Lots of oats are being hauled into town this week. Thirty-five cents per bushel has been the prevailing price.

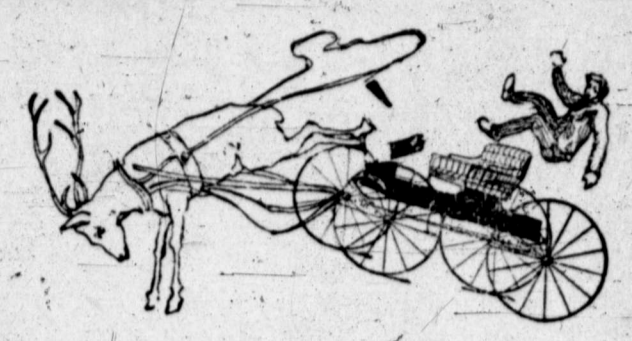
Rev. Erwin, of Amarillo, and Rev. Haines, of this place, left Tuesday to commence a protracted meeting at Silverton.

OUR NEW RAILROAD.

From all indications, it seems now a cinch that the railroad will go south from here via Tulia and Plainview, and that work will be pushed so as to complete the road as far as Plainview by January 1907.

The promoters, Tallmadge and associates, have been in and out of here almost the entire week and the surveying corps with equipment are on hand ready to begin the work of cross-sectioning the lines as soon as some preliminaries have been arranged.

The News is informed that Plainview and Tulia have already signed up the contract for right of way and other present requirements, and it is expected that this town will do so by the close of this week.

The committee having this matter in charge for Canyon City, consisting of L. T. Lester, W. C. Baird, Dr. Black, W. F. Heller and L. C. Lair, has already secured grants for the greater portion of the distance between here and the county line and expresses itself as very sanguine over the prospective results as to the balance required of it as a committee.

Now, while this long projected and much needed—by our South Plains friends—railway, seems certain at the present, it is yet considerably in the fog and not only is this so as to the present plan being carried out, but as to its commercial effect, if carried out, upon the future of Canyon City. There is one way to view it in which all is lovely and the "goose hangs high." This is the way we prefer to see it and do see it just now, but there is another view that is not quite so rosy. In saying this The News does not wish to be understood as in any way forecasting bad results to the country or even to the town itself, for to the first named—the country—only good can come and no positive injury can possibly accrue to the town, in fact its future as a commercial center is already assured—the only question now hanging in the balances being when.

However, as stated, the whole business is still somewhat in the fog, but the mist is clearing away little by little and it is now thought that by next week developments will show true conditions and until then The News will forbear further comment.
