\$43,213.21 TAXES WERE COLLECTED

433 POLL TAXES PAID IN RAN-DALL COUNTY THIS YEAR.

Taxes Collected up much Better this Year than Last-Very Little Left on Rolls.

Tax Collector, W. A. Jennings' office was the busiest place in town last week. Mr. Jennings reports that the total collection for the year has amounted to \$43,218.21, and that .433 poll taxes were paid. The amount of general taxes received the last week was very large as many of the large tax payers came in at the last hour, while nearly a third of the poll taxes were receives during the last week.



SWEET CORN. Fred Heller, of Kane, Ill., Tells Dr. Ingham about the Crop which is being Discussed. More light was shed upon the sweet clover question last week

when Dr. S. L. Ingham returned from Ohio where he had accompanied the remains of his sister. and on the way home stopped at Kane, Illinois to visit with Mrs. Fred Heller, formerly Miss Kitty Grimes, of this city. Mr. Heller is manager of a large dairy farm, is a practical man and a student of the different kinds of feed which are best adapted to his line of business and has studied the question thoroughly so as to get the best results from his dairy cows.

Dr. Ingham (reports, that Mr. Heller, said there is, absolutely no kind of grass or hay that is better for cattle than sweet clover. There are about 100 Jersey cows on Mr. Heller's farm and he uses sweet clover to a very large extent both for pasture and for winter hay. He reported that he has found no grass that the cattle like better and that no hay is a better milk producer than sweet clover. Mr. Heller stated that the hay must be cut at just the right time in order that the stalk does not become woody

by the indomitable spirit of our commander, the line officers worked incessantly in the welding together of their commands. I scarcely knew what sleep was, yet the importance of the coming movement of troops held me steadfast to duty. Word came to us early in June that Count d'Estaing, with a powerful French fleet, was approaching the coast. This surely meant that Clinton would be compelled to retreat across the Jerseys, and a portion of our troops were advanced so as to be within easy striking distance of the city the moment the evacuation took place. The remaining commands pressed farther north, near convenient crossings of the Delaware, prepared for a forced march across the British line of retreat. Maxwell's brigade, with which I was connected, even crossed the river in advance, co-operating with General Dickinson and his New Jersey militia. All was excitement, commotion, apparently disorder, yet even amid that turmoil of approaching battle, Hamilton recalled my request, and granted me two days' leave. "Was the Tory officer named Grant?"


He stared at me in surprise.
