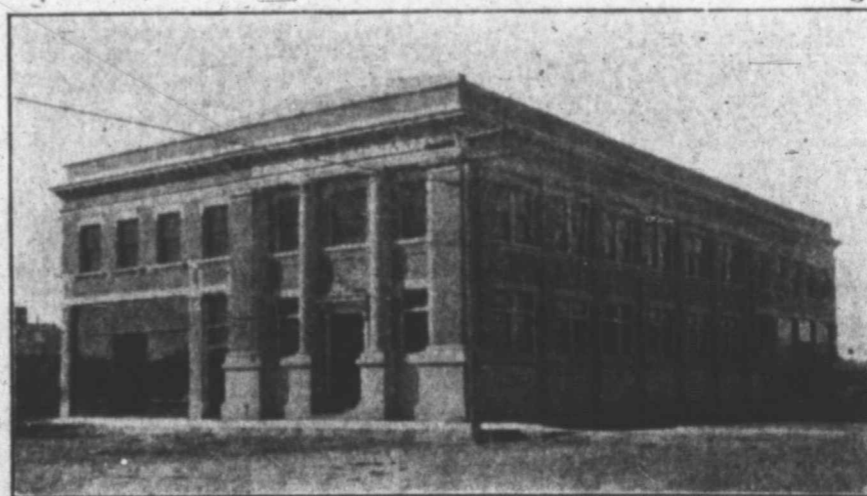

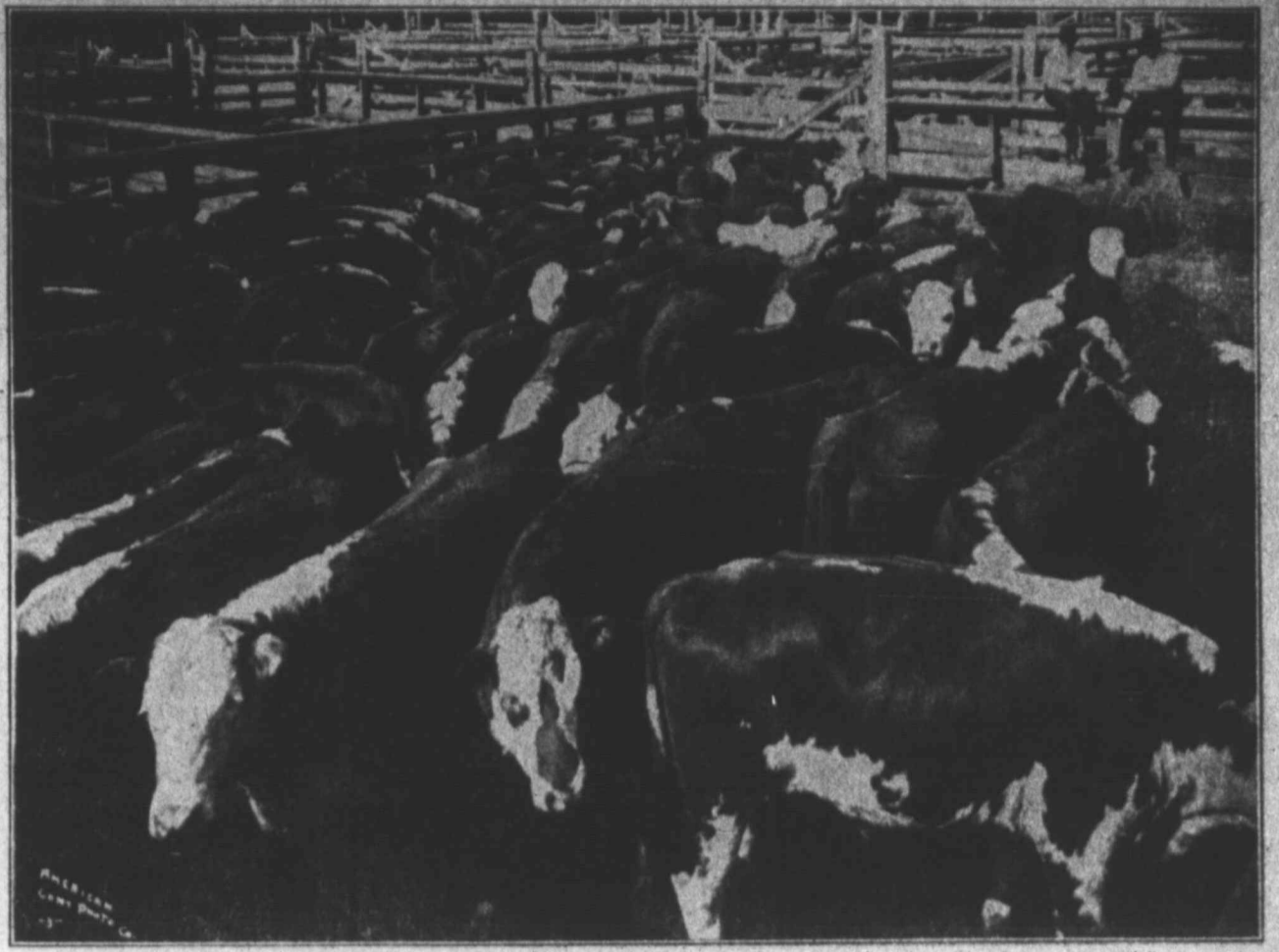

GOETHE AND THE CHESTNUTS

Poet, With Righteous Indignation, Objected to Practice That is Common in This Day.

Nothing is more annoying in autumn than to have near one's windows a chestnut tree, the natural target for the missiles of youth. Goethe, whose respect for the rights of property was only equaled by his love of law and order, suffered considerably from this annoyance. The Munich News has just lighted upon a complaint made by the poet to the corporation of Weimar during his stay in that city. He writes:

"At the edge of the fields is a row of Spanish chestnut trees, and as soon as the chestnuts begin to ripen the children bombard the trees with stones without any concern for the passers-by. Nor do they confine their attentions to the trees in the road. They throw cabbages and sticks at our fruit trees, so that the owners move about their own gardens in terror of their lives and begin to despair of ever garnering their crop of fruit. Worse still, this outrageous conduct goes on in the depths of winter, when there is not a single fruit on the branches nor even a bird's nest to excite the young rascals' cupidity. Policeman Lenger, to whom I have shown some of the stones that fell on my lawn, will bear me out."

Goethe never acted precipitately: In this case he refrained from sending in his complaint immediately, and to add weight to his representations kept the letter back till new outrages had been committed, when he sent it, with this postscript added:

"I may add that this is a matter of general interest, and I can prove it. As I was leaving my garden yesterday by the field gate to remonstrate with some sacrilegious young ruffians several peasants who were on their way home from working in their cabbage fields joined their voices to mine and told me that it was impossible to pass along this road, which is the only way to the fields, without incurring real danger."

NATIONAL LOVE OF BELLS.

Traveler in England Long Ago Noted the Fondness of the People for "Great Noises."

To one sixteenth century visitor at least the English seemed to be a nation of bell lovers. This was Paul Hentener, a German, who wrote of his travels in this country during the reign of Queen Elizabeth. "The English," he said, "excel in dancing and music, for they are active and lively, though of a thicker make than the French. They are vastly fond of great noises that fill the air, such as the firing of cannon, drums and the ringing of bells; so that in London it is common for a number of them, that have got a glass in their heads, to go into some belfry and ring the bells for hours together for the sake of exercise."

And though bell foundries are so few in this country, we can lay claim to the oldest association of bell ringers in Europe—the "Ancient Society of College Youths." The society was established in 1637, two of the founders being Lord Brereton and Sir Cliffe Clifton, and derived its title from the vanished city church of St. Martin Vintry, on College Hill, where the youths used to practice, relates the London Chronicle. To the college youths was dedicated Stedman's "Tintinologia," the earliest book on change ringing, which was published in 1667.

Hadn't Disturbed Him.

The poet and his friend dropped into a little side street place to continue their argument. The bartender was the only other occupant. Now and then he was called to their table to serve them. Between times he peeled potatoes and onions and carrots for the next day's free lunch. The poet and his prose friend argued vehemently, beat upon the tables, quoted yards of the best sellers and insulted each other in the most friendly and impassioned fashion in the world. At two o'clock in the morning the pair paid their bill and started for the door. Half way the poet stopped. "I hope," said he patronizingly, "that we have not disturbed you by our talk of literature?" "You never bothered me none," said the bartender, reassuringly. "I was busy peelin' pertaters."

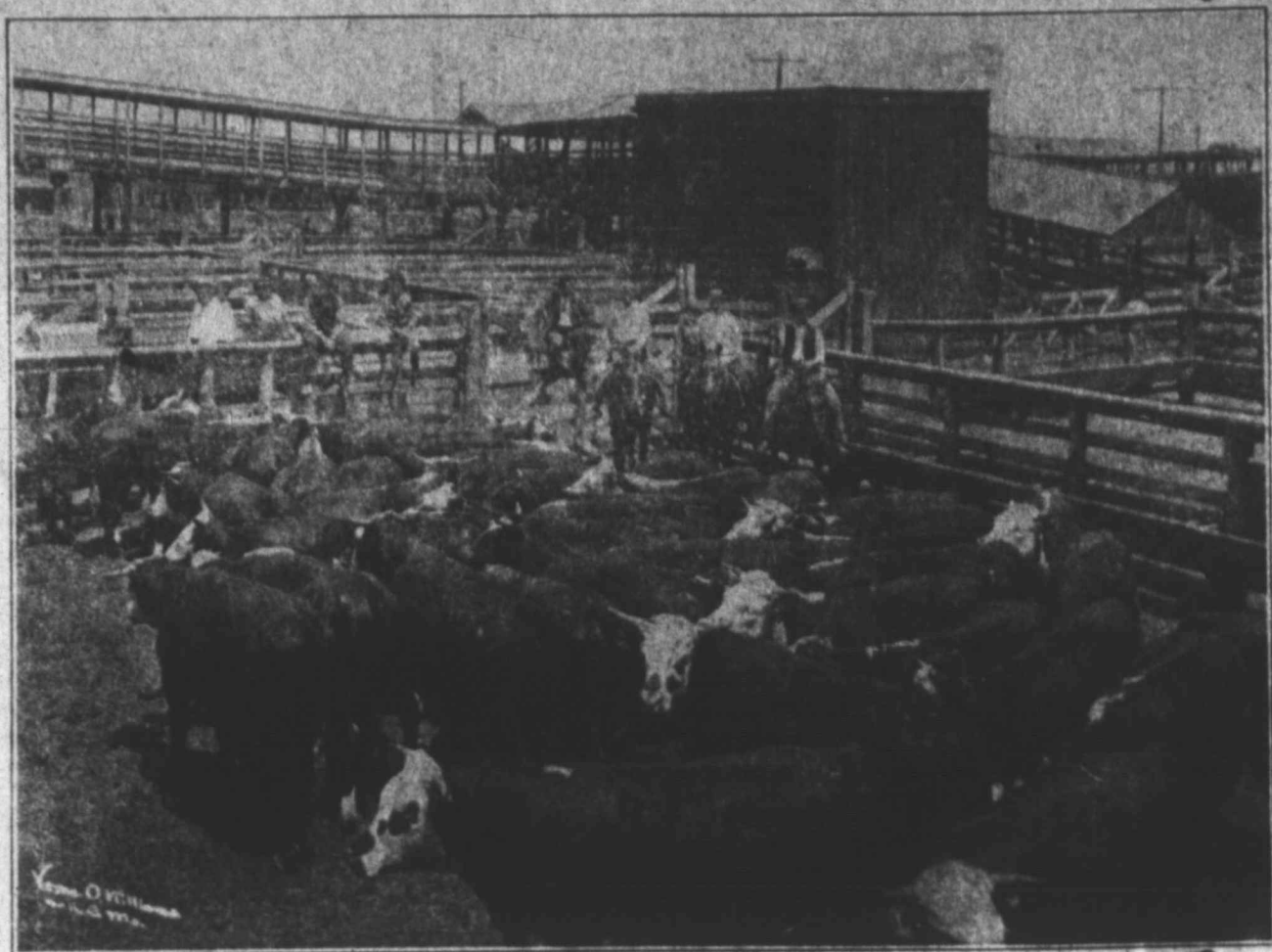
Ticklish Position.
