**HORSES AND MULES.**

About a month ago in St. Louis a car of well bred, medium size horses averaging 1400 brought the neat little sum of \$825 around. A good figure, you say. Yes, and the supply is not near equal to the demand. And this is also true of good mules. Nothing else in the property line has climbed so fast in price in so short a time. Mares that just preceding the Boer war were dull sale at, from \$6 to \$10 now readily bring \$100 and so all along the line, and from present indications the end is not yet.

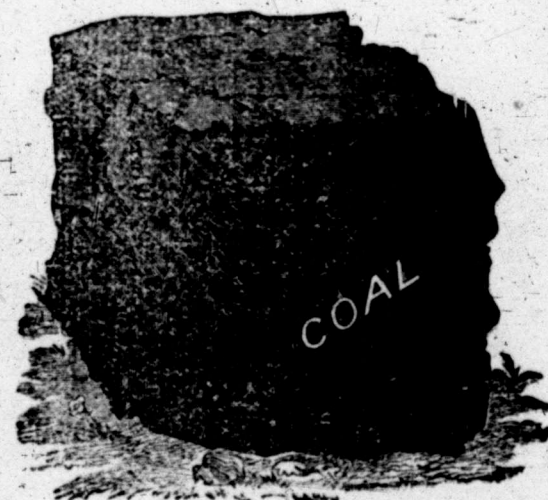

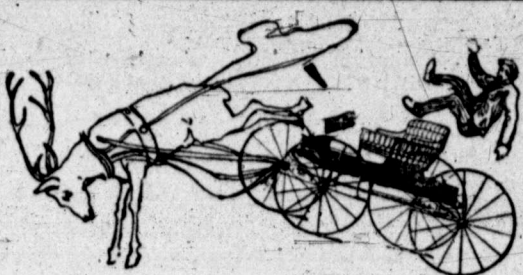

Joe Foster was marketing his second crop of alfalfa this week at \$12 per ton. He informs us that this crop was harvested just four weeks from the time of harvesting the first crop and is considerably better than the first, both as to quality and quantity.

Commissioners' court holds its second equalization meeting next week. At its last meeting the rendition of taxes reported by the assessor were reduced in many instances and raised in the others, the net raise in valuations being in the neighborhood of \$86,000.

D. Brown, the Houston street carpenter, has built sixteen heavy pews for the district court room which have been put in place this week. These are to substitute the damaged seats which have been in use for the last fifteen years or more. 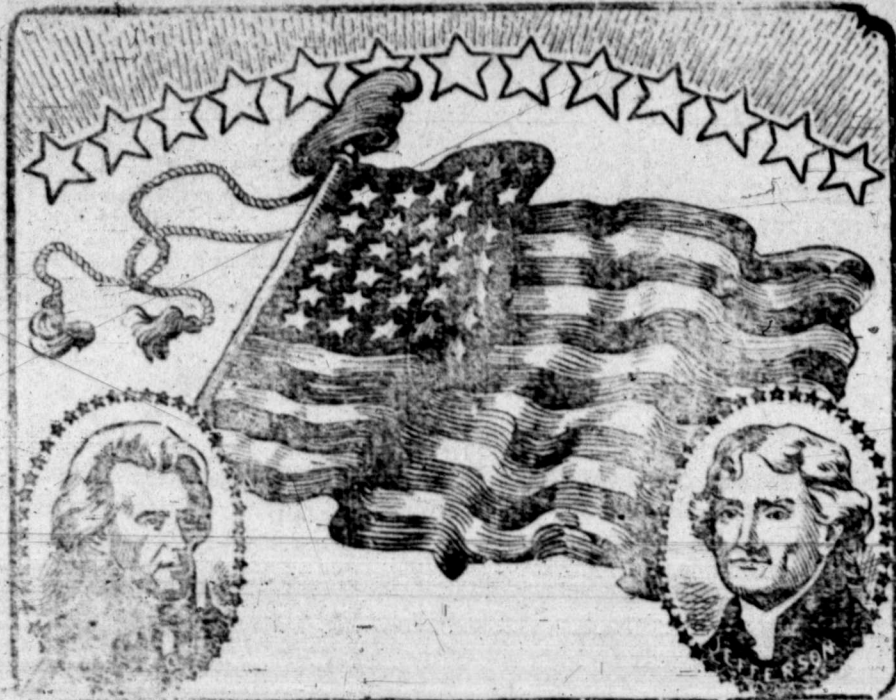

**Railroad Observations.**

**TO THE NEWS:**  
 For the last six months there has been much talk and observation about Canyon City railroad prospects. To me the prospect is very much brighter now than heretofore. I am fully persuaded that the Santa Fe will build its round house and machine shops here whether it builds from Panhandle to Amarillo or from Washburn to Canyon City and by way of observation I might add that it will build from Washburn to Canyon City. Now there are two whys, after which comes an interrogation point.

First, Why will the round-house and machine shops be built at Canyon City? Easy to perceive. There is no town on the Santa Fe railway within the Panhandle that has its super abundant supply of soft water— from 40 to 120 feet enough to supply any want of a city of 100,000 people. Besides this inexhaustible supply of underground sheet water there is on the south and north of Canyon City creeks or canyons with fine running water—the north canyon especially is fed by ever-living springs of soft, pure water the year around in great abundance. We have the finest drainage of any town on the line and are so situated that some day Canyon City will have more manufacturing than all the rest put together. We can furnish a million gallons of water to Amarillo—one thousand. We get it from 60 to 120 feet; Amarillo from 250 to 800 feet. Of course on the canyons we get water at from 12 to 10 feet. There will be a railroad in the near future built from Canyon City southeast by Floydada on to connect with the T. & P. Ry. in the vicinity of Abilene. We have the outlets from here over the Santa Fe and will have two more, one via Washburn and one southeast. This will be a central point.

The railroad track will never be taken up from Washburn to Panhandle. Railroad people are not in the habit of saying what they will do—they always say the other thing. They have been intimating strongly that they are going from Panhandle to Amarillo, thereby necessitating the taking up of the Washburn line; but this gives me a clew by which I say they will never do it. The first thing to be done is the grading from Washburn to Canyon City. Railroad people are business people and we may suppose that they will not add four miles to their trackage over greater grades and take up a whole chartered railroad in order to do it with a long legal fight in the courts between Washburn and the railroad and then, too, if this fight should be decided in

favor of removal, to defend a hundred suits by individuals. Will they do it? No, and you may be sure of it. Mark it—Canyon City by January, 1908, will have a real boom.

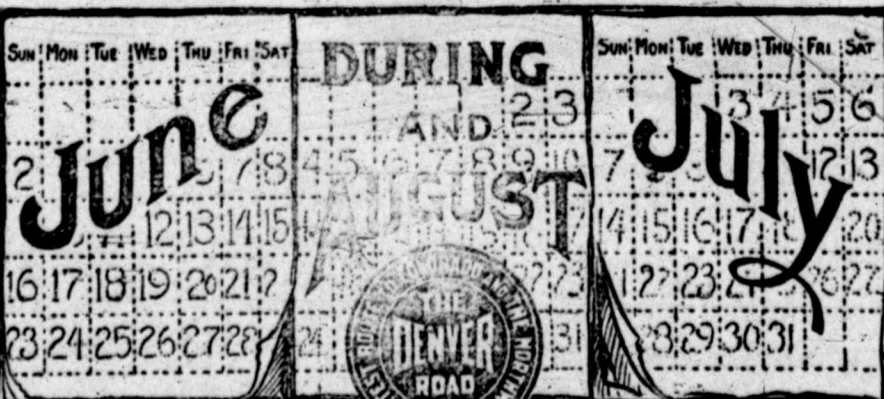
