

"Join the WACS and see the world", a statement so often played upon, is oftentimes misleading, states County Chairman Lillamae Thompson. Miss Thompson spent seven months in the service. She had special training in administra-tive school after her basic train-ing. Then she was sent out into the field to one of the largest air corps bases in this country. There she had the opportunity of seeing a whole field in operation. Her job carried her into all base headquarters, Hospital, Quartermaster, dozens of other branches that are so essential to ar army base. So

## Warning Against Overheating Homes Given

weather, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued some timely advice concerning room temperature and its relation

"It is very important that inside temperature be maintained at around 68 to 70 degrees," Dr. Cox continually overheated in the winter, and a degree of heat is often demanded that would not be tolerated in the summertime"

In a room that is overheated, moment that the outside temperature is encountered, much harm may result. Colds, influenza, bronchial troubles and even pneumo nia may take advantage of this bodily abuse, and take a serious toll in sickness and even in death. "An inside temperature of from

68 to 70 degrees is not only more healthful, but actually more comfortable," Dr. Cox said. "When, added to these factors, the resulting economy is considered, it might be well to check up and see what your thermometor reads. A thermometor kept within the range suggested, plus the careful maintenance of proper humidity, and Raymond Smith. will help to prevent needless sickness and protect the good health of your family."
