Three members of the Board of Regents for Normal Schools arrived in Canyon Monday morning on a combined business and pleasure trip. Their first duty was to investigate the progress being made with the Normal building and to look closer into the needs of the institution. From the standpoint of pleasure, they were here to enjoy the commencement exercises, after which they were taken to the canyons where they were astonished at the marvelous sights. At seven o'clock a fish fry at the Palo Duro club proved a fitting close to a busy and pleasant day.

The membership of the party consisted of Pres. Sam Sparks, Hon. A. C. Goethe of Austin and Hon. A. B. Martin of Plainview. Architect Endress accompanied the party and explained the progress and plans of the building.

All of the gentlemen were very enthusiastic over the prospects of the new building. They stated that Texas has never completed a public building at one time. Precedent seems to demand that the state's buildings be erected in pieces. Mr. Sparks in speaking at the breakfast Monday morning stated that the board was going to use every particle of its influence to see that the Normal building was completed and equipped as it should be. He stated that he was firmly convinced that the wings would be built at this time and that the necessary appropriation for equipping the building would be made.

The gentlemen left Monday night for Denton. They will visit all of the normals while on this trip. The annual meeting of the board will be held within a few days, possibly at the close of the trip.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS CLOSE TOMORROW

The commencement exercises of the Canyon public schools will be held Friday night of this week at the Methodist church.

Each member of the graduating class is on the program, following which will be the class address delivered by Rev. B. F. Fronabarger of the Baptist church.

The public schools have been enjoyed a very successful year - one of the most prosperous in the history of the city and the able faculty is to be congratulated upon the work accomplished during the nine months.

Scholarships will be issued for those making the highest grades during the year from the following institutions: State University, one for boy and one for girl; Georgetown, for boy and girl; A. & M. for boy; Trinity university, boy and girl; C. I. A. for girl.

Class Day Exercises Saturday.

The class day exercises of the Normal were held Saturday morning at the auditorium. The program was arranged to show the contrast between the old time rural school and the modern rural school of today. The freshman and junior classes exemplified the former, while the sophomores and seniors showed the latter. As a fitting close of the program, the members of the training school showed what is being done in this department by presenting a four act playlet entitled: "A Flower Allegory."

The exercises were pronounced to be the best in the history of the school.

Normal Commencement Sermon.

The commencement sermon of the Normal was preached Sunday morning by Rev. G. A. Farris of the Hereford Christian Church. Rev. Farris is an exceptionally able man and his sermon Sunday was highly educational and spiritual. Special music for the service consisted of the Hallelujah Chorus sung by the Choral Club and "A Life's Lesson" sung by the Normal Ladies Chorus.

Large numbers of the patrons of the Canyon public school attended patrons day Friday at the school building. A very splendid display of the regular work of the school was in evidence in several rooms, all of which was pronounced to be very fine.

Goethe of Austin, and Hon. Sam Sparks of Austin closing the program with a splendid address to the student body and with the delivery of the certificates and diplomas.

The special music for the occasion was Lacombe's "Estudiantina" by the Normal Chorus and an instrumental trio by Misses Terrill, Hicks and Ellis.

Will Discuss International Relations

Prof. J. A. Hill has been selected by the Carnegie Peace Foundation to give a series of lectures in Canyon during the summer months on the work this organization is attempting to do. The principal idea of the movement is for the purpose of giving the people a better understanding of international laws and of international relations, with especial emphasis upon our relations with Latin America. The primal object being to secure universal peace. This organization has chosen a number of college professors in each state to give series of lectures, and Prof. Hill is to be highly complemented upon his selection in this great movement.

Mexican Burned to Death.

A Mexican workman on the railroad was burned to death Monday noon three miles north of Happy. He was taking a nap after dinner under a new culvert which was covered with fresh cressote. At the other end of the culvert was a bunch of weeds which one of the Mexicans set on fire. The wind blew the weeds into the culvert and the cressote was set on fire, the flames flashing instantly the entire fifty foot length of the culvert and enveloping the sleeping Mexican. No doubt he was dazed to the extent of losing all presence of mind when awakened surrounded with fire, for instead of crawling a few inches to the opening, he started to crawl the fifty feet to the opposite end, but died before he could make the entire distance.

Steel Work Complete on Building.

All of the structural steel work on the new Normal building was completed Tuesday noon. A little more steel work is to be done on the roof but this will be completed when the top floor has been laid in order to save erecting tressel work at this time.

STORE BURGLARIZED FOR \$200 OF GOODS

The Leader was broken into Tuesday night and as nearly as can be estimated \$200 worth of goods were stolen, consisting chiefly of men's clothing and furnishings.

A 2x4 was used to break in the back door. This work effected, the thief or thieves proceeded to select out the goods wanted. Two suit cases were taken off the high shelf. All of the men's clothing from the racks were taken down and several suits and coats taken, the remainder being thrown on the floor and show cases. The piles of pants from the rear of the store were brought to the front and several pairs selected. Some shoes, sizes 6 or 7, were missing. A box of hose was taken, likewise a box of colars. The men's gloves were taken from the shelves and presumably several pairs were taken.

All the silverware from a case in the front of the store was taken. Three silk petticoats and some ladies hose are missing.

The thieves were traced through the grocery department by the burned matches they used, but little was missing there, with the exception of taking all the chewing gum from one of the cases.

A jimmy was used in trying to open the cash register but no damage was done other than scratches on the register. Two of the cash drawers stood open both containing about \$2 in change, but this was not taken.

In working the thieves used matches for lights and nearly a box was used. In one place they had dropped a lighted match which had set fire to paper and in another a match had fallen upon a coat and scorched it badly in one place.

Three-eighths of an inch rain fell about three o'clock this morning. The fall came slowly and will be of great benefit in softening the crust which had formed on fields which had not been cultivated since the last rain.

That there is no boy in Texas so poor who, having the ambition, the health and the will, cannot obtain a University education, is demonstrated by J. G. Grissom, whose photograph in reproduction appears above. Mr. Grissom will receive this year two degrees from the University of Texas, the degree of Bachelor of Arts and the degree of Master of Arts. He has earned himself every penny he has spent at the University. But for the munificence of the state in supporting a University it would be impossible for poor boys to secure a University education. Handicap young Grissom, for instance, with a payment of \$200 per year for tuition, and he would be unable to attend the University. The founders of the Republic pointed out this fact, that whereas the rich can send their sons and daughters anywhere, to the East, to Europe, or to the Orient, to secure an education, the children of the poor must depend upon state supported institutions of higher education. Therefore, the University of Texas has been truly called "the poor man's school," since above half of the students within its walls are either in whole or in part self-supporting, and fifty per cent of the remainder would be unable to attend a university that demanded tuition-fees.

Any comprehensive scheme for rural school improvement in Texas must include a provision for the training of teachers to teach them. Herein is a great service of the University of Texas, which institution alone furnishes above 400 well trained teachers to the common schools of the State.

The University of Texas is the largest institution of learning in the South. It has graduated above 4,000 students, while the roll of its ex-students and graduates include the names of over 20,000 individuals.

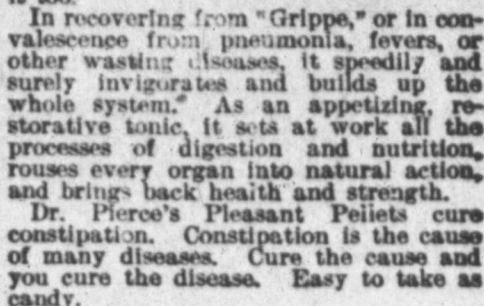

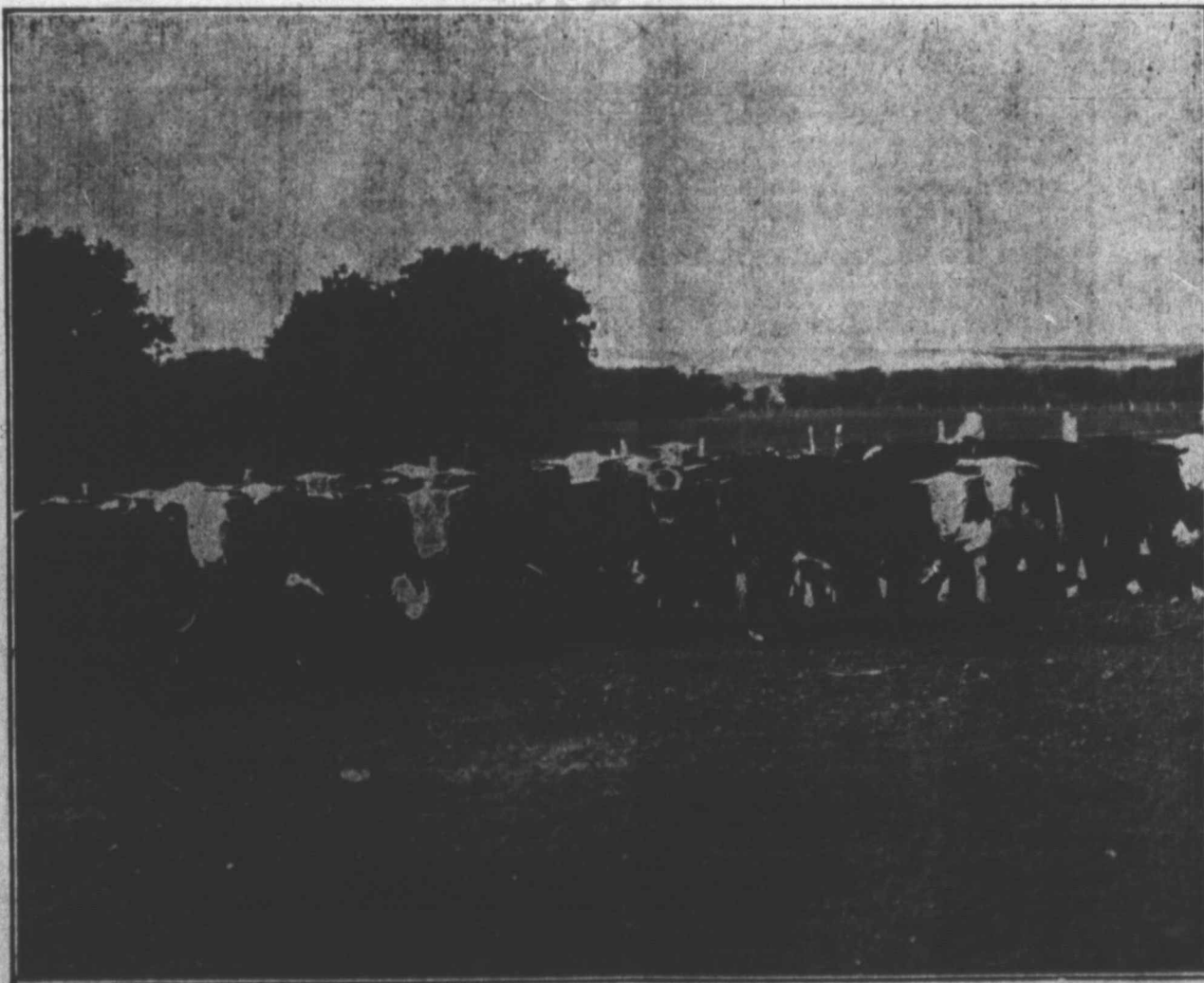
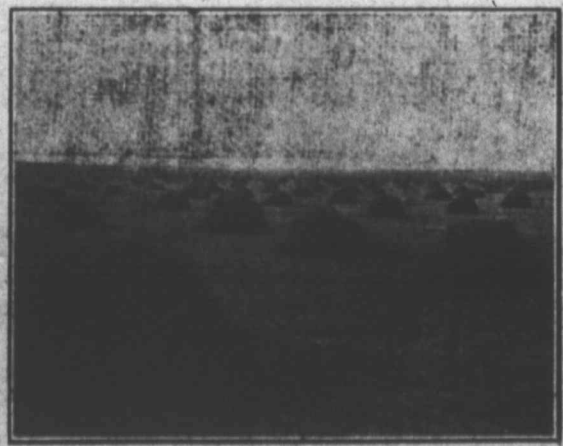

It is the fashion of the press to poke fun at Kansas, which may be depended upon to come to the front with something foolish in the way of legislation. And although the Sunflower state has lifted up her glowing reputation in the present session, her companions in the sorority of states have not fallen far behind. Most of the new laws have been introduced for prohibiting something or other. Here are a culled from one day's exchanges:

To prohibit the catching of frogs.—Minnesota.

To prohibit the use of face powder, rouge, hair dye or bleach, the piercing of ears and wearing of earrings.—Kansas.

To compel chickens to go to roost before 7 p. m. To provide that bulls driven along the road at night shall wear lights.—Colorado.

To furnish lumber jacks individual bath tubs.—Minnesota.

Establishing a uniform thickness of sleigh runners.—North Dakota.

Prohibiting a man from becoming a "bull-dogger" i. e. allowing persons to throw base ball at ones head, for hire.—New York.

Limiting each resident of the state to one gallon of "corn-licker" a month.—South Carolina.

Prohibiting the smoking of cigarettes by school, normal and university instructors.—Wisconsin.

Prohibiting the publication of liquor advertisements in the newspapers of the state and calling for the destruction of all such advertisements in papers outside of the state before such papers are sold.—Alabama

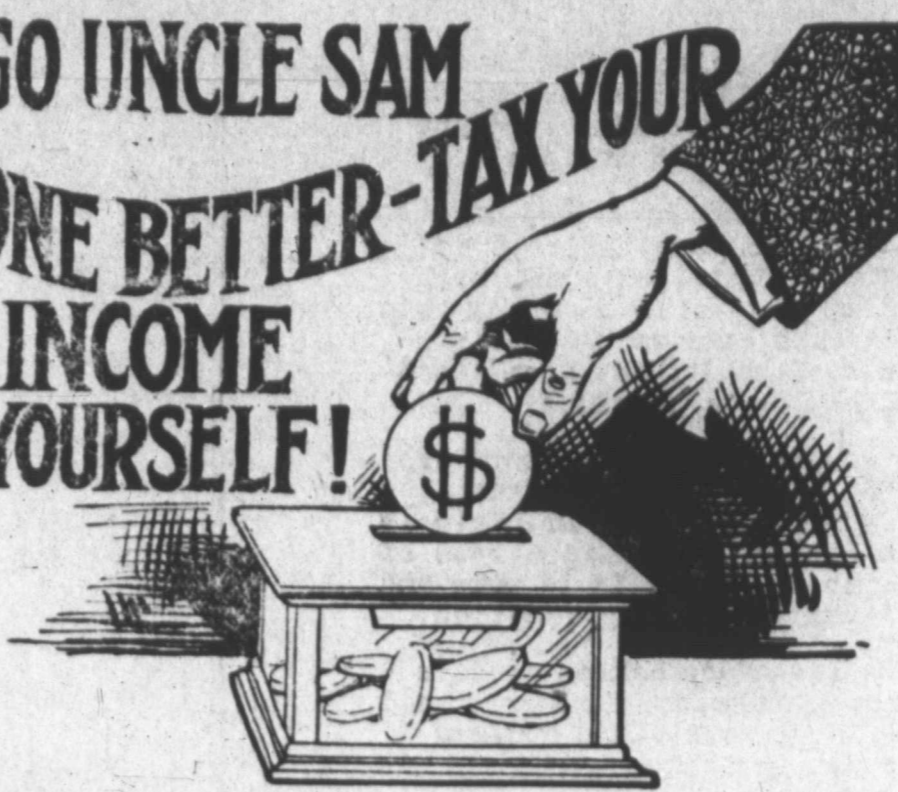

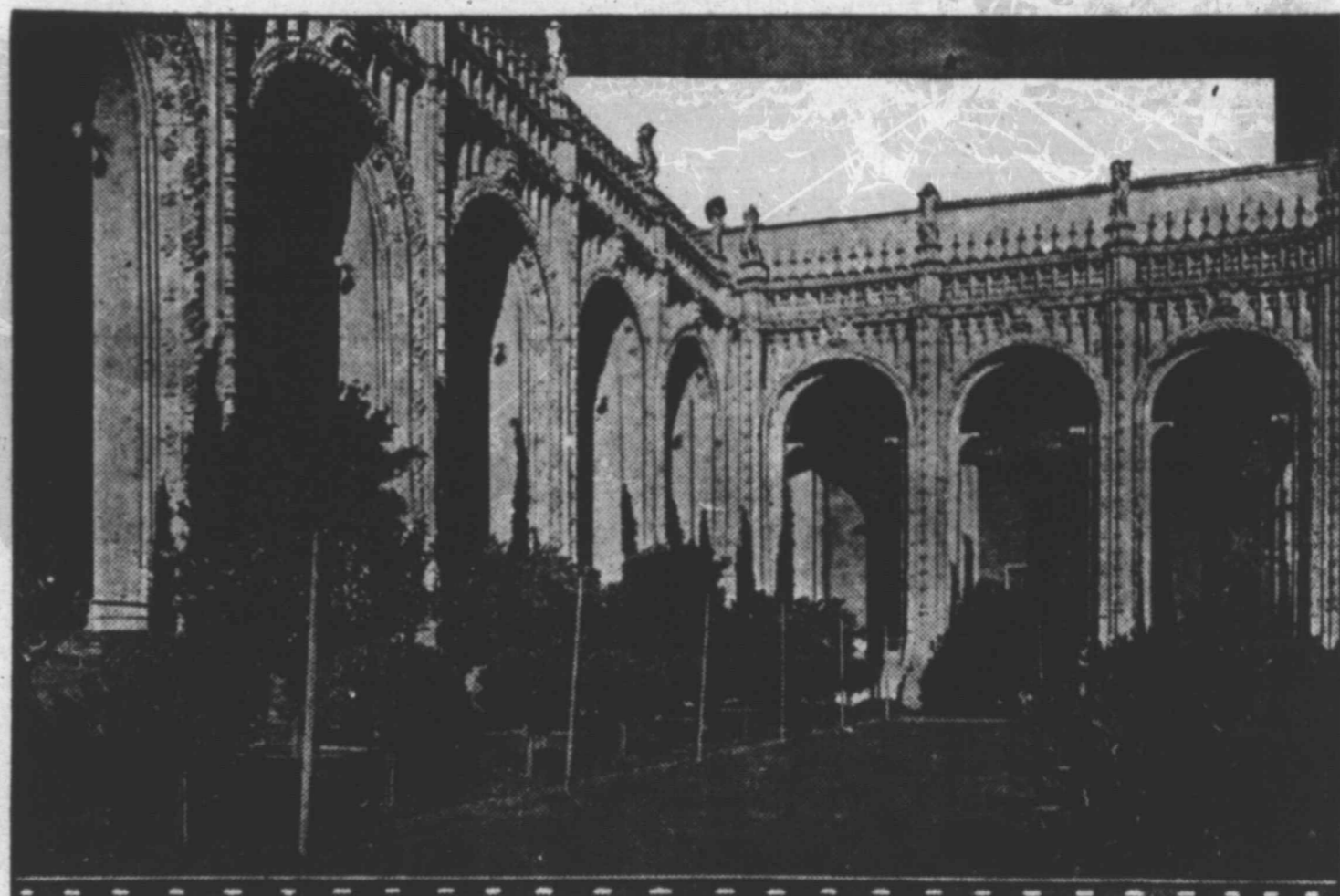

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision authorizing a qualified voter to vote for State officers, or on any proposition submitted to the voters of this State in a precinct other than the precinct of his residence under certain conditions, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, and every male person of foreign birth, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and providing further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State, and holds a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or, if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. If any qualified voter in this State shall have personally paid his poll tax in the county and precinct of his residence, or secured an exemption certificate showing that he is exempt from paying a poll tax, he shall be permitted to vote in the county in which he may be on election day on any proposition which may have been submitted to the voters of the entire State, and for any office to be filled by the voters of the entire State; also for members of either branch of the Legislature and Congress and judicial officials outside of the legislative, congressional or judicial district of such voter's residence, and nothing herein shall permit a voter to vote at any place other than his residence, if he be within the county of his residence on election day. Any person offering to vote in any county other than the county of his residence shall deliver to the election managers his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, who shall retain same until the following day, and then mail same to the person depositing same to any address he may name; and in addition to depositing the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, such person so offering to vote shall make an affidavit:

(1) That he is absent from home, and it will be impossible for him to return to the precinct of his residence in time to vote; (2) that he has not voted at any other precinct on that day; and will not offer to vote at any other precinct in this State; (3) that he personally paid his poll tax within the time provided by law, or personally secured the certificate of his exemption from the payment of a poll tax.

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of July, 1915, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have same published, as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions." Those opposing the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions."

Sec. 4. No legislation shall be necessary to put into effect this article of the Constitution, but when adopted same shall be self-enacting.

Sec. 5. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18

A Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Section 53 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for public improvements, and levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same, and for maintenance.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 53, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 53. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company, provided, however, that under legislative provision any county, any political subdivision of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, villages, or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory; except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this constitution; and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereon, or irrigation therefrom, or in aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

Provided, however, that under legislative enactment any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, which may be formed for the purpose of reclaiming and improving overflowed and swamp lands in this State, and maintaining the improvements thereof, may, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory, in addition to all other debts, issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the real property in such district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a county, district or other political subdivision has issued bonds for improvements for the purposes named in this Section, the Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of taxes for the maintenance of such improvements, not to exceed fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation in any one year.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment of Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for its adoption or rejection, at a special election hereby ordered for the Fourth Saturday in July, A. D. 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment to Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levees, drainage, road and other public improvements, and for taxes therefor."

Those voting against its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment of Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levees, drainage, road and other improvements, and for taxes therefor."

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the county judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of the voters in each county, on which he shall have printed the form of ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of voters.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation, and printing tickets and blanks for use in said election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

A Joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Section 9, Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors voting at an election held for that purpose, and making an appropriation for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit:

Thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment, September 25, 1883; and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further building and maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county or of any political subdivision or subdivisions of the county, or of any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within any county, who has been assessed a property tax and paid said tax for the next year prior to the time he offers to vote, voting at an election held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollar valuation of property subject to taxation in such county, political subdivision or subdivisions, or described or defined district. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to Section 9, Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in the month of July, 1915. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment to Section 9, Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollar valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3

A proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution of said State, so as to provide that the Supreme Court of this State shall consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, describe their qualifications, tenure of office and compensation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three judges shall be necessary to the decision of any case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be at the time of his election a citizen of the United States, and of this State, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court, or such lawyer and judge together, at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall each receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars until otherwise provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for said officers; and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Immediately after the adoption of this amendment the Governor of this State shall call an election for the purpose of electing two Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, one of whom shall, when elected, hold said office for four years and one of whom, when elected, shall hold said office for six years, and the question of which of them shall hold for four years and which of them hold for six years shall be determined by lot, as now provided by law.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, ordering an election to determine whether or not said Constitution amendments will be

adopted, and have the same published, as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. Said election shall be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as necessary, is hereby appropriated from any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A Joint resolution to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation of a student's loan fund in each county in connection with the public schools thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3b, which shall read and be as follows, to-wit:

Sec. 3b. The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund to be known as a "Student's Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and administered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by law.

Sec. 2. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in each county; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. Provided, that if the tax is adopted, after it has been enforced for two years, an election may be held, on the order of the commissioners' court to determine whether or not said tax shall be repealed; and provided, further, that it shall be the duty of the Commissioners' Court to order such election upon a petition so to do by twenty-five per cent of the qualified tax paying voters of the county.

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall pass the necessary laws carrying into effect this provision of the Constitution.

Sec. 4. That the above and foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week, for four weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before a special election to be held for the purpose of voting upon such proposed amendment, on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, in one weekly newspaper of each county in the State of Texas, in which such newspaper may be published. And the Governor shall, and he is hereby directed, to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature. At such election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot the words "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Student's Loan Fund," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Student's Loan Fund."

Sec. 5. That \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of advertising and holding the election provided for above.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 34

A Joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, Section 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the University of Texas and fixing its permanent location in Travis County; providing for the permanent location of the medical branch of the University of Texas in Galveston County; providing for the establishment and maintenance of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas as an independent college, and providing for its permanent location in Brazos County; providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the College of Industrial Arts and fixing its permanent location in Denton County; authorizing the establishment of junior agricultural college subsidiary to and under the government of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board; establishing the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, and declaring it a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, and fixing its permanent location at Prairie View, in Waller County; making an equitable division of the State permanent endowment fund between the University of Texas, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College; making an appropriation to defray the expenses of advertising the Governor's proclamation and submitting same to a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, Article 7, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 10. The University of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Travis County, and shall be a university of the first class. The Legislature shall provide for its organization and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement shall make by appropriation and otherwise such provision as may be necessary for the promotion of literature and the arts and sciences, pure and applied, in a university of the first class. The affairs of the University of Texas shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The location herein made of the University of Texas shall in no way affect the location of the medical branch thereof situated in Galveston County.

Sec. 11. All lands and other property granted by the Republic of State of Texas to the University of Texas, or the University of Texas and its branches, except the lands transferred by Section 13 of this Article to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, shall together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, constitute the permanent university fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund, and shall be applied to the support and development of the University of Texas and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of University lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund. The one-tenth of the alternate sections of lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which was set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas by an act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled "An Act to establish the University of Texas" shall not be included in or constitute a part of the permanent university fund.

Sec. 12. The Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Brazos County and separated from the University of Texas and constituted an independent college. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of said college and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement, shall make by appropriation and otherwise such provision as may be necessary to accomplish the purpose of said institution, which, without excluding classical and cultural studies, shall be to teach and develop those branches of learning which relate to agriculture and the natural sciences connected therewith, the various branches of engineering, the mechanical arts and military sciences and tactics. The affairs of the Agricultural and Mechanical College shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College for Colored Youths is hereby established and its government and control shall continue under the governing board of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. Provided the Legislature may establish junior agricultural colleges subsidiary to the Agricultural and Mechanical College and under the control of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board.

Sec. 13. Of the land heretofore set apart to the University and to the University and its branches by the State of Texas, and remaining unsold, there are hereby transferred to and made a part of the permanent fund of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, six hundred thousand acres of land of average value; there are hereby transferred as a permanent fund to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College one hundred and fifty thousand acres of land of average value; and all of the remainder of the said land shall constitute a part of the permanent fund of the University of Texas. The Legislature shall provide for the division of the land as specified herein. The land herein set apart to the University, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College may be sold under such regulations, at such times and on such terms as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the prompt collection at maturity of all debts due on account of the sale of said lands, and in no event shall any relief be granted to any purchaser.

Sec. 14. All lands and other property heretofore granted or herein granted to the Agricultural and Mechanical College, together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, shall constitute its permanent fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund and shall be applied to the support and development of the Agricultural and Mechanical College and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of the Agricultural and Mechanical College lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund.

Sec. 15. The College of Industrial Arts for White Girls located at Denton, in Denton County, Texas, is hereby established and recognized as an independent college, and the Legislature shall provide for its organization, maintenance, development and permanent improvement and shall make, by appropriation and otherwise, such provision in addition to that heretofore made as may be necessary for the establishment and maintenance of a first class college, for the education of white girls in the literary branches, the arts and sciences and the practical industries of the age. The college shall have its own governing board, which shall designate the officers of administration and instruction, and other employees, determine their salaries, establish departments, subdivisions, libraries and laboratories and other agencies of education consistent with the objects

NEW THEORY AS TO SHOCK

Medical Man Points Out Some Flaws in Beliefs That Have Been Generally Accepted.

In an article on intestinal stasis printed in the Medical Record, Dr. Frank R. Starkey of Philadelphia advanced a new hypothesis as to what "shock" is.

"What is this mysterious condition of depression which we call shock?" he asked. "In view of the radical changes that have taken place in our understanding of physics since the advent of the electronic theory we know that the different physical manifestations of matter are simply differences in the vibration of the component electrons. The difference between the individuality of persons is not merely one of physiognomy or corporeal peculiarities, but their personality depends upon the rate of their electronic vibrations. The human body is naught else but an aggregation of cells, each a world within itself, made up of various components which are finally composed of electrons vibrating in perfect unison and the entire organization attuned to vibrate in one harmonious whole.

"In view of all this, why should it not be reasonable and rational to define shock as a disturbance in the normal vibrations of the electrons of the organism? This would certainly conform to our recent knowledge."

There are two ways of bagging a hippopotamus, says a writer in the Wide World, and neither is justified unless the sportsman is sorely in want of food, for its meat is very poor indeed, and wants a good deal of preparation to be palatable to anyone except the starving. It has a taste I can only describe as fishy—something of what beef would taste like after being wrapped up for a couple of days with a Scotch haddock of doubtful freshness. The hippo may be shot in water; when mortally wounded he will sink, and will not reappear on the surface for several hours, consequently a tiring lookout has to be kept for the carcass. If he is only slightly wounded he may charge, but more often he will flee and die in the reeds, to serve as food for scavenger birds or crocodiles. The other and more sporting way is to shoot him on land. This is, as a rule, only possible at night, or late in the evening or early in the morning. It would not be wise to find oneself between the river and the wounded hippo, for he at once makes for the water by the shortest route, and he goes so fast that getting out of his way requires pretty speedy feet and great coolness of nerve.

A Famous Shot.

A good story is told on a trading agent in Nyassaland. He was obsessed with a particularly real horror of lions. One of these brutes began to eat up the natives of the nearby village, doing terrible havoc. The agent barricaded himself in his room and slept with six native watchmen on duty in case the lion should try to break into his house. One night he thought he heard the lion prowling around, and promptly fired out of the window, knocking a hole in the government boat. The following morning he was astonished to see what had happened. That night he again heard sounds which seemed to foretell the presence of the lion. He seized his rifle and fired, and this time succeeded in bagging the district officer's favorite mule at the first shot. A certain well-known sportsman, who shall be nameless, was hunting in the district and heard the story. He wrote to the agent and congratulated him on shooting his first lion. The agent rose to the occasion, and now silences all skeptics by producing the letter. He has since acquired quite a reputation as a lion-hunter on the strength of this testimonial.—Capt. W. They will leave today for their home in Lamesa. Their many friends in Canyon wish them a happy and prosperous life. Contributed.

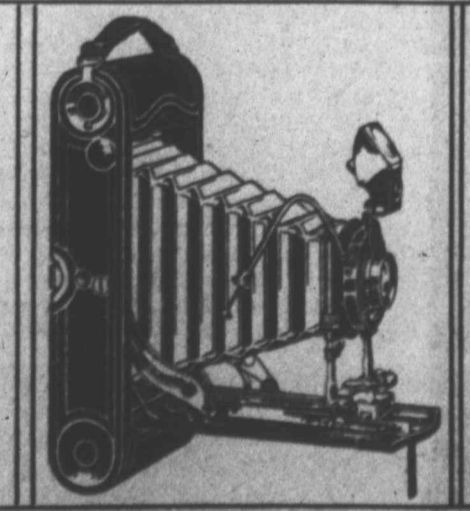
