There is nothing unusual about this pro-cess but it is highly gratifying to the people who had faith in the area and invested their savings, either in business enterprises of in farming land and equipment when it has been definitely es-tablished that their judgment was sound and that the economy of the county is based on a permanent program with unlimited possibilities of development.

Castro county has eleven fine gins. The most of these gins are practically new. They represent an investment of hundreds of thousands of dollars. The invest-ments were made by men and firms that were willing to take a chance with the farmers in establishing a new industry in the county, cotton. The fortunes of a gin are tied in with the fortunes of the local cotton farmer. The ginner depends entirely on ginning cotton for a source of income their facilities cannot be diverted to any other purpose. The gins stand idle for nine months waiting for the land to be conditioned, the crop to be planted and cultivated and for the crop to grow and mature. The ginner watches the sky for rain clouds, and shudders at the sound of hail falling on the roof, he examines the grow ing plants and forms for harmful insects and watches the antics of the cotton market with the same interest manifested by the farmer, his partner in the industry. It is reasonable to assume that the local ginner deserves the ginning business in his area if his services are standard or satisfactory. The battleship USS West Virginia, commissioned Dec. 1, 1923, was the last battleship to take to the seas until the North Carolina was commissioned April 9,



History of Christmas Seals

When you see the Christmas seal do you ever wonder how it started? It was born in Denmark, home of the fairy tales of Hans Christian

Einar Holboell, a Copenhagen postal clerk, was sorting mail one snowy afternoon before Christmas, 1903, when he thought of the idea of a penny stamp to swell a fund for children's hospitals.

Authorized by King Christian, the first Christian seals were sold n Copenhagen in 1904.

Holboell's scheme outgrew his wildest imaginings, for before his death in 1927, he lived to see it

The seals found their way to America on letters and packages Jacob Riis who wrote an article about them. Few people, however, were interested in the idea.

Then, in the autumn of 1907, Emily Bissell, a public health worker, concerned about the fate of a small sanatorium, recalled th article and sat down to sketch America's first Christmas seal, a America's inst Christmas seat, a wreath of holly encircling the words "Merry Christmas."

With 50,000 stamps printed and nowhere to sell them, Miss Bissell


at last enlisted the aid of a columnist on a Philadelphia newspaper. The idea caught and within a few weeks \$3,000 was collected.

The first nation-wide sale was held the following year and was backed by newspapers all over the country, religious and civic groups, and sponsored by the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association.


