## Certificates by Junior Colleges.

The following letter was send The following letter was send by Pres. R. B. Cousins. The let ter was headed: "Shall Junior colleges under Texas state law have the privileges of temporary certificates now granted in col leges of the First class," ans wered in the negative.
It is a well established principle in this country that church and state should perform separate and distinct functions. The preparation and certification of teachers for the state's' public chools is certainly not a church affair. It would be unwise tor ally belongs to the state schol to the Roman Catholic schools and its schools. It is equally un and its schools. It is equally un
wise to turn it over to any branch or branches of the Protestant churches. This proposed legisla tion can have no other effect than to fan the fires of sectarian conflict which now seem to smould er. This is very much like chil dren playing with fire.
These sectarian "Junior Col leges" are in the main schools supported and patronized by the
respective denominations, in the respective denominations, in the
interest of these denominations. They are, in the main, weak in equipment and financial suppor They do not pay salaries suffici ently large to command goo teaching talent. (There are ho orable exceptions to this,
course.) It is doubtful if work equals the average first rate high school. It is proposed to add two years to these strug gling schools and thus enable them to prepare students for the Junior year in the University This is practically impossible The worst objection to this that they require the State Su perintendent of Public Instruc are all right," and to sase, "yo are all right," and to anothe you are not up to the standard.
