Lockney played Shallowater in the first round of the play-offs (bi-district). We lost the contest 25-7. Last time Lockney was in the play-offs was 1985.


Looking back on the year, we had a team that was picked to finish fifth in their district, and was used up in the play-offs. What made it all possible?


Also, the best group of coaches I ever had. Outstanding support from the community and school groups. But most of all, everyone willing to pay the price, whatever it takes.


Edwards announces for District Clerk post

Jackson sustains injury in pedestrian-auto clash

Floyd County Commissioner Floyd Jackson, of Lockney, received serious lacerations on both of his ears, Thursday, November 30, as a result of a vehicle-pedestrian accident in the parking lot of the Lockney Post Office.

According to Lockney police, the injuries occurred when Jackson was hit while he was leaning inside the opened passenger door of a pickup, parked facing south and parallel to the east curb in the Post Office parking lot. The driver of the pickup, Jerry Cawley, had pulled alongside the curb to talk to Jackson.

While Jackson was talking to Cawley, another pickup, driven by R.V. Webster, of Lockney, backed from his horizontal parking space directly in front of the post office. "Cawley's truck was in a blind spot for Webster," said Chief Leonard Gilroy. "He did not see Jackson or the pickup and he continued to back up until the left rear portion of his truck struck the passenger door that Jackson was standing behind. Jackson's head then became pinned between the top of the door frame and the door. The force of

the blow severely lacerated both ears." Jackson was immediately transported to Lockney General Hospital, but because of the severity of the cuts he was

transported to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

"He was taken care of by Dr. Kellerher, the best plastic surgeon in Amarillo," said Mrs. Jackson. "He was in surgery for approximately 1-1/2 hours. They think they have been able to save his ears. There was no damage to his hearing and no other head injuries. He also received a deep bruise on the calf of his leg that the doctor said we should watch. It was a miracle that he was not killed. We were real afraid of other head injuries, but he was very fortunate."

"The majority of reported accidents that we investigate are in the Post Office parking lot," said Chief Gilroy. "It is a very congested and busy area and we urge people to be extra cautious when driving in and out."

It should be pointed out that this is not a new tax. Nothing has changed. Taxpayers won't be payiung more unless you have brought a new car or automobile.

The various boards are required to inform the taxpayers of the need to continue this taxing.





Poinsett, who was born March 2, 1799, in Charleston, S.C., introduced the plant to the United States after serving as U.S. ambassador to Mexico 1825-1829. While there, Poinsett became fascinated with the "flower of the holy

According to legend, it appeared at the feet of a poor Mexican boy who, having nothing for the alter on Christmas Eve, offered only his ardent prayers for the Christ child.

Although native to Mexico and some parts of Guatemala, the poinsettia now is grown in hothouses around the world. The actual flower of the plant is a small yellow blossom. It is the leaves, referred to as "bracts," that occur in red, white, pink and yellow forms, making them festive plants.





"Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full color illustration and teaches such lessons as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to ones potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but SHE has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with her Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and

she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teachers guide, which covers discussion starters, lesson objectives, and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lesson is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes", a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on the battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen and doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such actions. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

Phi Theta Kappa originated at Stephen's College in 1910 as the Ladies National Honor Society, It wasn't until 1924 that men were allowed to join.
