

were young and is a special person Terry, a truly outstanding hospital administrator, and Jim and Kay, who are involved in so many positive things.

SEEN AND HEARD The idea that young children should be seen and not heard is out!

Infants, as it turns out, shoud be both seen and heard.

New research shows that those cute sounds babies make are actually vital to speech development. In studies of more than 100 infants, D. Kimbrough Oller, Ph.D., of the University of Miami, has documented definite stages of infant speech.

According to Dr. Kimbrough, twomonth-old babies make throaty sounds that they produce with a virtually closed vocal tract. They then move on to the "gooing" stage, using their mouths and tongues to shape discernible sounds.

At three to six months, infants enter the "expansion stage," systematically exploring new sounds. He or she may squeal or "growl," indicating a new ability to control pitch; or the child may whisper and yell, experimenting with volume.

Finally, at seven months, infants enter the "canonical stage," producing sounds like "dada."

If a child does not begin such canonical babbling by 10 months, it could be an early sign of hearing impairment, retardation or a functional

"By studying baby babbling," says Oller, "we can trace the development of an infant's speech and determine who's going to have problems."

By the time they are six, parents are wishing they would shut-up!

EXPENSIVE HUNTING

Big game hunting safaris undoubtedly are expensive. But surely they wouldn't dent the pocketbook as much as hunting bighorn sheep. That doesn't come cheap.

A hunting consultant from Cody, Wyo., paid a whopping \$93,000 for the right to hunt one of the regal wild sheep in Montana. He submitted the highest bid during an auction of rare bighorn sheep hunting permits donated by

seven Western states and Mexico. Other successful bids ranged from \$68,000 for an Idaho permit to a paltry \$15,000 for a North Dakota permit.

This may be a once-in-a-lifetime hunting opportunity, but not many people we know could afford the permit.
