

Violent weather stalks Floyd County as severe storms rage

The weather has played havoc with most parts of Floyd County at some time during the past week. Rain has fallen in amounts from a trace to seven inches and crops in all parts of the county have been destroyed by hail.

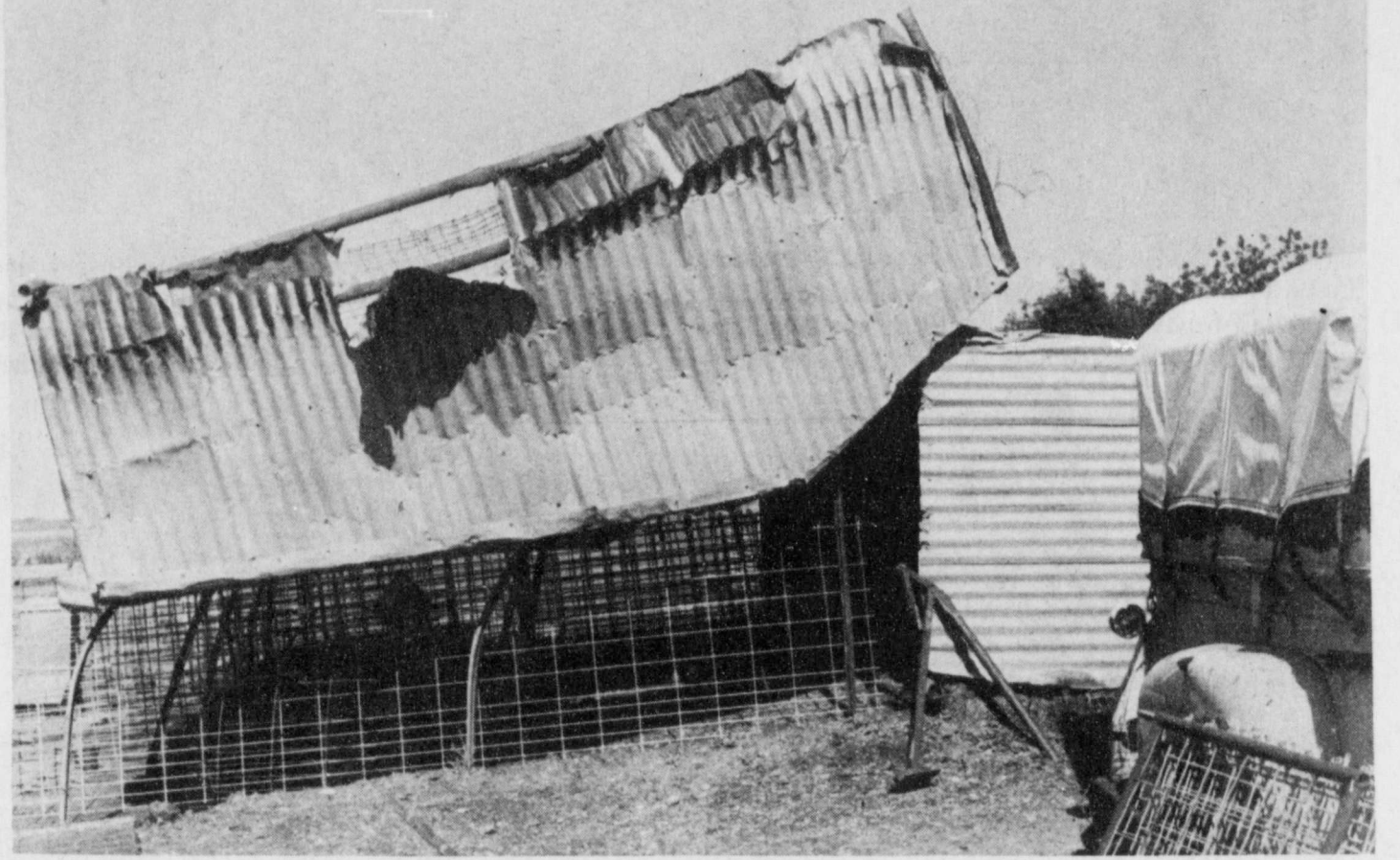
An estimate on crop loss from Bob Lotspeich, manager of the ASCS office in Floydada sets the loss from 45 to 50% with the possibility that it may increase. Some crops that have been hailed on may die in the days to come.

Clouds have come from the south, the west and the north and dumped from 1 to 7 inches on the county. The Providence community received from 3 to 7 inches. Sterley received approximately 6 inches, as did Lone Star and South Plains.

Hail covered the ground in wide areas and in places looked like snow.

Tornadoes have dropped from several of these clouds and the inhabitants of Lockney were warned to take cover

on two occasions. In the south part of town Saturday night Herb Dudley lost several of his pig barns and had a pecan tree broken off about a foot from the ground. Randall Stapp had an evergreen tree uprooted in his yard and Mary Lou Bollman found her patio cover upside down on the roof of her garage. This is the second car port Bollman has lost. The first one was destroyed in 1985. Tin and debris was scattered over the area and a trailer turned over.

County approves landfill contract with city

The Floyd County Commissioners Court approved a motion authorizing county judge Bill Hardin to sign a landfill contract with the City of Lockney. The motion was made by Precinct 1 commissioner Connie Bearden, seconded by Precinct 4 commissioner Kay Crabtree during the May 31 special session of the court.

The court approved the contract as submitted by Lockney Mayor Dan Smith on May 18, 1989, with a single revision. The change is in the terms for paying the annual fee of \$2,000.00 in exchange for county residents using the city landfill.

Said Judge Hardin, "Rather than pay the entire \$2,000.00 in a lump sum, due to the uncertainty of the length of time the City of Lockney will be able to keep the landfill open (refer to Mayor Smith's letter of May 18), the county will pay the amount of \$166.67 per month until such time as the landfill close."

Below is the letter from Mayor Smith followed by the contract as submitted by Lockney.

Dear Judge Hardin:

Enclosed is a Landfill contract the City Council has approved. This is the contract the city and county had in effect for many years. The City of Lockney will do our best to maintain the landfill according to Texas Department of Health regulations. Please keep in mind if we cannot, the Health Department may force the closing of the landfill. Also, if the proposed landfill standards go into effect in 1991, the City of Lockney will close the landfill.

The City Council will not agree to a street contract in which the City of Lockney must assume all liability and also be responsible for county equipment (as stated in the 5-18-89 edition of the Hesperian). The City of Lockney is willing to assume responsibility for broken utility lines as originally asked by the county.

CONTRACT

This Landfill contract between the City of Lockney, Texas, a municipal corporation acting by and through its Mayor, having theretofore been authorized to enter into such contract by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas and Floyd County, Texas, acting by and through its Commissioners Court of said County, WITNESSETH:

Whereas, said City owns and operates a sanitary disposal and dump ground located on a portion of the J.E.F. Roger Survey, Floyd County, Texas, and said City desires to enter a joint use agreement concerning the same under the following conditions:

1. Said County has paid the sum of \$2,000.00 cash in hand, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged. (This is the section changed by the county to monthly payment of \$166.67.)

2. Said County agrees to dig whatever pits the City and County mutually determine and agree are necessary and advisable to be dug on said dump ground area.

3. Residents of Floyd County residing outside the City of Lockney shall be entitled to and shall be permitted to use such dump ground in the same manner and with no greater restrictions than are placed on City residents.

4. The City of Lockney or the Floyd County Commissioners Court may at any time cancel this contract upon a 30 day written notice to either party from the date of the notice of cancellation. The City of Lockney further agrees if this becomes necessary that they will refund the pro rata cost of the unused portion of pits dug at whatever cost (\$1,800.00 or \$2,000.00) per pit to the County.

5. Notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary, said City is to remain the sole owner and proprietor of the lands known as "The City Landfill" and said County does not desire to control the management nor shall it be liable to any person, firm or corporation by reason of said City's management and use of same.

The approved contract has been for-

warded to the City of Lockney for consideration of the change made in item #1. The contract will not become official nor will it take effect until both parties have agreed to it in the present form.

COMMISSIONERS COURT FACES BUDGET CRUNCH

Meeting in special session on Wednesday, May 31 and Monday, June 5, the commissioners of Floyd County came face to face with the harsh realities of the budget process and the consequences of the actions of their predecessors.

Commissioners were told that estimated budget deficits for the October 1, 1988 to September 30, 1989 fiscal year "Will amount to almost \$60,000 (\$59,406.42) if expenditures continue at the rate they have to date."

Commissioners were asked to review the proposed budget for 1989-90 and recommend cuts to alleviate not only the 1988-89 deficit, but also to ward off an estimated \$90,000 in deficit by the conclusion of the upcoming fiscal year. The proposed budget has made no provisions for a salary increase for any employees.

After lengthy discussion and with no immediate solutions apparent, the court will consider a tax increase to provide the necessary funding. An increase of 10 cents per \$100 of valuation is being considered, and will be discussed at the regular monthly session of the court on June 12 which is open to the public.

"The problem extends back to 1986," said county judge Bill Hardin, "when the commissioners court in office at that time cut taxes from 31 cents per \$100 in valuation to 25 cents per \$100 in valuation. Federal revenue sharing funds were cut off at that time also, resulting in the loss of about \$150,000 in addition to the tax revenue lost to the tax cut. With inflation, increased costs of operation and unexpectedly high costs in the legal and judicial areas, Floyd County has spent more than it has taken in and now faces a deficit."

He also pointed out that the problem could be worse if the court had not increased taxes by two cents in 1987 and two cents in 1988.

Commissioners in office when the tax decrease was passed included Sam

Spence, Bob Jarrett, Thomas Warren and Jack Lackey. Choise Smith was the serving county judge at the time.

The county currently has funds in certificates of deposit consisting of taxes collected which will be used to finance the cost of operations for the next four months (June, July, August and September) under the current budget. Expenses from June through September are estimated to exceed the available money by almost \$60,000. Tax collections for the next year will begin in October and those funds will be used to pay for county operations beginning in October.

OTHER ACTION

The court took no action concerning the contract still pending with the City of Lockney for maintenance of unpaved streets within the city limits.

Farm work contracts were considered and approved for Ray Gant, Jim Byrd and Clyde Baxter.

Attending the two day extended session of the court were Judge Bill Hardin, commissioners Connie Bearden, Floyd Jackson, George Taylor and Kay Crabtree, treasurer Glenna Orman, Margaret Herrera, budget clerk Jane McAnally and the Hesperian reporter.

Board approves salary schedule

The Lockney school board met Monday in a called meeting at the school board room for the purpose of discussing the salary schedule, hearing the projections on the 1989-90 school budget and the hiring of personnel.

Superintendent W.H. Hallmark explained the increase in teachers salary that was mandated by the Texas Legislature while they were in regular session in Austin. The board members agreed that it was a step in the right direction and they voted to accept the salary schedule as amended by the state mandate.

The board members heard the projections of the 1989-90 budget. This budget, according to Hallmark is at present a rough estimate and further study and work will go into it before the finished budget can be presented.

It includes the amended 1988-89 Budget, 1989-90 Salary Increases, 1989-90 Career Ladder Expenses, Cuts from the 1988-89 Budget, and recommended 1989-90 needs, which include

computers, typewriters/word processors, furniture (mostly for the computer rooms) It also includes a 3% increase in insurance, transportation and contracted services.

Sheila Faulkenberry, appraiser for the Floyd County Central Appraisal District, had given the board a written estimate of the Lockney ISD tax value for 1989 and it came to \$78,463,654. This is a \$2,000.00 value increase over 1988.

Income for the school year will come from the state, local taxes.

The board members voted to hire Rhonda Lyle to teach language arts in the elementary school.

The next meeting of the school board will be on June 15 at the Lockney Independent School board room.

Board members present were Eddie Teeter, Lisa Mosley, Paul Glasson, Jim Bob Martin, and Dickie Lambert. Also present were W. H. Hallmark, superintendent.

He and his wife Wanda have five children.

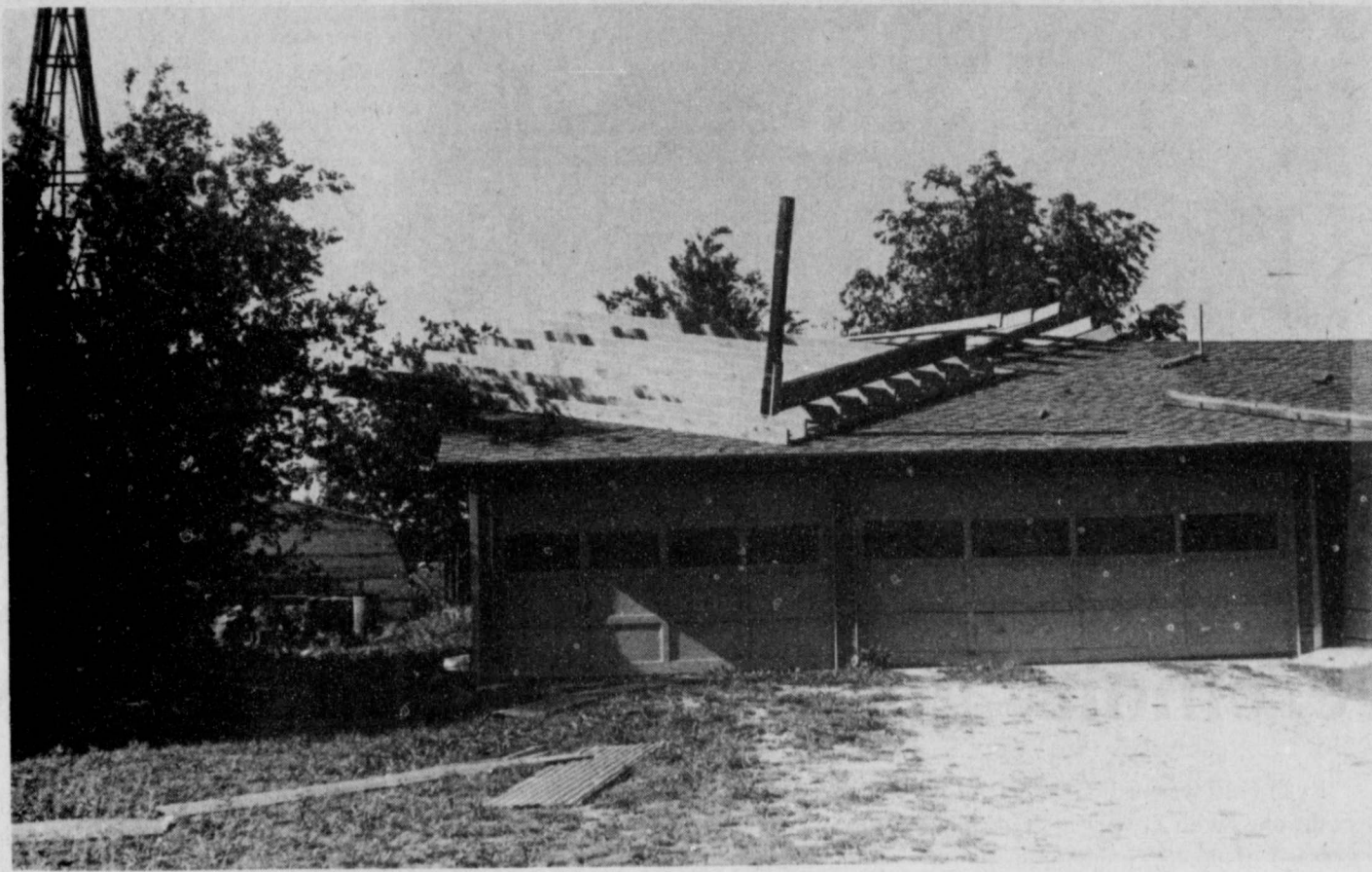
According to Stone "We are pleased to have Herb to run our farm store."

Education legislation to impact Texas

State Representative Ernestine Glossbrenner, chair of the House Education Committee, and Texas State Teachers Association president Charles N. Beard, Jr. issued statements today commending the 71st Legislature for the passage of a number of progressive education bills.

The two cited, among others, new legislation on student dropout prevention, a raise in the minimum salary schedule for teachers, sick leave for educational support personnel, compulsory school attendance for students between the ages of six and seventeen years, an early retirement bill for all school employees, and increased funding for the teacher career ladder.

Glossbrenner, chairing the Education Committee for the first time this session, said she was proud that the new school finance package includes a new "floor" for teacher salaries, but is disappointed that a long-term plan to provide for funding the true cost of public education failed to gain passage.

Beard said that he was pleased that salaries were raised, especially during the hard economic times, but warned that the "pay raise battle" is far from over.

He said TSTA, the state's largest organization of school employees, and its local affiliates will now "focus our attention on local school district budget deliberations in the hundreds of Texas school systems where salaries already exceed the new state minimums," Beard said. "In these districts, local school boards are not legally mandated to pass on their increased state aid for salaries so long as they pay at or above the minimum."

The TSTA president said he believes the legislative intent was to provide funds to grant every teacher at least an \$1,800 increase.

"Our recent polls conducted by The Texas Poll indicate that 81 percent of all Texans want to raise teacher pay and we urge all of these citizens to come forward on behalf of their local teachers during school district budget deliberations," he added.

In addition to salaries, the legislators approved additional funding for the teacher career ladder by 28 percent, raising the allotment from \$70 per ADA to \$90. The bill will add more stringent requirements for advancement to level III of the ladder and delays Level IV implementation until 1991.

A five day sick leave bill for educational support personnel gained passage

and provides that all school employees may use two of the five sick days to conduct personal business which cannot be accommodated during the off-duty hours. This adds a new benefit for over 100,000 school support workers, including custodians, bus drivers, maintenance and cafeteria workers. It also provides personal leave provisions for teachers, as well.

All school employees will be affected by a new early retirement bill. The new legislation provides that school employees can retire as early as age 55 provided they have 30 years of service. It also provides for lesser penalties for retiring earlier under different formulas and gives retirees greater flexibility in providing annual annuities for their beneficiaries. Current retirees who left the school system prior to August 1986 will be granted pay increases in monthly annuities.

Beginning with the next school year, the new compulsory attendance age for students will be from six to 17 years-of-age, as opposed to the current law which states that students between the ages of seven and 16 years must attend school.

Beard said that in addition to the new legislation passed this session, TSTA was very pleased in that it was able to defeat many proposed bills that it felt would be bad for students and school employees.

He credited the organization's success to a network of 200 teacher lobbyists who stayed in continual contact with their representatives and senators during the deliberations of the various bills.
