

# Lance Patridge wins scholarship

Lockney resident Lance Patridge, 16, has received a \$1,000 educational scholarship for his work in the national 4-H electric energy program, according to Robert F. Pugliese, chairman, Westinghouse Foundation, Westinghouse Electric Corporation, which sponsors the program.

"We are proud of our participation with 4-H over the past 55 years," Pugliese said. "During that time, thousands

of young people have learned about the critical importance of electricity and its direct relationship to improved standards of living around the world. We encourage young people to take ownership of their lives, to choose what they want to do and to develop themselves to their fullest potential. We are pleased to award one of our scholarships to Lance Patridge, an outstanding 4-H'er and a future leader."

Patridge was one of six 4-H'ers to receive national 4-H electric energy scholarships, courtesy of Westinghouse Electric Corporation. The winners were selected by the Cooperative Extension System and presented with their awards during the 69th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 1-5. Awards are arranged by National 4-H Council.

Patridge received the award for progressive personal and skill development over the period of his enrollment in the electric energy program. As part of his 4-H work, Patridge conducted seminars with nursing home employees and residents about the various types of light bulbs and their efficiency. He developed wiring skills by installing a ballast in fluorescent light fixtures and gave elec-

tric demonstrations to youth groups. This year he did research on heat pumps and gave a demonstration explaining the cost savings of heat pumps versus conventional heating and cooling. The seven-year 4-H member served as teen leader for 60 young people in the electric project.

"Working with my dad and grandad has helped me to learn a lot about electrical safety," Patridge said. "It seems to me that as soon as I learned to walk, I was tagging along with them and discovering more about the wonderful world of electricity at every moment."

This summer Patridge led a workshop at county 4-H camp on lamp making.

"This experience taught me to be a little more sympathetic toward my dad when he complains about his job," he said. "I found it takes that certain something called patience to be able to handle such responsibility."

He organized an electrical lamp safety check for 58 individuals, developed an electrical energy project promotion for 130 county 4-H members and donated plug covers to 31 children at a local day care center.

If your date of birth is before September 2, 1971, you are not required to take the course. However you may choose to take the course to learn more about hunter safety. People also take the course if they plan to hunt in other states

At this point the course is 12 hours in length and is mostly concerned with hunting safety and ethics. "Everyone who attended the school seemed to really enjoy the course," said Lockney

Police Chief Lennie Gilroy. "We had some very good volunteer instructor's who shared their expertise, including: Billy Joe Turner who taught the black powder section; Danny Smith who taught the bow hunting section; Ray Macha taught the modern guns, including pistol, rifle and shotgun and John Dea taught ethics.

"The game warden, Trent Anderson discussed hunting laws," said Gilroy. The fee for the course is \$5.00, which pays for materials. If you would be interested in taking this course contact the Lockney Police Department, for more information.



Dan. "The field is also used by the whole community."

The councilmen then voted unanimously to keep paying for water usage at **Bigley Field.** 

A variance was granted to Mrs. Gibson concerning a garage addition she was putting on to her house. The eaves would be no closer than one foot to the property line. Since there was no objections from the neighbors the variance was approved.

The council also approved the Record Management Ordinance, that is required of all city governments. This ordinance pertains only to record keeping within the city office, setting up guidelines and committees.

Councilman Jim Doucette made the motion which was seconded by Councilman Copeland to reappoint Mike Mooney as the City Judge for another two years.

Mayor Smith then brought a proposal before the council which had been sent to the city by SPAG (South Plains Association of Governments). Mayor Smith stated, "Each region of each state has now got to have a solid waste management plan. SPAG has obtained an engineer from ADR Engineer Inc., to draw up a regional solid waste plan for the South Plains Region.

"To pay for this engineer," said Smith, "SPAG is asking for 17¢ per residence, which is \$370.77 in Lockney. The state provides 50% of the funding and SPAG is asking to local governments to help match those funds.


"They are going to do it anyway," said Smith. "SPAG told me, that if everyone did not chip in, they may have to come back and get more money."

After a lot of discussion the council voted to pay the \$370.77.

However they council was advised by their attorney Paul Lyles to join the SPAG board and have a say so in the solid waste management plan. "After everything ya'll been through," said Lyles, "I advise you to appoint someone to get on that board so the interests of Lockney and this county is not overlooked. This could be where the big decisions are going to be made, you never know."

The council members thanked Lyles for his comments and agreed to think on who would be best for the position.

Attending the council meeting were: Councilmen Doucette, Copeland, Wofford, and Fortenberry; Mayor Smith. City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, Paul Lyles, attorney at law, and The Beacon reporter.

It is a complete report covering all aspects of LISD. It is available for public inspection on each campus.

#### Organizations

Continuous efforts are made to keep the parents and community informed and involved. Two strong organizations assist us in this endeavor, the Parent-Teacher Association and Parental Advisory Council through our Chapter I program. Lockney is fortunate that a large majority of the parents take an active roll in their children's education.

#### Programs

The school sponsored a Parent Volunteer Program in Elementary and Jr. High. Parents worked to assist teachers in areas other than teaching. The school also sponsored educational programs on DRUGS which were presented for the

Lockney Elementary Computer Program

Lockney ISD designed and implemented a computer lab for Lockney Elementary to begin functioning in the fall of the 1989-90 school year.

The lab contains 24 micro-computers to be used for such applications as: computer assisted instruction in language arts and math, word processing in composition classes, basic computer key-boarding and tutorial. The computers are also available for teachers use in grade keeping, creating assignments from software and management of instruction.

All students in grades K-5 have regularly scheduled classes in the computer lab twice weekly for approximately 45 minutes. Computer assisted instruction is used in special education, remedial reading, gifted and talented and regular education. The goals of the elementary instructional computer program are to provide students with the essential skills necessary to become proficient computer users and to develop basic computer awareness through keyboarding and word processing. Additionally, the computer is used as a tool for teaching logical thinking and to enhance students problem solving skills.

Sing, Spell, Read and Write This multi-sensory phonics program was implemented in Kindergar'en, 1st and 2nd grade classrooms.

#### At Risk Summer School

All compensatory students in grades 2-8 were given the opportunity to work on basic skills during a two week summer school.

Life Management Skills Retreat Migrant At-Risk students attended a weekend retreat where the emphasis was on goal setting, teamwork and leadership.

make a decent living for my children. Tell me why does things like this happen? This is the only question I have. May the Rumors Stop Patricia Garcia



# Money worries can add stress during holidays

Once the battle in crowded stores is won and the Christmas gifts are finally wrapped and delivered, once the Christmas dinner is served and friends and relatives have departed, most of us tend to breathe a sigh of relief. For all the peace and good will that is supposed to accompany the holiday season, many of us seem to wonder if it's all worth it.

Christmas is one of the most stressful times for many of the three quarters of all Americans who now say they suffer from stress - something which is estimated to cost the economy up to \$150 billion annually in hobbled productivity and absenteeism.

This year with talk of higher taxes to reduce the U.S. deficit, falling real estate prices, a costly war in the wings and signs of a recession on the horizon, money worries can mean even more holiday stress and illness. 
A - No. VA absorbs this deductible. This may even satisfy your policy deductible if you later seek private medical care.





# Twenty seven named to Who's Who

A total of 27 students from Lockney have been included in the 24th Annual Edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1989-90.

Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. 
