## MORE ABOUT FETERITA

The News presents a second article on feterita as published by the Oklahoma Agricultural
Department.
The following is a letter from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station:
Experimental work thus far with this crop indicates that it is perhaps somewhat more resistant to drouth than milo. It has the advantage over milo in that it always produces erect heads and has white seed. Some considerable work has been done at the
Chillicothe station towards seChillicothe station towards seuring a uniform strain of feteri-
While considerable progress has been made,feterita is not yet
uniform grower either in a uniform grower either in
height or maturity. A compariheight or maturity. A comparion between kaffir and feterita grown in the same season is hardly fair, inasmuch as there is such great difererence in the wo crops. Feterita is compa crops. Feterita is compara the general habit of growth and time of maturity of the two crops is nearly identical. There is justification for statements that eterita will give much greater jields than dwarf milo. The present indications are that when a uniform strain is secured one might reasonably expect as great yields, or slightly greater from this crop.
