President R. B. Cousins has filed with the state comptroller an estimate of the expenses for the Normal for the coming years thich amounts to $\$ 109,000$ fo 1913-4 and $\$ 52,500$ for 1913-4. In this report Mr. Cousins asks fo $\$ 50,000$ to build a new training school and industrial building. President Cousins feels confi dent that the appropriation will be passed by the legislature a
