Dimmitt Canning Center To Open Monday, July 31

The Dimmitt canning center will open for canning Monday morning, July 31. The lady in charge will be Mrs. Jim Elder. The plant will open at 9:00 A. M. and close at 5:00 P. M., until a better schedule can be arranged.

Saturday afternoon the canning room will be open for inspection by the public, and you may make arrangements to begin canning Monday morning. This center is equipped with new equipment. The material is about the same as that used in larger centers over the United States. Sealers, canners and burners are all new and of the latest design. This plant should have around an 800 can capacity per day.

Many of these centers are in operation over the South Plains. The plant at Lockney has been operating with a great degree of success for the past two years. The plant now cans several thousand cans of food per day. Our little plant is not as elaborate as this one, but it could be. The funds came from the same place that our did. The best way to persuade the O. S. Y. A. program to place more canning equipment in Dimmitt is to use what we have and to show the official representing that program that we have a use for the equipment. If people use this center this summer more than likely we can have a much more elaborate one next year. The equipment we have on hand is good so you shouldn't wait for a better plant. I just wanted to remind you of the fact that we might be able to build a bigger plant if you patronize this one.

This plant isn't to be a school. It is not intended as instructional. You can your own food for your own use in whatever manner you like. Mrs. Elder will be glad to give as much information as she can to anyone who desires it.

Last Rites For Mrs. J. Z. Smith Held Here Wednesday

Funeral services were conducted today, Thursday, for Mrs. J. Z. Smith, 91, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. C. B. Hughes at Cleburne July 26. Mrs. Smith had been in ill health for the past several years and had been critically ill for the past four weeks. Last rites for Mrs. Smith were held at the Dimmitt Methodist church with the pastor, Ural S. Sherrill, officiating. Assisted by Rev. C. W. Williams, Pastor of the Dimmitt Methodist Circuit. Interment was made in the Dimmitt Cemetery.

Mrs. Smith, with her family moved to Castro county in 1905, and she had made her home here until 3 years ago when she went to Cleburne to live with her daughter. She was truly one of the pioneers of Castro county and the great plains country, having suffered all the hardships contingent to the settling and developing of a frontier land fraught with hazards and discomforts as only early day settlers of the plains country experienced.

Laura A. Huckstep was born in Osage county Mo., in 1853 where she grew to young womanhood. She was married to J. Z. Smith in 1872. The family moved to Hunt county, Texas, from Missouri in 1888, where they resided until 1905 when they moved to Castro county from that time until three years ago when she went to Cleburne to live with her daughter. Mr. and Mrs. Smith were the parents of six children, five daughters and one son, all of whom survive, except one daughter. They are: Mrs. R. B. Johnson of Childress, Mrs. McCormack of Wichita Falls, Mrs. Lucy Whitcomb of Houston and Mrs. C. B. Hughes, and Mr. Glenn Smith of Dimmitt. Mrs. Smith was preceded in death by Mr. Smith in 1934. She is also survived by nine grand children and four great grandchildren. She joined the Methodist church early in life and continued in that fellowship until death.

Mother Turner Celebrates Her 81st Birthday



As the morning advanced, on July 22, 1944, there began gathering at the home of Mrs. R. A. Turner (Mother Turner, as she is familiarly known) quite a crowd of people, and by the noon hour a sufficient number had gathered to do ample justice to the outs that had been prepared by the different ones in celebration of the occasion in the person of her sons and daughters and grand children.

Mother Turner is one of the few of the first settlers of the county still living, having settled with her husband and then small family by homesteading a tract of 160 acres of land about 2 miles N. E. of the present town of Dimmitt.

At this time she is the only living resident charter member of the First Baptist church of Dimmitt, which she helped to organize in 1891 or 93 years ago, and of which she has been a member since.

Mother Turner has been, up until about the last year, very active in life, and still takes quite an active interest in affairs, enjoys going to church, visits and fellowship of friends and her children, although not able at this time to get about as lively as she once did. She is the mother of 11 children—5 sons and 6 daughters, all of whom are living and were present for this occasion, excepting one son, Dixon L. of Graford, Texas, and two daughters, Mrs. Nellie Jones of Albuquerque, N. M., and Mrs. Geo. Burch of Dimmitt, prevented from attending by illness.

She received many tokens, expressions of love, congratulations, and well wishes from friends and relatives for all of which she says to each and all, "Thank you and may God's richest blessings rest and abide with you all."

Infantile Paralysis Precautions Urged

"Infantile paralysis can be expected to occur more frequently during the next three months," declared Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. "This disease is always more frequent during the hot months."

"The germ responsible for infantile paralysis is so small that it escapes detection even with the most powerful microscopes. The first symptoms are usually vomiting, headache, fever, stiffness of the neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. Complete recovery may follow such an illness, but in more severe cases, the germ penetrates the nervous system, resulting in paralysis of nerves controlling one, or more, groups of muscles. Some remarkable recoveries have been noted.

"Flies, or other insects, while under suspicion, have not been demonstrated to play a part in the spread of this disease. Infection spreads from person to person with the droppings attending coughing and sneezing. Children and grown people that are healthy may be carriers of the germ. When present in epidemic form, about one child in each hundred is apt to suffer an attack.

Early recognition and diagnosis are essential. The use of immune serum may be a factor in preventing paralysis. A period of complete rest is essential for muscles that are affected. If parents note any symptoms of illness in their children, the family doctor should be consulted at once."

Soil Conservation News

Phillip Jones of the Sunnyside community is having his irrigation system re-designed by district engineers. A conservation plan has been made recently on his farm. It includes conservation crop rotation, contour planting, crop residue management, improved methods of irrigation water application, tillage for impounding water, and proper stocking of grass land. The crop residue management is being done this year on wheat land by the use of sweeps so that all straw and stubble will remain on the surface as long as possible.

M. B. Benton has added a quarter section to his farm and has asked for district assistance in putting a well-rounded conservation plan on it. A plan for his farm was worked out in 1942 and its application was started in 1943. Conditions have been such that the entire plan has not been established on the land,

Stork was successful in his campaign for re-election as commissioner of precinct 4, the only three incumbents in county being opposed for re-election.

Mrs. Ola T. Murphy was re-elected county and District Clerk, without opposition as was Mrs. Faye E. Holland, County Treasurer. A comparatively light vote was polled in the county, as was indicated by the slight interest manifested during the campaign. A large crowd was present Saturday night, however, to witness the returns of county officers as they were placed on the large bulletin board on the courthouse lawn. The largest vote polled in the county was 1085 for County Treasurer Mrs. Faye E. Holland, and that was out of a possible 1406 qualified voters.
