LISD proposes 17.41% ad valorem tax increase

The Lockney Independent School District held a public hearing August 9, at 7:00 p.m., for the purpose of discussing increasing property taxes by 17.41%. No citizens came to the hear-

"The next step will be to adopt the tax rate," said Superintendent Dub Hallmark. "A public meeting on the tax rate will be held on August 28 at 8:30 p.m. for the purpose of setting the new tax rate."

"Based on the 17.41%, the new tax rate is expected to be .8620," said Hallmark.

To find your current rate of tax take the value of your homestead and multiply it times .75¢ and that will give you the amount of taxes you are paying $($15,000 \times .75 \neq = $112.50)$. To find the amount you will be paying at the .8620 rate, multiply the value of your homestead times .8620 and it will give you the amount of the taxes being proposed (\$15,000.00 X .8620 = \$129.30). To find the difference subtract this years amount from last years amount and it will give you the difference. (\$129.30 minus \$112.50 for a difference of \$16.80)


If you are over 65 and have applied for the "over 65 exemption" then even though the local school is increasing taxes the amount you owe will not change from what you paid last year unless you have made improvements in your property. This exemption only applies only to your homestead.

Before the tax rate is approved, the board members will also meet on August 28, at 7:00 p.m. to adopt the 1990-91 budget. After adoption of the '90-'91 budget, the board will amend their 1989-90 budget.

City adopts 37 cent tax rate for next year

The Lockney City Council met on Thursday, August 9 at 7:00 p.m. to adopt the tax rate for the coming year.

A public hearing on the tax rate was held on July 26 at the city hall and no one came to express their opinions on the rate. Alderman J.D. Copeland made the motion to set the tax rate at 37 cents and it was seconded by Kenneth Wofford. All voted for.

Mr. John Simpson and Gail Wyatt, representing the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, presented the proposed budget for the water authority to the council. Simpson told the alderman, "It is hard to budget water supplies. So much depends on the rain and the repairs."

He also reported that with the revenue up it is estimated that the water authority bond will be paid off in six years rather than ten.

Simpson presented the council with a chart showing the water usage. Each day the citizens of Lockney use approximately 405,000 gallons of water. The usage per month is 12,150,000 gallons and 147,825,000 gallons are used per

The volume used in June and July was up over the 100 percent contract rate. June was hotter than normal, setting several records for temperature, and over 12,000,000 gallons of water was used during those months.

Simpson stated "High usage started early and a lot of water has been pumped out of the lake. The water level is down somewhat."

Joe Walker, of Tommy Lewis Industries, met with the council on the possibility of setting up a recycling center. He told the council that recycling is a coming thing and that it may be mandatory by the year 1992.

He explained that Tommy Lewis Industries is a non-profit organization

and that revenues are used to pay the employees. He told the group that for them to make regular pickups in Lockney it would have to be profitable for

The council told him that they would like to try having a location where newspapers, glass and aluminum could be brought for pickup by the company.

Walker explained that at the present time news paper is not bringing in enough revenue to be profitable and that they are warehousing the paper that they get in hopes that the price will rise.

Glass is worth \$20.00 a ton and has to be sorted according to color and has to be clean. He explained that one ketchup bottle with ketchup still in it could ruin a whole shipment. Computer paper is worth \$200.00, cardboard \$25.00 and batteries 70 cents each.

Walker told the group that he would take the proposal to his directors and they would work on the possibility of setting up a center in Lockney.

At the present time the fire department is collecting aluminum cans and the proceeds from the sale of the cans will be used for the purchase of a new

The council agreed that recycling is a coming thing and the sooner it is started the better off the city will be. When the landfill is closed the cost of hauling garbage will be based on weight and the less weight that has to be hauled the cheaper the rate will be.

The next item on the agenda was the mobile home ordinance. Paul Lyles, city attorney, presented the ordinance to the council and they voted to hold a public hearing on September 6 to consider the ordinance.

City Secretary, Erma Lee Duckworth gave the council figures on installing a new water fountain at city hall. The old fountain has been out of order for a



True of Plainview as Board member and Kent Nix of Lamesa as his alternate. The second pair of nominees consists of Myrl D. Mitchell of Lenorah, member, and Verett, alternate.

The National Cotton Council is cotton's organization representing producers, ginners, warehousemen, merchants, cottonseed crushers, cooperatives and manufacturers. Its primary purposes are to develop and effectuate industry policies on legislative, regulatory and trade matters, to expand domestic and export markets for cotton and cotton products, and to provide the industry with research support, economic analyses, public relations and technical services. Its support comes from all industry segments and policy positions must be approved by a majority of delegates from all sectors.

Cotton Incorporated conducts programs of research, product development and consumer advertising and promotion, plus providing technical assistance to mills, manufacturers and retailers. It is funded solely by a producer check-off authorized under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act of 1966. Its 38 directors and 38 alternates, all cotton producers, are divided between states according to the volume of production and financial contribution of each.

The Cotton Board is a quasi-governmental body which represents USDA in

Social Security News

By Mary Jane Shanes

From time to time, people ask me if it is possible for a person to get social security benefits while in jail. The situation usually arises when the worker has been charged with a felony, and social security retirement or disability benefits are the family's primary income.

In general, social security law prohibits the payment of benefits to people imprisoned for the conviction of a felony. These include childhood disability beneficiaries, as well as people receiving other types of benefits under the social security retirement, disability, or survivors insurance programs.

Benefits, however, may continue to be paid to any family members receiving benefits on the prisoner's social security record. And the prisoner's benefits may begin again with the first full month after release from prison if he or she is otherwise entitled to benefits.

The only exception to the prohibition against the payment of benefits to prisoners is if the person is entitled to benefits on the basis of disability and is actively engaged in a vocational rehabilitation program approved by a court of law. The program must be expected to result in the person's being able to do substantial gainful work within a reasonable time after release.

A crime is considered a felony if it is defined as such under State law. In legal jurisdictions which do not use the term felony, a crime shall be considered a felony if the sentence is more than one year.

LETTER TO HOUSEHOLD

National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The Lockney Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.10 and Breakfast for .60¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced-price.

- If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.

If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals for cents for lunch and cents for breakfast.

If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

HOW TO APPLY:

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, carefully complete the application and return it to the school. If you now get food stamps or AFDC for any children, the application must have the children's names, your food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature of an adult household member. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all your children, the application must have the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income each household member now gets, where it comes from and how often it is received, the social security number of either the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application or the word 'none" if the member does not have an social security number and the signature of an adult household member. An application that is not complete cannot be approved.

OTHER INFORMATION:

- VERIFICATION: Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked to send information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.
- FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of the verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing to the following official:

- REPORTING CHANGES: If your children get meals based on imcome information, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals based on AFDC/food stamp information, you must advise the school if you no longer get AFDC or food stamps for your children.
- CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility. REAPPLICATION: You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If
- you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then. In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex,
- color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.
