Fair unreels Thursday through Saturday

All signals are go — and the weatherman is forecasting his cooperation — for the 33rd annual version of Floyd County Fair and Surrounding Counties, which unreels Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the grounds in southeast Lockney.

Plans for the '86 fair have been finalized and several new events have been added.

The fair dates were changed this year "to keep from interfering with school activities."

THURSDAY
Thursday, August 21, has been designated as Floyd County Sesquicentennial Day.

A costume contest is planned from 4:30 until 5:30 on the fair grounds, with a covered wagon serving as judging headquarters. Chosen will be costume winners in women's, men's, girls' and boys' divisions.

The Sesquicentennial theme is expected to be carried out in several fair booths, as well as some Lockney, businesses and offices.

Also, Thursday will be judging day in the various departments. Persons interested in entering foods, sewing, crafts and working items in the women's and youth departments should plan to have their entries in the fair barns no later than 11 a.m. Thursday.

Judging of community exhibits will take place at 1 p.m. on Thursday, followed by judging of the women's department at 2:00 and at 3:00 with judging of the agriculture department.

The annual talent show is also to be held Thursday in the fair entertainment building. This year the talent show will include both adult and youth talent from the area. Reeda Cay Smith is in charge of the talent show.

FRIDAY

Friday, August 22, is again Ladies Day at the fair.

"The Myths and Magic of Color Analysis" is theme for a 9:30 a.m. program given by Nelda Howard, certified color analyst with Beauty-control Cosmetics.

Ms. Howard, along with other certified consultants from this area, will also demonstrate some myths and magic in the way of a right and wrong makeup and wardrobe, and also a color analysis and make-over in the color coded makeup.

A door prize will be given.

A fall fashion show will be presented from 10:45 until 11:45 a.m. Featured will be Leiter Fabrics.

Focal point will be on transitional styles for fall and accessories. Many accessories "individually created" are to be modeled. Directions for all the accessories are to be provided.

Along with the style show, Anne Carthel of Floydada is to exhibit many new sewing notions to "demonstrate how rapidly the sewing industry is changing."

Lunch break is planned from 11:45 until 12:45.

Opening the afternoon session at 1 o'clock will be Vickie Chance from Chance's Country Collections in Lubbock, who will be demonstrating the new Bernette Averlock sewing machine. Various uses of the sewing machine are to be demonstrated.

Clara Harris of Floydada will demonstrate "her fascinating talent of basket weaving" from 2:15 until 3:15 p.m.

She will have on display different items she has made. She is to present different patterns used in weaving.

Also on Friday at 5 p.m. the tractor driving contest has been reinstated. This event has been deleted from fair events for the past few years but has been brought back for the 1986 fair.

Gospel singing will be held at 7 p.m. on Thursday and the square dancing will be held at 9 p.m. Both of these events will take place in the entertainment building.

SATURDAY

Saturday, August 23, is the final day of the '86 fair and will hold a wealth of events.

Starting at 8 a.m. a sanctioned rabbit show will be held in the livestock building. This replaces the livestock show which is normally held at that time.

The parade begins at 10 a.m. in the downtown area. Parade details are given in a separate article.

At 11 a.m. all entrants in the chili cook-off must be in place at the east end of the main fair building. Judging of the chili cook-off is to take place at 5 p.m. and chili samples will be for sale following the judging.

The Lockney FFA children's rodeo and miniature tractor pull is to take place at 1:30 p.m. in the rodeo arena and on the slab just east of the livestock building.

At 3 p.m. the Little Miss Floyd County contest will be held in the entertainment building. Age divisions for afternoon judging will include the three to six years old, seven to nine and ten to twelve year olds.

The Miss Floyd County Fair pageant, for 13 to 17 year old young ladies will be held at 7 p.m. on Saturday.

Providing music for the dance will be Slow Motion, a group formed at Clarendon College and featuring two of Lockney's hometown boys, Earl Brosech and Keith Owens.

School board makes final decisions for new year

In the regular monthly meeting of the Lockney school board, members approved several small items in preparation for the 1986-87 school year.

Among items approved were bids from Bell Dairy, the only company bidding, to provide one pint of milk for the Lockney school system for the coming school year.

Board members also approved the lunchroom prices for the coming year. They will remain the same as last year. Prices include elementary lunches are 60 cents, junior high and high school lunches are 65 cents, breakfast is 30 cents, reduced lunch is 35 cents and a reduced breakfast will be priced at 25 cents.

The board also approved the installation of nine ceiling fans in the elementary school cafeteria at a cost not to exceed \$900.00. The installation will be done by Bill Hunter of Lockney.

Accepted in the Thursday night meeting was the resignation of Edith Clark, first grade teacher at Lockney Elementary for the past 31 years. Clark is resigning due to family health problems.

The board approved hiring Sandra (Terrell) Watson as the special education and resource teacher and Naomi Jones as her aide. They have also approved transferring Violet Cooper to junior high as a teacher's aide.

Other items approved by the board included blinds for the open windows in junior high, a few amendments to the discipline management plan, a washing machine for the field house and approved the Floydada radio station to broadcast the Lockney football games on Friday night.

Present for the meeting were board members Kelton Shaw, Eddie Teeter, Jim Bob Martin, Paul Glasson, Clar Schacht and Keith Jackson.

SPECIAL CALLED MEETING

In a special called meeting on Monday, August 18, the school board members adopted the 1986-87 school budget and approved the resolution for the tax rate for the same year.

Board members unanimously approved a budget which calls for an estimated expenditure of \$2,491,802 which is down \$117,302 from the 1985-86 year. The budget also calls for expected revenues of \$2,618,171.00 which is also down by \$10,643.00 from the previous year.

In adopting the budget and setting the tax rate the board had put the new budget together on the same tax rate as last year and when the motion was made to set the tax rate at the same 67 cents per \$100.00 valuation the vote was unanimous to leave the rate the same.

Present for the budget meeting were board members Shaw, Teeter, Schacht, Glasson, Martin and Jackson.

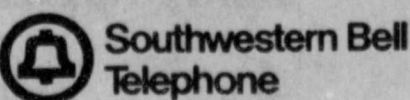
