Stansell, and her husband Pat, have lived in Lockney since 1946 when he came home from the service. They owned and operated the John Deere Company from 1946 to 1972. They raised four children, Sue, Steve, Tim and Scott and they have five grandchildren.

She will take office in January.

Drawings will be held in the individual participating businesses at 4:00 p.m. on November 16 and winners will be contacted and told where they can pick up their turkeys.

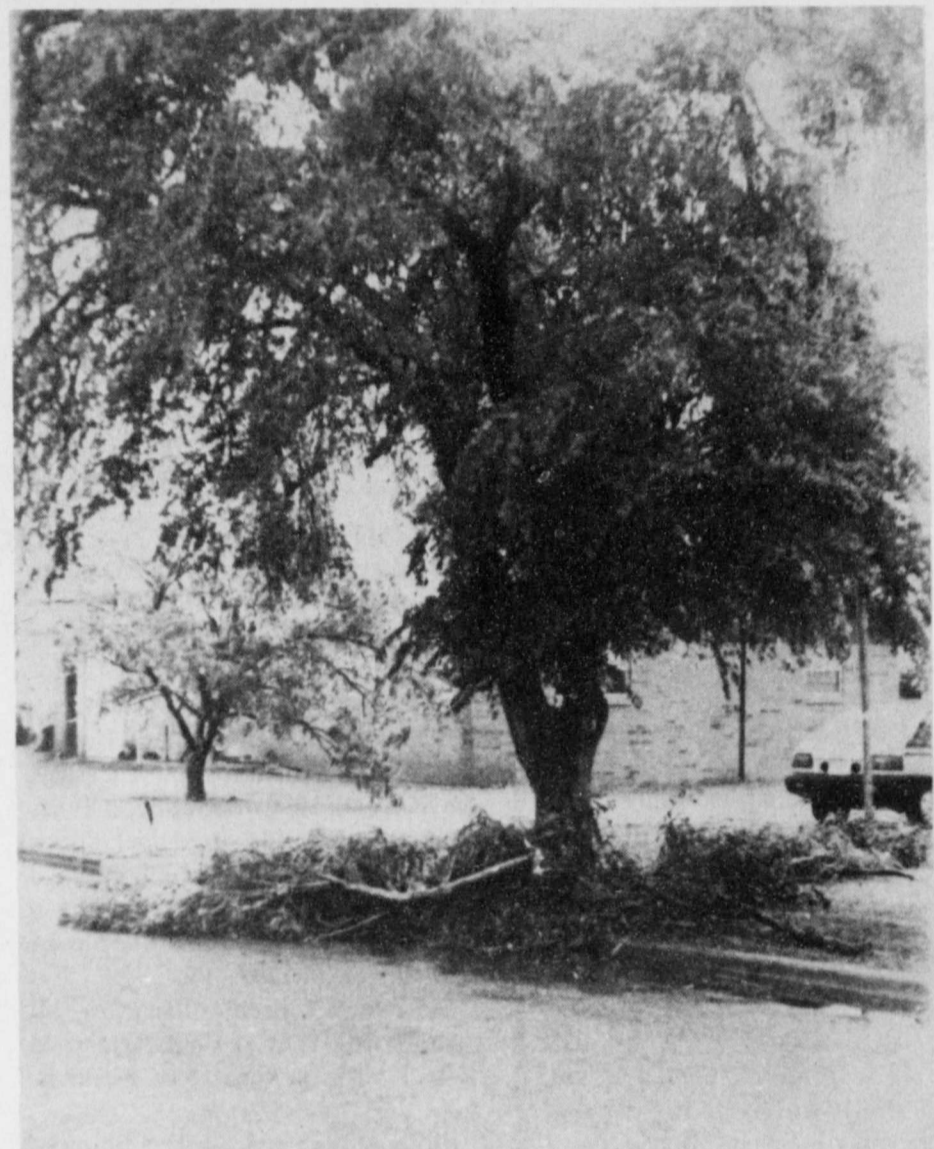

## City Council holds November session

The Lockney City Council met in a short session for their November meeting. The first discussion on the agenda was the amending of the budget to allow for the repair of two pumps for the sewer lift.

The pumps were installed in 1960 and according to Dan Smith, "The years have taken their toll and we have been lucky that they have lasted 30 years."

The bill for the repairing of the pumps

came to \$13,375.00 and as this was an unbudgeted item the budget had to be amended to include the cost of the repairs.

Discussion was held on an application that a variance be granted to allow a trailer house to be moved onto a lot on N.E. 4th Street. The council reported that the applicant would be given the opportunity to comply with the regulations before the trailer is moved into town and that if he complied with the building code that the variance would be granted.

The stipulations are that a concrete drive for one car and a concrete sidewalk around the trailer must be provided. The wiring and plumbing must be in compliance with the city code and the trailer must be skirted soon after it is moved on the site. The trailer must pass inspection

as is any house or trailer being moved inside the city limits.

The Lockney City Council would like to remind the citizens that TIRES WILL NO LONGER BE ACCEPTED AT THE CITY LANDFILL unless they are shredded, quartered or halved. The E.P.A. regulations will no longer let landfills accept whole tires.

In regular business of the council the minutes of the previous meeting were read by Irma Lee Duckworth, city secretary, and approved as read. The financial statement was reviewed. Current bills were discussed and members of the council voted that they be paid.

Present at the November meeting were Mayor Dan Smith, Aldermen Kenneth Wofford, Sam Fortenberry and Jim Doucette, City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth and the Beacon reporter.

## School board approves early dismissal

A brief school board meeting was held by LISD, November 8, at 7:30 p.m.

School board trustees approved the early dismissal of school every Friday, at 3:18, for all schools. "This still meets the state requirement of school hours," said Superintendent Hallmark. "This will now give us more time for teacher in-service, which will be held every

Friday from 3:18 - 4:00 p.m."

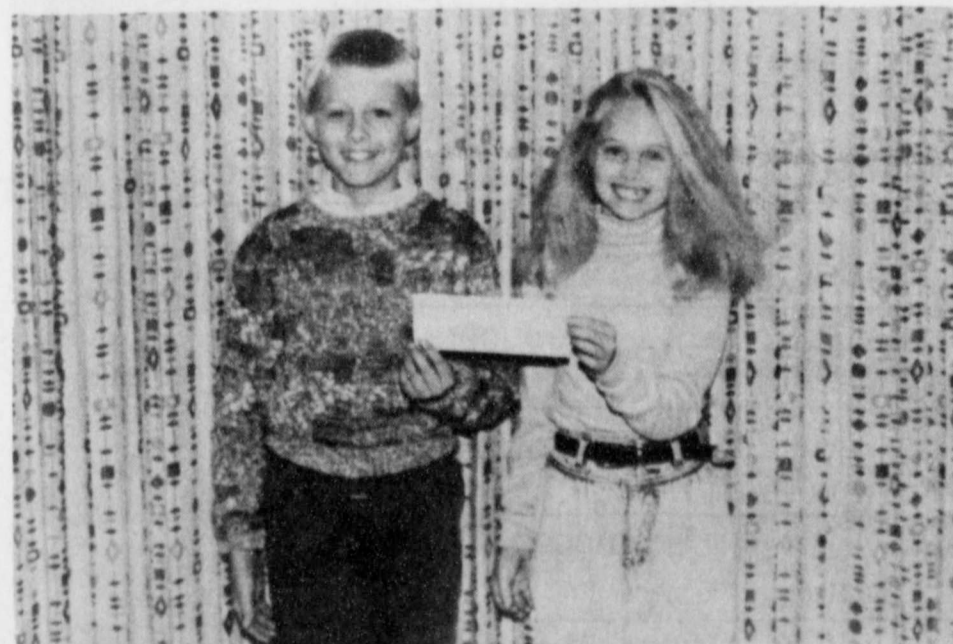
The trustees also voted to move the time of their board meeting to earlier on Dec. 13, so they could be out in time to attend the faculty Christmas party.

# BBB inundated by calls about unclaimed funds

The Better Business Bureau has received many calls from consumers who received a letter from Federal Information Services out of Dallas. The recipient or someone with the same surname, is being offered a possible refund on property. Based on the number of calls received your Bureau believes that there was an extensive mass-mailing sent to not only Lubbock residents but the Whole South Plains.

The Dallas Better Business Bureau reports that the company has been known in their area since November 1989. The company sells information on a work-at-home opportunity tracing individuals who may have refunds due them from the federal government. The company has been the subject of complaints at BBB/Dallas alleging that its

mailing was deceptive. The company responded to complaints by offering refunds.

The BBB/South Plains is concerned that people will become overly excited about the prospects of a refund and call the "900" number or send the \$15.00 fee when, in fact, they could get the same information from the government free of charge.

The only way you can be eligible for a possible refund is if you have PAID OFF a FHA 30-year fixed-rate home loan. If you believe you are due a refund, you should write to the U.S. Department of HUD, Distributive Shares Premium Refunds Section, 451 7th St., SW, Washington, DC 20410 or call 743-7262 here in Lubbock.

## Stennett named diplomate of ABFP

Dr. Kevin T. Stennett, M.D., of Lockney, has been named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a certification examination offered by the ABFP. The physician is now certified in the medical specialty of family practice.

The intensive written examination is designed to prove the candidate's ability in the areas of internal medicine, sur-

gery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and community medicine.

To qualify for the examination, a physician must have successfully completed three years of residency training in family practice. There are some 380 such training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

ABFP diplomates also must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. The family practice specialty was the first to require diplomates to prove their competence on a continuing basis.

The latest group of diplomates brings the total number certified to more than 39,000. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national medical group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.

## Homeowners 65 or older may now pay taxes in installments

Homeowners 65 or older may now pay the taxes on their current homesteads in four installments. Most elderly homeowners received their home tax bills this month.

Leon Willhite, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, explained the purpose of the new installment payment option authorized by state law beginning this September.

"In past years, older homeowners had to pay their entire home tax bill before the normal February 1 delinquency date or pay a penalty and interest on the unpaid amount. This was a hardship for many elderly homeowners with fixed incomes," Willhite said. "This new provision gives them the option of spreading out that payment," he said.

To set up installment payments, 65-or-older homeowners must pay at least one-fourth of their 1990 residence homestead taxes before the February 1 delinquency date. Then, three equal installments are due before April 1, June 1, and August 1.

If all installments are paid on time, homeowners will not be charged penalty or interest for late payment, Willhite said. However, those who fail to pay an installment on time must pay penalty and interest on that installment.

Homeowners 65 or older who are interested in arranging installments need to contact the tax collection office for each taxing unit — county, city, school, or special district — at the address on their tax bills.

This new provision does not apply to any past home taxes already delinquent or other types of property.

## Social Security News

By Mary Jane Shanes

If you have Medicare medical insurance, you should know about an important change in the way your claims will be handled.

Starting September 1, 1990, your medical insurance claim must be prepared and submitted by the service provider -- the doctor, laboratory, medical supply company, or other party providing the service.

In the past, you had to submit a Form 1490S (Patient's Request for Medicare) unless your doctor or service provider accepted "assignment." (Assignment means that the doctor or other service provider accepts the Medicare-approved charge as the total charge.)

But now, the doctor or other service provider must send in your claim even if

they don't accept assignment.

The service provider can't charge you for preparing and submitting the Medicare claim. If a service provider refuses to prepare and submit your Medicare claim or charges you a fee for doing it, you should contact your Medicare carrier.

The carrier's address and phone number are listed in your copy of the Medicare Handbook.

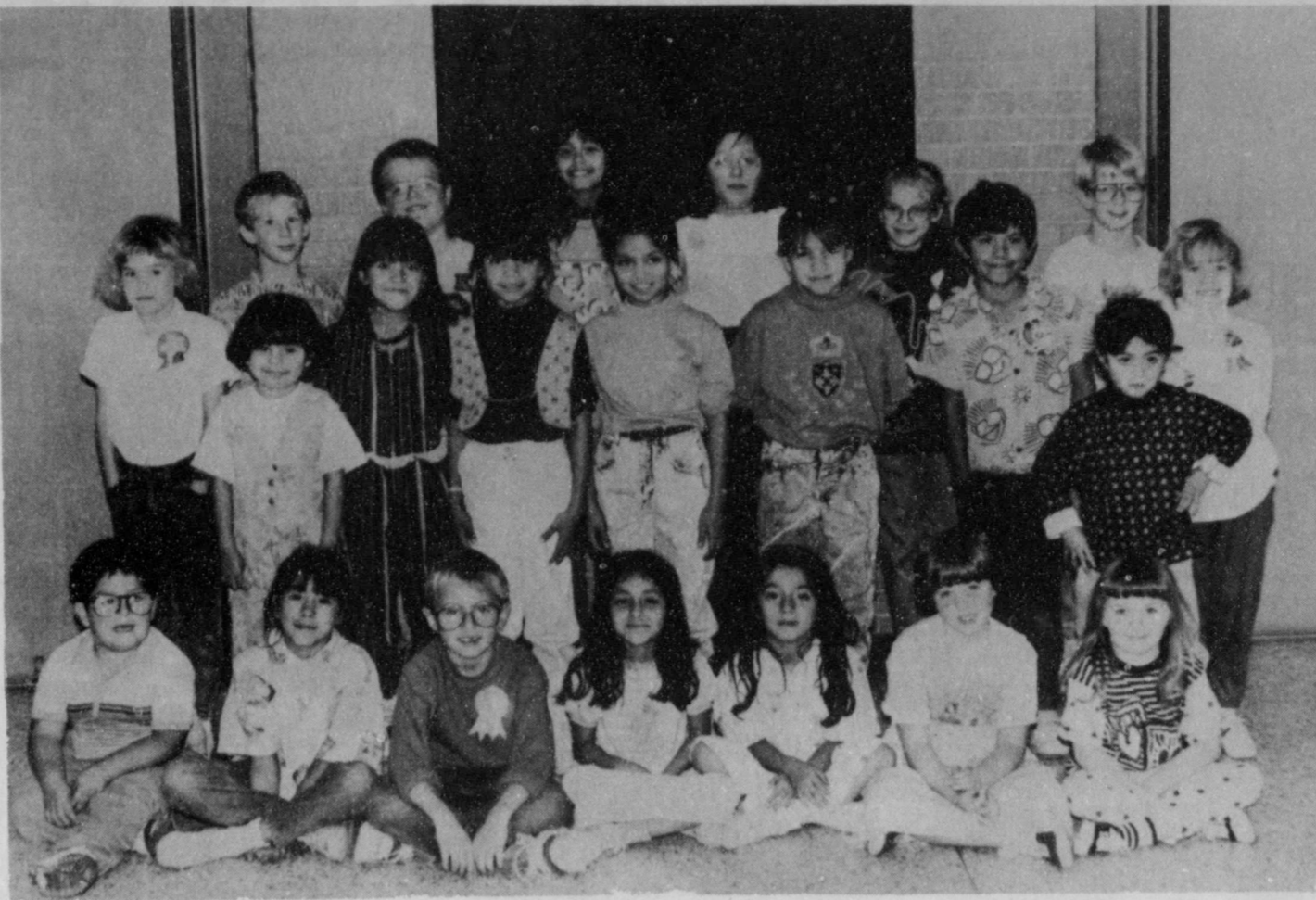

New Railroad Commissioner Bob Krueger was not chosen by the Shorthorn voters; their vote went to Beau Boulter.

Perhaps the most important race to our area was the one for Commissioner of Agriculture. Rick Perry beat incumbent Jim Hightower by a landslide in Lockney, but only by a nose statewide.

"I think our mock election helped make the kids aware of what is going on in the real world, and it may have helped prepare about the candidates through their children. I know of at least one student who was going to the polls with his grandfather to help him decide whom to vote for," added Norwood.

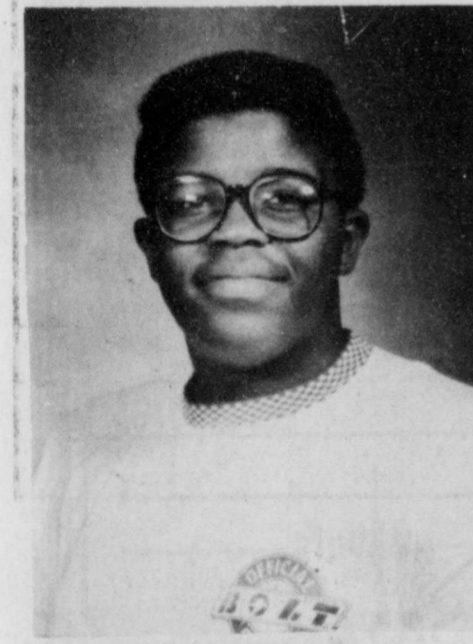

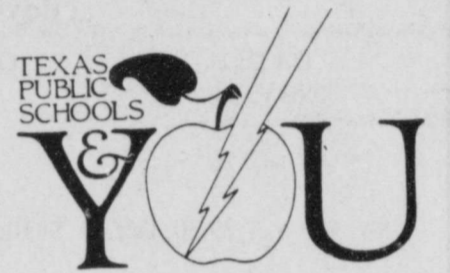
UIL Superconference was held in Lubbock Saturday. These meetings inform teachers and students of rules and tips on participating in academic UIL activities for the Spring.
