In present-day farming, the real roblem is to know how well particular fertilizer is meeting the needs of a crop, he says.

Hottel pointed out that once farmer has embarked on a fertilizer program, its value in meeting the needs of the crop from year year can be estimated by soil tests. Soil testing is a practical tool that tells you what you want to know about your soil before the trouble appears and before it's too late to correct it.

By following a regular program of soil testing, you can avoid loss in yield and low profits resulting from hidden hunger of your crops. Soil testing is the modern way to determine your fertilizer needs Soil test - don't guess, suggests the county agent. And, he adds, assistance and information in this subject are available from his of-
