West meets with Lockney council, presents 'Texas First' plan

The Lockney City Council met for their regular meeting Friday, March 4 at the City Hall. Present were Mayor Dan Smith and Aldermen Kenneth Wofford, Ronnie Aston, Gary Marr, Dee Copeland, and Jerry Johnson.

Jim West, area manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone met with the council to explain the Texas First Plan that is being proposed by the telephone company.

Southwestern Bell Telephone representatives went to the Public Utilities Commission and asked for some relief in their regulations. West stated that he knew that the telephone and utility companies needed regulating "no doubt about that" he said, but that since the telephone companies divestiture the regulations have strangled them.

PUC has a cap of 12% on profit that can be made by the telephone companies and this year Southwestern Bell has made 12.39%. At the present time they are being reviewed by the PUC board. If the PUC board rules that the money has to be returned to the customers then individuals will receive an average of \$3.00 and businesses an average of \$8.00 and West stated that this would automatically be done.

West asked that the Lockney City Council write a letter to PUC in favor of the Texas First Plan that he was presenting to the council if they thought it would benefit the city of Lockney.

He explained that the Texas First Plan would upgrade the phone systems in small towns to the same level as those of the large cities. Lockney would have a digital office and that in itself would make available several options that Lockney does not have at present, such as call waiting and call forwarding.

Fiber optic lines will be laid that will aid in the quality of telecommunication service. Mileage charges to those living outside the city limits will be eliminated. This as well as the telecommunication system update will help stimulate economic development locally as well as statewide.

Four party lines will be eliminated

and two party lines will be charged the same amount as is now being charged for the four party lines. Private lines outside the city limits will cost no more than is now charged inside the city limits.

Texas first would freeze Lockney's one party residential rates at 8.15 and one party business rates at 19.15 for five years. The five year freeze would keep Southwestern Bell's rates among the

School seeks parent support

The public schools of this state have been scrutinized, chastised and expected to be all things to all people.

Many of the problems of our youth have been placed on the school to solve. Schools are held responsible for drug abuse, teenage pregnancy, suicide prevention, pre-kindergarten and the list continues to grow. The statement has been made that public school's responsibility will eventually be from the "womb to the tomb".

Across this nation, the number of hours and money spent in discussing the ills and problems associated with our young people, would boggle the mind. In discussing our youth, very little attention is given to the home. It is time that we give more than lip service to the home and its responsibility. Despite what some people may think, the parent or guardian is responsible for the child's action. The problems with which we work (with little results, I might add) are caused by the lack of home discipline, direction and support for our schools.

Over 85% of all problems we deal with come from approximately 15% of our students. Many of these students have no direction or support from the home. Many times the parents or guardian blames the school or supports the student's actions. The students use the excuse "it's everybody's fault but

earnings should exceed the 13 percent the Southwestern Bell would automatically credit half of the amount over 13 percent to its customers bills.

At the conclusion of West's proposal the council voted to authorize Mayor Smith to write a letter to the PUC approving the Texas First Plan.

The humane society has recommended that the animals at the dog pound need better care. City employees are responsible for feeding and watering the dogs daily.

Presently the city has a \$5.00 bounty on animals turned in to the pound.

Councilmen discussed Ordinance # 259, Garbage and Trash Disposal. Al-



The council voted to install street lights at the corner of 8th Street and College and the corner of Spruce and 5th Street after checking with the home owners to be sure that they have no objections to having an electric pole in their yard.

Bill Sherman has been paid for the ten acres of land the City purchased from him to expand the landfill and the deed has been filed at the county courthouse.

The 1988-89 budget was discussed and the council passed an amended




Rice bags filled with bird seed were distributed by the house party.

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Forty four participate in drills

The weight room at the Longhorn field house is a buzz of activity during the last period before lunch each day as members of the football, basketball and track teams are participating in off-season trainings.

Several years ago it was decided that the athletic department would benefit from extra training and exercise to keep the boys in shape for the upcoming season.

The 44 boys, freshmen through seniors, begin the class period with stretching exercises to limber up their muscles before getting into the more strenuous exercises.

work to outdo what they accomplished the day before.


According to head coach Jim Clark, "the boys have really worked hard. They came into the program with a good attitude and they are ready to turn the program around."

ORDINANCE NO. 259 GARBAGE AND TRASH DISPOSAL

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND TRASH IN THE CITY OF LOCKNEY, ASSESSING A COLLECTION FEE; DEFINING TERMS, PROVIDING FOR PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS, SEVERABILITY, AND REPEAL OF PREVIOUS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, the collection and disposal of garbage widely affect public health and welfare; and

WHEREAS, in the course of protecting the health and welfare of citizens and of the public in general, it is incumbent upon the governing body of the City of Lockney, Texas, to provide adequate garbage collection and disposal service for the citizens of the City of Lockney, Texas; and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinances of the City of Lockney, Texas, providing for the collection of garbage are inadequate and need immediate revision;

NOW, THEREFORE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas:

Section 1: Scope of Ordinance: The provisions of this ordinance shall apply to all territory within the corporate limits of the City of Lockney, Floyd County, Texas.

Section 2: Definition of Terms:

- Garbage.** Wherever the word "garbage," is used in this ordinance, it shall be held to mean rubbish, trash, kitchen and household waste, ashes, paper, food containers, and other items generally deemed waste or discard.
- Brush.** Wherever the word "brush" is used in this ordinance, it shall be held to mean tree trimmings, weeds, large hedge trimmings, and trees not to exceed 8 inches in diameter and cut into lengths not to exceed 4 feet and tied in bundles for collection.
- Premises.** Wherever the word, "premises" is used in this ordinance, it shall be held to mean all business houses, business establishments, grocery stores, dry goods stores, mercantile stores, department stores, boarding houses, hospitals, rooming houses, schools, theatres, barber shops, beauty parlors, filling stations, garages, cafes, restaurants, lumber yards, electric shops, plumbing shops, tailoring shops, private residence, vacant lots, and all other places in said City where garbage, trash, and rubbish accumulate.

Section 3: Disposal by City and Billing Rates by the City.

- Collection by the City.** The city provides containers in alleys and other convenient places to the public as receptacles for garbage and brush;
- Charges and Collection Mandatory.** A Charge for the disposal of all garbage and brush shall be and is hereby levied by the City of

Lockney, Texas, against all owners, occupants, tenants, or lessees, using or occupying any building, house, or structure receiving such service, whether such persons aforesaid use the service or not. Since the prompt and proper removal of all garbage and brush is essential to the preservation of public health and safety, it is deemed necessary that this charge be levied against every person, owner, occupant, tenant, and lessee using or occupying any premises, thus providing for a more even and equitable distribution of the cost of this service to the citizenship enjoying the benefits thereof. Where an apartment house or other building served water through one meter, the person in whose name the water account stands shall be responsible for the payment of the garbage fees provided for hereunder for all persons in such apartments or buildings which are subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

c. Rates and Garbage Collection. The general and reasonable rates for collecting garbage and brush under the provisions of this ordinance shall be determined and fixed from time to time by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas. Rates heretofore set by the City Council are hereby approved.

d. Billing and Collections. For the purpose of convenience, the billing and collection of charges levied for the service by this ordinance shall be rendered by the City Water Department and all such charges shall be payable at the office of the Water Department of the City of Lockney in the same manner as other utility services are billed and collected by the Water Department.

e. Failure to Pay Charges. All sanitary service charges shall be due monthly on the date stamped upon the bills rendered and must be paid at the office of the Water Department of the City of Lockney, and if not paid within said time, the City shall have the right to shut off the water from such premises, and water service shall not be turned on again until said bill (including an additional charge of \$10.00) for disconnecting and turning the water back on has been paid in full.

Section 4. Other Waste Materials.

a. Waste From Building Operations. Rocks, waste, scrap building materials, or other trash resulting from construction, major remodeling, or from a general clean-up of vacant or improved property or from sideable amounts of trees, brush, and debris cleared from property in the preparation for construction, shall be removed by the owner of the property.

b. Industrial Waste. All industrial waste resulting from manufacturing operations must be disposed of by the owner or occupant of the building or premises where such industrial waste originates.

Section 5. Other Prohibited Acts.

a. Violations. The following acts, among others set forth herein, are declared to be unlawful and are deemed to be in violation of this ordinance, and are declared to be trespasses, and subject to the penalties as provided by this ordinance, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

- throwing, placing, dumping, or depositing of any lawn trimmings, hedge trimmings, or weeds, flowers, or other

vegetation on lots (vacant or occupied), driveways or other private property;

2) throwing, placing, dumping, or deposition of any lawn trimmings, or other cuttings or trimmings of weeds, flowers or other vegetation in any gutter, street, sidewalk, parkway, driveway, curb, alley, or any other public property of the City;

3) throwing, placing, dumping, or depositing of any garbage, refuse, animal or vegetable waste matter of any kind on or in any gutter, street, sidewalk, parkway, driveway, curb, alley, or any other public property of the City; permitting in or upon any premises (private or public) any animal or vegetable or mineral matters of any composition or residue thereof, which is in an unsanitary condition or injurious to public health, and after any of such items have remained upon any premises for more than seven (7) days, it will be presumed that the same is an unsanitary condition and is injurious to public health.

Section 6. Penalty. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$200.00. Each transaction in violation of any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offense, and each day of a continuing violation shall be deemed a separate violation.

Section 7. Severability. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the Sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance are severable, and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdictions, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of unconstitutional or invalid phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs or sections.

Section 8. Repeal of Previous Ordinances. This ordinance shall be held and construed to be cumulative to all other ordinances affecting the collection and disposal of garbage, brush, and other waste materials in the City of Lockney, Floyd County, Texas, except in those instances where the provisions of this ordinance are in conflict with the provisions of ordinances heretofore passed, and all ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, are expressly repealed.
