**Keep Your Money at Home.**

Commenting on the recent big insurance steals, our old friend, Bro. Vernor of the Lampasas Leader, makes the following suggestions, which in the opinion of The News are timely and to the point. He says:

Instead of pouring the hard earned cash of southern people into the coffers of northern thieves and robbers and contributing directly to the campaign fund of the republican party, would it not be better to put that money into safe investments in the south? People have been accustomed to look upon life insurance companies as infallible and safest of all investments, but the disclosures as to the management of the strongest and most prominent of the great insurance companies, would tend to shake this belief most seriously. There are other businesses which will yield a decent per cent on the amount invested and are just as safe and secure as any life insurance company. There is always the complaint here in the south of undeveloped resources, and scarcity of capital. If people would only turn the vast sums annually expended in the way of premiums to line the pockets of dishonest officials, into developing home industries the country would be more prosperous and better developed. The south has a world of resources which are either not being developed at all or else by northern capital. "The south for the southerner," should be the motto.

There are investments in your own town and county which are not only safe, but which would yield you large dividends, and instead of your paying out constantly large sums on premiums, you would be constantly deriving an income from your money invested. Keep your money at home.

All the graft is not in other states, Texas has been cursed with some of it and more than one member of the State government and several members of our last law making body are badly tainted if nothing else. The time will soon be at hand for a general cleaning up and the people should see to it that not only honest men but those above suspicion of dishonesty should be chosen next year.

Thieving in high places, such as developed in the recent insurance company investigations, must not go unpunished or the great mass of the people will cease to respect a law that makes flesh of one class of citizens and fish of another.

Every man is entitled to a fair compensation for his labor, whether it be mental or physical, and when he seeks more than this he is treading upon the rights of others.

THE RAILROAD.

At the annual stockholders meeting of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe, held at Topeka, Kansas, Thursday of last week, no change was made in the directorate, all those whose terms expired this year being re-elected.

The matter of the cut-off from the Panhandle to the main Galveston line was taken up but just what was determined upon does not seem to have been given out for publication. President Ripley being questioned about it said:

"We have such a plan in view, but the railway will not be built for two or three years yet. Work has been begun on a short line between Canyon City and Plainview, which will eventually be extended to connect with the main line, but when the line will be completed has not yet been determined."

As an evidence of the certainty of the extension of the branch of the Santa Fe from Canyon to Tullia, Mr. Tallmadge, the leading promoter of the enterprise, has demanded the right of way by the 10th of next month. It is stated by a gentleman in a position to know, that it is highly probable grading will be commenced by the 15th or 20th of next month. This is not official, but a rumor that has a good foundation for belief. The cars will enter this town some fine morning and announce to the people that they are at last connected with the outside world by rail and a new page in their history will open.—Tullia Standard.
