WOULD USE WATER FROM RANDALL COUNTY

SISTER CITY OF AMARILLO ARRANGING TO PIPE WATER SUPPLY FROM PALO DURO.

Kansas City Corporation Makes Amarillo Proposition to Supply Plainly of Water for Their Use.

For some time our sister city of Amarillo has been having to solve the water problem of that city and as it is a growing city it has come to the point when adequate water supplies are absolutely essential for the present needs as well as the future growth.

During the past week a corporation of Kansas City has made Amarillo a proposition to install a new system of waterworks and to supply the water from RANDALL COUNTY. It is proposed to dam the Palo Duro about eight miles northwest of this city and then pump the water from there to the mains near the city. As the Palo Duro is filled all along with good springs this will give an adequate supply of water for the use of the town for many years however the great growth that it may have.

Such an enterprise if it is installed will cost lots of money but the expense does not count if a good supply of water and a fine quality may be had. As stated the Palo Duro is fed by springs and the proposed dam will give a supply of millions upon millions of gallons of water. It would supply a city of approximately 500,000 people and the water would be good. According to the proposed plans which are still in embryo the dam would be built at a point where the two walls of the canyon come close together giving short dam. The dam itself would be about fifty feet high thus giving an area of water the full width of the canyon and extending back for about six miles.

INCREASE IN COUNTY SCHOLASTICS.

Tabulated Statement Shows Material Increase in Number of Children Entitled to School Money.

County Judge A. N. Henson has this week completed the work of compiling the names of the children in Randall county who are entitled to public free school money from the state for the next year. For the county there is an increase of nearly twenty per cent over that of last year which is quite a percentage and goes to show just how rapidly the county is developing. True, good schools have brought many to the county who would have located at some other point.

The consolidated rolls which Judge Henson has just completed and forwarded to Austin shows that there are 317 of scholastic age within the Canyon City Independent District and 391 in the rural districts making a total of 708 for the entire county. Last year 285 were registered within the Canyon City Independent district while there were 304 in the rural districts, an increase in the city of 32 and of 87 in the country, and a total for the whole county last year of 589.

Building Large House.

Work was begun this week on a large eleven room residence for David Thomas on West Chestnut street in this city. The house is located on the same block as the Presbyterian manse and is to be well built and of a design that will make the building an attractive addition to the residences of the city.

MRS. PARK IS KILLED.

Instant Death is Caused by Defective Electric Light Wiring—Popular Lady Drops Dead.

Canyon City has never been shocked as it was when on the evening of Friday, June 18, the report came to them that Mrs. David A. Park of this city had been instantly killed by electricity. Soon many people had gathered at the home on West Evelyn street to offer such assistance as they might be able.

The cause of the accident was evidently a defective electric light fixture in the milk house. Mrs. Park was cleansing milk vessels just at dark in the evening and, while her hand was still wet, she attempted to turn on the light. There was a blinding flash of light, a smothered scream from Mrs. Park and she fell back into the arms of her husband without a word, death having come immediately. Mrs. Park's hand had closed upon the bulb and in falling she tore the fixture from the ceiling of the room breaking the connection with the main line. The alarm was given and soon two physicians were upon the scene and did everything possible to revive her but to no avail.

Services were held by Rev. M. E. Hawkins, pastor of the Methodist church in this city of which Mrs. Park had long been a member, after which the body was taken to Amarillo where services were held at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Cartwright at 1816 Polk street at three o'clock Sunday afternoon, Rev. O. F. Sensabaugh conducting the services after which interment was had at the Llano cemetery near Amarillo.

Mrs. Park was the wife of David A. Park, cashier of the First National Bank of this city and was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. W. Cartwright of Amarillo. Mr. and Mrs. Park have resided in this city ever since their marriage and Mrs. Park stood at the very top as the favorite among the ladies of this city. She leaves, besides her husband and father and mother, two little girls, beautiful daughters, who will mourn the missing mother.

The sympathy which is extended to the bereaved family is universal. Mrs. Park's friends were limited here only by the number of people in the town. She was loved by all and her untimely death has cast a pall over the city.

PLAINS HOGS BRING HIGH PRICE.

Highest Market Price Ever Paid for Swine goes to Products of the Plains Stock and Feed.

Again the excellencies of our chosen country is shown when last week there was marketed at Fort Worth a bunch of hogs grown on the Plains which brought \$7.75 per hundred, the highest price ever paid on that market for killing hogs. This bunch of hogs was Plains raised and was fed entirely on products of the Plains, milo maize, Kaffir corn and alfalfa and is an additional evidence of the superiority of the feed as well as the country in which to raise such stock.

Everybody who knows anything about the markets know that when cattle and hogs which have been fed for market upon these feeds, are sent to the various markets, good reports of the sales are reported, in fact in nearly every instance the stock has brought the top price for the day.

YOUNG MAN IS DROWNED.

P. B. Carlisle of Happy Sinks Never to Rise Again—Long Search Before Body is Found.

Just at noon last Monday P. B. Carlisle of Happy was drowned in the Tierra Blanca just southeast of this city. Mr. Carlisle, together with Otis Malcolm and family and Charley June and sister of Happy camped on the creek last Saturday and remained there until about noon Monday when arrangements were made for their return home. It was suggested that before they go the men take a swim in the stream which is wide and deep at that place. Pulling off their shoes and keeping on the remainder of the clothes the three men entered the water and, using an old boat, spent about 15 minutes in bathing.

Just how the death of young Carlisle happened cannot be accurately told. It seems that his companions had hold of the boat and were in advance of Carlisle in going up stream. Carlisle was swimming behind, and one of the ladies noticed him gradually sink without any extra struggle, the lady thinking that he was diving. When the attention of the other two gentlemen was called to him he could not be seen. Swimming back Mr. Malcolm saw his body about four feet under water and reached him, catching him by the hair. He swam to the old boat and in attempting to raise the body from the water the boat was turned over throwing Mr. Malcolm under the water at which time he lost his hold on the body of Carlisle and he could not be found again at once.

An alarm was immediately raised and a large crowd went out from this city to assist in the search and it was nearly four o'clock before the body was located. It was immediately brought to this city after the various methods of resuscitation had been applied. The corpse was taken to the undertaking establishment of Thomas Bros., and embalmed and prepared for burial. Telegrams were sent to his relatives and notification was sent to have the body shipped to Clarksville, Tennessee, for interment, which was done Tuesday afternoon, Charley June of Happy, one of the gentlemen who was with the deceased at the time of the accident, accompanied the remains to their last resting place.

P. B. Carlisle was a young man who came to Happy from Kansas City a little over a year ago and engaged in the lumber business at that place. At the time of his death he was book-keeper for the P. J. Neff Lumber Co. He was one of the most model young men in point of character in this section of the state, made friends with everyone whom he met and was therefore very popular. His untimely death has cast a gloom over those who had met him and they all condole with his bereaved brothers and sisters, who alone survive him, as he was unmarried, and his father and mother were dead.

W. S. Keiser has just returned to this city from an extended trip to Seattle, Washington, and points along the Pacific coast. When seen by the News reporter Mr. Keiser said: "Yes, I have just gotten back and I am glad of it. While I have been gone I visited and looked over some fourteen or fifteen different states and in that entire district I found nothing that would compare with the Panhandle for a productive soil, healthy climate and general prosperity. The Panhandle and Randall county leads them all."

BIG ALFALFA PALACE FOR MAIN BUILDING.

AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITS TO BE HOUSED IN NOVEL EDIFICE DURING NEXT FAIR.

Unique Building of Large Dimensions is Planned to be Built from Randall County Hay Products.

If the present plans of the committee having in charge the reunion and county fair of this county which is to be held on August 24 to 26, do not go awry there will be something of a novelty presented in the way of a building this year, something that will be representative of one of the great products of the country as well as being of a beautiful appearance. Plans have been made for an exhibit hall for the showing of the farm products, the hall to be 44 feet by 48 feet on the outside, but the principal attraction of it is that, it is to be constructed of baled alfalfa almost the same as would a brick building. The design has a beautiful exterior having four large alcoves, one at each corner. The front of the building is to have a colonial effect with large columns and a flat colonial portico.

The size and shape of the proposed building together with the beautiful green color of the alfalfa will make it something that will be very attractive and in addition will be large and roomy and of good county-advertising value. The expense of construction also will be very light as a number of alfalfa raisers near this city have agreed to donate the use of the baled alfalfa for the building.

Speaking of the reunion and fair meeting one of the members of the executive committee stated to the News reporter that arrangements were being made for the largest and best entertainment ever held in this part of the state. Notable speakers have signified their acceptance of the invitation to be present and address the people on that occasion and that the farm and other exhibits bid fair to be greater than ever before. That while no premium list had as yet been issued there would be a premium offered on almost every class of product that could be grown in the country—and that means everything. In the live stock department already arrangements are being made for temporary sheds for the protection of the animals which will be exhibited and good premiums are to be offered.

Farmers all over the county are interesting themselves in the success of the entertainment and when these entergetic people get busy everybody knows that something extra will be on hand. Altogether this exhibition should be much better than any ever held in the Panhandle.

Something in the Fish Line.

On Tuesday of this week J. F. Hood and Oscar Smith, together with some of their boys, went to the Tierra Blanca about a mile from this city and before noon caught—and brought to town so that they might prove it, over three hundred fish, and they caught them with hooks and lines too. Election Order.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Canyon City, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned: THEREFORE, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City that an election be held on the 15th day of July, 1909, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted: Shall the City Council of the City of Canyon City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00)

Dollars, payable in forty years after date, with option of redeeming them at any time after twenty years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a waterworks and sewer system, within the limits of said City.

Said election shall be held at the New Court House in Canyon City, Randall County, Texas, for Wards No. 1, 2, & 3, of said city, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as managers of said election: E. A. Uptold, shall be presiding judge, J. F. Hood, shall be assistant judge, S. A. Shorwell, shall be a clerk and I. L. Van Sant, shall be a clerk of said election.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the 26th Legislature, Laws 1899, and duly qualified voters, who are property tax payers of said city, shall be allowed to vote, and all voters, desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds, shall have printed on their ballots the words "For the issuance of bonds" and those opposed shall have printed on their ballots the words "Against the issuance of bonds." The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

HEALTH OR SICKNESS?

There seems to be very little interest manifested in the forthcoming city election in which it is to be determined whether or not we shall jeopardize our lives henceforth or shall take steps looking to the betterment of the city for all time to come. We have reference to the election to be held on 15th instant relative to waterworks and sewerage bonds. Just at this time the eyes of the entire state is turned toward Canyon City on account of the great fight she is making for the location of the West Texas State Normal college which is to be decided in a short time and the outcome of this election will no doubt have a great deal to do with the determination of the location of that school. Even should the school not be located here it would advance the healthfulness of the city to such an extent that it will pay the citizens of the town well. If you doubt that some of the outhouses of this city are filthy just come and take a look with the editor. He will show you something that will amaze you if you have not investigated. Our water is daily being polluted and as the city grows it gets worse. Some people may say they are not going to vote for the proposition because the system will not reach their individual places. God help such people. They cannot see that it would be but a short time until their particular street would be so well populated that necessity would demand that the system be extended to them. Such an excuse is puerile in the extreme and shows a great lack of investigation.

Some time ago in discussing this matter, a writer in these columns stated that the issuance of bonds would eventually place the city in the hands of a receiver "as a number of other cities of the state have been placed." The editor investigated the matter and has in his office a letter from the Attorney General's department at Austin in which it is stated that their records do not show that a single city or town in the entire state had been placed in the hands of a receiver "on account of any bonds having been issued by any such city or town." It would not place the city in a position to be placed in the hands of a receiver—it would but tend to upbuild the town so that there need be no fear of any such calamity.

It is full time that something should be done or it will be brought to our notice that every single town in the Panhandle is

more progressive than we and it will hurt the pride of the editor and the progressive citizens to have to acknowledge such a position. This might not have any influence with some of the parsimoniously inclined who does not want this town to grow we have reason to expect, but it would hurt that progressive element in the town who have done the work of upbuilding the city and its enterprises. Such talk may cut some to the quick but that is the intention of the article. It will set some to thinking and if the people will give the matter unbiased investigation and will then give a good and valid reason why he should individually not vote for the measure then he is excused from the class but the reason must be forthcoming. We want to say right here that very, very few of those who have spoken out against the measure, have made any investigations at this office of the extent of the system proposed. They are just simply "fernist" anything that will build up the town and that is all there is to it. Don't you think so? Health or sickness, which?

It is announced that a citizen of Amarillo has stated that there is a field of gas located within twenty miles of that city. The article does not state anything about the quality except that it is "natural gas." We wonder just how close it to Amarillo and if it is stuff that will burn or is it that exhuberance of a nifty tongue often called "hot air." If it is the latter a whole lot less than twenty miles would cover the main field.

Texas As It Is.

We had a letter some time ago from a party in Kentucky making inquiries as to class of people that inhabit West Texas. From the trend of his inquiries the gentleman evidently thinks the days of Indian massacres are not over in this country and that the fictitious tales of the "wild and woolly west" are as true as gospel. Among other things, he wishes to know if the cowboys give much trouble with their wild and reckless behavior. We hated to knock the props from under his ideal, imaginary cowboy outlaw, but we were compelled to inform him that the cowboys of West Texas today is of the educated country gentleman type and as a rule as well acquainted with and as ready to regard the rule of good society as are his neighbors in old Kentucky; that the cowman of West Texas never was and never can be surpassed in hospitality, in liberality and gentlemanly behavior; that, in short, Texas as a whole is populated with a refined and highly cultured class of people whose social qualifications will compare favorably with the people of any state in the union. It is strange, indeed, that there are still people in the east who insist on believing that West Texas is the home of outlaws and bandits and that a man who comes here leaves civilization far behind.—Shafter Lake Herald.



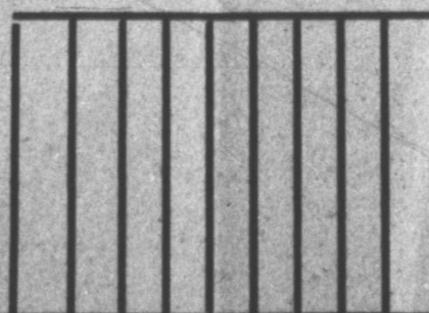
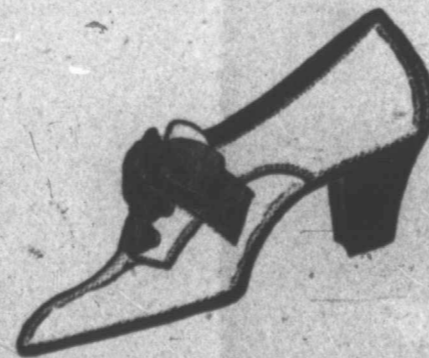
