### Facts About Weather.

The Farmers' Club of the American Institute has issued the following rules for forecasting the weather:

1. The wind never blows unless rain or snow is falling within 1000 miles of you.
2. When cirrus clouds are rapidly moving from the north or northeast, there will be rain inside of twenty-four hours no matter how cold it is.
3. Cumulous clouds always move from a region of fair weather to a region where a storm is forming.
4. When the temperature suddenly falls, there is a storm forming south of you.
5. When the temperature suddenly rises there is a storm forming north of you.
6. Cirrus clouds always move from a region where a storm is in progress to a region a fair weather.
7. When cirrus clouds are rapidly moving from the south or southeast, there will be a cold rain storm on the morrow, if it is in summer; if it is in winter, there will be a snowstorm.
8. Whenever heavy, white frost occurs, a storm is forming

within 1000 miles north or northeast of you.

9. The wind always blows in a circle around a storm, and when it blows from the north, the heaviest rain is east of you; if it blows from the south, the heaviest rain is west of you; if it blows from the east, the heaviest rain is south of you; if it blows from the west, the heaviest rain is north of you.

The following are excerpts from Bryan's lecture, "The Prince of Peace": "Much as I delight to discuss politics, I have a greater delight in discussing the things of religion. Religion is larger than politics. No matter what the people nor where the country, the presentation of the simple truths of the Christian religion always has a ready audience. We may forfeit the blessings of a good government by the practice of bad moral conduct, but even a bad government is not without its blessing when the people are true. In any place the discussion of governmental principles can interest but a limited section and a few people, while the subject of religion applies to all. A political movement cannot become effective unless it influences a majority, but the presentation of religious truth, even if it reaches but a single person, has accomplished much." "Let no young man deceive himself with the belief that later he can adjust the relations between himself and God. When a man has reached maturity

ty he has done that already, and whatever his attitude a change will amount to a revolution." "I don't understand all things in the bible, but there are enough things we can understand to keep us busy and prevent a bother about the others. The belief in the future life is taught by the tongue of everything God has made." "The scientist knows a great deal, but he does not know all about creation. I once weighed the seed of a watermelon. It took 5000 such seed to weigh a pound. But one such seed had taken off its jacket and gone to work and had produced a watermelon 200,000 times its weight, with green and white for a rind and red for a core, and hundreds of other seeds as large as itself and as capable of doing over again the same work. Yet the scientist cannot explain this: Whence does the flavoring extract come from? Whence the coloring matter? Until a scientist can explain the laws of the watermelon let him not essay to suggest what God would do or would not."

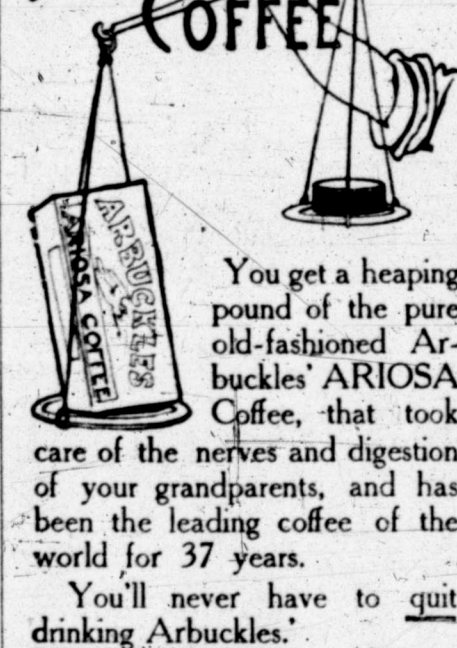

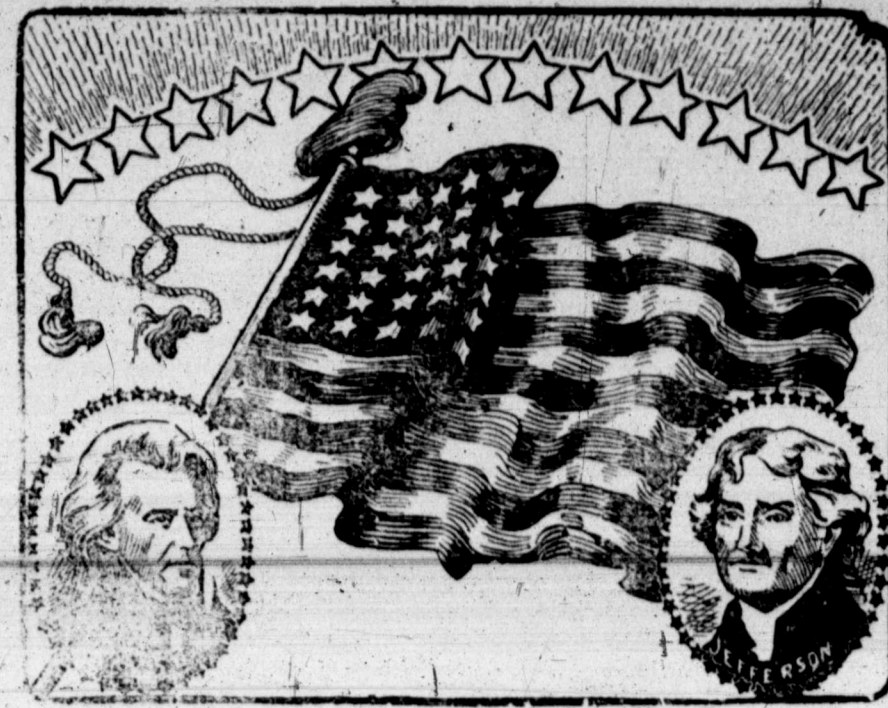

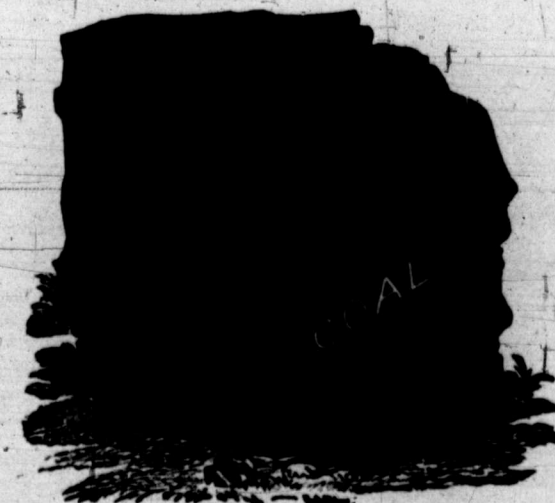
