investigations in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor.

The proposed plan came as a result of a six-month investigation involving special investigators from the T.E.C. and the U.S. Department of Labor in which Houston area residents were charged with theft.

The theft charges, filed in Houston December 5, 1985, cited 55 area workers accused of defrauding the T.E.C. of \$146,043.00 in unemployment insurance benefits. Each of the charges filed carries a maximum penalty of one year imprisonment and a fine of \$1,000.00. The alleged fraud was indicated by comparisons of state records with the records of Houston area employers, through the use of a computer match-up system.

Texas Employment Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers, who represents employers, said, "The cooperation of Texas' employers has been the key to our success in the continuing efforts to detect unemployment insurance fraud. Employers are becoming aware that their tax accounts can be beneficially affected by fraud detection."

Although the T.E.C. has been actively engaged in the prevention and detection of fraud for many years, it has recently assigned special investigators to most major metropolitan areas of the state in order to increase emphasis on seeking prosecution in its criminal fraud cases. As a result, T.E.C. has successfully obtained convictions in 361 criminal prosecution cases during 1985.

The Texas Employment Commission, in cooperation with the Office of Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Labor, is now planning a joint task force of state and federal investigators, which will concentrate its collective resources on the detection and prosecution of unemployment insurance fraud in those areas of the state where there is frequent incidence of this crime.

"Unemployment insurance fraud is not a victimless crime just because there is no violence involved," said Commissioner Nabers. "Ultimately, we all bear the cost of crimes of this sort. The Texas Employment Commission intends to ensure that this will be one type of crime that does not go unpunished."

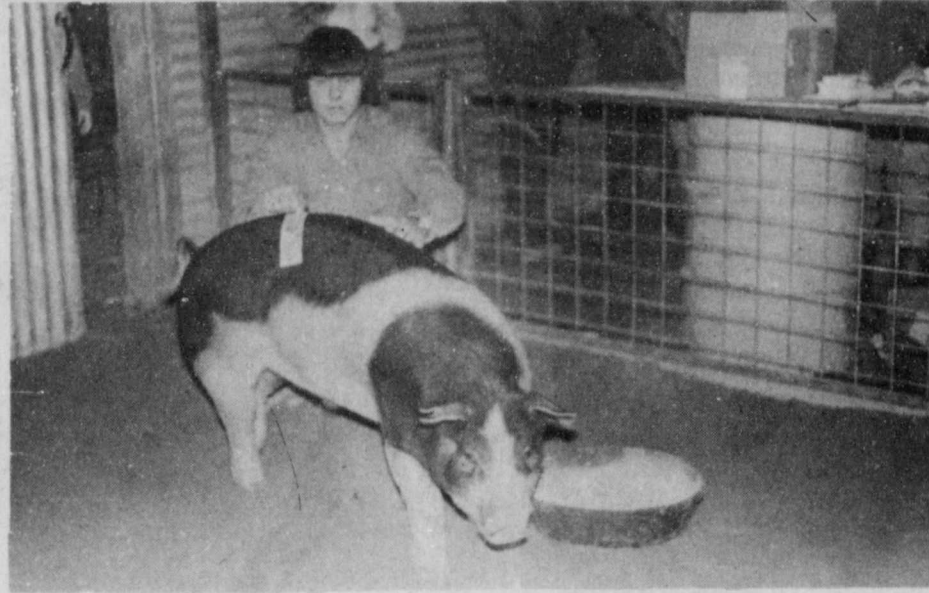


MATT MITCHELL—3rd Place Medium Weight and Heavy Weight Suffolk

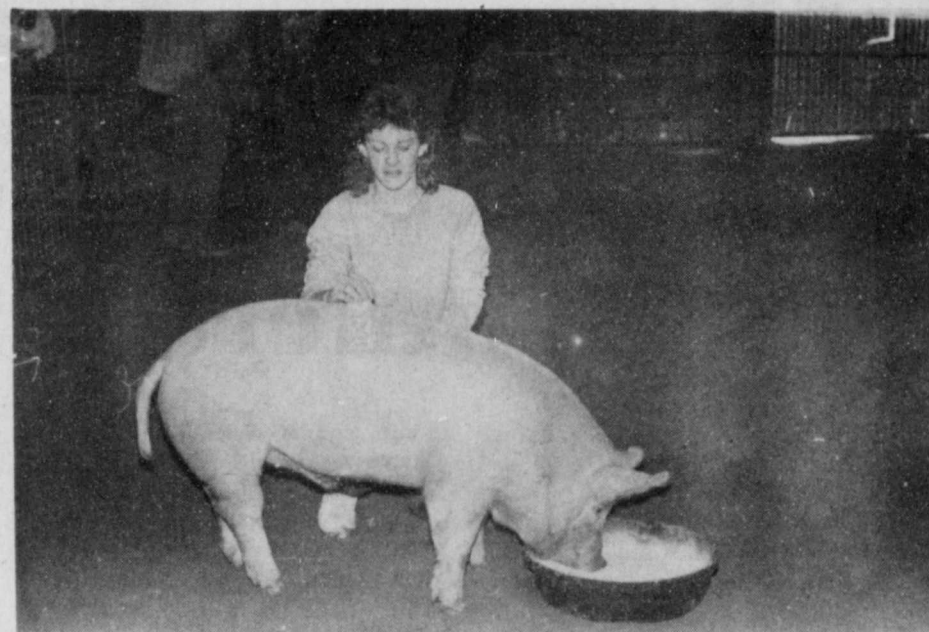
GWEN LANE—Breed Champion Southdown

Program takes land out

Aim of the new Conservation Reserve Program spelled out in the recently passed farm bill is to take millions of acres of erodible farmland out of production.

In Texas an estimated 700,000 acres are targeted for inclusion in the program this year, the majority being in the plains and Central Texas Blacklands, points out Dr. Bill Harris, soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

To qualify for the program, farmland must be classified as highly erodible (as determined by the Soil Conservation Service). Farmers with eligible land will then be able to enter those acres into the program, which includes cost-sharing for establishing permanent cover and annual rent payments over a 10-year contract period.

A 10-day sign-up period is tentatively scheduled to start in early March at local ASCS (Agricultural Stabilization and

Conservation Service) offices. At this time a farmer with eligible cropland must submit a bid for the annual rent payment on the designated acres, Harris explains. Bids will be reviewed by county and state ASCS personnel, and farmers will then be notified as to whether or not they have been accepted. Annual rent payments will be limited to \$50,000 per farmer.

A farmer participating in the program may elect to return the land to production any time by repaying the government, with interest, all of its costs for annual rental and establishing cover, Harris points out.

Since the Extension Service has the responsibility to inform farmers about the program, a series of regional meetings is slated in late February, Harris points out. Meetings are scheduled February 25, 9 a.m. to 12 noon at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, Lubbock.

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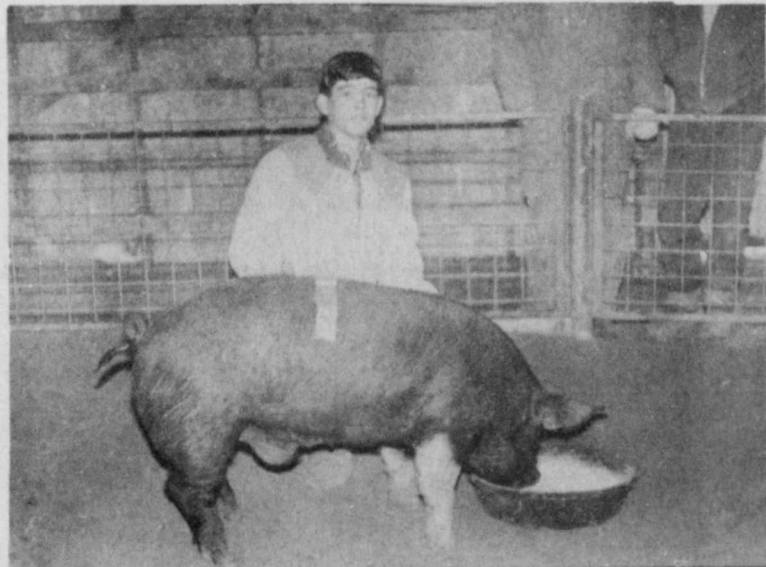

Financial Focus

I would like to start this Financial Focus series of article on Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA's). It is a subject I have found is misunderstood, and since this is "IRA Season", lets begin.

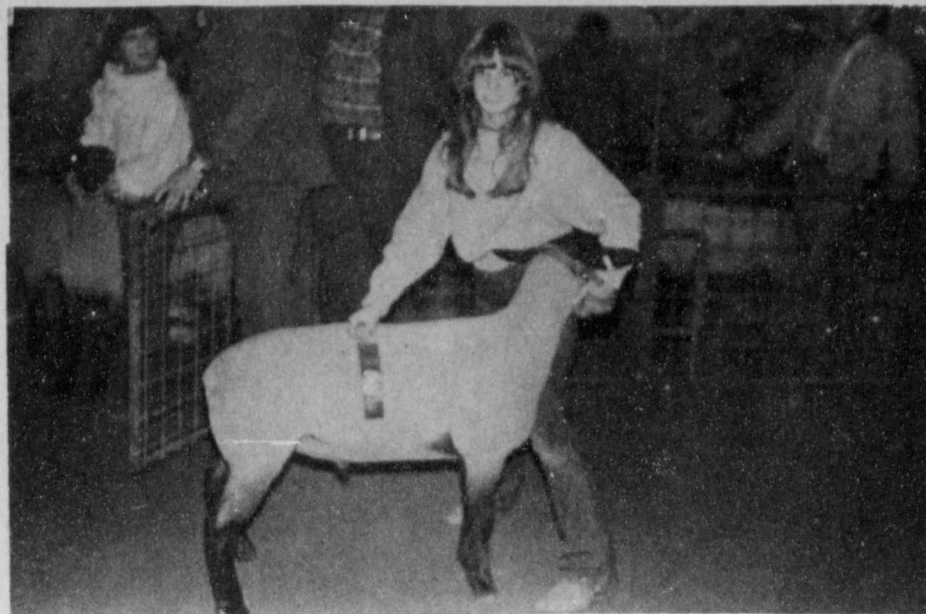
"Forbes" magazine ran an article on IRA's. The author began the article by writing, "Here is the gift from Uncle Sam, the kindest thing the government has done for the working stiff since repealing Prohibition, and most American families still have not taken advantage of it!" Many of us complain taxes are a major concern. Yet, at the beginning of 1985, only about 52 percent of the households with incomes in excess of \$50,000 had opened IRA's. Or to put it another way, almost half of the "affluent taxpayers" (that's what they call folks who earn more than \$50,000 a year) are not taking advantage of the tremendous tax benefit offered by IRA's. Also, according to the same article, only about 24 percent of all qualified taxpayers have purchased them!

It it's such a good investment, why don't more people take advantage of it, you might ask? Some rationalize they're too close to retirement for the current \$2,000 a year deposit limit (\$2250 if you're married filing a joint return and only one spouse has earned income) to be of benefit. By the way, there is legislation being considered that would

change the limits, and I will cover this in a later article. For example, an annual \$2,000 contribution made on January 1st of each year for the next 10 years would grow to more than \$33,000 at a modest 9 percent compounding rate. Added to the tax benefits, that makes for a pretty good return on your money, wouldn't you say?

Another group feels they're too young to start a retirement plan. They seem to feel there is an endless amount of time in the future to start worrying about retirement, and they don't want to tie up their money. Others just procrastinate and never start an IRA—they'll do it next year, they say, but next year never comes. And, of course, there are those who just never let themselves accumulate \$2,000 in cash. If this is the case, the ideal way to amass the annual contribution is to set up a budget that accounts for a monthly contribution into an IRA account. About \$166 a month will get the job done, and you could accomplish this through a payroll deduction plan at work or an automatic bank draft. I do my contributions in this way, and its great because I rarely missed the money.

So let's begin this series on the individual retirement plan by saying if you're not taking advantage of IRAs, for whatever reason, you're missing the "kindest thing the government has done for the working stiff since repealing Prohibition." More next week.



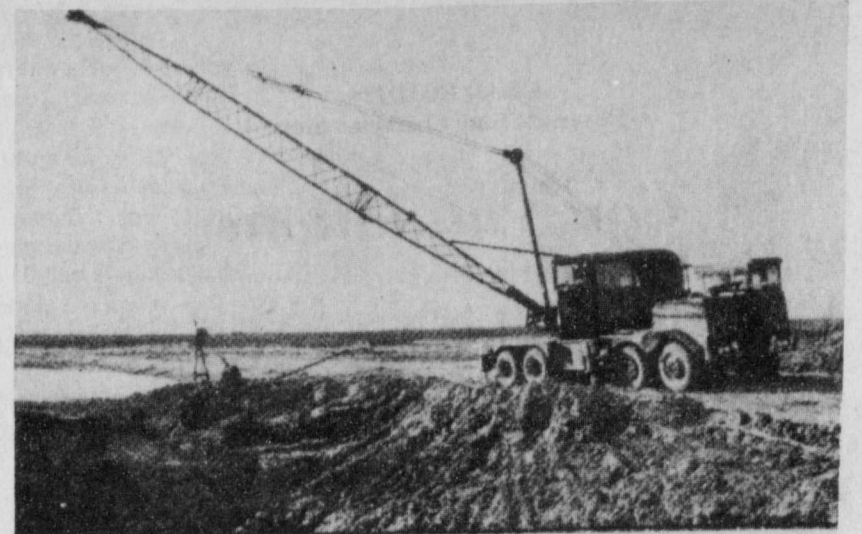
