REUNION TALK.

Canyon City and we may say Randall County has promised a great deal to the people who come as visitors to the reunion. As a part of it, an exhibition of what the country can do in the way of stock and agricultural products is down on the program. This has been advertised far and near and The News desires, here and now, to ask the people of Randall County what they are going to do about it?

True, it is too early a date for this section to have much in the way of Plains grown crops to show, but we do have some things even on this line and among them and of this year's growth are alfalfa and the small grains. And in the stock line Randall County can make a fine display if she only wills it. It is a mistake to depend upon the executive committee to look after this; the committee can't do it all. It has, however, detailed Dr. Howell and R. W. O'Keefe, two of its members, to confer with those concerned about it and assist in bringing this greatly desired end—a creditable exhibit—about.

It is now up to our people of town and country alike to say whether or not they will support this sub-committee. And The News again asks the question of its readers—what are you going to do about it? Beginning with the agricultural portion of the program, why not have a booth where exhibits of this character can be set out and explained by some competent person? A land agent would answer for this part of the job, but some one not concerned in any particular lands would be far better.

Going to the stock part of the display, arrangements ought to be made to have pasture or other provision for the animals brought in for a day or so before and during the four days of the Reunion. Entrance fees, if any, ought to be fixed and premiums decided upon.

Not only has the good faith of the Reunion executive committee been pledged for these exhibits, but through them the people of Canyon City and Randall County stand pledged in this particular and our visitors have a right to see these pledges redeemed. These things can be done and done well and no further time should be wasted in "getting good and ready."

In so far as the knowledge of The News goes, only one man, so far, is breaking ground in the direction of the stock show. That man is R. A. Campbell and he is out for, among other things, a good size premium on mule colts, a get of five from each sire to enter the show ring

It is expected that Mr. Hunt and family will arrive here this week.

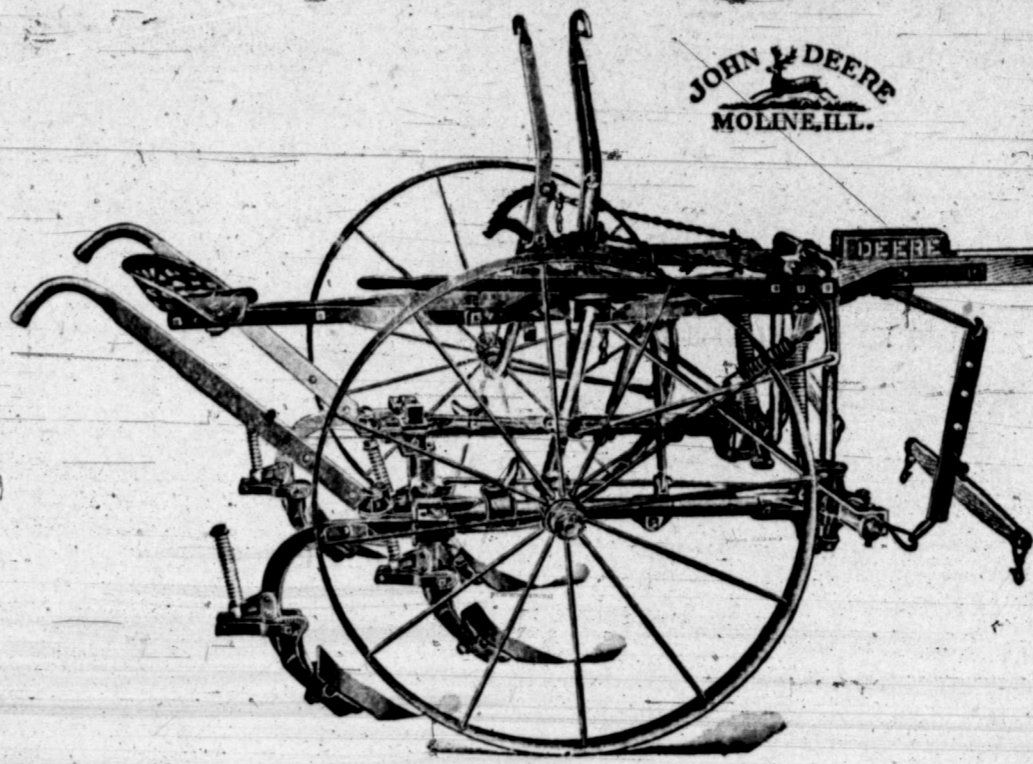

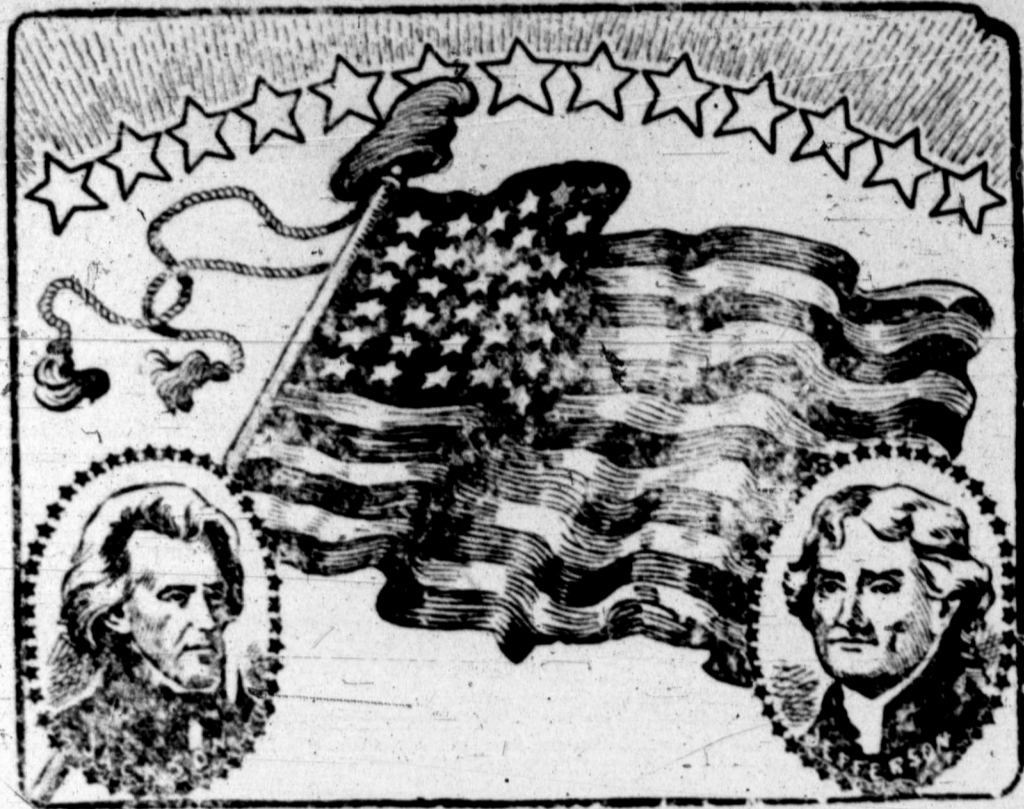
