The Passing of a Noble Woman.

On Monday last the court of special sessions of New York city set a noteworthy and an admirable precedent by adjourning in honor of a woman. She was a queen uncrowned save with the halo of the bright deeds of her beautiful and unselfish life. No crowned queen or empress has ever earned greater glory or has been borne to the grave with more sincere lamentations.

Mrs. Rebecca Salome Foster, a victim of the Park Avenue hotel fire, was known as the "Tomb's Angel." The full meaning of this appellation can only be measured by the gratitude that overflowed from the hearts of the criminals and outcasts to whom she ministered. Voluntarily withdrawing herself from all personal enjoyment of life, she spent her time and her substance upon the wretched, following in the Master's footsteps and relieving publicans and sinners. Given \$5000 a year by a charitable organization to use as she pleased, Mrs. Foster found it insufficient, and first spent her private income and then sold her private property that the needy might not want. It is told of this noble woman that she removed her own overskirt and gave it to a trembling prisoner at the dock, and stopped her thanks with the soothing, magnetic touch of her woman's sympathetic hand.

The noble woman has gone to her reward. "Blessed are the merciful,"

as it is written "for they shall obtain mercy." And, again: "Now abideth these three: Faith, hope, and charity; but the greatest of these is charity." Upon her tombstone should be carved the words of the King: "Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty and ye gave me drink: * * * Naked and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison and ye came unto me."

The custom has been for courts to adjourn out of respect to the memory of distinguished men; in thus honoring the passing away of a noble woman the court has honored itself. —Houston Post March 2.

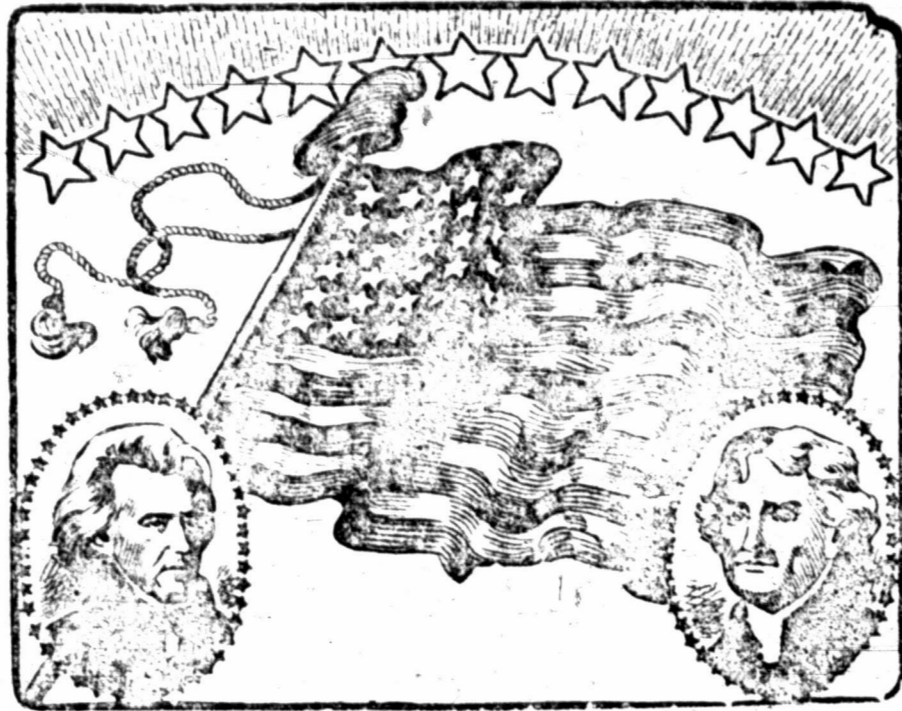

HOGG SHIES AT KNEE PANTS.

WILL NOT DON THE ENGLISH COURT DRESS EVEN FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF MEETING KING EDWARD VII.

London, March 2.—All the arrangements had been completed with the United States Ambassador, Joseph Choate, to enable former Gov. Hogg of Texas, who is in London, to be presented to King Edward at the forthcoming levee. A hitch occurred, however, for Mr. Hogg found he must appear in knee breeches, sword, etc., the regulation court dress. "Never," said Mr. Hogg, "if I cannot appear in the ordinary evening dress of an American citizen I will not appear at all. A pretty sight I would look rigged up in those gawags. I have not the faintest idea of trying to revolutionize or even criticize English customs, but, blamed if I'll wear another country's uniform—no, not even for the sake of meeting the King."—Dallas News.

The banner crop of sorghum seed in Hall county has been reported by the Herald twice so far this year, but each time some fellow has come along and over-reached the pile. We have now to report what we believe to be the very largest crop of sorghum seed threshed in the country. It was by J. B. Russell and was all raised by himself. It measures out from the machine 1150 bushels and will perhaps weigh out more than that. He did not plant the crop for the seed either but for feed. The seed crop is the clear gain of about \$1800 more than he expected to realize from the crop. This crop is several hundred bushels larger than Mr. Dial's crop.

Kansas City Stock Report.

Kansas City Stock Yards,
March 1, 1902.
Cattle supplies continue very light and prices to advance. The increase in values the past seven days amounts to fully 35 cents per hundred. The buyers show a willingness to make reasonable bids on all classes of stock that is wonderfully encouraging to the producer. There have been no strictly choice export steers on the market this week, the top for the week being 6.65, but good well finished cattle would bring from 6.80 to 7.00 on today's market. F. M. Ecton, Carrollton, Mo., topped the heifer market for the season today with three heifers that weighed 820-lbs each and sold at \$3.00 per hundred. The general range of dressed beef prices has been from 5.00 to 6.65; butcher cows and heifers \$2.25 to 6.00; canners, 2.50 to 3.25.

The country demand for stockers and feeders continues to improve; the moderate offerings of good quality finding ready sale at steady values, but dealers have an accumulation of light common stockers and that class of cattle are some lower. Prices range all the way from 3.25 to 5.15.

Texas and Territory meal or corn fed cattle are eagerly sought for by all the dressed beef buyers. At one time Monday with about one-half the supply in the native yards, there was not a single steer buyer to be found in the native division; they were all backing each other in the quarantine division where the market was fully 10 cents higher. W. F. Smith, White Eagle, O. T. topped Wednesday's market with 42 steers that weighed 1225-lbs each and sold at \$5.35. Thursday W. W. O'Bryan, Welch, I. T. raised Mr. Smith out by selling 51 steers that weighed 1339 pounds each at 5.85. The top for the week was 5.85 with general prices ranging from 4.40 to 5.35.

Hog products during the early part of the week were almost panicky, with live hogs

correspondingly lower. The reaction that developed Thursday is still in evidence and both hog commodities and live hogs are quoted almost as high as last week's prices. Top for the week was 9.42 1/2, with prices ranging from 5.80 for common lights to 6.42 1/2 for prime heavies.

The continued stringency of sheep supplies at this point has held prices well up this week and the market has been active and satisfactory compared with last week's quotations. Lambs show a slight weakness but the fact is that the lower quotations are traceable to a marked falling off in quality of the offerings and not to any depreciation in values. Prices being paid here are comparatively higher than those obtainable at Eastern markets and producers would find it to their interest to consider the merits of this market when making consignments. Native lambs have sold this week from 6.35 to 6.50; Colorado lambs 6.25 to 6.45; Western wethers 5.00 to 6.50; Western yearlings 5.90 to 6.30; Western ewes 3.50 to 5.40.
