WM. D. SMITH DEAD.
 Father of Oscar Smith Died Last Friday Morning—Sick for a Long Time.

Wm. D. Smith died Friday morning at the home of his son, Oscar, where he has been sick for several months. The body was shipped Friday evening to Temple where the funeral services were held Sunday. Mr. Smith has not been in good health for years and during the last days his suffering was intense.

Mr. Smith was 72 years of age and was born in Tennessee. He moved to Texas in 1882 and settled at Moody. During the past few years he has made his home in this city with his son.

Mr. Smith was a confederate soldier enlisting in Company F, Second Regiment Tennessee Infantry. He fought in the battle of Manassas near the opening of the war and was on duty during the entire four years.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, his membership being at Moody.

The old soldiers in the city accompanied the remains from the residence to the depot and on the casket was spread the flag of the Confederacy owned by the local Daughters of the Confederacy.

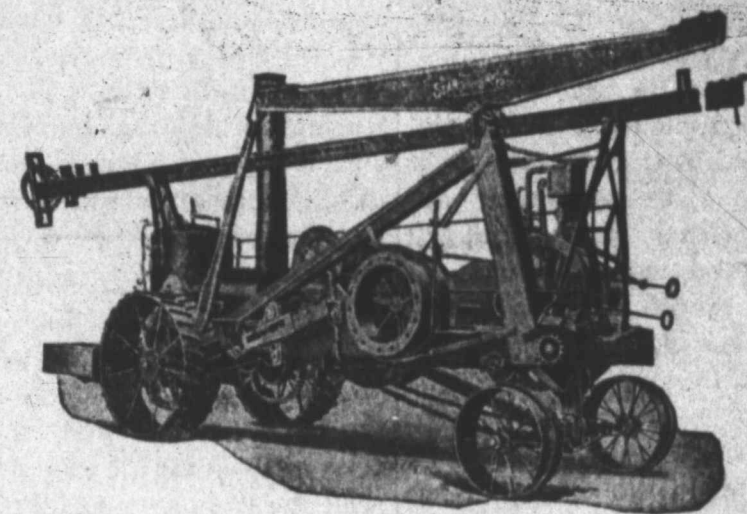

As long as there are newspapers there will be fools who think there ought to be more newspapers. As long as there are towns there will be big enough fools to think these towns ought to support his particular paper no matter how many other papers there are in the town. A newspaper in a town of less than 1000 inhabitants has a hard fight for existence. A town from 1000 to 3000 ought to support a good live newspaper. No town of less than 4000 inhabitants needs more than one good newspaper nor can it support more than one good one. There may be two newspapers in towns of less than 4000, but both papers will not be first-class. It takes a whole lot of money to make a good newspaper but some fellows can't realize it until they try to start a second paper in a one newspaper town.

President Cousins is going to ask the legislature for a new building for the Normal college. This will, of course, be done through the board of regents for normal schools and the board will no doubt recommend the same, but it may take some "rooting from the side-line" to get the appropriation through both houses. Every citizen in Canyon can help get this appropriation. It is every citizen's duty to assist in this matter. Sheep Pay.

To the Star (Stratford):

The sheep business is one of the most profitable in the United States for the amount invested, especially in a country where grass is cheap. Texas is a great sheep state and sheep men should get rich fast. Wool is a fine price and meat has got so high that there is always a good price for mutton. Good fat lambs sell from 8c to 10c per pound most of the year and good fat sheep from 4c to 6c per pound. A good wool sheep will shear from 8 to 10 pounds and good wool sells from 20c to 25c per pound. Eight pounds at 20c would be \$1.60 per head and good fat lambs weighing 60 to 70 pounds at 7c per pound would be \$4.20 per head. That is what the income on one ewe would be per year. These are reasonable figures on good stuff so it is easy to count a big profit. Take for instance 1,000 good breeding ewes that would cost \$3.50 to \$4.00 per head, say \$4,000 for 1,000 head. Each ewe with good care will raise one lamb. It is safe to count on that percent lambs for a great many ewes raise twins. If they were to come up to the above figures the lambs with the wool from

1000 ewes would be \$5800. Count \$40 per month for a man to care for them for a year, \$480, and the interest on \$4000 at 8 percent; \$320 all this taken from \$5,800 would still leave \$5,000. Count \$1000 for feed and \$1000 for loss

and you would still have \$3,000 from \$4,000 invested. Can one figure any line of business that is as safe with as little labor that will yield as much. Texas is one of the greatest sheep countries in the Union.

A good bunch of ewes will buy a good farm in three or four years. Men ought to take advantage and buy a bunch of ewes as free grass will not last always.

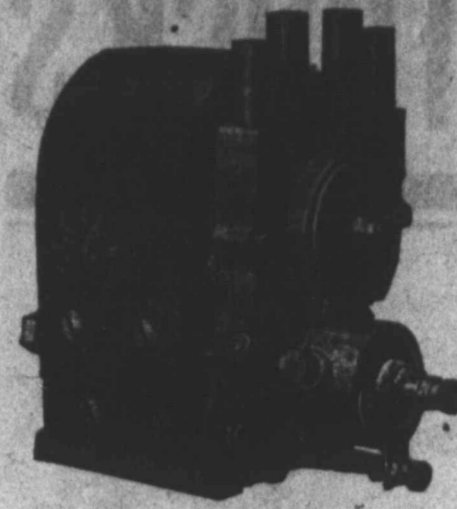

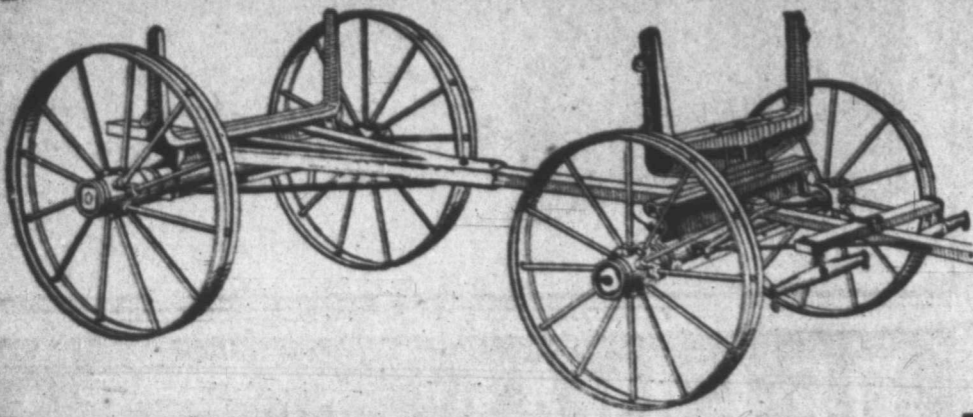

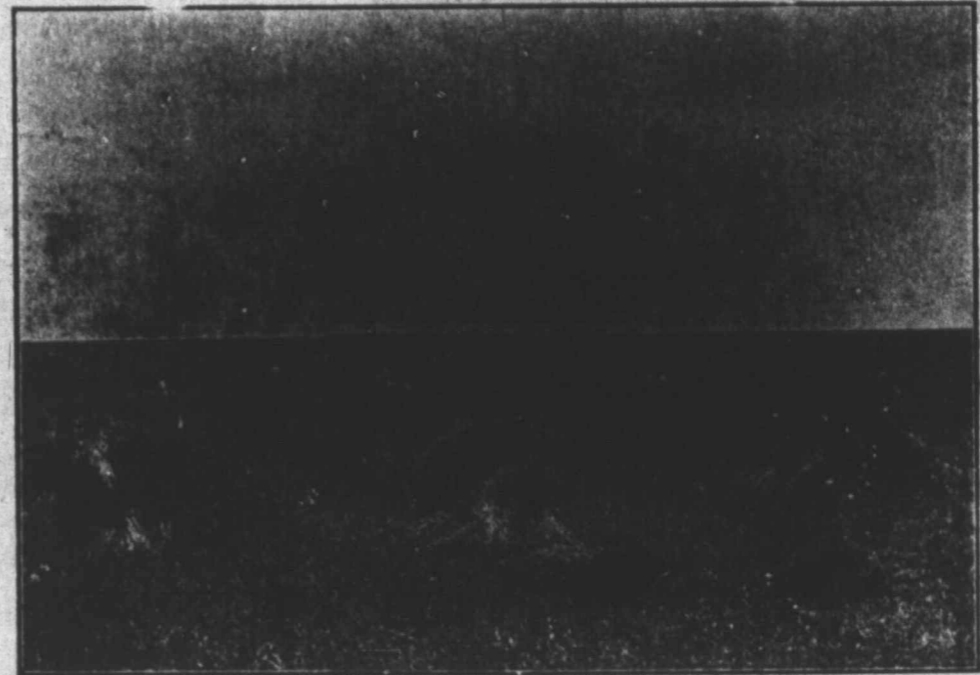
