### TAXATION.

What Some Counties Are Doing Toward Equalizing.

#### IN BRISCOE.

The county commissioners' court has been in session this week setting as a board of equalization. We learn that this court has placed land values at from 50 cents per acre for strictly grazing lands in the brakes to \$2.50 per acre for lands within a radius of six miles of Silvertown, while it has lowered the personal property valuation about 50 per cent.—Silvertown Enterprise.

This is putting the land at about one-fifth of its present market price and why not the personal property on the same ratio? Can or will the Enterprise explain?

#### FALLS COUNTY.

In the black land counties the old method of classification is being followed as of yore with a considerable raise, from a third to one-half for this year. They are still way under market value, however. Take Falls county for

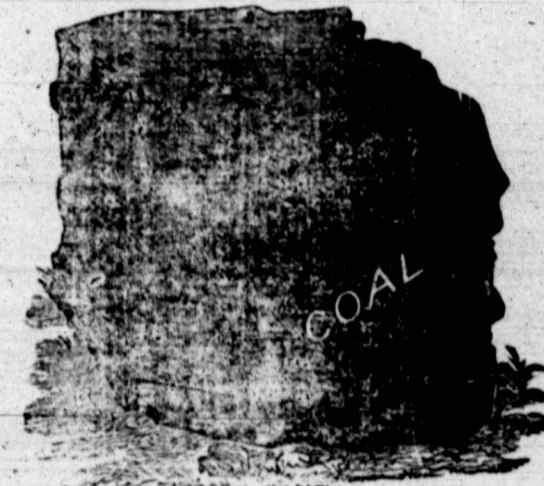

There in passing on land values the board classified and valued same as follows: Black land, class 1, \$30 per acre; class 2, \$25; class 3, \$20; mixed, \$15; sandy land, class 1, \$10 per acre; class 2, \$7; class 3, \$5. Some land had been rendered as high as \$65 per acre, but the same was reduced and placed in the class to which it belonged according to the scale above.

**RANDALL COUNTY REPUBLICANS.**

Some forty-three Republicans met in county convention at the court house Saturday evening and with W. C. Kenyon temporary chairman organized a Republican club for Randall county.

Jasper N. Haney, Esq., was chosen county chairman and Oscar Hunt secretary, and a committee composed of S. A. Shottwell, C. M. Houser and J. Weller was appointed to select one Republican from each of the eight voting precincts of the county who, with the chairman and secretary, will constitute the county executive committee.

Judge Haney in thanking the convention for the honor conferred upon him declared in substance, as follows:

That he regarded a Republican as a patriot, with a higher regard for principle than for partyism and who is willing to be governed by a majority, when fairly and legally expressed; that the two essential qualifications for any office was competency, that is common sense and integrity. That ignorance in the discharge of official duty breeds contempt for the law rather than respect. He said that here, as elsewhere, there are two factions in the Democratic party and that the true mission of the Republicans is and should be to aid the Democrats to place the best element of their party in the local offices throughout the counties in this State. Judge Haney also expressed the opinion "that one's political or religious convictions should have no influence in selecting one for office." "Is he competent to efficiently discharge the duties of the office, and is he honest, should be the only test," says Judge Haney.

That all may be so, Judge, but it is not upon any such lines that Republicans run their business where they have a majority—the absolute power by force of numbers to elect.

The Republicans of Randall county are nice people, good citizens, valued patrons of The News, nearly all of them, but when they get together in brotherly conclave as on Saturday, there's something up besides saving the country from incompetent and dishonest Democrats.

LATER—Judge Haney, referring to the above proceedings, informs The News that he cannot serve as county chairman and must resign said position owing to the fact that the Terrell election law prohibits any public official from acting in that capacity.

**Commercial Club Doings.**

At the regular monthly meeting last week the proceedings in substance were as follows:

L. G. Conner of the committee charged with the Rock Island proposition, Washburn to Canyon City—asked further time to report. This was granted and on motion Jasper N. Haney, J. C. Hunt and L. C. Lair were added to said committee and a report called for at 2 p. m. Thursday, June 20.

The proposition of a College for Canyon City as submitted by Rev. H. H. Thoren of Le Mars, Iowa, was considered and the president and secretary were requested to write Mr. Thoren informing him that the Club was ready to take the matter up with him at any time and would be pleased to have him visit us

again, as he suggests.

On motion the chairman and secretary were appointed as a committee to see about renting a room and furnishing same for use of club, also to see about holding the club meetings in the Odd Fellows and K. of P. Hall, with instructions to report at call meeting of club June 20.

The by laws setting the second Thursday night in each month as the regular time of meeting were so amended as to hereafter read, "Thursday evening at 8 p. m."

Adjourned to meet Thursday evening at 2 p. m.

Thursday June 20.

A good turnout was present at this call meeting with results as follows:

The committee charged with the Rock Island and other railroad propositions made report in substance: That a company be formed here with a capital stock of \$100,000 for the purpose of building a line of railroad from Canyon City to intersect with the Rock Island at or near Yarnell in Carson county and that a charter be applied for such by the second week in July. This report, on motion, was unanimously adopted as the sense of the Commercial Club and a committee was appointed consisting of J. C. Pipkin, Geo. L. Abbott and A. S. Rollins, to solicit the gentlemen recommended to serve as incorporators and directors, to-wit: L. T. Lester, R. W. O'Keefe, J. F. Smith, John Hutson, J. C. Pipkin, J. M. Black, W. C. Baird, and John A. Wallace, to serve as such, and also to see about having the stock subscribed as speedily as possible. It was suggested in the original committee report that this railroad be called the Canyon City and Northeastern.

During a recess given for the purpose several thousand dollars was subscribed for stock at \$100 per share.

A. S. Rollins, R. A. Sowder and J. E. Smith were appointed as a committee to meet certain railroad people at Amarillo who are contemplating the building of a road from this point via Silverton and Floydada to other places Southeast.

To sum it all up it is clear that Canyon City is determined to have more railroads if it be possible for her to get them on any reasonable grounds.

**More Cowboys' Victories.**

La Platta, Missouri, pitted against the Canyon "Cowboys" last Friday and lost out. The count stood 8 to 4. A special to the Daily Panhandle says that La Platta put up a strong fight, much better than other towns had up to that date, but no use, the Texans seemed invincible.

A special to the Daily Panhandle under date of June 16, says: Canyon found another victim in La Platta yesterday, at the terms of 17 runs for the visitors and 6 for the Missourians.

Canyon's batteries were Hunicut, Mitchell and Hubbard.

Ft. Madison came next in the Cowboys' invasion of the north and in the game this afternoon the Iowans took their defeat straight at the rate of 9 to 0. Ft. Madison had stiffened her line up for the occasion by the addition of four league players but the importations were merely among those present.

Wicker was in the box for the visitors and surprised the Iowa team by pitching a no hit game. The Ft. Madison men went down before him in one, two, three order, and only twenty-seven of them faced the pitcher in the entire nine innings.

**THE FIRST DEFEAT**

A special from Galesburg, Ill., to the Daily Panhandle dated June 17, gives the Cowboys' first defeat as follows:

The first defeat the Cowboys' invasion of the North came this afternoon on the field at Gales-

burg where the Illinois team pulled out three scores in a fast game while the Texans were only able to register two markers.

In every way Galesburg was the hardest proposition that the Cowboys have yet encountered but even at this rating the score came near being a victory for the visitors. In the eighth inning with the score 2 to 1 in favor of the Canyon team, the Cowboy fielders went to pieces in two spots and made two throws to Bell which the long first baseman was unable to corral. Each throw gave Galesburg a run which left the score 3 to 2 for the locals. Canyon was unable to disturb the score in the ninth and had to mark up the first defeat.

Galesburg is the best baseball town that the team has yet played in. As the home of two colleges, Knox and Lombard, it has the opportunity for spirited athletic contests at all times and the city itself supports a fast team. The honors were about even in the hitting but the Galesburg men proved very different from the easy victims the pitchers have found in some of the games. Canyon failed to hit in pinches and had to waste several good hits.

**TWO OUT OF THREE.**

"In a cage near the room in which I lived while in Khiva, was a tiger from the Oxus swamps. He had taken a dislike to me, and every time I passed his cage he got up and paced angrily toward me, snarling.

"In the cage of this beast, at the command of the prince, a Turkoman stepped, armed with a short stick as big round as his wrist. With this stick he struck the tiger's nose as he made for him, and then, with palms out and eyes fixed, he walked slowly up to the shrinking beast and stroked his face and flank.

"The tiger snarled and took the man's hand in his open mouth. I held my breath and looked for the bleeding stump to fall away. But keeping that hand perfectly still, with the other he tickled the tiger's jaw and scratched his ear, till with a yawn and a pleased snarl the big cat rolled over on his back to have his belly scratched.

"The man then sank to his knees, always keeping his hands in motion over the glossy fur, and with his foot drew toward him a collar attached to a chain. This he snapped round the beast's neck and, rising to his feet, laid hold of the chain and dragged the tiger out.

"This was only the second time that the cage had been entered. As soon as the tiger was outside he espied the watching party and started for them, but came up short on the collar. When the summing up of prisoners came this "Napoleon of the West" was missing, and Houston remarked to some of his men: "You will find the hero of Tampico, if you find him at all, making his retreat on all fours, and he will be dressed as bad at least as a common soldier."

Santa Anna was shortly taken, disguised as a rustic, with a skin cap, blue cotton pantaloons and a round jacket, but beneath peeped out the fine linen shirt, and more obtrusive still, and not to be mistaken, were the manners of El Presidente. He was crawling along through the long grass, intent upon saying at any cost a life which in his eyes was of more value than many Mexican armies.—Metropolitan.

**IN OLD NORMAN FRENCH**  
 English King's Approval to Acts of Parliament Still Quaintly Phrased in Language of Old Times.

Then the clerk of the crown standing to the left of the commissioners bows to them and reads the title of the first bill.

The clerk of the parliament on the other side bows to the commissioners and then to the speaker and announces in the old Norman French phrase: "Le Roy le veult," or the king wills it, and what was before a bill has now become an act of parliament and the law of the land. The same ceremony is repeated with every bill on the list.

In the case of a bill granting supplies or money to the sovereign the phrase employed is: "Le Roy remercie ses bons sujets, accepte leur benevolence, et ainsi leur veult," that is, the king thanks his good subjects, accepts their bounty, and so wills it.

If it is a private bill, that is, a bill to grant additional powers to a railway or gas or other similar company, the phrase used is: "Soit fait comme il est desire," or be it done as it is desired.

When the king withholds assent it is by the simple words "Le Roy s'avisera," or the king will consider.

The use of Norman French takes the England of to-day back four or five centuries. Cromwell, that stout old iconoclast for whom traditions had no terrors, who called the mace, that sacred symbol of the speaker's authority, "a bauble," and ordered it thrown out of the house, gave his assent to bills in English, and in 1707 a bill passed the house of lords and was well on its way to passage in the house of commons requiring English to be used for the royal assent, when a dissolution of parliament intervened.

From that day to this no attempt has been made to restore the mother tongue.—Appleton's Magazine.

**"WAKING" THE WRONG CORPSE.**

An extraordinary blunder in connection with the identification of a corpse was brought to light at an Irish "wake" in the little village of Chapelizod, near Dublin, recently. An octogenarian villager became so ill that his relatives had to remove him to one of the Dublin hospitals. Shortly after news reached them of his death, and they at once put the house in order in preparation for the "wake." In the evening the body arrived. The coffin seemed unduly bulky and heavy, for the villager was only a small man, but no one suspected that a mistake had been made. The "wake" took place, lasting through the night. Toward the end a relative expressed a desire to see the dead man. The coffin lid was raised, and then those around it were horrified to find that they had been "waking" a stranger. There was great excitement, and hurried telephone messages to the hospital, where the body of the relative was still lying. In due course matters were righted.—London Mail.

**TOO BUSY TO EAT.**

J. G. Phelps Stokes has withdrawn his support from the Young Men's Christian association because in some of its classes business methods of a very worldly description are taught.


"The association," said Phelps Stokes recently, "attempts to give good reasons for teaching the tactics of Wall street. It attempts to reconcile such teachings with its Christian character. On the whole, it fails in this. It fails like the huckster who attempted to account for the miserable condition of his horse. 'Why,' said a woman to the man, 'your horse is a living skeleton. Don't you ever feed him?' 'Feed him?' said the huckster. 'Well, that's a good one, that is. Why, he's got two bushels of oats and a ton of hay at home now, only he ain't got time to eat 'em.'"
