

Certificates by Junior Colleges.

The following letter was send to the members of the legislature by Pres. R. B. Cousins. The letter was headed: "Shall Junior colleges under Texas state law have the privileges of temporary certificates now granted in colleges of the First class," answered in the negative.

It is a well established principle in this country that church and state should perform separate and distinct functions. The preparation and certification of teachers for the state's public schools is certainly not a church affair. It would be unwise to turn over this work which logically belongs to the state schools to the Roman Catholic church and its schools. It is equally unwise to turn it over to any branch or branches of the Protestant churches. This proposed legislation can have no other effect than to fan the fires of sectarian conflict which now seem to smoulder. This is very much like children playing with fire.

These sectarian "Junior Colleges" are in the main schools supported and patronized by the respective denominations, in the interest of these denominations. They are, in the main, weak in equipment and financial support. They do not pay salaries sufficiently large to command good teaching talent. (There are honorable exceptions to this, of course.) It is doubtful if their work equals the average first rate high school. It is proposed to add two years to these struggling schools and thus enable them to prepare students for the Junior year in the University. This is practically impossible. The worst objection to this is that they require the State Su perintendent of Public Instruction to say to one of these, "you are all right," and to another, 'you are not up to the standard." An easy thing to say in the abstract but a difficult thing to do. This is too much embarrassing work to put on any consciencious. political state officer. AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF HOGS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF CANYON CITY, TEXAS.

Be It Ordained By the City Council of Canyon City Texas.

Sec. 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to keep confined in a pen or lot more than one hog within the plotted districts of Canyon City. and it will be unlawful for any person to keep any hog confined in a pen or lot within fifty feet of the residence or habitation of any person in said plotted district of said city.

Sec. 2. Every person keeping a hog in a pen or lot within the Plotted District must keep said pen or lot in clean and sanitary condition.

Sec. 3. Any person violating this ordinance or any part there of shall be fined in any sum not more than Ten Dollars and each day of such violation shall constitute a seperate offense.

Sec. 4. All ordinances or part of ordinances in conflict herewith hereby



Increasing the Yield. Experience has taught that the following practices are necessary to increase the yield of oats:

a. Preparation of seed bed to

a uniform depth and surface. b. Grading seed.

Treating seed for smut. Sowing with a drill.

Sowing plenty of seed. Cutting as soon as ripe.

Shocking. h. Stacking.

Uniform Land and Tillage.

The tillage of land for oats is one of the most neglected practices in a great many states. This is true in Iowa. Two or three times over a stalkfield with a dull disk and harrow is considered by too many farmers to be all that is necessary for oats. The ridges from the last year's cornfield are left so that they are apparent all through the season, and even the next year in the clover. The water from rains runs down into the hollows between these ridges in the early part of the season, causing the ground to pack, and thus retard the growth of the plants. The few that are able to survive get yellow and spindly. The whole piece is striped like a prison suit.

Depth to TIII.

The depth to which oat ground should be tilled varies with the soil and season. Corn stubble will usually produce a fair crop if prepared well to a depth of two to two and a half been raised upon land tilled to a depth of four inches. The seed should not be put in more than one inch below the surface.

The first item in the production of good oats is to prepare the land to a uniform surface and to a uniform

Uniform Seed.

Results show that grading seed improves the crop. Well graded oats will usually give a germination test above 90 per cent, but if they have at any time heated in the bin, they should be tested for vitality. This may be done easily in a box of dirt or Plainview, Floydada, Lubbock sand, set in among the house plants, and Tahoka. The same careful or in any light room that is not allowed to freeze.

There is another factor of importance from the standpoint of uniform seed, namely, smut. The fanning mill or grader will not eliminate oats smut from the seed oats.

Uniform Distribution of Seed. It is impossible to sow oats evenly by hand, or with an endgate seeder, and it is impossible to cover to a uniform depth after any kind of a broadcast seeder. Just how much this non-uniformity will affect the uniformity of the plants lies largely with the weather conditions. If there is an abundance of rain the difference caused by depth is reduced. . The spotted condition caused by uneven distribution is never entirely over-

Cutting the Crop.

The average farmer cuts his oats at above the proper time; that is just before the heads turn yellow. There are two or three days just before maturity when the heads are white, but are not entirely ripe. Oats cut at this period will ripen and cure in the shock, giving a brighter color, and are not so likely to "shatter" as when they are left until they get dead ripe. How to Shock.

Opinions differ regarding the form of shock which it is best to use. This will vary with the ripeness of the bundles. Round shocks should be of medium size, open enough at the base so that they will dry quickly and capped so as to expose the least possible amount of the heads to the sun and dew. The color of the grain depends largely upon these two points he shocking.

Shock Threshing. Shock threshing is a pernicious practice. EXPERIMENTING WITH OATS.

Only Plump, Heavy Seed Should Be Chosen for Large Yields.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] By sowing only plump seed definite increases in yield may be expected. At the Ontario station (annual report 1908) an experiment was conducted to determine the difference in yield to be secured by sowing the heavy and light seed of a given variety. For the first three years of the experiment the difference was 10.4 bushels per acre in favor of the heavy seed and for the last three years the difference in yield was 22.4 bushels per acre in favor of the heavy

Furthermore the difference in weight per bushel increased from 3.2 pounds the first three years to 9.5 pounds the last three years of the experiment. This shows a decided advantage to be secured by thorough grading and sowing only heavy seed

CLEANING AND GRADING OATS.

Seed oats should be carefully screened and graded before sowing. This work is ordinarily done with the mill, the light oats and some of the trash being taken out by a current of air, while the small oats and most of the weed seeds are removed by means to be done away with before we can of screens. The process should take out one-third or one-fourth of the oats, but if the seed is very light a much germinate at all, while others produce weak plants, which materially reduce the yield. Screening also greatly reduces the proportion of weed seed, thus preventing the spread of weeds and further favoring the growth of the oat crop.

PREPARING SEED BED.

A Well Prepared Seed Bed Is Necessary-Disk Land Two or Three Times-A Mellow Surface of About Three Inches-Plowing Not Necessary.

(By R. A. Moore, Wisconsin College of Agriculture.) [National Crop Improvement Service.]

A carefully prepared seed bed has been one of the most neglected features in connection with the production of oats. It is a very common practice to see an end-gate seeder at work in fields where the corn stalks still remain standing on the ground. As a matetr of fact, most of the preparation of the seed bed has been very largely done after the oats have been sown. Test Your Seed Oats. [National Crop Improvement Service.] Every grower of oats should test his seed before sowing. A very simple way to test seed for germination is to take two tin plates, one slightly smaller than the other, cut cotton flannel pads to fit the inner side of the plate, soak pads in water and squeeze out surplus moisture; put the pad upon the larger plate and count 100 oat seeds and scatter over the pad; place another wet pad over the seed and invert the smaller plate as a cover to prevent evaporation. Add a little water when the pad becomes somewhat dry, but be careful not to use too much water. Keep in temperature of from 74 to 80 degrees F. At the end of six or seven days, count Four sprouted seeds.

In spite of the magnitude of the oat crop in the United States and the immense increase in production in the last few years, the exportation of the grain has steadily decreased and the importation increased. It is evident, therefore, that there will be a good market for years to come. It should be the aim of the farmers of the United States, by more scientific growing and care of the crop, to supply the home demand.

DRILLING OATS BEST.

(By F. H. Demaree, Agronomist.) [National Crop Improvement Service.] "In experiments conducted at vari-

ous experiment stations to determine the effect of drilling compared with broadcasting on the yield of oats it has been found that a definite increase in yield can be secured by drilling in the oats instead of broadcasting them. The Illinois station found as a general average on these separate fields for three years, an increase of 3.9 bushels per acre in favor of drill-

ing over broadcasting. "Kansas reports one of the longest continued experiments on this method of seeding oats. The station at Manhattan found a yearly increase of 5.3 as an average for seven years in favor of drilling over broadcasting. At the Ontario Agricultural college the yields of six plots each for three years for the two methods of seeding showed four bushels per acre increase in favor of drilling.

Use a Disk Drill.

"These results are quite conclusive and definite increases should be secured by a more thorough preparation of the soil and putting in the oats with a drill. A disk drill is preferable because it acts as a cultivator and will cover better when running through corn stalks. These increases in yield are probably due to a better germination and stronger plants, which were produced by getting the seed down to moist fine dirt and a place where the root system could become more thoroughly established."

Depth to Plant Oats.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] The proper depth to sow the seed and the best manner of sowing will depend much upon the soil. Better results have been obtained by shallow sowing. One inch is the best depth at which to sow oats. Drilling is the best way of seeding where the seed bed is properly prepared, because the depth of seeding can be made more precise and uniform.

Corn Growers, Figure for Yourselves. Can't You Grow Ten Bushels Per Acre More?

(National Crop Improvement Service.)
One of the important factors in increasing the yield is to obtain a good stand. Let us notice for a moment the possibility of a perfect stand. Hills per acre, three feet eight inches apart, 3,241.

Number of stalks, three stalks per hill, 9,723. One-pound ear to the stalk, 9,723 pounds, or 143 bushels per acre.

Three-fourth-pound ear to the stalk, 51tf 7,292 pounds, or 107 bushels per acre. One-half-pound ear to the stalk, 4,-861 pounds, or 71 bushels per acre.

Why is it that we fail to obtain a failure may be due to the neglect of the following:

Proper selection of seed corn. Proper drying and storing of seed corn before freezing weather.


