## County Fair Gets Underway

This is the big week end of the year for competitive-minded farmers and fun-loving city dwellers. Once again the annual Castro County Fair has rolled around with its array of top-quality farm and home products and festive carnival rides and concession stands.

One of the big attractions from an entertainment standpoint is the Lone Star Carnival rides of Amarillo. These include five rides for both children and adults and have been operating since Monday night. The rides are 20 and 25 cents each.

As in years past, the major judging will center around Community and Individual Farm Products. Chairman of these divisions are Doyle Underwood and Rayphard Smithson.

Persons wishing to exhibit in this division should have their exhibits in place by 6 p.m. Thursday. Entries were made Tuesday. Community exhibit prizes will be \$10.00 for first; \$7.50 for second place; \$5.00 for third place; and \$3.00 for fourth place. To pay for prizes in all divisions, Dimmitt businessmen have purchased memberships in the Castro County Fair Association. They were given cards for displaying in their businesses.

Neatness and attractiveness will count heavily in judging of the displays.

A Champion Gardener and a Champion Farmer will be selected.

There will also be judging of 4-H and FFA livestock and women's and girl's handwork in the fields of canning, cooking, sewing and other endeavors.

Participation in the fair preparations have been excellent, according to several Fair Association officials. Most of the booths available have been spoken for.

The dunking board will be operated again this year by the Dimmitt JayCees. The Dimmitt American Legion will have the bingo; Nazareth FFA, the cat rack; Lions Club, the milk bottle rack; the Dimmitt FFA will have the record-breaking stand; the Teen-Canteen, the balloons and darts; the JayCee-Ettes, the novelty stand; the Garden Club will have the Bear Rack (tossing coins into a saucer on a stuffed bear's head), and the Dimmitt Catholic Church will serve cokes and other drinks at the fair.

A new attraction will be a shooting gallery operated by the Dimmitt Gun Club in the barracks building just east of the main fair building. This will be the first time for such an attraction at the fair.

Dimmitt Firemen will operate their portable concession stand, dishing out cold drinks, snow cones and other refreshments.

Serving meals at the Fair Grounds are the Castro County Home Demonstration Clubs. They will have regular \$1 plate lunches for the noon and evening meals Friday and Saturday and between times will serve light foods like sandwiches, pie and cakes along with coffee and koolade.

Highlighting the fair will be a fireworks display set for 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

According to Parade Chairman Earl Brock this year's Fair parade will probably be as good one. He said four or five floats had been entered early in the week and that more were expected. The parade will be at 10 a.m. Saturday.

In the contest department, there will be selected "The World's Champion Lady Nail Driver" at 8:30 p.m. Saturday, since it is the only such contest of its kind. Chairman Dick Reinhardt felt justified in taking the liberty of saying the winner would be a world's champion.

Taking nothing but a big mouth and a deep appetite will be the watermelon eating contest at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

## Bobcats Face Hereford Here Friday Night

The Dimmitt Bobcats had little trouble Friday night in running up a 24-6 score against the Lockney Longhorns, but injuries are costing the local team any edge it might have had over Hereford in the next game.

Dimmitt will play host to a visiting team for the first time this year Friday night when they meet their traditional gridiron enemies, the Hereford Whitefeaces, at 8 p.m.

This game will also furnish another first. It will be the first time the new rest room facilities at the field house will be ready for use by the public. The new field house is located just north of the west stands.

One of Dimmitt's speediest players, halfback Stanley Nelson, suffered a torn leg ligament which required sewing up following the game with Lockney. He will be out for the remainder of the season, although no permanent injury resulted. Also on the injury list and unavailable for the Hereford game are Jimmy Slough and James Collins, both of whom have shoulder injuries.

Hereford had a rough go of it Friday night when they played Canyon. The Eagles pasted Hereford with a 38 to 8 defeat in

## Local Option Vote Set for October 10

A local option election in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 has been called by the Commissioners Court for Saturday, October 10.

This will be the first such election here since November, 1936, when the entire county voted to continue its dry status.

From all present indications, the proposition to permit package store sales in Precinct 4 will be approved. One man involved in having the election called said this week that he felt every one of the 116 qualified voters who signed the petition would vote for liquor sales for off-premises consumption. This is almost half the total of 244 qualified voters in the precinct, indicating that only seven more affirmative votes of the remaining 128 would swing the balance. (Except in cases of local option, it is often a paradoxical occurrence for some of the signers of a petition for an election to vote against the issue.)

Excepted to be bitter opponents of legalized sale of alcoholic beverages in the county were several known bootleggers in East Dimmitt, Precinct 4. However, it was reported they were willing signers of the petition.

The law permitting the calling of this election is apparently somewhat confused. Local clergymen who are protesting the election, have said their legal advice indicated a county-wide election

could be held later to dry up the county, including Precinct 4. Legal sale proponents say this is not so, that the State Supreme Court decision in June gave precinct and municipal local option powers preference over counties.

The same Supreme Court interpretation has resulted in a rash of local option elections over the state. Petitions are expected to be filed in Southeast Lubbock county and Slaton on the South Plains by Monday morning. These petitions, like the one from Precinct 4, call for "off-premises consumption" or package stores.

There will be four polling places in Precinct 4. The exact places will be announced later, but they will be located in Arney, Jumbo Nazareth and northeast Dimmitt.

## Buses Leave Thursday at 1:30 p.m. For Experiment Station Field Day

Exact departure time was set this week at 1:30 p.m. for the buses taking local farmers and businessmen to the High Plains Experiment Station Field Day at Halfway Thursday, September 24.

According to trip arranger Steve Taylor, those wishing to make the trip should call No. 3 or 586 to make a reservation. There will be no charge for the trip and any seats not reserved will be given out at departure time on a first-come, first-served basis. The buses will leave from the East Side of the Court House Square.

The two buses will be furnished by New Mexico Transportation Company and will be paid for by local businesses. They will carry a total of 82 people.

The group will arrive at Halfway about 2:30 and will be given a guided tour over the Experiment Station. They will be given a free barbecue supper at 6:30 and will then return to Dimmitt.

This will be the third annual field day for the Experiment Station, which is an independent foundation owned and supported by farmers and businessmen of the High Plains. The tours will include such experimental research

Mr. Shambeck, 33, is married and he and his wife Velma Ruth, have two daughters, Debra, 6, and Brenda, 4. His family will join him here soon.

He is no stranger to the automobile business. He is past owner and operator of Shambeck Motor Company in Lubbock, the Edsel and Lincoln agency there. Prior to going into business in Lubbock he had operated the Buick dealership and Ford dealership in Tahoka. He will operate the Dimmitt firm personally, having relinquished his Lubbock dealership.

Shambeck said this week he was impressed with Dimmitt. The personnel working for Plains Motor Company will be retained by the new firm, he said.

Shambeck Motor Company will sell Ford automobiles, the Ford Thunderbird sports car and the new Falcon, a small economy car being introduced currently by Ford.

**Arney Election To Select New SCD Supervisor**

An election to name a member from Zone 1 to the Board of Supervisors of the Running Water Soil Conservation District will be held October 6 at 8:30 p.m. at the Arney School House.

Zone 1 is that area in the northeast corner of Castro County bounded on the south by Highway 87 from Nazareth to the Swisher County Line, north from this highway to the northeast corner of Section 228, block M-6, thence west corner of section 12, block M-7 and then north to the Deaf Smith County Line.

Presently serving as a member of the Board of Supervisors is M. L. McFarland. Other members of the board are G. W. Sanderson, chairman; Fred Ake, J. E. Burch, and Wade Mills.

**This Noisy World Is Bad for Health**

This is a noisy world we live in—there's no doubt about that. And things are getting noisier! Sounds like the loud radio next door or all of the neighboring kids enjoying their games with squealing delight and major offenders.

Medical experts show that noise where we work, where we live and sleep, where we travel to and from work can cut down our efficiency, impair our peace of mind, our health and our comfort.

Noise, they reveal, brings sleeplessness, tired nerves, and poor digestion.

Normal sounds in a business office will combine to create a noise that measures 60 decibels. A noisy office often hits 70 decibels.

A whisper five feet away amounts to 25 decibels. The loud radio next door probably registers 65 or more. An automobile horn blasted at you from a distance of ten feet jumps the count to 120 decibels, hurts your ears, and probably makes you mad. An ordinary conversation averages 50 decibels.

Occupational deafness seems to be more and more common. As our cities become noisier there is more deafness among road builders, bus and traffic drivers, printers and traffic policemen.

Organizations of employers and insurance groups are analyzing this hazard and beginning to develop control techniques.

Experts tend to agree that a sudden loud noise causes about the same reaction in a person as does a great fright and may be followed by a general feeling of depression and loss of vitality.

Surveys of the most annoying noises list automobile horns, squealing brakes, city buses, cut-outs and motorcycles as the worst offenders.

Close to the top among other objectionable sounds are those from overloud radios—that belong to someone else—factory whistles, rattling pneumatic drills and noisy games and parties.

Strangely enough barking dogs and yowling cats were not given as top annoying.

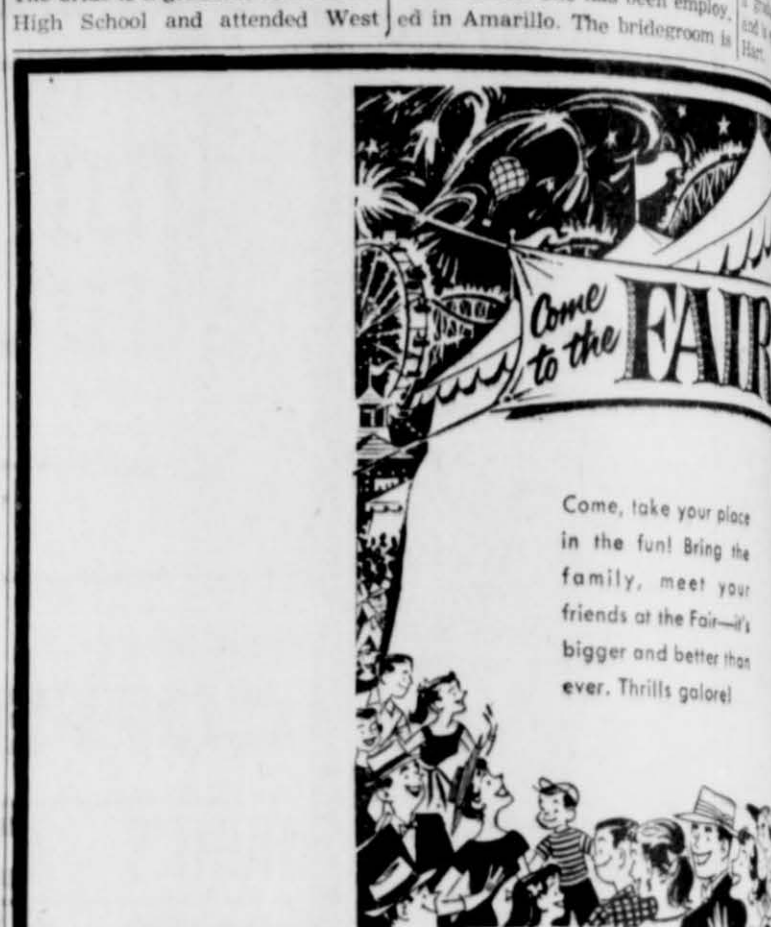

DRIVING SAFETY TO BE DEMONSTRATED. Students of Dimmitt High School will have an opportunity at 8:45 a.m. Thursday, September 17 to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile can give, can be overcome. The program is being brought to Dimmitt under the sponsorship of Castro County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend the lecture as well as the demonstration.

## DRIVING SAFETY TO BE DEMONSTRATED

The first section will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Vernon Gayle, Director of Safety (Assistant Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department). The first section will be a lecture, while the second will be a demonstration on Jones St. north of the school. Vernon Gayle will also demonstrate the correct and incorrect driving habits. High point of the demonstration will come, however, when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric horn which is mounted on the front bumper of the car will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency. The driver being tested will be signaled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied and the third when the car halts. 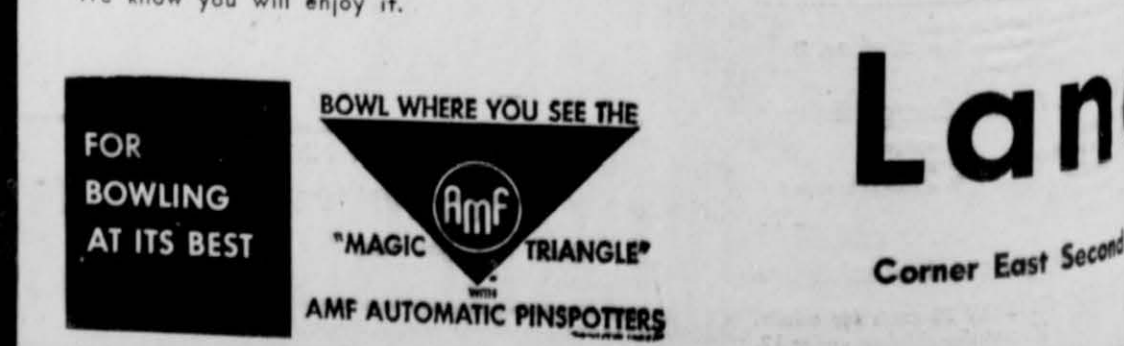

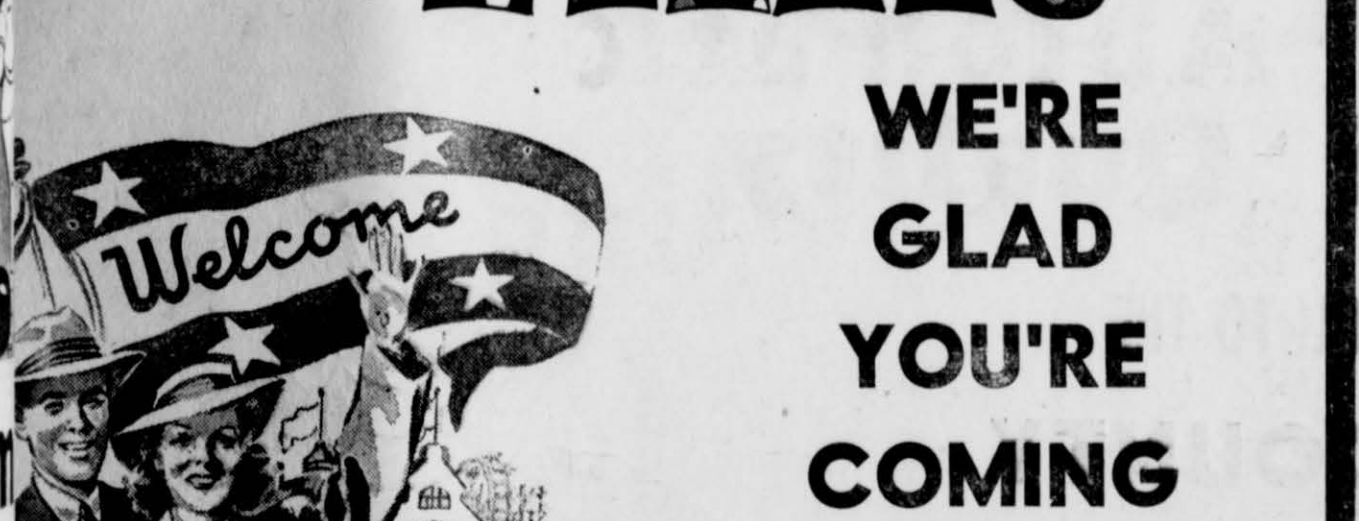

### Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Getting a beneficial law passed is a step-by-step procedure. A very important step has just been taken toward making a National Seashore Area on Padre Island in Texas. And the people of our state have a chance to help.

The Senate Interior and Insular

Affairs Committee will hold hearings in Texas later this year on my bill to create such a Seashore Area on the island. Senator James E. Murray (D-Montana) announced the decision to conduct the hearings after receiving a joint letter from senator Lyndon Johnson, Congressman John Young and Joe Kilgore, and myself.

Date of the hearings has not yet been set. The time must be agreed upon by the members of the committee and members of the Congress who are particularly interested in this proposal. Discussions are now being conducted to set an exact time for the hearings.

When the hearings are held, the people of Texas and the nation can help by showing the committee members how strongly they support the move to preserve for

public use this undeveloped beach, one of the last such areas in our country. Conservation, civic, fraternal and other organizations can aid with their support. Individuals can show their stand by petitions and letters. Local governments can issue statements.

The bill to create this National Seashore Area on Padre Island is the first one I introduced in this session of Congress. It was the fourth bill introduced in the Senate; it is Number 4. If a representative of your group or organization cannot attend the hearings personally, please send the resolution, petition, letter or statement to me at my office in Austin and I will be glad to present them to the committee members.

If we do not act soon to preserve the greater part of this island in the Gulf of Mexico be-

tween Corpus Christi and Brownsville, private exploitation will have ruined its natural beauty and its value as a wildlife refuge. Padre Island and the waters which wash its shores abound in fish and other wild life. The historic past of this strip of sand and grass has seen explorers, pirates, Indians, cowboys and many others pass that way.

Its chief drawing card is the wealth of recreational activities which it offers. Looking at the rest of our coastline, we can see the tremendous popularity of a National Seashore like Cape Hatteras, and we can see how private development ruins public enjoyment of the seaside. This nation's population is increasing rapidly. We must keep our recreational facilities apace.

With the support of Texans and others, Padre Island can become a new winter playground for the present and future generations.

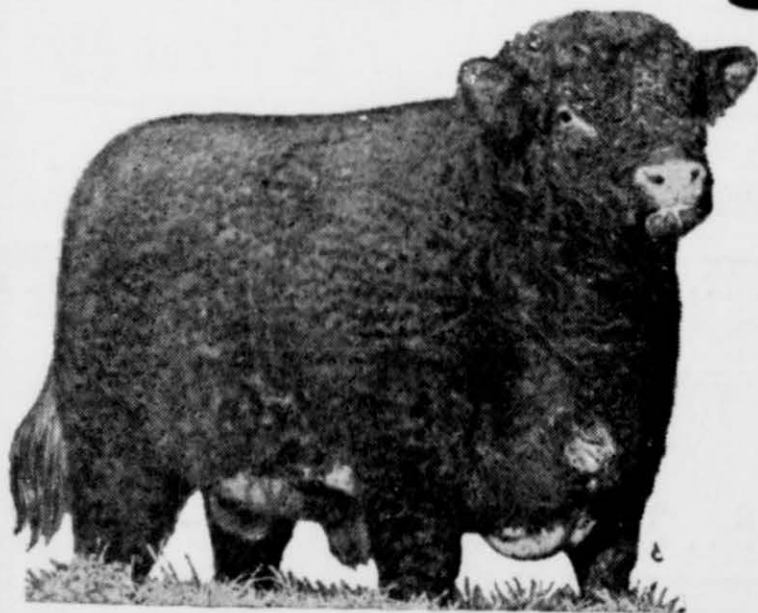
