AS OTHERS SEE US.

A. D. McNair, writing in Farm and Ranch of last week, speaking of his recent visit to this section says:

"At Canyon City, I saw a fine field of alfalfa on the slope of a large, circular depression, and another on the plains, three miles east of Amarillo; which has been cut three times this year. Wheat and oats are everywhere in evidence and I heard of one field of wheat which yielded 30 bushels per acre, and one of oats that turned out 72 bushels per acre. I also heard of fields of barley, and I am interested to know more explicitly how well barley will produce in the Panhandle. In other states it has done better than other cereals at high altitudes and it is the only grain that I know of which flourishes in the far North, even in Alaska and Norway, and yet grows well alongside orange and lemon groves in California. It is a crop that can be sowed either early or late, matures quickly and takes about one-fifth less moisture from the soil than oats do, and it is, moreover, an excellent feed for all kinds of stock when ground. I hope it will be thoroughly tested by farmers on the plains.

"Garden vegetables grow finely, but I am told that every tender-foot makes a failure of his garden because he plants too early. The fact is that March is usually dry and April is comparatively so, but with the advent of May come good rains, which last, sometimes, with reasonable frequency, till October.

"Records kept by the U. S. weather observer at Amarillo, show an average rainfall for 13 years of 16 1/2 inches, for the six months from April to September, inclusive. This is only two inches less than at Rochester, N. Y. for the same months, and Rochester is in the center of one of the finest agricultural and horticultural regions in the United States. It is quite evident to me, partly from what I have seen and partly from the indisputable weather records, that agriculture in the Panhandle has a great future.

"As a place of residence, the Panhandle is excellent and I have no hesitation in saying that I prefer it to any other part of Texas. The water is the best I have ever tasted; the summer climate is superb, and the winter climate, while colder than in other parts of the state, is dry, clear, and, I think, highly desirable.

The only complaint in regard to climate is the spring winds, which blow the dust badly, but this affects town people more than country people, for the

latter have the ground covered with grass or wheat on the windward side."
