Special Legislative Session.

Governor Lanham has signi-
fied his intention of calling a
special session of the Legisla-
ture to convene sometime in
April.

From what Governor Lanham
has said on the matter, it seems
that the only purpose for which
this special session will be
called is to heal Section 120 of
the Terrell election law. He,
the Governor, also strongly in-
dicates that the Legislature
may do this work free of extra
charges to the State, as many
of them already stand committed
so to do.

So much is outlined by the
Governor. The official call is
expected some day next week.

While The News holds heartily
with Governor Lanham that
the Legislature ought of right to
present no bill for this curing
process it feels sure that in this
as in all other cases, right or
wrong, the dear people must
pay the costs.

The Home Paper.

Following is an address by
Col. Jo W. Allison to Texas
cotton seed men:

"The day is coming when we
have to look at home to find a
market for our products and
when we want the boys up in
the forks of the creek to im-
press upon their congressmen
some important matters of leg-
islation or to fight the most pro-
hibitory Austrian tariff that is
already upon us or to help us
wipe off our statute books those
disgraceful oleomargarine laws,
you will have to do it in the
pages of the little paper at
home, and you are not going to
get those benefits if you do not
know the fellow who publishes
it and do not read his paper and
do not help him as you want
him to help you. You have
other papers to read, perhaps,
and do not need your home pa-
per, but I carry an advertise-
ment every day in the year in
both my daily and weekly coun-
ty papers, and I believe it has
made me money, too. I do not
believe there is a day that I can
not go into their office and com-
mand their help in any reason-
able manner, and this is not be-

cause they think more of me
than they do of you, but it is
simply because I am paying
their money and patronizing
their efforts, and because I
have shown the interest in their
business which I am asking
them to show in mine. They
are, or should be, your friends;
they are your neighbors, their
children play with your children
their wives go to church with
your wives, while you go fishing
with them. It is your duty to
help them in their business if
you expect them to help you in
yours. And if you do not do
this you should not complain of
their indifference or their en-
mity.—Greenville Herald.

Speaking of the prohibition
campaign soon to be on in its
territory, the Forney Headlight
comes to the following sensible
conclusion as to its course dur-

"The prohibition campaign
will soon be upon us, and in the

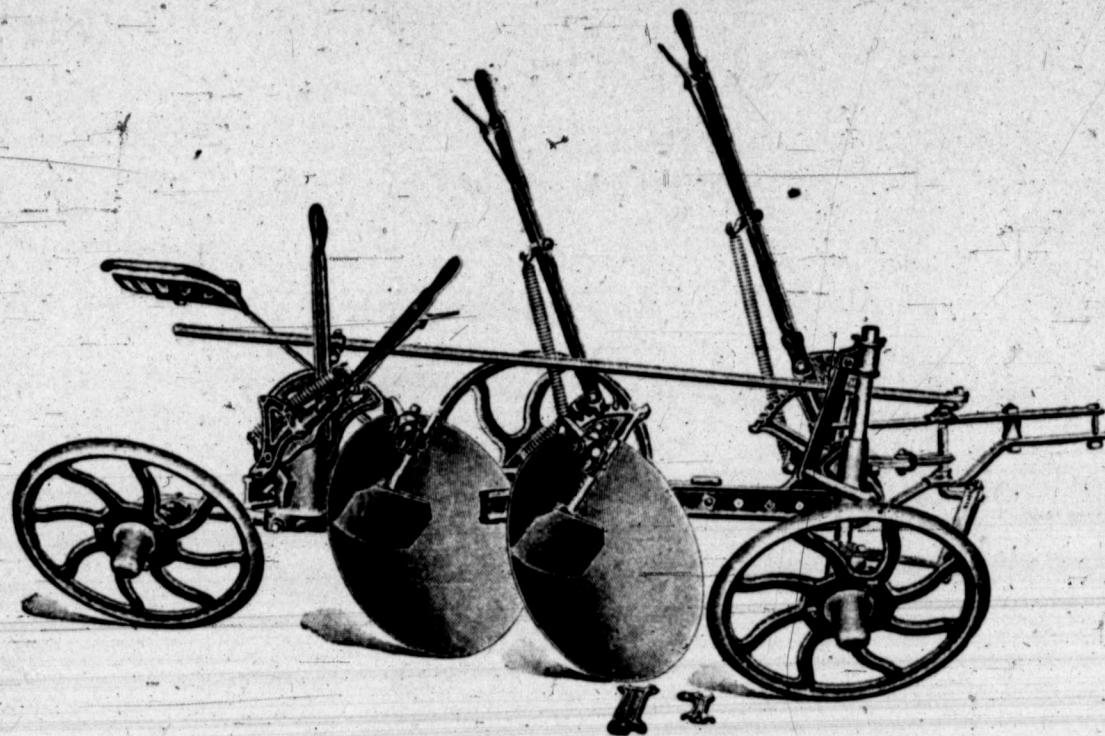

Manufactured Stone.

There has been a company organized in this town for the manufacture of building stone from hydraulic cement and sand. The machinery for this factory is in transit and work will commence early after its arrival. It has been practically demonstrated that this manufactured stone is superior to either lime-stone or sand-stone, will stand a greater pressure without crumbling, is cheaper and better for either residence or business house construction than rock or brick and will stand fire far better.

The company has just the kind of sand for the best results, but the cement will have to be shipped in from some other country. It has been demonstrated that this manufactured article is cheaper than lumber and when properly built is almost absolutely fire proof. We opine that much of this material will be used here in the next few months, and that it will give perfect satisfaction. The men who have gotten up this scheme are all good men and interested in the progress of this country, and will furnish the stone at the lowest rates consistent with good business principles, and they should receive every encouragement.—Hale County Herald.

NEW RAILROAD PARAGRAPHS

Work began on the grade Thursday of last week and is moving right along. The start was made on the fill near the creek on the W. F. Heller place.

Teams, men and other necessities for the work on hand are arriving almost every day and by the close of this week it is expected that gangs of men will be at work all along the line reaching south of this place for thirty miles.

The crews already here have their own commissary and are also shipping in their hay and other feed stuffs from Kansas. This assurance of the railroad has already had a marked effect at Tulia and Plainview. Property at the first named town is jumping rapidly in price and credible reports as to Plainview say that lots on the public square have already passed the \$2,500 figure.

Lands all along the line have also been marked up from two to three dollars per acre and some of them near Plainview are said to have doubled and trebled.

The effect has also been experienced here. A general advance in prices of lots has taken place and houses are in greater demand than ever.

Reiterating what The News has already said, the road is going sure, and the general outlook for all within its zone of influence, especially the dwellers in the country, is good indeed.

It is claimed that at San Francisco a human skin tannery has recently been discovered. It is alleged these skins are stripped from corpses in hospitals and college dissecting rooms and that when tanned they are soft and very pliable resembling chamois. The fine quality of the leather thus made comes high, the finished skin of a man rating at \$500. It is made up into purses and various other articles including tan slippers, but from the present market value of the leather it is hardly likely that any of these goods will reach Canyon City for a time at least.

'Tis not at all likely that a big system like the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe would crook its transcontinental line and go four miles out of the way just to take in Amarillo. What it has refused to do for northern cities of twenty times the size of our nabor it is not to be expected it will perform down this way. Amarillo wants it, to be sure, and will work hard to get it, but fail she will just as certain as correct business methods hold good with the Santa Fe management.

The contract for the new Methodist parsonage was let to Jack Scott—a "turnkey" job—at \$1,600. Work is to begin as soon as the old parsonage can be moved on one of Sam Heyser's lots. Mr. Heyser has purchased the old building at \$500, Rev. W. B. Wilson to occupy it until the new structure is completed.
