GIRL SCOUTS OBSERVE THIRTY-FIFTH BIRTHDAY ON MARCH 12

On March 12, more than 46,000 Texas Girl Scouts joined with a million of their sister Scouts in the United States to celebrate the 35th anniversary of the founding of Girl Scouts.

Their anniversary theme "Better Citizens Build a Better World" is not quite 35 years old. Ten years ago there were fewer than 6,000 Girl Scouts in the whole of the state. This tremendous growth shows that Girl Scouting has become a part of Texas tradition.

Texas Girl Scouts this year are honoring troop leaders, sponsor groups, and other adults active in Girl Scouting. They will be cited for "National Service to Youth" and for helping girls to become better citizens to build a better world.

Locally the American Legion Auxiliary is due much credit for sponsoring and lending its financial support to the Dimmitt Girl Scout troop which is one of the most active and fastest growing troops in this area.

With a combined membership of 50 girls, the local Scout troop is headed by a council composed of Mrs. Woodson Brown, president; Mrs. George Bagwell, vice-president; Mrs. Ted Sheffy, secretary; Mrs. Leland Lee, chairman training committee; Mrs. M. B. Benton; Mr. Clarence Bearden, finance chairman.

Bain, dean of the School of Music at NTSC.

On March 7, the NTSC A Cappella Choir will present choral highlights from Gluck's opera "Orpheus," featuring the Houston Civic Ballet and the music of the Houston Symphony Orchestra, starring Anna Kaskas of the Metropolitan. Two NTSC faculty members, Robert McDonald and James Jackson, will be featured with the choir when they are presented with the Houston Symphony on March 8.

A group of over 200 students will be presented with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in Dallas on March 22.

LARGE BARN AT PHILIP ACKER FARM DESTROYED BY FIRE FRI. NIGHT

A large barn on the Philip Acker farm, seven miles east of Dimmitt, was destroyed by fire last Friday night at about 12 o'clock. The barn, 30x40 feet, contained 2000 bundles of feed. One registered Chester White sow and eleven pigs also perished in the flames. Loss from the fire was estimated at approximately \$2,000. The Dimmitt Fire Department went to the scene of the fire too late to combat the flames that destroyed the barn but took protective measures against the spread of the fire to other buildings on the farm.

Announce New National 4-H Awards Program

Announcement has been made of a brand new national 4-H home improvement awards program for 1947.

Among the program's objectives are to encourage club members to gain a knowledge of principles and materials involved in making the home more attractive and convenient at minimum cost; develop skill in painting and simple carpentry, and plan home improvements for beauty, comfort, health, privacy and safety in keeping with the needs of every member of the family. Participants will demonstrate to others what has been learned relative to home furnishings, rearrangements and interior decorating practices.

Both boys and girls who are bona fide members working under the supervision of the Extension Service and enrolled this year in a 4-H home improvement project or activity may participate.

Merit awards on county, state and national levels provided by Sears-Roebuck Foundation. County winners will receive silver medals of honor. The state winner's award is an educational trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, next November. Eight selected state winners will each receive the national award of a \$300.00 college scholarship.

County extension agents will furnish complete information regarding this new program.

The state winner will receive, also from the Simplicity Pattern Co., an all-expense trip to the 1947 National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago, next November. Each state winner participating in the National 4-H Dress Revue Presentation at the Club Congress will be given a \$25 U. S. Savings Bond.

In this activity, which is conducted under the direction of the Extension Service participants' outfits are judged on style and design, suitability of material to purpose and workmanship, becomingness of color and fit, and cost. Grooming, posture and poise of the participant are also taken into consideration. Complete information may be obtained from county home demonstration agents.

CLEO CLUB

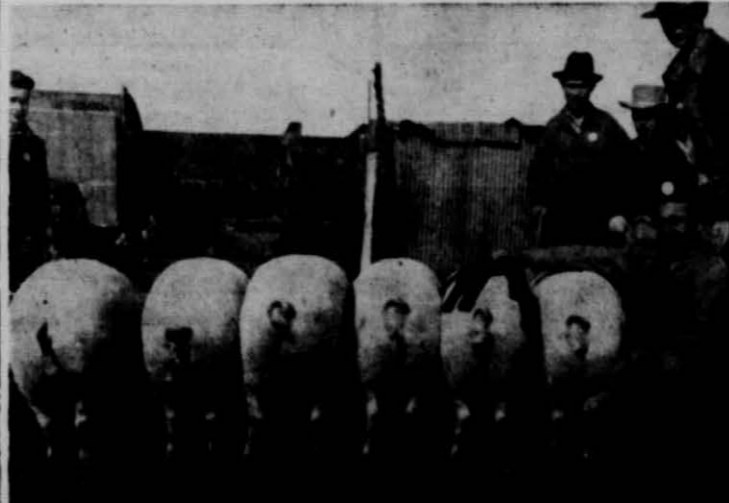

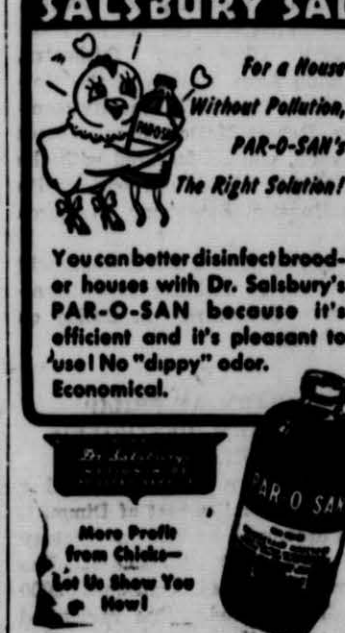

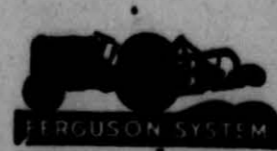
