Points in Colorado and Utah as seen by The News Representative.

On Saturday evening, August 12th, the following members, and representatives of the N. W. T. P. A., started on their annual summer excursion—the objective point this year being Boulder, Colorado, over the Ft. Worth & Denver Ry.

The first stop of the party after leaving Amarillo was at Colorado Springs, Sunday night about 11:45. On Monday morning we took a side trip to Manitou Springs, situated five or six miles west of Colorado Springs, immediately at the foot of Pike's Peak. Here are the celebrated effervescent soda and iron springs, which in an early day gave the name "Springs" to the town of Colorado Springs. Of all nature's lovely spots few equal and none surpass in beauty of location, grandeur of surroundings and sublimity of scenery this veritable "Gem of the Rockies." The elevation is over a mile above sea level. Many camp sites are on the banks of beautiful mountain streams, in the vicinity of the Iron Spring and Ute Pass, and the manifold attractions of Manitou render it one of the most

desirable places to spend the summer for rest and quiet, and altogether Manitou will be found an ideal place for camping. Owing to limited time at this place we did not ascend the summit of Pike's Peak. Though some of us would have been content, perhaps, to have made this the final stopping place—Johnson, the leader, says, "Arise! go on; and behold more enchanting scenes ahead!"

From here, the party went on to Denver, the capital and great railroad center of Colorado, and a city of more than ordinary attractiveness. It is one of the greatest railroad points in the west; 12 railroads centering here in a fine union depot and radiating to all parts of the United States. The foothills of the Rocky Mountains are only 14 miles distant, and Long's Peak, James' Gray's and Pike's Peak are in plain view, connected by the gleaming serrated line of the Snowy Range. Parks, boulevards, paved streets, costly and elegant public buildings and private residences are a few of the most obvious signs of wealth and luxury which are to be found in Colorado's capital. At this point our plans were somewhat changed and our party a little divided; Mr. and Mrs. Shafer taking the trip alone to Boulder; Mr. Hendrick, wife and sister-in-law, and Dr. Bailey, wife and daughter, remaining in Denver awhile longer;—the others taking advantage of the courtesy granted by the Denver & Rio Grande R. R., secured transportation to Salt Lake City.

THE ESSENCE OF IT.

The Santa Fe management is considering what our Amarillo friends are pleased to term "improvements" along its Panhandle line. Among these things called improvements, is the straightening of its line from Washburn or, as the Amarillo Herald would have it, from Panhandle. As the purpose of the Santa Fe is to shorten the line, the cut-off from Washburn, as contemplated by its management, is by far the most rational course as fully fifteen miles would be gained, but in this case Amarillo would be left out and so the Panhandle cut-off is projected by Amarillo.

And with this cut-off, whether from Panhandle or from Washburn, will go the shops. To make it plain, so clear that all can see, with the cut-off from Washburn and the road going south from here, Canyon City is sure to come in for the shops, while with the cut-off from Panhandle, Amarillo would as surely bag the whole shooting match. This is the very concentrated essence of the whole matter.

In this little cut off matter is tied up the future commercial importance of Canyon City. If decided, it is not yet public property or at least Amarillo is not aware of it as the following from the Herald of Tuesday will tend to show:

"During the course of the visit of President Ripley of the Santa Fe system, to Amarillo and other points along the southwestern lines of that system, nothing definite was reached in regard to either the proposed trans-continental cut off from Panhandle or the possible enlargement of the present shop here.

"Vice-President and General Manager. Avery Turner, in discussing the visit of these officials along his lines, stated that the trip was made largely in the interest of the present improvements and as a general inspection tour.

"Vice-President Turner states that the situation as far as regards an enlargement of the present shop facilities remains practically unchanged as he has reached no final conclusion in the matter. The Herald does not think that the people of Amarillo appreciate to the full extent even what the present railroad facilities represent to the town in general and the people should be foremost in not only offering their moral support but in offering substantial encouragement toward any contemplated improvements which have been or may be proposed or advocated by the railroads. J. A. Edwards returned last Saturday from a trip to Rockwall county. He stated that while there he visited W. T. Lofland and that he found him in bed and very sick.

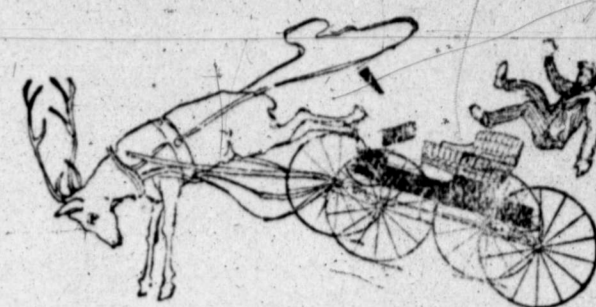

The News has reference to the one going south from Canyon City.

The promoters are on the grounds, they are hard at work getting matters in shape; the surveying corps is busy making what are deemed necessary changes along the line of the old survey. Some two-thirds of the right of way through this county has already been procured and all of it has been guaranteed. It is expected that in so far as this county is concerned the re-surveying will be finished this week. Julia and Plainview have also guaranteed the right of way and the committees having this matter in charge down there are ready for business on receipt of plats from the engineer corps.
