## WATER SHORTAGE

 Aerving more than 780,000 authoriti serving more than 780,000 people in thestate had experienced summertime water supply problems by September 1 .
according to the Texas Water Develop according to the Texas Water Develop.
ment Board. ment Board.
Many of the problems were caused by the inability to produce water from well at a high enough rate to meet peak
demand, while others involved inadedemand, while others involved inade-
quate water treatment and distribution capacity. Howeere, most water utilitites
in the state reported that water levels in in the state reported that water levels
wells and lakes were adequate. Of the 40 areas reporting problems, at least 15 had imposed mandatory
water use restrictions and another 20 water use restrictions and another 20 had put into effect voluntary restric-
tions.
Most of the areas were in North Texas Most of the areas were in North Texas near Dallas and Fort Worth and in
Central Texas in and near Austin. Central Texas in and near Austin.

Current rules provide that fields Current rules provide that fields

classified as highly erodible, or fields containing 50 or more acres of highly erodible soils, shall be determined to be highly erodible land. Soil surveys are
vailable from the local Soil Conservation Service office for all counties in the Southern High Plains. Through the use highly erodible soils, also available from the local SCS office, it it possible to
identify fields which contain hight identify fields which contain highly
erodible soils.

Modified I-values
Modifing the --value of a soil can

plan needed to control soil erosion plan needed to control soil erosion.
I-values can be modified with such practices as deep tillage, where the soil
surface is turned under and mixed with surface is turned under and mixed with
minimum of 25 percent or more of the a minimum of 25 percent or more of the
clayey-textured subsoil material. This
results in topsoil aggregates that are results in topsoil aggregates that are
considerably more wind stable and that considerably more wind stable and th
protect the soil to a higher degree. Some soils with an I-value of 310 can
be modified to an I-value of 86 by proper be modified to an I-value of 86 by proper deep tillage once every third year.
Similarly soils with an I-value of 134 and an I-value of 86 can be modified to an -value of 56 by practicing proper deep
tillage. Usually, if the sand surface illage. Usually, if the sand surface
layer is greater than 20 inches thick, laeep itlage practices are less effective in producing conditions that allow the

The alternatives open to prod
farming highly erodibe so prods in the
Southern High Plains of Texas primarily Southern High Plains of Texas primarily
consist of some type of crop rotation system or a wind strip-cropping system.
