## WALTER ROGERS' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

The Second Session of the 83rd Congress convenes at twelve o'clock noon on January 6, 1954. The House of Representatives of the United States was called to order by the Speaker, the Honorable Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts. The Chaplain, Rev. Bernard Braskamp, D. D., offered the prayer, which was concluded with the Lord's Prayer, in which all of the Members joined, in voice as well as in spirit. A roll call reflected the presence of 392 members, which constituted a quorum. The Speaker then laid before the House communications from the Clerk concerning the election of four new members to the congress. These Members were sworn in and the House proceeded with its business of the day. As soon as this was concluded a tribute was paid by Members of the aisle to the Honorable Sam Rayburn, former Speaker of the House. The occasion was the seventy-second birthday of Mr. Rayburn. Honorable Robert Byrd, of West Virginia, included in his remarks a poem that I would like to leave with you. It is as follows:

"Count your garden by the flowers,  
Never by the leaves that fall;  
Count your life by the sunny hours,  
Not remembering clouds at all;  
Count your nights by stars, not shadows,  
Count your days by smiles, not tears;  
And on this, your happy birthday,  
Count your age by friends, not years."

The House adjourned on Wednesday until noon Thursday, January 7, at which time it met in joint session with the Senate to receive the State of the Union Message of President Eisenhower mother, Mrs. Doud. Cameras of every make and description were grinding away in every direction, and the television lights were flashing. The President was escorted

into the Chamber at 12:30 p. m., by Senators Knowland of California, Johnson of Texas, and Bricker of New Hampshire, by Representatives Halleck of Indiana, A. Rends of Illinois, and Rayburn of Texas. He proceeded to deliver his State of the Union Message. The President looked very healthy and appeared in fine spirits, and made a splendid presentation of his message. Needless to say, the galleries were filled to capacity and included Mrs. Eisenhower and were so bright that you felt you were sitting under the brilliant sunshine of a fine spring day in

the Panhandle. The President was preceded into the Chamber by members of his Cabinet. Shortly before the arrival of the Cabinet, the Ambassadors, Ministers and Charges d'Affairs of foreign governments entered the hall. Incidentally, Russia was represented in this group. It was shortly after the entrance of these diplomats that a somewhat embarrassing situation was created. How embarrassing will not be known for a while. It seems that seating arrangements had not been properly arranged, and there was not sufficient available seating space for the diplomatic corps. They were crowded into the aisles. Many of the Members of both the House and the Senate who were sitting close to these aisles, realizing the situation, graciously offered the diplomats their chairs. Some of the invitations were accepted. However, the substantial majority of the diplomatic corps continued to stand through the President's message. It appears that this is the first time that such a situation has arisen. Actually, there was no need of it, as plenty of seats could have been made available for them. I sincerely hope that all of the diplomats appreciated a human mistake and that none became offended. Every member of the House would have been more than glad to have yielded seats to the foreign visitors. However, the situation arose so soon before the arrival of the President and the commencement Message that there was not time to rearrange the seating.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: The President's message was brilliantly worded and was delivered in an outstanding manner by the President. In fact, much better than his previous performances. The message gave treatment to almost every important issue that this Congress will face. I say general because the President recognized this himself and pointed out that he intended to deliver specific messages to the Congress on the several subjects at subsequent dates. One item or issue of explosive proportions was noticeably committed. I refer to the Bricker Amendment, or legislation pertaining to the curtailment of the treaty-making powers of the Executive Department of the government. The President has heretofore voiced his opposition to the Bricker Amendment, as it presently reads, and I presume concluded that there was no reason to say more about it. The explosive nature of this issue is building up daily. Some think that Senator Bricker will retreat and accept a compromise of the wording that would, in effect, actually leave the law as it is today. Others think that he will continue his fight and insist upon wording that will clearly spell out the supremacy of the Constitution over treat-

ies and executive agreements. I shall, of course, support the Constitution of the United States and the theory that it is the supreme law of the land and supercedes all others, whether they be treaties, executive agreements, statutes, administrative decisions or otherwise.

There are many things in the President's Message to which I can wholeheartedly subscribe. On the other hand, there are a number of things with which I must beg to disagree. Some of these issues that I have fought in prior administrations and which I intend to continue to fight, regardless of the personalities involved. This country was not built on personalities. It was built on principles, and on principles its survival must depend.

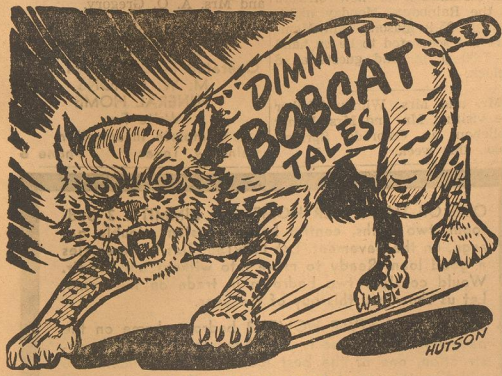

The Bobbies came out of the Hale Center tournament as the number two team Saturday, January 17 after being defeated by a smooth Cotton Center team 58-51 in the finals.

The game was nick and tuck all the way until the final minute and a half when Cotton Center managed to control the ball most of the time and gain a 7-point lead. Dimmitt outscored Cotton Center the first quarter by five points with the score standing 17-12. They slipped behind the second quarter however, and were trailing 20-27 at the half-time. The score was out to 42-41 in favor of Cotton Center the third period. Darlene Cates led her team in the losing battle with 18 points followed by Margaret Odom and Mary Nelson with 13 and 12 respectively. The guards Mary Witt, Soyna Lowe, and Dalvia Howard played one of their most outstanding games of the season.

### Win In Semifinals

The D. H. S. basketballers advanced to tournament finals when they defeated Shallowwater in the semi-finals by the score of 51-27. The Bobbies managed to get a 15-4 first quarter edge and by the halftime they gained a 19 point lead with the score showing 46-15. The entire squad made a good showing for the night.

The Bobbies started the tournament in fine fashion by scoring one of their largest wins of the season over Crosbyton 73-44. They had rolled up a thirty point margin at halftime with the scoreboard reading 44-14. Subs took over the game the third period and most of the last. Leading scorers for the night were Mary Nelson with 21; Shirley DeLozier with 14; Darlene Cates with 13 and Margaret Odom had 12.

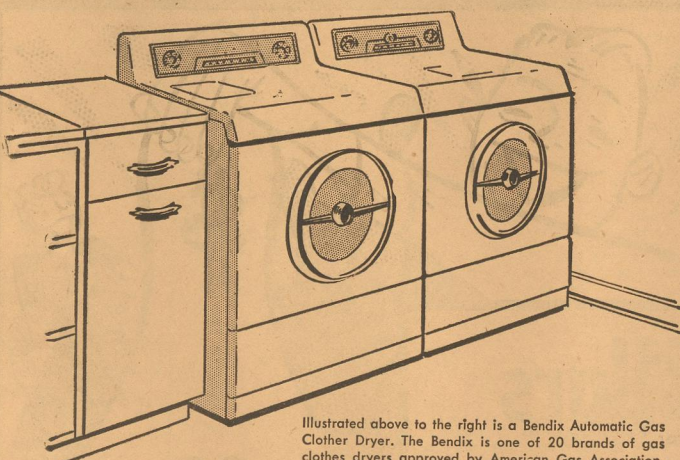

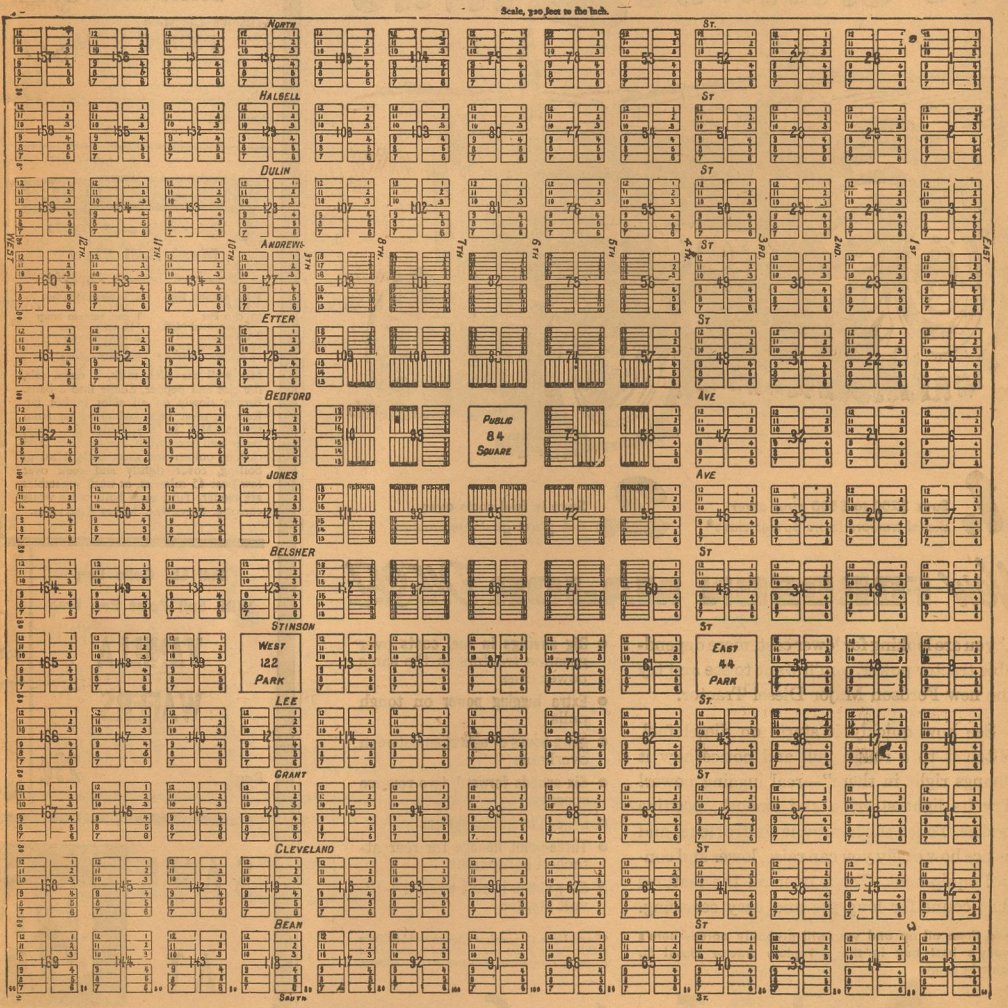

# Duel Between Communism And Free World Tops News in '53

The duel between Communism and the free world dominated the news in 1953. At least that is the opinion of beginning newspaper people who are first-year students in the TCU department of journalism.

In a poll taken by Prof. Warren K. Agee, department head, students selected six stories dealing with the Red menace in their "Ten Best News Stories of 1953."

Far and away the first choice was the end of the Korean "police action". The death of Premier Josef Stalin ranked second closely followed by the coronation of Elizabeth II.

Altogether, 30 stories were

nominated for the list by the students. Some that drew interest but failed to make the top 10 included such items as U. N. action and decisions, our experiments with the H-bomb, the Big Three meeting in Bermuda, the epidemic of tornadoes in the U. S. and the elections in West Germany.

The "10 best" list with typical comment was:

1—End of Korean Conflict. The end of a war that was not a war with nothing gained or settled. Yet it proved to the Communists that the free world is prepared to fight for principles.

2—Stalin's Death. Important

for two reasons: It brought to an end his regime as symbol of a powerful movement and opened the possibility of an internal eruption in Russia, leading to a change in policy.

3—Coronation of Elizabeth. A postwar high spot for hard-pressing action by U.S. in combatting crowning of the first Elizabeth in an era of great prosperity.

4—Rosenbergs' Conviction and Execution. First instance of positive action by U. S. in combatting Communism with extreme penalty.

5—Harry Dexter White Case. American people shocked to find men of such doubtful allegiance in such high office, caused them to wonder about official laxity.

6—Bobby Greenlease Case. Biggest kidnaping case since Lindbergh affair in 1930's.

7—Repatriation of POW's. Great human interest story of families reunited with most intriguing angle of the 23 who refused to be repatriated.

8—Disappearance of Lavrenti Beria. Fall of Russian secret police chief caused world-wide speculation.

9—Inauguration of Eisenhower Regime. As first Republican administration in 22 years, world was interested in possible changes of policies and direction of U. S. aims.

10—Death of Robert A. Taft. Not only removed top political figure but came at crucial time in story of new Republican regime.

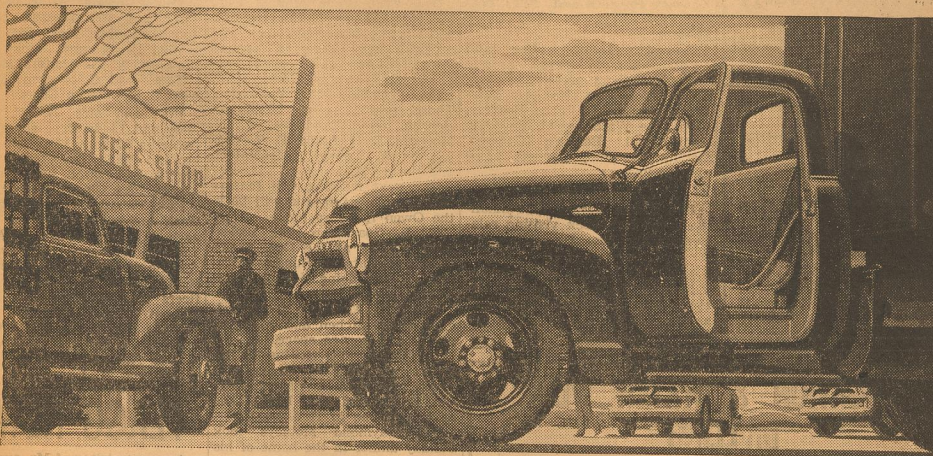

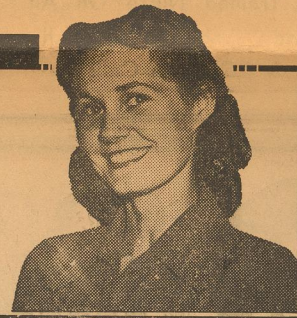

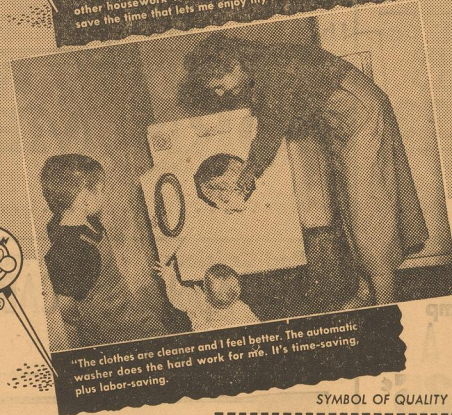
