Others feel that the president and vice-president should be elected by popular vote; that the electoral college system should be abolished. There are still others who feel that a proper solution would be an amendment providing that each candidate should receive only the percentage of electoral votes that he receives popular vote in each state. This is definitely a problem on which much will be done and said before the 1956 elections.

Generally speaking, we found that the folks in all sections are primarily interested in the United States and what it stands for. They realize in responsibility that

we hold in the world today and are willing to meet all requirements, but they are not willing to exhaust our resources trying to keep up the whole world. Opinions are varied on how far this country should go in foreign aid, but almost unanimous that such aid should be on the basis of the helped helping themselves as much as humanly possible.

The crops across the southeastern section seemed to be in fairly good shape, but you can sure tell where the drought disaster belt begins. The small businessman report decreases in sales and profits, but many of them think that this is the usual pre-election slump. One man told me that this slump in business was a healthy

thing in the smaller communities because things had just gone too high. He seemed to think that the slump would become more noticeable in the larger cities, especially as to profits, and that the election had nothing to do with it. It is interesting to read the national polls and estimates that are made on a nationwide scale, and then go out into the different communities and talk to the people. The nationwide picture is a great deal different from the single community pictures, but the two together make a wonderful view of the entire American scene.

If you ever get to feeling that the country is going to the dogs and can't be saved, just start out across the country and stop every chance you get and visit with the folks. America will never go to the dogs as long as we have the kind of Americans that I have been talking to for the past several days, and most of them look pretty healthy and good for many years to come.

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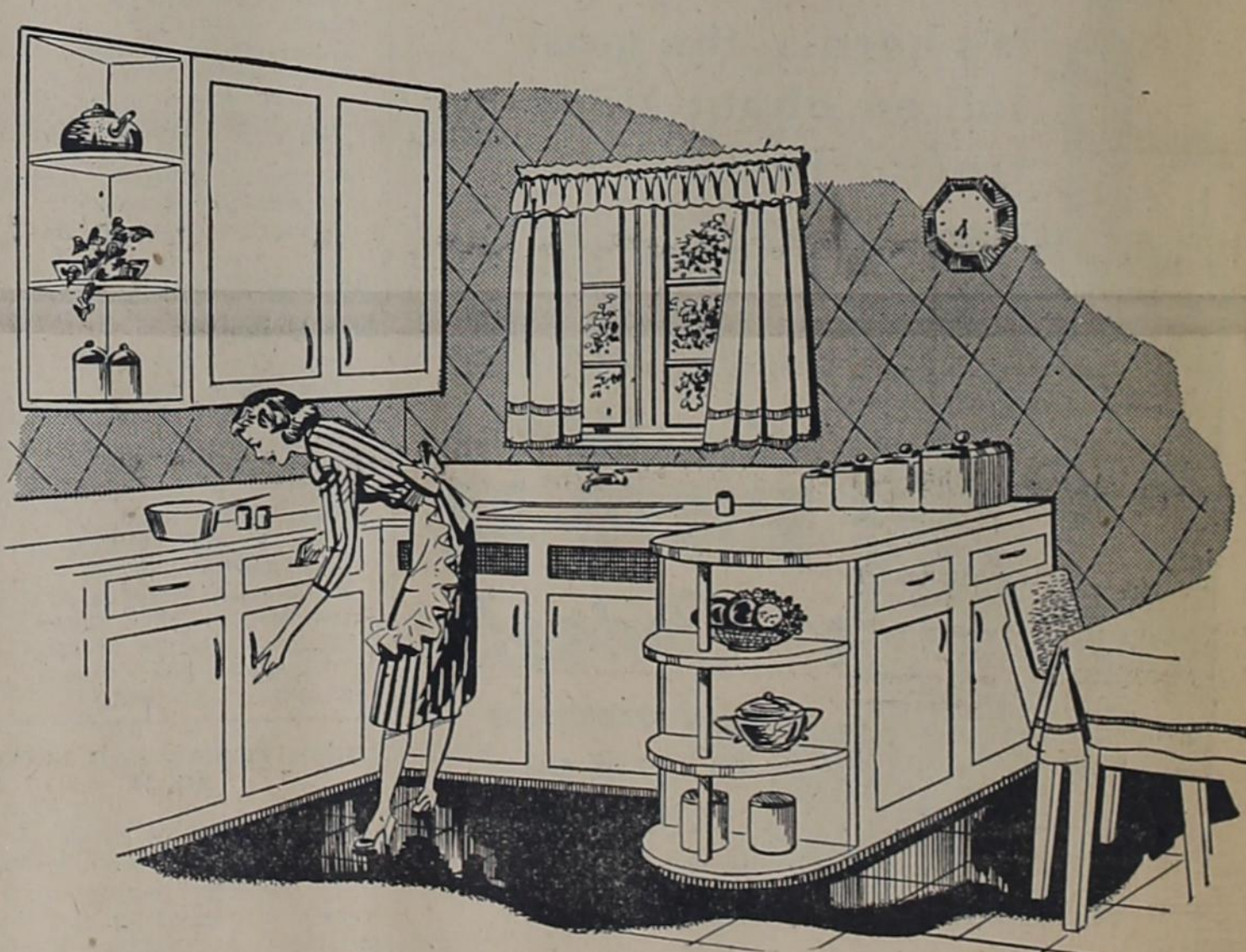
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
