

City Buys Jail

Tractor Maintenance Course For Farmers At High School March 21

A second-hand jail is hard to come by in a while a good one does show up. Since the city has been needing a jail for some time now, the commission at the chance of buying from Garbell Bros. Tank Co. of Fort Worth last week. The new jail, who are doing some work for the city, came by a trade-in on some work done for another town. They bought the jail for \$13,500, a fraction of the cost of a new jail, incidentally, ranging from \$30,000 to \$50,000, depending on size, accommodations, and other appointments.

The new jail consists of the concrete floor forms, concrete walls, and concrete roof (except on New South of July, etc. when it is standing room only). Everything is in excellent condition and the price is FOB Dimmitt.

Need for the new jail has been known for some time. The city has a court house with malefactors and could have been becoming over-crowded. There's not enough room in the city's and the county's jails.

If the bond election coming up in April passes, the jail will be placed in the new building. But if it fails, there will be a jail constructed on the present grounds.

Ordinarily the city jails four or five persons per week for various offenses.

Liquor Airlift Attempt Fails Near Nazareth

Successful bootlegging calls for resourceful people and there seems to always be someone willing to do the job.

The latest bootlegging episode in Castro County concerned itself with four Texas Tech students who, for \$20, rented an airplane at Lubbock and flew it into a pasture southeast of Nazareth with the intention of loading up on the sack stores there and heading some where a possible lucrative return on their investment awaited them. It didn't work though.

It happened Friday. A Texas Tech student, Jim D. Baccus, 22, was arrested for illegal possession of liquor when Liquor Control Board inspectors caught him and two other Tech students loading sack stores from a station wagon belonging to the liquor store owner where they had made their purchase.

Baccus pleaded guilty to a charge of transporting in Castro County and was fined \$100 and costs. The other three students, all minors, were released without charge.

The youths had pulled the car up next to the plane in a pasture southeast of Nazareth and had lowered the tail gate on the station wagon to transfer the liquor to the plane when they were apprehended, Lloyd Dunlap, Liquor Control Board Inspector, said.

Incidentally, even in a wet area, it is illegal to carry more than a certain amount of alcoholic beverages.

Another case concerning a plane bootlegging turned out to be a false alarm. Highway patrolman L. W. (Bo) Melton of Lubbock, said Monday that he met a plane being sought by officers when it landed in Shelby, water about dusk Saturday. The man, however, had a legal amount of liquor and no intention of sale, Melton said, and was not detained. The man told Melton he had landed near a Nazareth liquor store and made the purchase.

The new location is centrally located where Pesina's Dry Goods operated until recently. Hutcherson bought the business from Hutcherson after receiving his discharge from the army last July.

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held March 21-25 under the sponsorship of the Dimmitt High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Paul Hilburn, superintendent and Mr. Jim Dowdy, teacher of vocational agriculture.

The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Dimmitt High School.

Mr. Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agriculture Engineering at Texas A & M College, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Wiedemann, a native of Mission, Texas, received his B.S. Degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A & M College in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Company of Mission, and while serving 24 months active duty with the U.S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

"Outstanding success" has been the words associated with the tractor maintenance short course taught by Mr. Wiedemann, according to Walter Lebay area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in tractor maintenance and in other fields are made through Mr. Lebay's office.

The short course at Dimmitt is scheduled to begin March 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of five will be held March 22, 23, 24, and 25.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Mr. Dowdy.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Hilburn, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Dowdy. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Tractor Maintenance Short course Certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Wiedemann states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuel, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Wiedemann will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life. Throughout the short course emphasis will be placed on "Learn-

ing to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. All students will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on these tractors. Safety during both maintenance and actual operation will also be included in this course.

"Short courses in tractor maintenance, as well as other subjects, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M College," stated E. V. Walton, head of the Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M College.

"This cooperative program," states Walton, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of tractor maintenance, farm electrification, farm welding, dairying, insect control, farm management, and swine production.

City Manager E. B. Noble said this week that the city government is desperately in need of more space. "We've reached the point where we must either build on to our present building or construct a new one. There's no choice in the matter."

The bond election for a new city hall has no promoters, Noble emphasized. The election, called in conjunction with the regular city commission election, is an attempt by the commission to find out what the voters want done. If the issue passes, they will take the vote as a clear indication the city taxpayers want, and are willing to pay for, a new city hall. If the issue fails the commission will then next study the possibility of building onto the existing structure.

Plans for the proposed city hall are not complete. In general it would be a modernistic, flat-roofed brick building, L-shaped and attractive. Present plans call for more than 7,500 square feet of floor space which would make room for three fire truck stalls, living quarters for the fire chief, vault, city manager's office, accounting and city service office, a council room, room for a police department and jail and rest rooms.

The city has an option on a quarter of a block just southeast of the courthouse (corner Southeast Second and Jones) for \$12,000. This is \$2,000 per lot, about standard for good lot prices in Dimmitt.

The proposed building would face north with fire-truck entrance facing west.

Plans for the building have not been definitely established. The general outline of the building is approved, but modifications in the floor plan are being made. It will be made of brick and tile.

A new city hall will have some effect on the tax structure. At present, property owners are paying about 42 cents per \$100 market evaluation of their property. In other words, a property owner with a \$10,000 house will pay about \$42.00 per year now in city taxes. Since the city is having a hard time meeting its obligations at present there is an imminent prospect of the taxes going to 52.5 cents per hundred and if the bond election passes it will go still further to 57.75 cents. In other words, the \$100,000 city hall and lots would increase taxes \$52.50 per year on a \$100,000 home. A person who had rendered property for taxation worth a market value of \$20,000 would pay an additional \$10.50 per year and so on. The first step in tax increases—to pay

\$100,000 New City Hall Bond Election For Dimmitt Here Tuesday, April 5th

Submitted to voters is as follows: "Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, be authorized to issue \$100,000 general obligation bonds for the purpose of constructing a City Hall and Fire Station Building in and for said City and the acquisition of a site therefor; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed six percent per year, payable annually or semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of principal and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

Absentee voting may be done at any time until the election at the county clerk's office.

300 Attend Farm Bureau Appreciation Dinner Friday

A large crowd, estimated at about 300 persons, were on hand Friday night at the Farm Bureau Appreciation Dinner where members of the organization brought businessmen and their wives as guests.

There were several highlights of the evening, emceed by Allan Webb. One of these events was the citing of D. D. Myrick of Hart as last year's Outstanding Conservation Farmer. Mr. Myrick was lauded by Wade Mills, zone supervisor, as "a friend of conservation." "We have a land of plenty today," he said, "but what about fifty years from now. Mr. Myrick has worked to conserve his land and water by installing 5,000 feet of underground pipe and a recharge well. He has taken badly abused farms, practiced sound conservation, and has put them back in good shape. Mr. Myrick is an outstanding conservation farmer."

Mr. Myrick was later presented a large framed, full-color picture of his farm by Mr. Audrey Crossman of Canyon, a representative of Great Southwest Life Insurance Company of Dallas who said that his firm had picked Myrick as one of 15 top conservationists in the state of Texas.

Also on the program was Hub King, Farm Bureau District Director from Brownfield who discussed Farm Bureau purposes and beliefs.
