

**Last Rites Pending For Mr. G. L. Blanton**

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday at 2:30 p.m. for Mr. George L. Blanton who died Tuesday night at 10:20 o'clock at the family home in Dimmitt. Services will be conducted from the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt with Dennis Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Blanton succumbed following an illness of two and one half months during which time he had been confined to the hospital and his home. At the time of his death he was 92 years and 8 months of age. Relatives are requesting that friends of the family make cash contributions to the Methodist church building fund, rather than making floral offerings.

George W. Blanton was born at Burnham, Johnson County, Texas, July 9, 1870, where he grew to young manhood. He was married to Miss Viola Burns 65 years ago last November. They were the parents of nine children, all of whom survive.

A resident of Dimmitt and Castro County for the past 34 years, Mr. Blanton first moved to the plains in 1916 settling at Lockney. His family moved to Dimmitt in 1928. He retired from farming some 10 years ago. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Linda Karen Kitty Robinson won the honor of representing the Panhandle in the National Science Fair this year at Albuquerque, New Mexico. Tom Garza was representative last year at Seattle, Washington.

This is a year of firsts in the Panhandle Science Fair in that the two representatives winning competed in the same division, "Medicine and Health". Also this is the first year for a girl to have the top place in the Regional Fair. This year, two girls are the winners. Pat O'Keefe, regional director stated at the awards ceremony, the boys were placed in the shade this year by the girls.

Kitty's exhibit was titled "Dietary Control of Ionizing Radiation." This exhibit, with Kitty and her sponsor, Mrs. Inez Robinson, will go to the national Science Fair which is International for the week of May 6-11.

Albuquerque has planned many interesting events for the finalists and their sponsors. Among the events are tours of Albuquerque, Santa Fe, White Sands Missile Range, Los Alamos Laboratories, Grants Uranium mines and Lovelace Foundation for Medicine and Research.

Speakers for the week will include Glen Seaborg of the A.E.C. and Walter Von Braun of U. S. Space program.

Kitty is a Junior in Dimmitt High School. She is a member of the Science Clubs of America, Future Scientist of America, Latin Club, F.H.A., Future Teachers of America and Dramatics Club. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Robinson. This is her fifth entry in the Regional Fair and her seventh entry in the local Science Fair.

The Robinson, mother and daughter, will be accompanied on their trip by the other regional winner, Cynthia Ann Platter of Pampa and her sponsor, Wendell Watson.

**Polio Drive Nets \$1,722.99 For Scholarship Fund**

Bill Barnett, coordinator of Castro County Polio Drive, has released the final report of the Sabin Oral Polio Types I, II and III.

Grand totals for the three drives include attendance, 10,456; donations, \$2,744.23; expense, \$1,021.24; and net for Scholarship Fund, \$1,722.99.

Attendance for Type I was 4,257 from the combined communities of Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth. Broken into sections the attendance report was South Grade School—2,279; Fire Station—565; Nazareth \$40; and Hart—573.

Total donations for the first drive was \$1,202.78. Divided into sections, the donations were South Grade School, \$748.95; Fire Station, \$81.38; Nazareth, \$241.20 and Hart, \$131.25. Expense of the Type I vaccine was \$460.99. Money netted for the scholarship fund was \$741.79.

Attending Polio Type II were a total of 3,408. According to stations, there were South Grade School, 1876; Fire Station, 427; Nazareth, 819 and Hart, 286. Total donation for Type II was \$368.50. Expense for Type II was \$284.65. Net collected for the scholarship fund was \$583.85.

Only 2,791 were present for Sabin Oral Vaccine Type III. Broken into sections, they were South Grade School, 1,450; Fire Station, 320; Nazareth, 750; and Hart 271. Total proceeds for the vaccine were \$672.95. Expenses were \$275.60. There was \$397.35 was collected for the scholarship fund.

**Assembly Of God Start Construction On New Church**

Construction was started Saturday morning on the new building for the Assembly of God Church according to Rev. Bill Elswick, pastor.

The foundation for the structure has been completed. The building will have 10 classrooms, auditorium, pastor's study and evangelist quarters. Two of the classrooms will serve the triple purpose of overflow auditorium, classrooms and CA Fellowship Hall.

According to Rev. Elswick, the entire building will cover 4500 feet of floor space. The auditorium is 40 feet by 58 feet with a 6-12 pitch roof. Educational department is 33 feet by 66 feet with a flat roof.

Construction has laminated beams, unideck ceiling and central heating and refrigerated air-conditioning throughout the building.

The complete brick structure is composed of eight-inch bricks. The building is valued at approximately \$60,000.

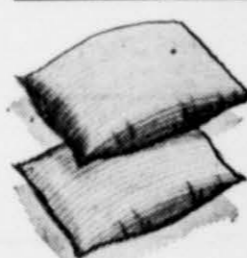
